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

Kansas State Teachers College of Pittsburg was established in 1903 by the State Legislature and was placed under the authority of the Board of Regents. Since its founding for the purpose of preparing teachers of the practical arts, it has grown to be a general college and now offers curricula in Science, Technical Work, Business Administration, Home Economics and all areas of Teacher Education. Many students take courses to prepare them to enter professional schools such as law, medicine and dentistry. 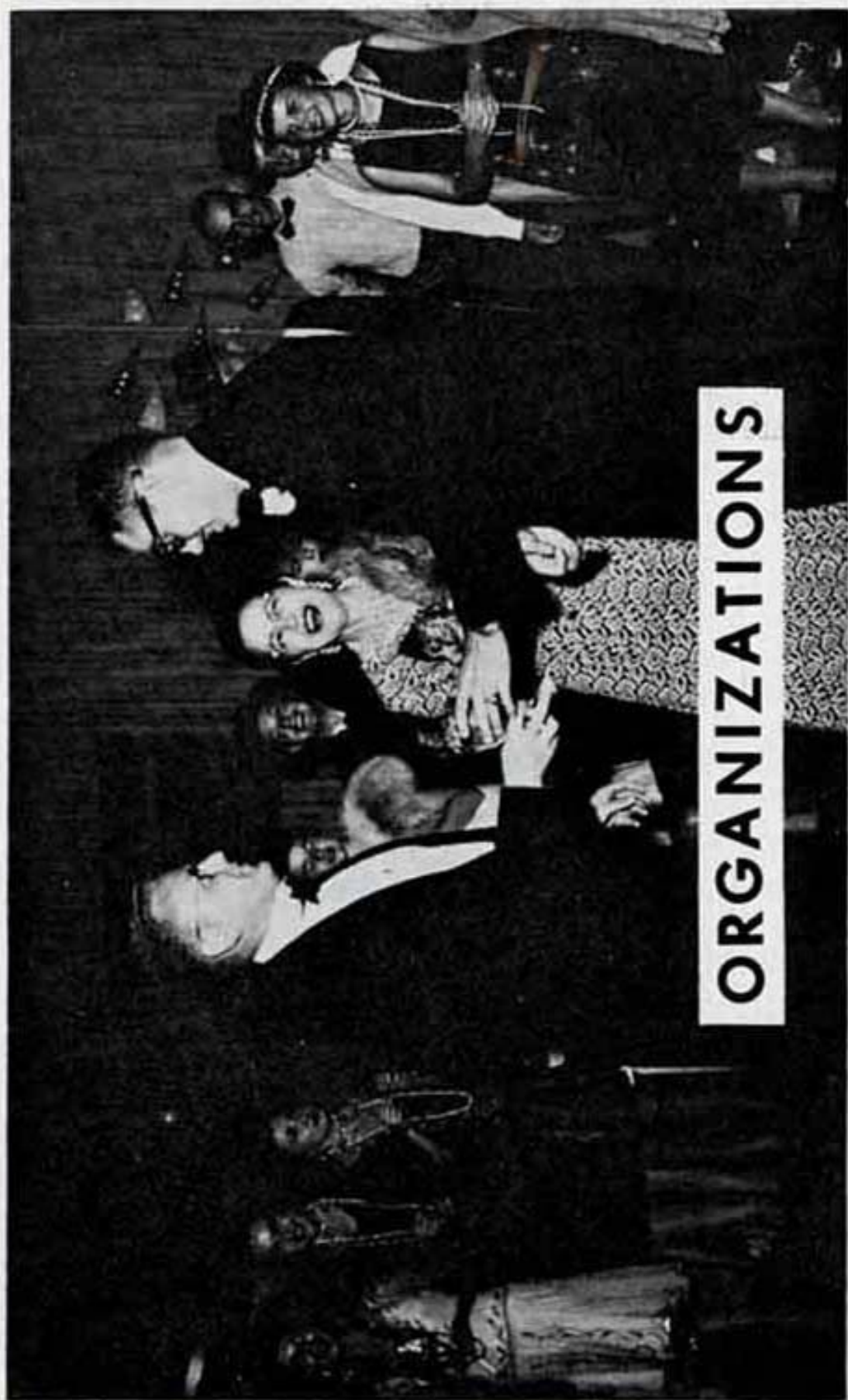

THE STUDENT COUNCIL is the student-governing body of the college. It is a representative body named at a general election by the voting members of the student body. It is composed of the following voting members: President, Four Vice Presidents, four class presidents, one representative from each of the five sororities, one representative from each of the six fraternities, one representative from the Independent Student Association, nine representatives from the unaffiliated students, and one representative from the Graduate students.

Non-voting members include the NSA representative, the Collegio representative and the Kanza representative. This makes a total of 33 members on the council.

Elections are held for all elective officers during the last week of April except in the case of Freshman class officers. Freshman class elections are held during the first week of October of each year.



ORGANIZATIONS

Any group of students with a common interest may form an organization to further that interest. When a constitution and a set of by-laws have been drawn to indicate the objectives and procedures of the organization these must be submitted to the student council and to the activities council. If these councils feel that the objectives and proposed activities are worthy and in keeping with the objectives of the college, the constitution and by-laws may be accepted and the organization may become an official organization of the college.

Men living in the residence halls established a Judiciary Council in the spring of 1958. The purpose of this council is to hear complaints of infractions of regulations in the residence halls. Two representatives are named from each building. A chief justice and other officers of the council are named from among these representatives. This council is founded on the idea that the residents of the halls can administer justice within their own group more successfully than persons not a part of their group. This development is considered to be a movement toward maturity on the part of our students and we anticipate successful administration of justice from this organization.

A. W. S. is the newly formed women's governing body at KSTC of which every regularly enrolled woman student is a member. This organization works to unify the women students, to provide opportunities for leadership, to encourage activities, and to govern the women on campus. It is our belief that every woman should take advantage of her cultural and scholastic heritage to learn her future roles of leadership and responsibility in the community through the valuable experiences offered to her as an active participant in A. W. S.

The government is patterned after our own national administration with a House of Representatives and a Senate. The House is composed of 20 members: 6 representatives from East Hall, 4 representatives from Willard Hall and 10 from the students living outside the dormitories. The Senate is composed of one representative for every 100 enrolled college women and the officers. Elections for the Senate and House of representatives take place within the first two weeks of the fall semester, and the officers are elected in the preceding spring semester.

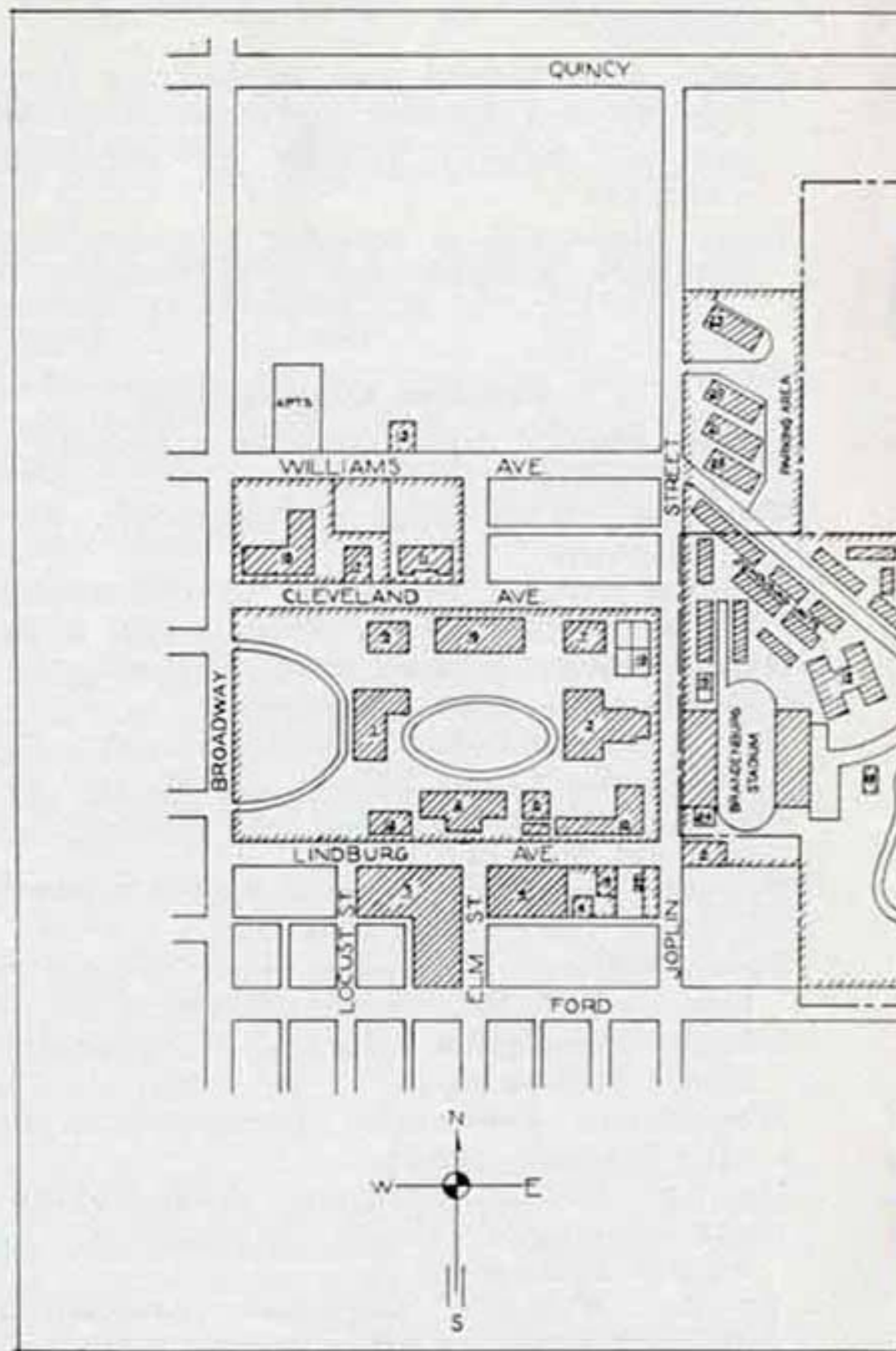

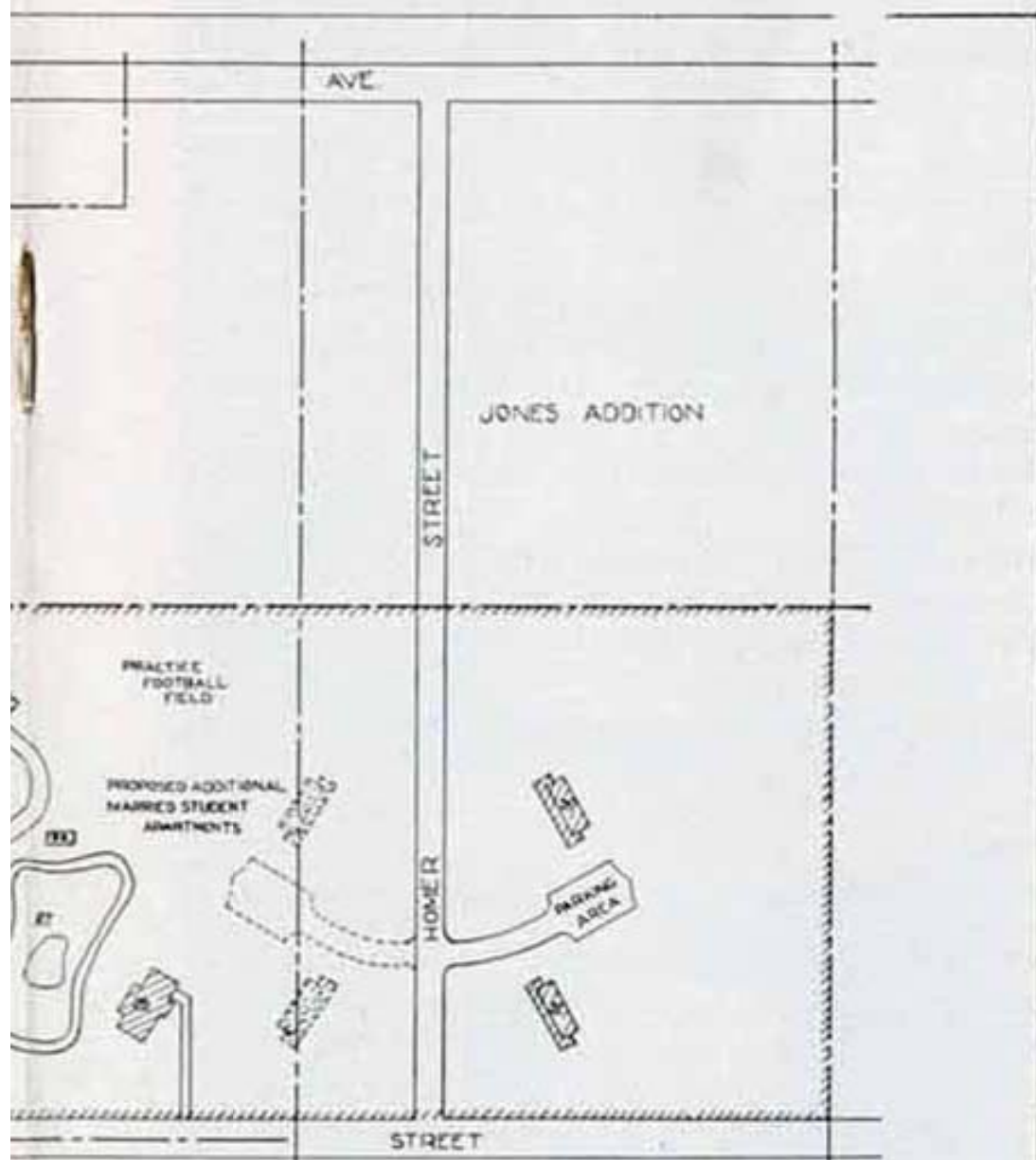

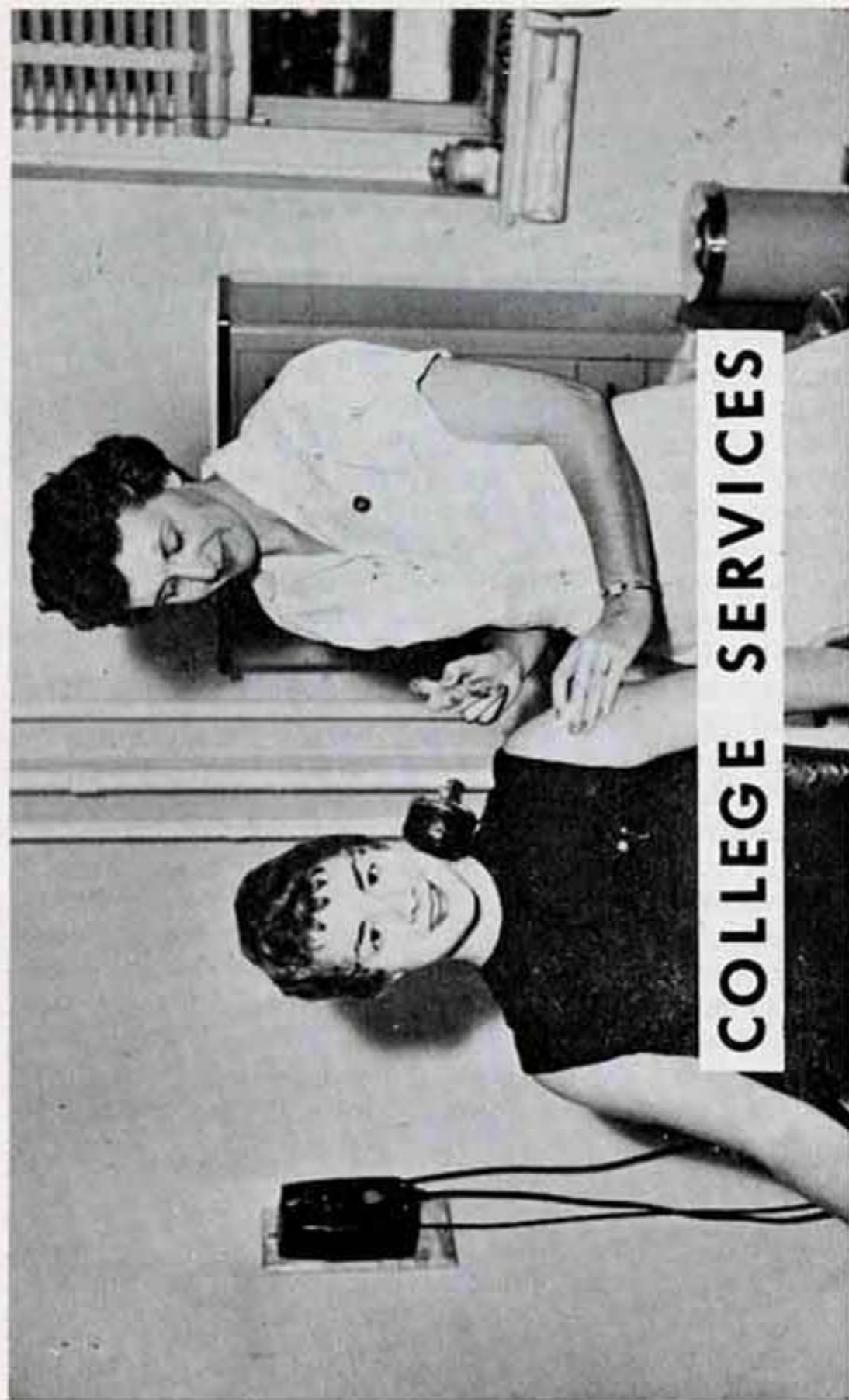

SERVICES

Health

At each enrollment students pay a student health fee. The funds realized from this are used to provide health services of various types.

The Student Health Center is located on the first floor of Carney Hall. Nurses are on duty from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day and are qualified to render help for minor ailments. To deal with conditions of more major proportions a doctor is on duty at the health center from 12:30 to 1:30 each day. If you are seriously ill at your residence the doctor will visit you there at your expense. If your illness is of such a nature as to require hospitalization the college health service will pay the amount of \$6.00 per day for seven days. The health service will also pay for certain drugs, medications, X-rays, etc.

Students should inform themselves of the details of the health plan and make use of it when they have need. Good health is essential if you are to do good college work and it should be carefully guarded. If you must miss classes for health reasons you must inform the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women.

Women students living in the dormitories are requested to notify the housemothers **before the class is missed**. Women students living off-campus are requested to telephone the Dean of Women's Office **before the classes** are missed. This record is placed on file for the instructor's confirmation of any absence.

Counseling

Counseling Services of the College are administered by the Guidance Bureau, located in Room 119 Russ Hall, and through the Office of

the Deans of Men and Women. The purpose of these services is to help you in all phases of your college experience.

In changing from the familiar situation of your high school where you were well acquainted with everyone to the more complex situations of a college where you may be almost completely among strangers, you may encounter some difficulties. The College has provided various persons to help you meet these difficulties if they arise.

When you arrive on the campus in fall, students and faculty who are members of the orientation committee will acquaint you with your college, and introduce you to other people on the campus. During enrollment a faculty advisor will counsel with you about the course offerings of the College. During the orientation period you will take a battery of tests which will be scored and the results made known to you by a counselor assigned by the Guidance Bureau. If you live in a dormitory, the dormitory counselors and house mothers stand ready to help you at any time. House mothers in private homes are also helpful to the students who stay with them.

If you have problems not mentioned above do not hesitate to seek help from the Director of Guidance Services, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the Chairman of your department or from any one of the many sources available to you.

Veterans will receive special assistance in the Office of the Co-ordinator of Veterans Affairs, Room 212, Mechanic Arts Building. It is in this office that Veterans file their certificates of eligibility for educational benefits under the G. I. Bill. All problems which are particular to veterans will be dealt with in this office.

Financial Assistance

- a **Scholarships**—Each year a limited number of scholarships is awarded by the college to incoming freshman students, as well as to a few upperclassmen. These scholarships are generally contributed by interested individuals, labor groups, business concerns, service organizations, fraternal groups, and other local music, civic and teacher organizations. In addition, a few scholarships are contributed each year by campus organizations.

The amount of these general scholarships usually ranges from \$50.00 to \$200.00 which covers to a considerable extent the matriculation fees of the regular college enrollment. Selection is based upon evidence of scholarship, leadership experiences, and personality and character qualities. Application may be made to the Scholarship Committee. The following are representative of the awards given.

American Association of University Women Scholarship Award

The Pittsburg branch of the American Association of University Women offers a scholarship annually to a junior or senior girl.

Boeing Airplane Corporation Scholarship Award

The Boeing Airplane Corporation, keenly aware of the need for a continuing supply of teachers in our public schools, has made available to the College the amount of \$400 a year for one or more annual scholarship awards.

Building and Construction Trades Council Scholarship

The Building and Construction Trades Council of Pittsburg awards two four-year scholarships to

students who plan to teach in the public schools of Kansas.

Winifred Sue Curfman Memorial Scholarship

This award, in memory of the late Winifred Sue Curfman of Pittsburg carries an annual stipend of \$150.

George N. Spiva Memorial Scholarships

A part of the earnings of the George N. Spiva Memorial Trust Fund of the College Endowment Association is allocated each year for the granting of George N. Spiva Scholarships.

Grand Chapter of Kansas Order of Eastern Star Scholarships

This organization now makes available two types of scholarships. To be eligible for one scholarship award, students must be Masons, members of the Order of the Eastern Star, children of Masons of Kansas, children of members of the Order of the Eastern Star of Kansas. This scholarship is for the amount of \$200 a year.

Kansas Congress of Parents and Teachers Scholarships

Students who have completed two years (junior standing) in any accredited two or four year college in Kansas are eligible to apply for this scholarship.

Kansas Federation of Women's Clubs Scholarship

This award is for the amount of \$96 and is presented to a deserving freshman girl who is in need of financial assistance to continue her schooling and who plans to teach in the schools of Kansas.

O. W. Chapman Memorial Scholarship

This award, which is for the amount of \$100 is contributed by members of the Southeastern Kansas Division of the American Chemical Society and is in memory of Dr. O. W. Chapman, for many years a member of the chemistry staff at the College.

- b. **Student Employment**—The majority of students who attend colleges in America have jobs which earn some part of the money they need to attend college. At KSTC most of our students hold such jobs on and off the campus. Those who are intereted in a job should place their names on file in the Placement Office and should also use their own initiative in trying to find jobs. The Placement Office (Room 117 Russ Hall) lists any jobs which are reported there but many jobs are filled by people who seek them personally.
- c. **Loans**—No student should leave the college or be needy while in college without consulting the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women about his financial condition. Loans are made available to people who have a genuine need and such people should inquire about available assistance. Information may be obtained in the office of the Deans of Men and Women.

Housing

Good and comfortable housing for students is known to be an important factor in helping them to be successful in college. Considerable attention is given to providing such accommodations and all single undergraduate students are required to live in college approved places.

If your home is outside of Pittsburg and too far to drive to the campus each day, the office of the Director of Housing will help you to find a place to live. By September, 1958, the College will have places for 305 women and 550 men in College dormitories. For the convenience of those who prefer to live in private homes the College keeps an approved list of such houses. Married couples are accommodated in the 60 units and 34 apartments on the College campus as well as in apartments in the city. Information and application forms may be obtained from the Office of the Director of Housing, Room 115, Russ Hall.

Information

Bulletin boards are located at strategic places on the campus and students should check these daily to be informed about activities on the campus. Each week a calendar of events is printed and will appear on all of the bulletin boards on the campus. The Collegio, our student newspaper, is published weekly and contains information which is of particular interest to students on our campus. Students should keep themselves fully informed about all activities and proceedings at the college.

Orientation

Special effort is made to help new students to quickly become comfortable and efficient members of the college community. Orientation days are arranged during the first part of every semester to help achieve this objective.

In the fall semester of each year some fifty upper-class students and twenty faculty persons are formed into teams of three to meet with new students and help them to become a part of our college community. Various organizational groups also

assist in this program and make a valuable contribution to it. The various administrative and service offices will help students toward these objectives, not only during orientation days but throughout the college year.

Student Center

Our Student Center Building is the most efficient and beautiful union building in this part of the nation. Here students gather for fine food services and for recreation. Besides the main cafeteria, food is served at the grill on the main floor and at the snack bar in the Gorilla Den. By special arrangements served meals may be scheduled in the private dining rooms on the second floor. Many formal and informal dances are held annually in the beautiful ballroom. Recreation in the Gorilla Den includes ping pong, billiards, card games and conversation in informal groups. Many meetings of students as well as of faculty are held in the various lounges and meeting rooms. The Student Center is your social gathering place while at college and will provide you with many enjoyable experiences.

Porter Library

The College maintains a well stocked library for the use of all citizens of the community. The library is used mostly by college students, however, and the skillful and frequent use of the library often makes the difference between a good student and an excellent student. All students should develop the library habit during their first weeks on our campus.

Several departments of the library should be used frequently by students. The ground floor west of the reserve room contains books extensively used for class assignments. These books may be used for

a limited time in the reserve room or may be checked out for overnight one hour before closing time and must be returned at 9:00 o'clock the next day the library is open. A card catalogue of all books in the library will be found in the lobby of the second floor. The main stacks to the west of the lobby on the second floor are open to everyone and books drawn from these may be checked out for a period of two weeks and may be renewed twice. To the east of the lobby on the second floor is the periodical room where all current periodicals are shelved. South of the main lobby on the second floor is the reference room which houses all reference books. The reference librarian is probably the best person to ask if you have problems relative to your using the library.

You should become acquainted with all members of the library staff and feel free to ask their assistance at any time. Besides what has been mentioned above the library houses a museum on third floor and a library science room on first floor. The library is open from 7:45 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 7:45 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Friday, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, and from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday.

College Book Store

The College Book Store is located on the north side of Cleveland street across from Porter Library. All books and supplies as well as many convenience items may be obtained here.

Most students at KSTC rent their books. For this service each student pays \$5.00 rental fee per semester plus \$3.00 deposit which is returned to the student when all books are returned to the Book Store in good condition. All receipts from the Book Store should be kept by the student until he has been officially cleared by the Book Store.
