NEW TERM AT HORACE MANN

Summer Session for Grade Pupils to Begin June 11.

Horace Mann summer school for both children previously enrolled in the school and those who attended other grade schools during the year will begin regular classes at 9 a. m. Monday, June 11, it was announced today by Miss Jane Carroll, professor of education and director of the laboratory school.

The morning work, continuing until noon, will consist of classes while the afternoons will be given over to swimming, crafts, art and orchestra. Afternoon classes, all of which will be taken by choice, will be under supervision.

Children who have not attended the winter session will be enrolled at the school Wednesday, June 6 from 8 a. m. to 10 a. m. These children will come to the school for the first period Friday, June 8 from 8 a. m. to noon.

All children, both those who are enrolled for the summer session only and those who have been in regular attendance during the year, will meet for the first class sessions Monday, June 11 at 9 a. m.

Regular students of Horace Mann have previously been given the opportunity to enroll in the classes and afternoon activities. Letters were sent to parents some time ago informing them of the plans for the summer and asking for registrations through the mail.

Miss Carroll pointed out in the letter the advantages of enrolling a child in summer school. Among these are regular work hours, remedial work to overcome weak spots, limits forgetting of class work over the summer, prepares the child for better work in the following grade and gives the child a sound, beneficial program through the summer months.

In addition to the types of afternoon activities mentioned before, there will also be classes in Spanish for older pupils. Children wanting to go to Bible schools or scout camps will be excused from classes to attend.

Children enrolled in the summer school will be given a permit to swim in the College pool twice a week. This period will be closely supervised. Playgrounds at the school will be supervised both morning and afternoon. Trips and excursions will be planned for all grades during the summer.

Fees for the morning classes and the afternoon activities are small.

Horace Mann Will Present Operetta Tonight With Cast of 400 Although Original Score Prepared for Just 24

That pianist down front, playing the music for "The Enchanted Tree," the operetta featured in the musical being presented by Horace Mann school at 7:30 tonight in Carney hall auditorium, shouldn't have much trouble with the score. He and his wife wrote it.

It's the story of a little girl with a vivid imagination whose dream takes shape in the form of firefly fairies, acorn fairies, tree elves, daddy frog-legs dancers, and a cricket band. What's more, there are flowers that speak, even a moon-flower fairy queen, and all are alive around the little girl's enchanted tree in her garden.

Markwood Holmes, music instructor at the College and his wife, Leone, whipped up the fantasy about a year ago for the St. Peter's Episcopal church school. They presented it with a cast of 24. "I guess it was because none of the children fluffed their lines," Mr. Holmes asserted, but after the play, we were asked for the script and it was produced in Fort Scott by the Eugene

Ware elementary school with 100 in the cast.

"That was exactly 76 more players than we had used in our production," Mr. Holmes said, "and the spectacle must have been attractive. Anyway, at the request of Louise Burton, a director at the Nelson Art Gallery in Kansas City, the Fort Scott cast went to Kansas City and "The Enchanted Tree" was given last May 12 on the Saturday afternoon program at the gallery."

Horace Mann training school first presented the musical which includes "The Enchanted Tree" at the College on May 16, with 350 students and a production crew of 82. The other part of the musical is an action chorale called "Putting on Airs." The presentation tonight will have the same students that participated in the earlier showing. Asked about his plans for the publication of the "score" Mr. Holmes stated that they had already printed a few copies on the duplicating machine at the College. "Leone and I haven't decided what

else to do with it yet, but we have had quite a few inquiries from school supervisors and directors over the state," Mr. Holmes said. "There's just one thing that worries me, though, Mr. Holmes asserted. "We started out with a cast of 24. Then Fort Scott used 100 members. Now Horace Mann is producing it with a cast of nearly 400."

"When I hear of someone presenting it with a cast of thousands," Mr. Holmes said, I think maybe its getting just a little out of hand."

Children Learn Foreign Language Best Through Daily Conversation

THE fluent use of a foreign language is a great accomplishment, because it opens a rich field of culture to its possessor. This nation is a mixture of peoples with varied cultures, all of which are precious contributions to our own, and if our school children will master at least one language beyond their own English they will add not only to their own powers of thought and expression but also to the strength of their country.

Language is the only means people have of communicating with others. If the language cannot be understood there can be no communication. There is more to language than its words and its grammar: Accent, inflection, idiom and implication. To make an idea clear to another one must use language complete with its overtones of meaning and feeling; this is something grammar alone cannot do.

School children often become discouraged with a foreign tongue because of the way it is taught. When stress is laid first on structure and the grammar of the language, American children dislike it with all their hearts. But they will try to talk the new language if they are allowed to and if their mistakes are accepted cheerfully, and as cheerfully corrected. Talking the language is the first step and the easiest to take.

If the teacher of French will speak only French to the pupils, no matter whether they understand at the time or not, they will begin, at least, to hear the language. Hearing a language is not always easy even for those who have good ears. Those ears have to be trained before the tongue can curl around the words and utter them correctly. And how proud a child is when he can answer the teacher in her language and she smiles and answers back to express her satisfaction in his progress.

After talking comes reading. The two soon go along together if the reading is done on the level of the pupil's ability to talk and understand. The junior high school pupil who reads anything at all in English will be quite happy to read a foreign story at the 2-year elementary level. When he succeeds, he is as pleased as if he had read a chapter of Caesar in the original.

After talking and reading, comes writing. Don't start with original compositions in this field but be content with reproduction even when it is the exact words of the book. This is hard work for the beginner, so make the steps easy. Pupils well taught in this way will take

the grammar of the language later on in high school and college. But let use of the tongue come first.

Two Workshops Are Popular

Large Enrollments This Week For
College Programs.

An exceptionally large enrollment in two workshops in elementary education currently in progress at the College was announced yesterday by Dr. Jane M. Carroll, supervisor of the Horace Mann laboratory school and director of the conference.

Leader for the various sessions of the language arts conference in progress is Miss Ethel J. Graff, educational consultant of D. C. Heath & Co., Chicago. She is a member of the board of directors of the Association of Childhood Education. Eighty persons are enrolled in the language arts workshop, Dr. Carroll said.

A penmanship workshop also is in progress under the leadership of Miss Ruth Kittle, author of the series of penmanship books currently being used in Kansas schools. Thirty persons are enrolled in the group, which is also under Dr. Carroll's direction.

Five workshops are now in progress at the College concerning the fields of junior colleges, family life education, English communication, language arts and penmanship.

Six workshops recently completed were in the fields of vocational education, business education, guidance, the modern school, life adjustment, and the teaching of art.

Beginning next Monday, the College will hold its annual book week, sponsored jointly by the College and the Kansas Bookmen's Assn. All major publishers of text books and other educational aids will have materials on display during the week. Particular attention will be given to state-adopted texts. Director of the book week will be Dr. Eugene Dawson.

On Wednesday, June 25, the 31st annual rural life conference will begin under the direction of Dr. William A. Black and Prof. E. E. Stonecipher. Leader for the conference will be Dr. Maurice F. Sea, of the University of Kentucky.

The following rules shall be memorized and thoroughly understood by the school safety patrolmen before he is given an assignment, for patrol duty. He must practice these rules if he expects others to obey his directions:

1. Cross streets at intersections only. Never in the middle of the block.
2. Never cross diagonally at an intersection. Keep within the crosswalk.
3. Where signal lights are used -- stop for the red light -- walk with the green.
4. Walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the road, facing approaching traffic, especially on rural highways.
5. When in groups on highway, walk in single file or not more than two abreast.
6. Before crossing the street look first to the left and then to the right. Look out for drivers making right turns.
7. Do not play games along the street or highway, ~~while at school or going to and from school.~~
8. Do not roller skate in the street or on the highway.
9. Do not heedlessly run into the street or on the highway.
10. Do not "hitch" onto trolley cars, wagons, or automobiles.
11. Do not run into the street or highway from behind parked automobiles or moving vehicles.
12. Do not hold an umbrella in a manner that it will obstruct your view of the road.
13. When riding a bicycle on the street or highway keep close to the right side of the road.
14. Do not "Beg" or accept a ride from strangers along the highway.
15. If on the highways after dark, carry a white handkerchief, or wear a white arm band on the left arm.
16. Look both ways before proceeding across railroad tracks, especially if a train has passed -- there may be another train coming. When disc or light is swinging or lights are flashing stop clear of all tracks and look for approaching train.

The Oath of the School Safety Patrol

"I promise faithfully that as a member of the School Safety Patrol of my school I will at all times do all in my power to protect all members of my school and other child pedestrians when they are crossing the street at my post, to guide my own conduct toward automobile traffic so as to set a proper example to all other children in my school, and to guard myself from accidents while on duty."

GENERAL RULES OF A PATROL MEMBER

1. He must report to his post on time and remain the prescribed period, or until properly relieved.
2. He must perform his duties as outlined, and must not exceed his authority.
3. He must, at least, wear his patrol belt while on duty. Additional equipment and uniform clothing is encouraged for the purpose of identification and protection.
4. He must conduct himself as a gentleman while on duty.
5. He must attend strictly to his task and must not permit his attention to be diverted while on duty by any unnecessary conversation or by any games or amusements.

HORACE MANN SAFETY PATROL ENLISTS

PARENT COOPERATION

Parents, Principal, teachers and children met in Grade 6, Horace Mann Laboratory School of the Kansas State Teachers College to discuss the safety patrol. The parents had been raising some questions which we felt needed to be considered for the welfare of everyone concerned. The members serving this week presented a dramatization of how the patrol functions. Others explained how the organization was set up, such as:

1. Why do the Patrol members remain on duty for 2 weeks as a 1 period unit?

It was necessary for us to work out a half-day program because:

- a-Many children have orchestra or music lessons at the 8:00 o'clock hour
- b-Many children felt they would like either the 8:00 a.m. or 1:00 p.m. period for play
- c-Bad weather conditions would not be so hard to take if there were shorter periods and more workers.

2. Must people stop at "stop" or "school" signs?

Yes, indeed. It is a City ordinance as well as a State Law.

3. Should people stop when patrol members are standing at the corners where there are no signs?

Yes, It is a safety measure and patrol members would not be at these corners if they were not local junctions. It is better to stop than take a chance of injuring a child!

A question period followed and the children answered the many inquiries. The parents made some very good suggestions which everyone felt were worth trying out.
