LOCAL CHILD VICTIM OF GASOLINE BLAST

Jan. 1, 1951

**JAMES JONAS, 7, SUFFERS
FATAL BURNS WHILE AT
PLAY NEAR HOME.**

**Fire Near Site of Residential Con-
struction Reaches Can of Gaso-
line, Which Explodes;
Clothing Ignited.**

Seven-year old James Hanson Jonas, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Jonas, 1702 South Walnut, suffered fatal burns Saturday afternoon when he was sprayed with flaming gasoline while at play near his home. The youngster was burned shortly after 3 o'clock. He succumbed shortly after 9 o'clock last night at Mt. Carmel.

The youngster's clothing was ignited by burning gasoline from a can near the house where with other youngsters, he was playing. His playmates were not injured but the victim suffered second and third degree burns on his face, arms and legs.

Enveloped in Flames

With others, the young victim was playing at the site of residential construction, near his home. Workmen had been water-proofing part of the building with tar and had left a can of gasoline in which they washed out their brushes. A small fire was nearby. In some manner, gasoline in the can caught fire and exploded sending a fiery blanket that enveloped the youngster.

Residents in the neighborhood heard his cries and called both the fire department and an ambulance. Firemen reached the scene first and had the victim ready for the dash to the hospital.

Horace Mann Pupil

The youngster was born Feb. 20, 1943, in Joplin, but had lived here much of his life. He was a student in the second grade at Horace Mann school.

Other survivors are a brother, Donald, twelve; a sister, Anne, three, and the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Hanson of Hiawatha.

Funeral services will be at 3:30 p. m. tomorrow at the Ellsworth chapel. The body is at the chapel.

Little Jim Jonas Dies

This would have been a formal obituary except that one of the staff who had been a friend of Jimmie's asked to write up the story so that everyone who didn't know Jimmie could see what a fine friend he was.

Little Jimmie Jonas, the un-official mascot for the College football team, is dead. Jimmie was seven years old and lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Jonas, 1702 South Walnut. He had a brother, Donald, and a little sister, Anne. He was in the second grade at Horace Mann.

Saturday afternoon, Dec. 30, Jim was playing with some friends near his home and was killed. Workmen nearby had left a can of gasoline by a fire. Somehow, it exploded, throwing burning gasoline over Jimmie, setting his clothes afire. Bert Lewis was one of the first to reach him and tried to pull off Jim's burning clothes, unmindful of the burns on his own hands and arms.

An ambulance was called and Jimmie was rushed to Mount Carmel hospital. But despite all efforts, shortly after 9 o'clock that night, little Jimmie died.

Most of the squad didn't hear about Jimmie's death until they came back from the holidays. "Hell of a shame..." one athlete said. Another, "I can't hardly believe it... seems like he should be comin' in the dressing room about now..."

The football-team members sent flowers as their final gesture. And Jim would have been glad to know that six of his friends from the team completed their duty of friendship by carrying his casket to its final resting place.

Says Europeans Don't Envy U. S.

Europeans are not envious of Americans, asserted Mrs. Tamar Zerubavel, exchange teacher from Israel, last Thursday at a joint meeting of the Education Department and the Future Teachers in 110 Russ Hall.

"We are glad to have the opportunity to learn from you," she continued, "but only so we can rebuild our own home lands."

Mrs. Zerubavel, who was sent here to study teacher training on the elementary level by the United States Department of Education, left Friday for Alabama to wind up her six-months' visit in the states.

While on her two-week visit on campus, Mrs. Zerubavel spoke to numerous classes and at special meetings.

Visitor From Tel Aviv

An attractive, blond visitor from Tel Aviv, Israel, is studying American education at the College this week.

She is Mrs. Tamar Zerubavel, a teacher in the school system in Israel. A guest of the College during her stay of ten days, she is observing schools in this area under the direction of Dr. Jane M. Carroll, principal of the Horace Mann school.

Mrs. Zerubavel, a tall blond, whose

long hair and slender oval face call to mind the features of screen star Greta Garbo is finding Pittsburg a hospitable, quiet place after a fast moving tour of colleges and universities in the east. And she likes it.

"I like the people of Pittsburg, their friendliness, and I like the town," she says. "I liked Pittsburg the first day I arrived and

I haven't changed my mind since." Maybe it was the sunshine. The sun was shining when she got here. "I had been in the Great Lakes region," she says. "It was so cold. There was no sunshine like this. In Tel Aviv we have much sunshine. I've missed it in the past few months."

Mrs. Zerubavel is in the last month of her stay in this country which is for a 6-month period, and which was arranged through the United States Office of Education in conjunction with the College.

In that period she has begun to formulate some ideas about Americans and education in this country but admits that she hasn't seen everything. "The United States is so large," she says, "and there are so many things to see. It would take a lifetime to see New York, or some of your larger cities."

Of some things she is certain. She likes Americans. They are friendly and kind to visitors. She likes their happy approach to life. "They are always trying to enjoy life," she says. "Have fun is a typical American expression which you use so often. It's not so much so in Israel, she believes, where there is a more sober approach to living. Not that there is no happiness there, for there is, but just that people take a more thoughtful view of things generally."

Mrs. Zerubavel finds beauty in the United States, in the country she has seen, but misses greatly the sea, for Tel Aviv looks across the blue of the Mediterranean and the sea is part of city life. There is an atmosphere of serenity and a type of beauty around the Mediterranean which one does not find in the United States, she believes, with all its comforts of living and mechanical progress.

"It's a small thing, perhaps, but I find I miss greatly the sidewalk cafes at home," she says. "There one can sit for hours and write or watch people passing by. In the United States one goes to a cafe to eat and you are expected to leave the moment you are through."

Among other things Mrs. Zerubavel has not become accustomed to is the idea in the United States of sitting in a drug store among the drugs and eating or drinking soft drinks. "All around you are drugs," she says smiling. "How can you relax or think?"

Nor has she become adjusted to the idea of American men eating ice cream and drinking milk, or eating candy. In Israel only women and children eat these things, she says. She does, however like the American custom of eating a large meal at night. That should make it possible for the family to get together more often. In Palestine the heavy meal comes at noon with a light breakfast and small night meal. Following the noon meal there is a siesta period until mid-afternoon before people return to work.

Comparing education and schools in the two countries she expresses surprise at the long time which students spend in colleges and universities here. "In our country we take only two years to cover the courses which you cover in four," she explains. She believes the schools of her home country do as good a job in that time as the schools here. She is not, however, critical of American schools.

"They are well equipped and in so many ways offer opportunities to students," she says. "An American student may become what he wants to be. That is an important thing which we do not always have at home."

Although she comes from a small country Mrs. Zerubavel finds people in the United States somewhat "provincial." Not in the snobbish sense of the word, she hastens to add, but in that they seem to think America the only place to live enjoyably. "Often when I tell them I am going back they say 'Oh' in a discouraged way which means they feel sorry that I have to go back to such a country," she laughs. "Apparently they are surprised that I still want to go back home. But I still prefer to live in Israel though I like your country very much."

Blond and blue eyed Mrs. Zerubavel often received comment on her fairness. "People seem to expect people from my country to be dark," she says. "However, many of our people, just as in your country, a great many in fact, are blond."

Language difficulties have posed no difficulties for Mrs. Zerubavel who speaks English very well, but had to get rid of her English accent on arrival here. She is still amazed at the polite American phrases which keep popping up such as "You're welcome," and "Thank you

very much." Americans are very polite in their speech, she says. In Israel we are not so polite, I think. Everyone here is always saying "You're welcome."

Some American words, she points out, come from her own language. Among these are "amen" which means "let it be through" and "hallelujah" which means "to praise God." Her own first name Tamar means "palm tree" and "fruit of the palm date."

Mrs. Zerubavel hopes that Americans will be fully conscious of how important their leadership in the United Nations is to the smaller countries abroad, and how much this organization is looked to for world peace. She sincerely hopes that war between the United States and Russia, both of whom seem to fear the same things in each other, will never come.

Many friends and acquaintances have helped pass the time in her visit to the United States but they have never taken the place of her longing to see her family and her husband, an officer in the army, or her young son, all of whom are anxiously awaiting her return.

Since we are scheduling teachers for a half day with the idea that they will get all classroom and teaching experiences during that period, I believe we should try to see that they have most of the following experiences. I find that in some schools all listed are being required and in others, at least a part of them.

- *1. Learning to make out six-week reports. (If you wish mimeographed forms of the Pittsburgh City Schools Six-Weeks Report to give to your students in order for them to work on such reports, we shall be glad to make them for you)
2. Learning to write and use anecdotal records.
- *3. Learning to write good letters to parents. (Since this is so very important and is being used in so many schools today, I should like you to ask each of your teachers to write letters to parents concerning two, three, four, or more children. I suggest that you divide the children into as many groups as you have teachers, thus having a letter for each child to send home to parents when the last report card goes out. This letter will need to be checked very carefully by you. It will be the same plan as we use for the summer report cards.)
4. Learning to make case studies of individual children.
- *5. Learning what tests to use, how to use them, how to score them, how to interpret them, and how to use the results of the tests.
- *6. Learning to record all information on the cumulative record. (This will include health programs, such as immunizations, test results, etc.)
7. Learning how to interview children and parents.
8. Learning to get family and educational histories of children. (This, of course, would come in the case study.)

It will probably not be possible to do all the things suggested above, but I should like you to do as many as possible and particularly wish you to work with your teachers on the things starred above.

Please have in each child's folder everything possible to help the next teacher understand the child. In our case, this will be

1. Pittsburgh City Schools Cumulative Record.
2. Carbon copies of letters sent to parents.
3. The first page of the test booklet. (If you have all three for the year, that will be fine.)
4. A family history and educational history as far as you can get it.

Board Names Navy Vet, 39

Buford Fisher, 39, a native of Kimball whose teaching experience has been mainly in Neosho and Allen counties, was appointed today as superintendent of the Chanute schools.

The board of education announced at a noon luncheon meeting at Kay hotel that Fisher will be given a 2-year contract. The board's discussions continued and details about Fisher's salary and the starting date of his contract were not immediately announced.

Fisher, a navy veteran of the last war, is at present assistant dean of the junior college, supervisor of elementary education and director of teacher training in the Iola schools.

He said he will associate himself as closely as possible with the local schools until he begins his duties as superintendent.

He will succeed James B. Hutton, 48-year-old administrator who died here Feb. 11. Howard Jester, principal of senior high school and dean of the junior college, has been acting superintendent since Hutton's death.

Fisher has taught at every grade level from primary through college graduate school. He said he intends to emphasize the continuity of education from kindergarten through junior college in his role as superintendent.

His goal, he said, will be to maintain "a unified system whose basic purpose shall be to educate boys and girls with a continuity of purpose." He has taught at Erie, Galesburg and Kimball and said he is familiar with the various departments of Chanute's

schools, which he considers a "fine system."

The school board selected Fisher from a list of 46 applicants for the position. The qualifications of applicants were studied at a

number of executive sessions of the board, said Dr. E. C. Cathers, board president.

Born at Kimball, Fisher is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Fisher who live now west of Elsmore. He attended Neosho county rural schools, at Valley and Spring Branch, and was graduated in 1929 from Stark high school, which later became Grant township rural high school.

He received his BS degree in education at Pittsburg State college, the same school where he was awarded a master's degree in education in 1948.

He taught in Kimball primary grades before teaching upper grades at Galesburg from 1935-39. He was a junior high teacher at Erie in 1939-40, had an 8th grade at North Kansas City, Mo., 1940-41, and returned to Erie as junior high principal in 1942-43. He taught on a fellowship at Pittsburg State college in 1947-48, and since then has been in the Iola school system.

Fisher served in the navy 2½ years during the last war. He was a radar technician, assigned much of the time to Alameda, in California.

Youthful appearing and 5 feet 9 inches tall, Fisher is married. He said he likes to sing and, in church preference, he is a Methodist.

FIVE-YEAR PROGRAM WILL SEEK TO RECRUIT KANSAS STUDENTS.

Meetings Are Scheduled for Nine County Seat Towns in Southeastern Part of State.

Pittsburg, Kas., April 7.—A search for qualified young people to enter the teaching profession in the next five years will be inaugurated next week in Southeastern Kansas.

Meetings are planned for county seat towns to discuss the need for recruiting new teachers to fill necessary vacancies in the educational field.

A Lead by Pittsburg.

The Pittsburg State Teachers college, in co-operation with the Kansas State Teachers association and the State Department of Public Instruction, is conducting the meetings under the leadership of Dr. William A. Black, head of the Education department at Pittsburg.

A shortage of well-qualified teachers already exists due to the fact that many teachers are leaving the profession to go into business and industry, according to Dr. Black. The very modest preparation requirements in Kansas cannot be held unless new recruits are found or some schools are closed.

Meeting Over 3 Days.

Meetings will be held April 16 at Columbus, Oswego and Sedan, April 17 at Independence, Fredonia and Erie, April 18 at Girard, Fort Scott and Iola.

Participating in the meetings will be President Rees H. Hughes, Dr. Black and Dr. Jane M. Carroll of the Pittsburg State Teachers college, F. Floyd Herr, director of certification, State Department of Public Instruction, Topeka; Miss Elsie Olson of Marysville, member of the Kansas State Teachers association committee on professional relations.

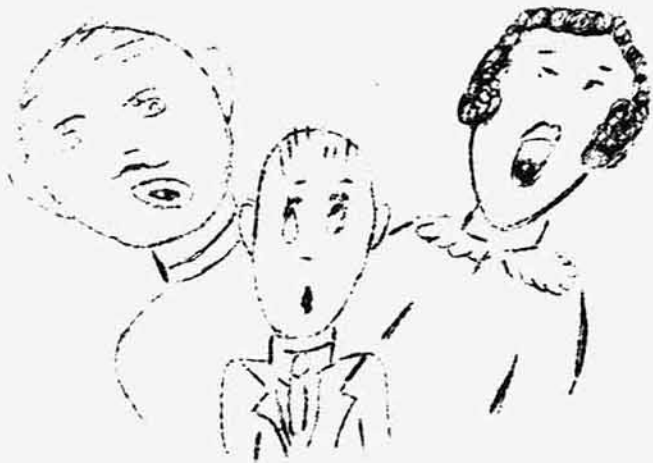

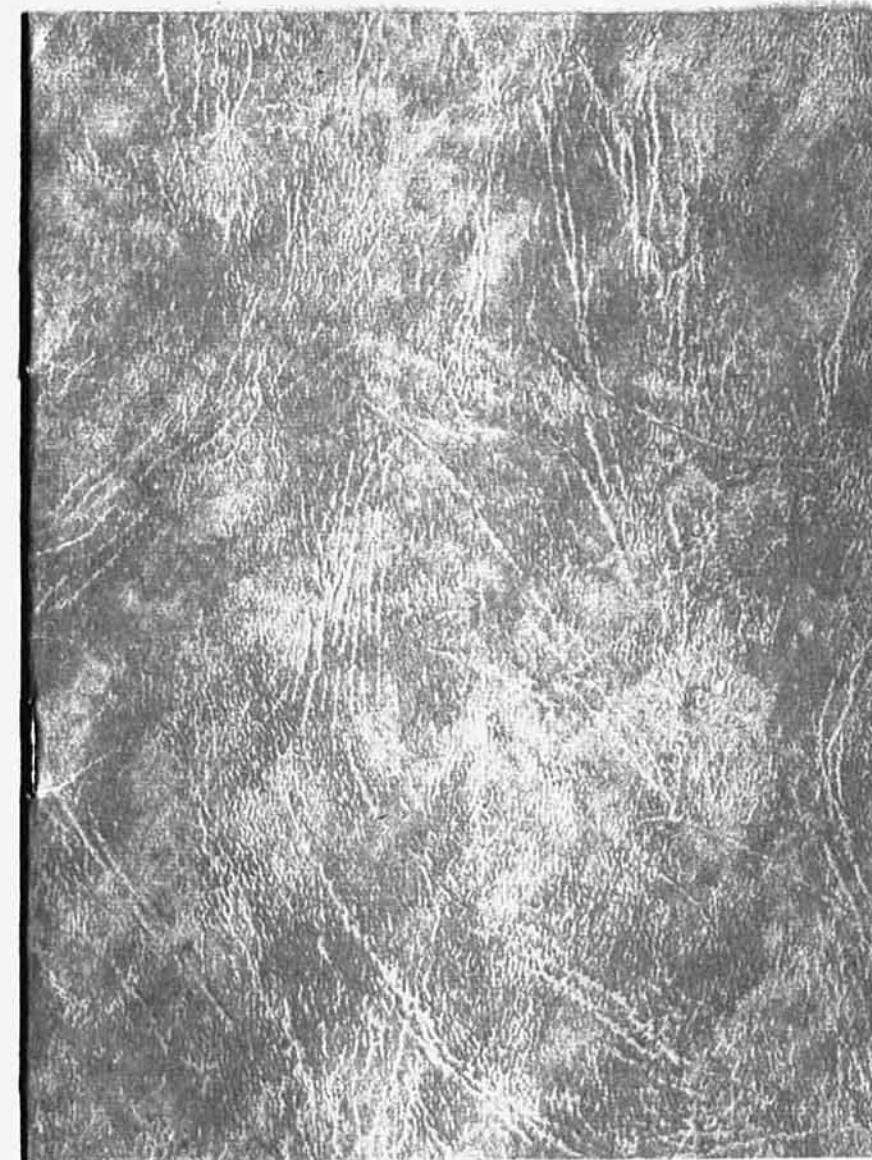
