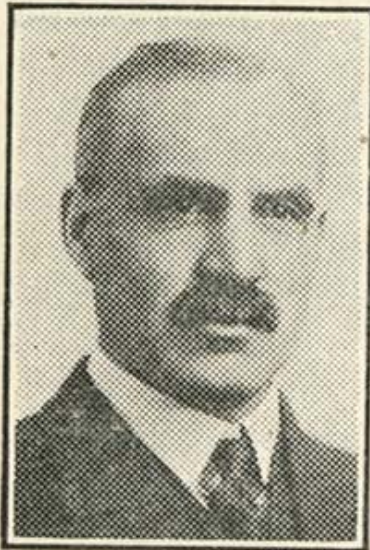

HISTORY OF K. S. T. C. OF PITTSBURG

In 1903 the state legislature passed a bill which authorized the establishing of an institution for the training of teachers to be located at Pittsburg, Kansas. The school was known as the State Manual Training Normal. The school building on the corner of Fifth and Walnut, which was loaned by the city of Pittsburg, housed the student body for six years.

Russ Hall, named after the first president of the institution, was the first building erected by the state. It was completed January 1, 1909. The Industrial Arts building came next. It was completed in 1914. The heating plant was also completed in 1914.

Russ Hall was destroyed by fire on June 29, 1914. Within twenty-four hours the citizens of Pittsburg had held a mass meeting and pledged nearly \$100,000 to reconstruct the building. This fund was replaced by legislature of 1915.

Carney Hall, named after Governor Carney, who served as governor of Kansas during the Civil War, was completed in 1919, giving to the school one of the finest auditoriums and science halls in the state.

The legislature, realizing that the school was making rapid strides, voted appropriations for the Cafeteria, the Gymnasium and Willard Hall.

Our two latest buildings, Porter Library, named after the late Senator Porter, and the Mechanics Hall are just being completed and will soon be ready for use.

During the year 1922 the faculty, alumni, and citizens of Pittsburg began the erection of a modern reinforced steel and concrete stadium. The first section

of this project, with a seating capacity of 5,000, was dedicated and named Brandenburg Field on Nov. 11, 1924. It is the only structure of its kind on a teachers college campus in the United States.

The legislature of 1923 passed a bill changing the name from State Manual Training Normal to Kansas State Teachers College of Pittsburg.

In 1913, President Brandenburg came to the college, and since that time the growth of the institution has been phenomenal. For the year ending June, 1913, the enrollment was 1416. In the first degree class of the same year there were graduated 13 persons, and from the life diploma class, 113. In 1926 the enrollment reached a total of 5,283 and a graduating class of 203 and life diploma class over three hundred. The faculty numbers 125 persons.

The policy adopted by the founders of the institution has been constantly promoted—the education of head, hand and heart—and equipment of teachers to work for the bringing about of social efficiency as the great aim of education.

Purpose of Y. M. C. A.

1. To lead students to faith in God through Jesus Christ.
2. To lead them into membership and service in the Christian church.
3. To promote their growth in Christian faith, especially through study of the Bible.
4. To challenge them to devote themselves in united effort to make the will of God effective in human society and to extend his kingdom throughout the world.

The membership of the "Y" is entirely free, and every man entering K. S. T. C. is invited to join. The only requirement is that you agree to the statement of purpose given above. The activities of the Y. M. C. A. of K. S. T. C. can be grouped under the following three heads:

1. Religious Education. The Y. M. C. A. believes that no man can afford to neglect to develop himself spiritually and endeavors to promote serious thinking on the big questions of Religion through these channels.

- a. Forums. Each Wednesday night throughout the year between the hours of seven and eight the Christian organizations join in promoting a Forum session.

Every effort is made to make these meetings of vital interest to K. S. T. C. students. Such topics as politics, war, prayer, belief in God, race, labor, international relationships, immigration, and relation to men and women are discussed.

b. Bible Study. A bible group meets every morning in the Y. room for a fifteen minute devotional study. You will be welcomed to this group. Other classes will be organized later.

c. Regular Tuesday meetings, 10:10, R. H., 206.

2. Social Service. Groups will be organized to promote various kinds of community programs. Last year men volunteered to lead groups of boys at the Y. M. C. A., Scout troops, Sunday School classes, to coach basketball and baseball, to lead singing and gospel teams.

3. Campus Service. In co-operation with the faculty committee, work is secured for students. Sick visitation, freshman department, conferences with business men.

EXTRACTS FROM CONSTITUTION OF THE STUDENT COUNCIL

Student Council

The college's student government and administration is in the hands of a Student Council. The president is elected at the annual spring election by the student body as a whole, and two representatives from each class are chosen at the regular class elections in the fall. The members of the council serve for the full school year.

Our student council was organized in 1919 and its duties have increased steadily until at present it is responsible for quite a list of school activities such as commemoration day, hobo day and the stunt fest school elections, freshman cap rules, class organizations, and the honor point system.

MEMBERSHIP

Article III

Section 1. The Student Council shall consist of nine members; a president chosen at large by ballot from the student body; and two representatives of the opposite sex from each class.

Sec. 2. The Secretary and Treasurer and such other officers as may be determined upon, shall be chosen by the Council from its own membership.

SELECTION OF COUNCIL

Article IV

Section 1. The election of the President shall take place the first Thursday in May, and the remaining members shall be elected the third Thursday following the opening of school in the fall. Provided further; that for purpose of organization this year (1919), all members of the Council shall be elected at

such time as may be designated by the committee framing this constitution.

NATURE OF COUNCIL

Article V

Section 1. The Council shall constitute a body to determine upon any, or all policies, affecting the best interests of the student body which may come up during the school year, provided there is already in existence no other organization in school to which the settlement of the same by reason of its origin or nature should be referred (Y. M. C. A.; Y. W. C. A.; Athletic Council, etc.); and which, from time to time—as may be warranted by changing conditions—shall initiate such new policies or measures as it sees fit.

Sec. 2. No business shall be legally transacted unless each of the classes is represented. Provided further should any class refuse representation at any two consecutive meetings, the Council may legally transact any business at the third meeting in the absence of the representatives of said class.

ELECTION OF PRESIDENT

Article VI

Section 1. Any eligible person wishing to become President of the Council must file a petition to that effect with the Secretary of the Student Council one week before election; and said petition must be signed by at least twenty-five (25) college students; provided further, that for purposes of organization this year (1919) such petitions shall be filed with the committee framing this constitution.

Sec. 2. All students in order to be eligible to vote must register, stating class in which they belong, at such time and place as may be designated by the Council.

Sec. 3. Registration must close at least thirty-six (36) hours prior to opening of the polls for the primary election.

Sec. 4. A primary election shall be held under the jurisdiction of an election board designated by the Student Council on Tuesday before election day from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. in such room or rooms as may be designated by the Student Council; and which room or rooms shall be supplied with the necessary booths, ballot boxes, etc.

Sec. 5. The two persons receiving the highest number of votes at the primary shall be considered nominees for the election.

Sec. 6. Ballots for the primary and the election shall be printed, or typewritten, and all voting must be done in secret.

Sec. 7. For election day all regulations used for the primary shall be followed except that the candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared president.

Sec. 8. In any case of a tie vote, the Council shall be the deciding factor, and in all other matters in any way pertaining to the selection of a president, not herein provided for, the Council shall be supreme.

EXTRACTS FROM BY LAWS OF STUDENT COUNCIL

Number 1

Section 1. Any eligible person wishing to become an officer (president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, student council member) of either of the four (4) classes of the college must file a petition to that effect with the President of the Student Council the Friday preceding the general election which shall be held the third (3) Thursday of the school year, and said petition must be signed by at least ten (10) members of the class of which he desires to become an officer and must state which office he desires.

Sec. 2. All students in order to vote must register, stating class to which they belong at such time and place as may be designated by the President of the Student Council.

Sec. 3. Registration must close at least twenty-four hours prior to the opening of the polls for the primary election.

Sec. 4. A primary election shall be held under the jurisdiction of an election board designated by the President of the Student Council, on Tuesday before election day, from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. in such room or rooms as may be designated by the President.

Sec. 5. The two (2) persons receiving the highest number of votes for each office at the primary shall be considered the nominees for the election.

Sec. 6. Ballots for the primary must be printed or typewritten, and all balloting must be done in secret.

Sec. 7. For election day all regulations used for primary shall be followed, except that the candidate for each office of each class receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.

Sec. 8. In case of a tie vote another election for that office shall be held within one week.

Sec. 9. In case there is no election for an office, the Student Council as then formed shall have the power of appointing.

Number 2

Section 1. The Editor and the Business Manager of the Collegio shall be elected at the same time and under the same rules as govern the election of the President of the Student Council. (Art. 6. Sec. 4)

Number 3

Section 1. Each student shall be allowed to hold school offices for which the points allotted shall not exceed ten (10).

Sec. 3. Every student must register, as soon as elected, the office that he holds, with the secretary of the Student Council, and in case a student is elected to several offices for which points shall exceed ten (10), he shall be allowed three (3) days after notification by the Student Council to choose from which office he shall withdraw and shall notify the secretary of the Student Council of his decision. In case no resignation is received from such student, the Student Council shall decide which offices he shall retain.

Sec. 4. In case of new offices being organized or of dispute arising over the number of points to be allotted an office, the Student Council shall decide each question by a majority vote.

Sec. 5. The provisions of this by-law shall take effect at the opening of the school in September 1923.

By-law Number 10

Section 1. When for any reason whatsoever the office of President of the Student Council, Editor of the Collegio, or Business manager of the Collegio, becomes vacant during the school year, the Student Council shall have the power to appoint, by a majority vote of the Council's membership, the person who shall succeed to the office which was vacated.

Any person so appointed shall not serve, by reason of such appointment, longer than the duration of the unexpired term which he was elected to fill. This by-law shall be effective on the opening day of school in September 1924.

Non-fiction may be checked for one day only.

Special permission may be given, on request, for the retaining of a book for a longer period, provided it is not needed in the library. If a book is desired for a longer period, state clearly the purpose and length of time for which you wish it. Length of time should be stamped on the book card and book pocket if checked out for more than one day. If this is not done, the student is subjected to the one-day rule.

Fiction, books of travel and juvenile books may be checked for two weeks, and are renewable for another two weeks.

General reference books and books being used by whole classes should not be taken from the library before 5 o'clock and should be returned by 8 o'clock the next morning.

Books on statistics are not checked, without special permission.

Periodicals may be checked for a period of five days. The current issue is not checked before 5 o'clock and must be returned by 8 o'clock the next morning.

Reserve books may be checked one-half hour before closing time, and must be returned by 8 o'clock the next morning.

Date when book is borrowed is stamped on book pocket and on the book card. Students should see that book pocket is stamped before books are taken

from the library, otherwise they may be fined for taking a book from the library without permission.

Bound volumes of magazines are not to be taken from the library. If wanted for one hour for class use, permission must be obtained at the desk.

Fines

Two cents a day is charged for fiction, books of travel, juvenile books and back numbers of the magazines kept overtime.

Five cents a day is charged for all other books not "Reserve" books.

Five cents a day is charged for magazines kept overtime.

Ten cents for the first hour and 1 cent for each additional hour is charged for "Reserve" books. "Reserve" books not returned by 8:20 are counted one hour overdue. If one day overdue, the fine is 25 cents per day.

Twenty-five cents is charged for books taken from the library without permission.

Books not having the date when issued stamped on book pocket and book card are counted "taken without permission."

No books will be issued to students having fines one month unpaid, without the consent of the librarian.

Before grades are issued at the close of each semester, names of students having unpaid fines will be sent to the office of the President of the College.

Books must be returned at the end of the Delivery Desk having the sign "Return Books Here."

"Reserve" books returned to the shelves instead of the Delivery Desk will be considered "overdue."

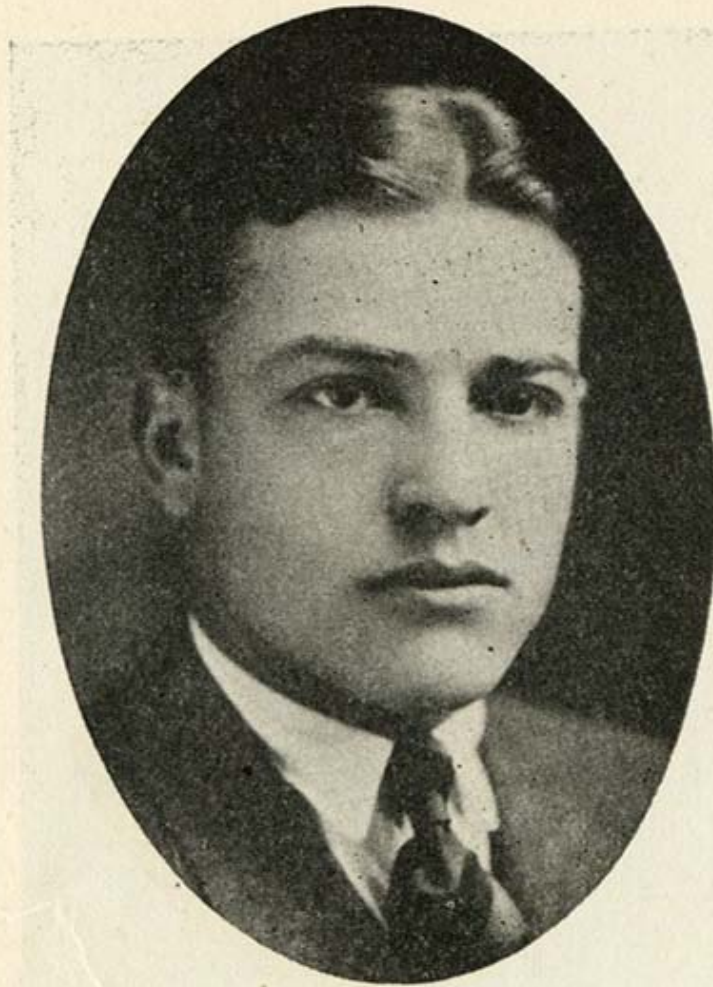

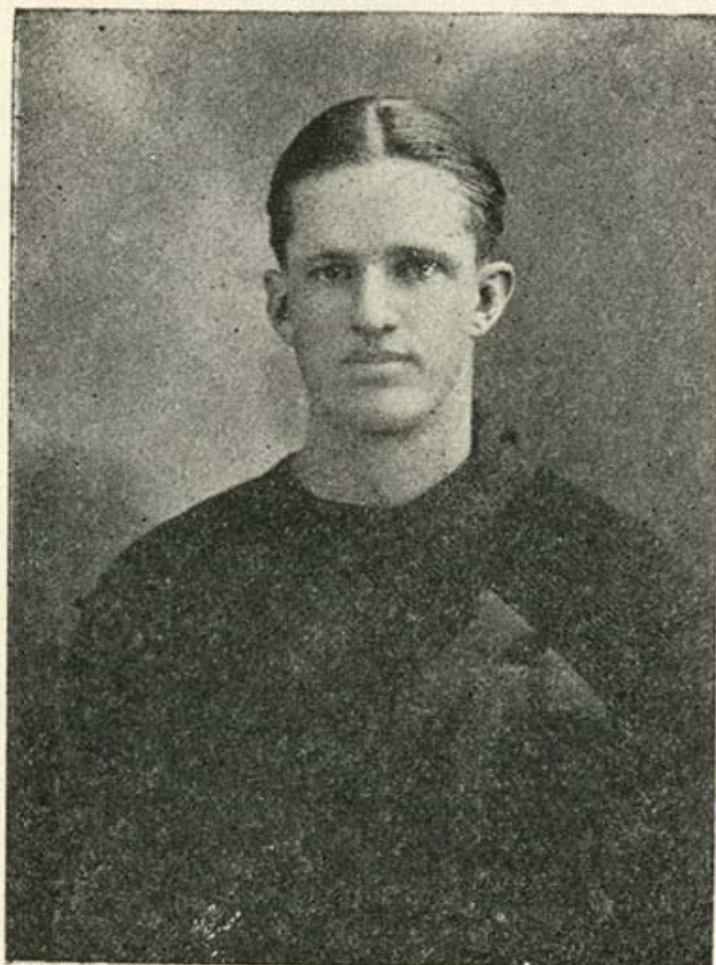


GEORGE WALKER
