Dear Parents of the Kindergarten Children:

Since the milk prices have been increased, we have attempted to provide milk for your children at the old rate of 3 1/3¢ per bottle, or \$1.50 for the nine-week period. But since we are paying a straight 5¢ per bottle, plus the additional expense for straws and at times cookies, we are compelled to change the amount you need to pay.

As you know, in the past you have paid \$1.50 each nine weeks. At the present time with prices as they are, we will need to change that amount to \$2.30 each nine weeks. This is 5¢ per bottle each day, plus a general fee of 5¢ for the nine weeks to cover other incidental expenses, such as straws and cookies. We are sorry we need to make this change, but it is necessary.

**10,000 Expected to View Town's Biggest Parade**  
**45 Bands With 2,000 Musicians, Model Carrier Join Line of March**

## Homecoming in 9 Days! 'Biggest-Ever' Events Entice Record Throng

### Excited Campus Wonders Who Will Be Chosen as Gala Queen

Plans for the biggest Homecoming Celebration in the history of KSTC were nearing completion this week as Pittsburg Chamber of Commerce officials and special committee chairmen at the College ended their conferences and unveiled the schedule of activities for the gala week-end.

Approximately 100 student and faculty members of all Homecoming committees will gather for a joint meeting this afternoon at 4 o'clock in Room 110, Russ Hall, Dean Eugene Dawson, general Homecoming chairman, announces.

Campus organizations are excitedly choosing queen candidates and preparing house decorations and floats for the October 13-14 festivities. The Chamber of Commerce is making the Homecoming event a community celebration similar to the former coal festivals.

Downtown groups are already preparing to take a part in what is rapidly becoming one of Pittsburg's outstanding events.

Officially, Homecoming will begin at 7:30 p.m. Friday, October 13, with the Pep and Student Rally on the campus oval. Prof. Milburn J. Little, sponsor of the Pep Club, released the evening's program of stunts and demonstrations but would not disclose the highlight of the rally except to say that it would be of a fantastic nature.

House decoration judging will take place during the stunt rally and the prizes this year will be in cash money. The prizes are being furnished by the Pittsburg Chamber of Commerce. However, Kent Collier, Secretary of the C of C says that plans are in the making to determine how many awards will be given.

City police are making preparations to zone streets in order to prevent confusion, and will direct traffic to permit as many people as possible to view the house decorations.

#### Announce Queen at Show

The variety show, "Homecoming Hodgepodge", will take place at 8 p.m. immediately following the pep rally. City Merchants are co-operating with campus organizations in furnishing the evening's entertainment. The highlight of "Homecoming Hodgepodge" will be the naming and crowning of the Homecoming Queen at the close of the show. As in the past, the Queen will be selected for personality, ease of conversation, poise, and grooming.

Queen candidates will appear on Tuesday before the judges. They will keep the winner's name secret until Friday night.

Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, the Homecoming parade will tour the downtown business district. Plans for the parade include campus organizational floats, the queen and her procession, the old grads caravan, bands from the four-state area, and special attractions and floats from the city merchants.

#### Fifth Annual Feast

Afternoon, the fifth annual "Feast of The Oval" will be held on the College campus. Dignitaries will speak and the College band will present a short concert. Concession stands sponsored by campus groups will sell sandwiches, cold drinks, and ice

## Forty Bands To Strut in Big Parade

The largest number of bands and of drum corps in the history of parades in this city will appear in the Homecoming line of march, Saturday morning, October 14.

Thirty-five bands and drum corps of high schools and junior colleges throughout the four-state area have accepted invitations, Dr. Otis J. Mumaw, head of the Music Department, announced the first of this week. It is expected that there will be a total of 40 by the end of this week, Dr. Mumaw said, with more than 1,700 musicians taking part.

Some cities are so interested that they are sending several organizations. Among these are Parsons with five units, Erie with two, and Galena with two. Smaller towns are drawing on all available musicians to make a big showing with a sizably large unit for the town's population. Organizations are:

Gala events opening Homecoming festivities this Friday will precede the annual parade

slated to get under way at 10 a.m. Saturday in the Pittsburg downtown area. An expected crowd of 10,000 will view the largest parade ever to be assembled in a celebration here.

Forty-three bands and drum corps totaling 1,850 members in the four-state area have indicated they will march. Plus these, there will be commercial floats, organizational and special floats, and cars bearing beauty queens. The Cavalcade Of Years will also be represented by 28 alumni classes.

Dr. Otis J. Mumaw, head of the Music department, said Tuesday that he expects 45 bands to sign up swelling the total of marchers to about 2,000.

It is expected that the parade will take an hour and a half to pass a given point.

President Rees H. Hughes and party will head the parade from its starting point at Ninth and Broadway to its conclusion at Brandenburg Field. City and school officials will include Mayor R.W. Hart and the visiting president of Washburn University, Dr. Byron Stoffer.

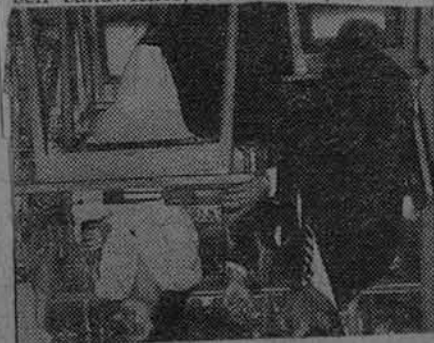
Some units will assemble at Ninth and others at Tenth and Broadway, according to instructions.

Spectators will crowd Broadway along the line of march from Eighth to Rose, where the parade will disband.

A special model of a navy aircraft carrier of the Essex class, sent by the Olathe Naval Air Station, will be an added feature of the day's activities. The aircraft carrier will be on display on the College campus between the parade and the homecoming game.

A broadcast of the parade beginning at 10:15 a.m. will be carried by station KSEK.

After the parade, commercial floats will assemble in front of the Stadium for all to inspect them. This is in addition to the usual parade procedure.

## Nurture New Sensitivity To Other Lands' Culture

Many varied and interesting programs relating to international understanding will be offered K.S.T.C. students during October. Elaborate plans have been made to promote a spirit of goodwill among peoples of every race and nation. More than a dozen programs will be presented accompanied by exhibits and displays.

A highlight in the schedule will be an "American Nationalities" luncheon on United Nations Day, Oct. 24, at which representatives of various races and nationalities living in this district will be honored guests.

Dr. Willis A. Sutton, noted educator from Atlanta, Ga., will be the assembly speaker tomorrow at 10 a.m. in the College Auditorium. He has taken for his theme "The Battle For America."

Friday a study of Italian culture will be presented under the direction of Professor V. P. Pierce.

The music department will offer selections from the music of various nationalities at the 10 o'clock assembly next Monday. At 8 o'clock that evening, the women's physical education department will present a "Folk Festival" featuring the folk dances of different nations.

The peak of interest will be reached Tuesday, Oct. 24, known throughout the country as United Nations Day. Four programs have been planned at K.S.T.C. for that date, all of them focusing attention on the importance of international understanding and good will.

At 9 a.m. in Carney hall, Dr. Ralph Wright will moderate an assembly which will outline the accomplishments of the UN. At noon, a luncheon will be held in the cafeteria with representatives of various nationalities who are living in this district as special guests. At 2 p. m. there will be a Horace Mann assembly with the 5th grade children under the direction of their supervisor, Miss Gladys Rinehart, presenting "The United Nations and All Of Us." All parents, students and friends are cordially invited to attend this program. The day's features will be concluded at 8 p.m. with a Spanish film in the Foreign Film Series, "Ay, Jalisco!", sponsored by the Language and Literature Department.

This film will be shown in Music hall auditorium.

Exhibits and displays concerning cultures and backgrounds of a number of nations are on display in various places over the campus. Dr. Alvin H. Proctor of the Social Science Department in charge of sponsoring this schedule of programs, says that they provide an excellent opportunity for students at the College to observe the life and culture of other nations, and to build a consciousness of the importance of international good will, co-operation, and understanding.

## CONFERENCE REPORT IS GIVEN A. A. U. W.

Dr. Jane Carroll Tells of International Meeting at Zurich, Switzerland, Before Joplin Group.

Dr. Jane Carroll, guest speaker at a luncheon meeting of the American Association of University Women yesterday in the Woman's Club, gave a report of the triennial conference of the International Federation of University Women held in Zurich, Switzerland, last August and of her observations during the trip.

She was one of visiting delegates at Zurich among nearly 600 voting and visiting representatives of university women from 20 federations over the world, meeting with the theme of what they could do to help achieve world peace in support of the United Nations. The delegates represented 136,000 members of the organization.

Dr. Carroll, who has traveled throughout the world, gave a vivid review of her visits in six nations of western Europe and England on the way home from the conference. She showed a basketful of souvenirs collected on the trip, illustrating the handiwork of those nations, especially the dolls in native costumes. She said she saw very little native dress.

### Abundance of Food.

As for food, she said there was an abundance in Switzerland, also flowers, and while there were many vegetables in other lands some foods were hard to get. This was particularly true of meat in England, she added.

Since her return, people everywhere have asked about the Marshall plan, she said, saying she was no authority for pronouncing it either good or bad but "we had better hang on to it until something better comes along."

In an over-all view, she said that the Marshall plan was received with suspicion at first but people soon saw the value of the dollars and materials coming in and later the resulting increase in jobs so that now the general opinion is America is being very generous and kind rather than interfering.

Dr. Carroll gave a summary of the conference in Zurich, pointing out such highlights as the election of officers and the general feeling among the delegates. She said there was a tension felt when the Holland delegates arrived, because of the South Pacific situation at that time, but later the tenseness

eased and before the adjournment all the women there knew one another. Even a hotly contested election ended in friendship, she added. In fact, she pointed out, if the harmony achieved at that conference could be carried out among all the university women of the world "it would be a definite step toward the conference goal of world peace."

One sidelight she discussed was that language was no barrier, since nearly everyone present was bi-lingual "except us poor American teachers." The conference was mostly in French.
