Anytime, Anywhere Celebration of Nature in the City

Simple citizen-science project reaches urbanites of all ages

Ithaca, N.Y.—Nature has the power to soothe and enthuse. More people are find-

ing that out as they join the free, year-round "Celebrate Urban Birds!" citizen-science project from the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. People of all ages and backgrounds participate in Celebrate Urban Birds through gardening, cultural activities and citizen-science. For the citizen-science part of the



project, participants watch city birds for 10 minutes, check off 15 target species of birds, and send the information through the mail or the Internet to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Once enough data are gathered, scientists hope to learn more about how birds survive in cities and how they use urban green spaces such as parks, rooftop gardens, and even potted plants on balconies for food, resting sites, and shelter. President Mavis Benner welcomed everyone to the new SGAS season. Mavis passed around a signup sheet for greeter and "Wing Tip" presenter volunteers. She recognized John Hartley as the current newsletter editor and urged everyone to submit items to John by the first Friday of the month: recipes, book reviews, and reports on birding trips are examples of good candidates for submission. Mavis commended Sheila Hensley for her above-and-beyond effort in counting chimney swifts on various nights. She and the curious neighbors watched swifts dart into Westside School in varying populations from 28 to 400. Mavis has appointed a new "green living team" consisting of Debbie Christensen and Jim Brumfield. From time to time, they will give us eco-friendly tips at meetings and in the newsletter.

Treasurer Liz Mangile reported that SGAS has \$4,458.56 in the checking account. The annual bird seed sale will be held at the mall on December 6. Members, please consider bringing homemade crafts, baked goods, or bird houses/feeders. Steve Ford is presenting a series of three beginning-birder seminars and two related field trips in October. Refore Larry Herbert began his presentation, he passed around the Kansas Ornithological Society's published tributes to Marvin Schwilling, a well-loved and respected Kansas bird expert, who recently passed away.

He then regaled us with lively information on penguins, in particular the Yellow-Eyed penguin (Hoiho) on the islands of New Zealand. At a population of 2,000, they are the rarest penguin species in the world, due to forest habitat degradation. Featured Speakers:

Delia first introduced Sally Imhof, who has received her federal and state permits to rehabilitate injured wildlife. She thanked SGAS for sponsoring her attendance of a certification workshop in Wichita on state and county animal response teams (SART and CART), who organize action in the event of a natural disaster. (If you are interested in volunteering, please give her your name.) She showed slides of some of the injured animals she and her helpers have cared for.

The next presenter was Meagan Duffee, PSU undergraduate student, who gave us a history of falconry, its current practice, and why the present-day sport appeals to her. After giving us a detailed description of the complex procedure



one must complete to become a certified falconer, she introduced Zoe, a young Redtail hawk, and Harriet the Harris's hawk, both of whom she is training to hunt in the falconry tradition.

Delia concluded the program by displaying two new additions to the Nature Reach family: Dodger the American kestrel, and Hootie the Great-Horned owl. Everyone gleaned entertaining and informative tidbits on some of our local raptors.

Liz's Larder:

In the late fall of the year the persimmons have had the frost they need to turn nice and sweet. If you can get to them before

the possums they make wonderful cookies. The hardest part is cleaning the pulp from the persimmon the easy part is eating this delicious

Persimmon Cookies 1 cup sugar 3/4 cup butter from SGAS Green Committee-Use your own container! Besides taking your own bags to the stores where you shop, you can also take a cup to McDonald's or Starbucks. Did you know you'll save 5 cents per bag at Ron's and Dillon's? McDonald's and Starbucks also give discounts. I like to take a reusable container to restaurants to avoid the wasteful use of a Styrofoam box for leftovers. And putting 6 half my meal in the box before I start to eat keeps me from eating too much. I keep several canvas bags and a travel coffee mug in the car so that they're always handy and I don't have to rely on my memory to have them available. Any time there is the possi-

bility of needing a container, try to think of a "green" alternative, and just say "NO" to disposable plastic and styrofoam!



2 eggs

l cup persimmon pulp

1 teaspoon baking powder 1 teaspoon vanilla

Review by Bob Mangile— The <u>Compact Guide to Kansas</u> <u>Birds</u> is an excellent guide for

beginner birders. It's 4-1/4" x 7-1/2" size conveniently fits into one's pocket. The Contents page is color coded with the page edges to allow quick access to the various bird groups and the illustrated Reference. Guide shows thumbnails of each species and page numbers to full accounts. The Introduction explains how to use the species accounts and range maps and a list of good birding areas in Kansas. Each species is given two side-by-side pages with a colored illustration and called out field marks, the common and scientific name - followed by a brief discussion, its Kansas range map, size, voice, habitat, nesting and colored illustration of the egg. Also, insets of things you might want to know and what to look for; plus colored illustrations of similar looking birds for comparison. The back contains a small Glossary of terms, a complete checklist of Kansas birds where the user can check each of the species seen, and index. This 240 page guide contains accounts for 105 of the bird species most likely to be encountered by a beginner birder. I could not find mention of binoculars in this guide, probably because most birders have binoculars and the topic might confuse rather than help to a new birder.
