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### Newspaper article, Death of Mrs. Callery, 1917

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"Death of Mrs. Ida Callery. Woman Lawyer Succumbed at Hospital Late Saturday," Pittsburg [Kan.] Daily Headlight, Monday Evening, April 16, 1917, p. 2, col. 4:

Mrs. Ida Callery, wife of Phil H. Callery, the two composing the law firm of Callery & Callery, died at Mt. Carmel hospital Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock following an operation. The funeral services were held from the First Methodist church this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, conducted by Sam I. Smith, pastor of the Christian church. Besides the short sermon by Mr. Smith, a tribute was paid by J. I. Sheppard of Fort Scott. John P. Curran spoke on behalf of the bar association.

Mrs. Callery was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Hayman. She was born in Stillwater, Okla., [sic] Oct. 23, 1887. She was a university graduate, from 1904 to 1907 she taught in Indian schools in Oklahoma.

Mrs. Callery was admitted to the Kansas bar last June and immediately afterward became her husband's partner in the law practice. Before that she had assisted him in the office.

Mrs. Callery was active in the Socialist movement. She was secretary of the party organization in Oklahoma in 1908 and 1909 and filled the same position in Arkansas for three consecutive terms.

Mrs. Callery is survived by her widower and a daughter, Annabell, seven years old, her parents, three sisters and four brothers.

The local members of the Crawford County Bar Association met this morning and arranged to attend the funeral in a body, meeting at the courthouse and going to the church. Six members agreed to furnish motor cars to go from the church to Mt. Olive cemetery. District court was in session at Girard today, but adjourned at noon.

The death of Mrs. Callery came as a shock to her friends. Bright and ambitious, deeply interested in law and social movements she also had a personality that gained her many friends.
