Dear Parents:

This letter contains three important announcements. The first concerns the scrap metal drive, the second the sale of war stamps, and the third hot lunches.

1. As you know, scrap metal is being collected all over the United States. The drive is on in Crawford County this week. The Horace Mann Training School children are asked to assist. The drive begins tomorrow, September 29 and continues through Tuesday, October 6. We hope you will help your child to find and bring to the Training School a great amount of scrap metal as we hope to have the largest scrap pile in the county.

2. All children as well as adults are interested in buying war stamps and bonds. We have planned to begin to sponsor the sale of war stamps Wednesday, September 30. The war stamps will be on sale at the college post office. We hope each child in the Training School will plan to buy at least one war savings stamp each week during the year. The stamps, as you know, come in the following denominations: 10¢, 25¢, 50¢, \$1, or \$5. The supervisor will take the children to the post office. The sale will continue for one half day each week.

3. Hot lunches for the children will be served again this year in the Home Economics Dining Room of Science Hall. The lunch is 10¢. Each child must give his name ~~in~~ to the supervisor with the money for his lunch by 9:30 a.m. each day. If you have any questions concerning lunches please talk with the supervisor or with me. We want every child who finds it necessary to eat lunch away from home to eat with us.

College Mourning Recent Death Of A. H. Whitesitt

Widely Known Professor
Succumbs To Heart
Attack Monday

Andrew H. Whitesitt, professor of industrial education at the College, died suddenly at his home following a heart attack on Monday afternoon, Oct. 5.

Although he had experienced similar attacks before, he had been in apparent good health recently, and taught his classes as usual on Monday. About four o'clock he walked to his home two blocks from the campus and spent some time at work on a door.



He then became ill and summoned a neighbor in the adjoining apartment who called Mrs. Whitesitt at town where she had been shopping. A physician was also called.

Both Mrs. Whitesitt and the physician hurried to the apartment immediately. When Mr. Whitesitt seemed better the physician left. Shortly afterward Mr. Whitesitt experienced another attack and passed away.

Born In Indiana

Mr. Whitesitt was born May 13, 1874, in Morgan county, Indiana. After teaching the common branches in a number of rural and village schools in Indiana for nine years, he enrolled in the State Teachers College, Terre Haute, Indiana, where he received the Life Diploma in 1908. From 1908 to 1911, he was director of industrial arts in East Chicago, Indiana. Then for two years he was instructor of cabinet-making in Emmerich Manual Training high school, Indianapolis.

In 1913 he went to Kansas State Teachers College, Pittsburg, as head of the wood-working department, and in 1918 was promoted to the position of director of the industrial education department which he held until 1935. In that year he asked to be relieved of responsibility as head of the department, and was succeeded in that capacity by Dr. William T. Bawden. Professor Whitesitt continued as a member of the staff of the department, teaching classes in woodwork, drafting, and a methods course.

Led In Development

Coming to Pittsburg in 1913, it was his good fortune to see the development of the former State Manual Training Normal school, with a two-year diploma curriculum, into the Kansas State Teachers College, offering four-year curricula leading to both AB and BS degrees, and a fifth year of graduate work leading to the MS degree. During this period the industrial education department of the College attained nationwide recognition for the high quality of work

accomplished, and its graduates were called to all parts of the country.

After his appointment at Kansas State Teachers College, Mr. Whitesitt completed summer school work at Bradley Polytechnic Institute, Peoria, Illinois, and at The Stout Institute, Menomonee, Wisconsin. In the summer of 1917 he received the BS degree from Kansas State Teachers College, and in 1928 the MA degree from Teachers College, Columbia University, New York. His practical trade experience included carpentry and cabinet-making.

One Of The First

Of all the members of the College faculty who were serving at the time of Professor Whitesitt's appointment in 1913, only three are still active: Dr. O. P. Dellinger, dean of the College and of the Graduate School; Professor J. A. G. Shirk, head of the Department of Mathematics; Miss Odella Nation, Librarian. Two others, retired from active duty, are still living in Pittsburg: G. W. Trout, former dean of the College; Miss Eula-Lia Roseberry, former head of the Department of Geography.

He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Ada Whitesitt; two sons, Ernal K., instructor of printing, East High School, Wichita, Kansas, and Robert K., Pullman conductor with headquarters in St. Louis, Missouri; one brother, Ritter Whitesitt, industrial arts instructor, St. Louis; and four grandchildren.

Active In Organizations

He was active member of the National Education Association, American Vocational Association, Kansas State Teachers Association, Kansas Industrial Arts Association (serving as president two terms), and the Kansas Vocational Association. For a short period he was a member of the Manual Arts Conference of the Mississippi Valley. He was elected to membership in Phi Delta Kappa, honorary educational fraternity, at Columbia University, and was a member of the American Association of University Professors. He was an active member of the Christian Church and a member of the board of elders.

One of the best liked members of the faculty at the College Mr. Whitesitt was an outstanding example of the cardinal virtues of the gentleman. Under all circumstances, and to all people he was helpful, kindly and considerate.

If You Ask Me

BY ELEANOR ROOSEVELT

When Mrs. Roosevelt, one of the most interesting, well-informed and unusual women of our times, agreed to reply to as many questions put to her by readers of the JOURNAL as could be answered on this page, we were not altogether prepared for the enormous interest aroused by this monthly feature.

Of the many letters which readers send in—some, we regret to say, bordering on ill nature—our editors choose those questions which are most provocative, not only because they make the most interesting reading, but because they give the first lady of the land an opportunity to express her opinion, and sometimes to answer her critics—thus clarifying some of the most controversial questions of the day.

Letters should be addressed to Mrs. Roosevelt, c/o the LADIES' HOME JOURNAL. No letters for this page sent to the White House will be answered. It should be understood that Mrs. Roosevelt's answers reflect only her own opinions, and are not necessarily the opinions either of the Administration or of the Editors of the JOURNAL.

Do you think it should be permissible for teachers to wear anklets to school, now that stockings are scarce?

Winter is coming and anklets will be a trifle cold! Seriously, however, if there is a real shortage of stockings in the place where you live, and you cannot buy stockings, of course you will be obliged to wear anklets or go without stockings. As long as you can buy stockings that wear fairly well, at a reasonable price, I think you would find yourself open to less criticism as a teacher if you wore them. Conditions may change with the war, but that would be my reaction now.

Carveth Wells, Noted Writer Will Appear At College Soon

A. A. U. W. Sponsors Lecture On "Trinidad—Atlantic Singapore"

Carveth Wells, noted lecturer, explorer and writer, will speak at the College, Friday, Jan. 29, in Carney hall auditorium. Mr. Wells will appear under the sponsorship of the American Association of University Women. His subject will be "Trinidad—Singapore of the Atlantic."

College students will be admitted to the lecture on their activity tickets. Admission for adults will be 56 cents, and for children 25 cents. All persons in uniform will be admitted upon payment of the 6 cents tax.

Professor of engineering in London, railroad builder in Canada, surveyor in Malaya, explorer in Central Africa, lecturer in America, writer in Bermuda, and at various other times soldier, naturalist, motion picture producer, Carveth Wells is genuinely a world citizen. He was sent to the Malay Peninsula by the British Government and lived for six years in the jungle surveying a route for the East Coast railway, and making a study of flora, fauna and people of the peninsula.

He has led expeditions to Central Africa, the Arctic Lapland, Hokkaido Japan, Russian Caucasus Mountains and many other little-known places.

Son of a Cornish mother and Bermudian father, Carveth Wells describes himself as a "combination of pirate and Celt" but also is proud of his American citizenship. He has long been a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society—pre-eminent recognition for important exploration.

Carveth Wells is a vivid personality. Handsome and debonair, with a whimsical manner of speech, he fascinates his audiences. Wherever he goes he delights people with his consummate skill as a speaker and with his vast knowledge of his subject.

Students will enroll for the second semester of school on Monday, Jan. 25, from 7:30 a. m. until 5:30 p. m., it has been announced by Professor J. A. G. Shirk, chairman of the enrolling committee.

Science Hall and the Library will be the two buildings used by the students, the same system being followed which was used last semester. Students will report first to Carney Hall in the College auditorium. There they will make out preliminary cards and then go to the library for a completion of their class schedules.

Classes for the second semester will convene at 8:00 a. m. Tuesday, Jan. 26. Second semester enrollment will follow a week of tests from Jan. 19 until Jan. 22.

In outlining plans for the enrollment Professor Shirk encouraged men in the enlisted reserve programs, and boys of draft age, to continue their studies and not drop out of school thinking that they might be called soon.

"Every student should get as much schooling as possible," Professor Shirk said. There is every indication that men will be called up for service individually and probably much slower than they think. Also a plan is now being worked out which will make it possible for students to receive proportionate refunds on their fees if it is necessary for them to leave school next semester at any time. In the meantime students can stay in school and get training of value to them when they are called into the armed forces.

Professor Shirk urged all students to think seriously of turning their enrollments this semester to subjects which would be of value to the war effort. "This is particularly true of students who are planning to go into the armed forces," he said. "The more training a student can get in a military way the better his chances are in the army and navy, and the more chance he has for officers training."

Mrs. Raymond Sayre, of Ackworth, Ia., addressed the annual meeting of the Kansas Council of Women, on "Woman's Part in War and Peace," at luncheon today at the Woman's club.

"Women have a greater stake in this war than in any other war that has been fought and they have an obligation to guard and preserve the gifts of democracy which they enjoy," Mrs. Sayre said. In continuing, she exclaimed, "They must take their part in winning the war by doing useful drudgery; by practicing the fine art of discard, and of learning to adjust themselves in good spirit to rapidly changing conditions."

Another point Mrs. Sayre brought out is that women have a responsibility for preserving democracy on the home front and if they do not the country is in danger of losing democracy while the boys fight for it on the battle front.

In closing she said, "The women's part in building the peace is the necessity of molding public opinion, having their part in the policies that are adopted. Thru their efforts we can build the kind of world we want."

Mrs. W. G. West, of McPherson, president, presided at the program of the thirty-second annual meeting of the council, which had for its theme "Women United for Victory and Peace."

Officers, elected for two years, today completed their first year and will carry over their activities for 1943. They are Mrs. West, Mrs. Cora W. Shelton, Salina, first vice president; Mrs. D. A. N. LONG ILLNESS ENDS CAREER
OF COLLEGE FACULTY
MEMBER.

On Teaching Staff Here 25 Years,
She Had Retired in 1939 Be-
cause of Ill Health; Fu-
neral Sunday.

Mrs. Hattie Moore Mitchell, for 25 years dean of women at the College, died at 6:07 o'clock last night at her home, 1907 South Elm. Mrs. Mitchell had been in failing health for the past five years and had been confined to her bed for the last three and one-half years. Dr. C. H. Benage, attending physician, attributed direct cause of death to acute pulmonary oedema. Mrs. Mitchell retired from her College duties in 1939. She was 76 years old.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed, but rites will be conducted Sunday afternoon at the Christian church with Rev. Virgil G. Nalley officiating. The body will be taken to Unionville, O., for interment in the Mitchell cemetery there, a cemetery which was started by forefathers of Mr. Mitchell. The body is at the Brenner chapel, where it may be viewed by friends from 3 p. m. tomorrow until 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Born Aug. 15, 1866, at Marble Rock, Ia., Mrs. Mitchell began her teaching career in an Iowa country school before she was sixteen years old. She braved the heavy snows to travel to and from the school on a handcar with railroad workers.

Popular Speaker.

A graduate of the Marble Rock high school, Mrs. Mitchell received her M. S. degree from Drake University at Des Moines in 1902. She was married in July, 1896, at Marble Rock to J. F. Mitchell who served as registrar at the College for many years. He survives.

After her youthful beginning in the teaching profession, Mrs. Mitchell taught in the high school at Mason City, Ia. She left there to assume the principalship of the Plog, Ia., high school. Next Mrs. Mitchell went to the Nora Springs, Ia., Seminary as an instructor. She remained there until 1897 when she went to Drake University to teach.

Mrs. Mitchell remained at Drake University until 1914 when she came to the College here as dean of women and professor of methodology. At that time the school was known as the State Manual Training Normal School. It was not until 1923 that the institution became known as the Kansas State Teachers College when legislation was enacted in February of that year changing the name of the school.

It was recalled here last night that Mrs. Mitchell played an important part in the development of the school through her lecturing tours over the state. She was a very popular lecturer and after teaching at the College here for eleven months during the year, Mrs. Mitchell would spend the month of August and sometimes the first week in September lecturing at educa-

tional institutes over the state. While doing this work she spoke in nearly every county in the state during the period she was connected with the College here. As a result of the tours, she was instrumental in bringing many students to the College.

Active In Church.

She had a very human way of presenting her lectures which always included many funny stories and which found favor with the young people.

Mrs. Mitchell took an active part in every phase of College life from the beginning of her association with the institution and was popular with the students.

After the College dormitory was constructed, Mrs. Mitchell was appointed director of the dormitory in 1923 in addition to her other duties and continued in that capacity along with her other activities until her retirement. Even after her retirement from active College life, Mrs. Mitchell was spoken of as Dean Mitchell, seldom if ever, was she called Mrs. Mitchell.

In addition to her College work, Mrs. Mitchell took a very active part in religious work and taught the College Sunday school class at the Christian church for 25 years, taking charge of the class shortly after coming to Pittsburg. She not only emphasized the spiritual side of life, but she also placed emphasis on fellowship and often served breakfast for her class on Sundays before turning to the study of the Bible.

Burial in Ohio.

Although weakened in body, Mrs. Mitchell's mind continued to be active even after she became bedfast and she retained a keen interest in daily happenings. Not only did she keep herself informed on current events, but she also kept posted on the activities of her friends and acquaintances. Mrs. Mitchell had a telephone installed at her bedside and made daily calls to persons with whom she had been actively associated before being overtaken by illness. She never lost the ability to see the funny side of things and as a result remained cheerful during her long period of confinement.

Memberships were held in the Christian church, the P. E. O., Order of Eastern Star, and Kappa Delta Pi, honorary scholastic fraternity.

Survivors in addition to the widower include a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Edwards of Peekskill, N. Y.; one sister, Mrs. Jennie A. Asper of Pasadena, Calif.; three brothers, O. E. Moore of Alta Dena, Calif., Fred I. Moore of Del Monte, Calif., and Thomas O. Moore of Los Angeles, and three grandchildren.
