DIPHTHERIA, WHOOPING COUGH, TETANUS, AND SMALLPOX ARE PREVENTABLE

TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS: KEEP THIS INFORMATION HANDY.

Diphtheria is one of the most dangerous diseases of childhood. The death rate is high among children less than five years of age. Be sure to have the pre-school children in your family immunized.

One method of immunization against diphtheria consists in giving injections of toxoid under the skin. Two doses are recommended at four (4) week intervals. Few reactions occur in children up to seven years of age, but in older children occasionally a local reaction may occur lasting from one to three days. The baby should be given toxoid before it becomes nine months of age. An additional one (1) cc of toxoid should be given the child one year after the initial series and again on becoming of school age, if three or more years have elapsed since the last booster.

Let us make sure that no child shall strangle to death from diphtheria, as hundreds of Kansas children did every year before the diphtheria immunization was discovered. There has been a 95 per cent reduction in cases and a 98 per cent reduction in the number of deaths since 1921 as compared with the years prior to 1921, when there were practically no children in the state who had received the immunization against diphtheria. The result of these immunizations is apparent to any person. DIPHTHERIA CAN BE PREVENTED.

A successful vaccination is the only protection against SMALLPOX. There has been developed the multiple pressure method of vaccination. By this method the skin is not broken and only rarely do severe sore arms occur as a result of vaccination.

3. Rules -- Starting Friday, April 3, and ending Friday, April 10, pupils competing for the prizes should make a clean up effort around their homes and neighborhoods. After the work is finished, the pupil should write a brief letter telling what he or she has done toward cleaning up the city this spring. In case of the younger pupils, parents may write the letter, if necessary. The letter, signed by the pupil and counter-signed by the parents, should be turned in to the pupil's room teacher before the close of school on Friday, April 10. Each teacher should list the names of the entrants in her room and take this list, together with the letters, to the principal of her school, who will make arrangements to select the boy and girl winners at that school for the two \$1 building prizes offered by the Chamber of Commerce civic affairs committee.

The decision should be made on the best effort in the clean up drive and not on the merits of the letter itself, which is only the signed statement of what has been done by the pupil.

In this way, each of the seven schools will have one boy and one girl in the final contest for the city championships for the two \$5 prizes and two bicycles and the two watches.

The principals will send the names of the two school winners and their winning letters to the Chamber of Commerce office not later than Tuesday, April 14, at 5 p.m. A report on the number of entries at each school also should be made at the same time so arrangements can be made to furnish the schools with the required number of theatre tickets. Principals also are reminded to keep the list of names from their school so each child entered will be certain to receive the tickets due.

The Chamber of Commerce civic affairs committee will select the two grand prize winners and the second and third place winners from the 14 building winners submitted to it. The committee will meet Wednesday noon, April 15, for this purpose and the grand prizes probably will be presented to the winners at special assemblies on Thursday, April 16.

Remember, the letters must be in the hands of the room teachers by the close of school on April 10, to be considered, and the principals must get the names of the school winners and their letters to the Chamber of Commerce office by 5 p.m. on April 14, to be eligible. The cash prizes and the show tickets will be sent to the principals for distribution by April 17.

The city champions on their new bicycles will lead the April 18 parade down Broadway before the free show. The other eight building winners will ride on the Pittsburg fire departments new truck next in line, with other contestants marching. Only ticket holders will be admitted to the free show and all going to the show must march in the parade.

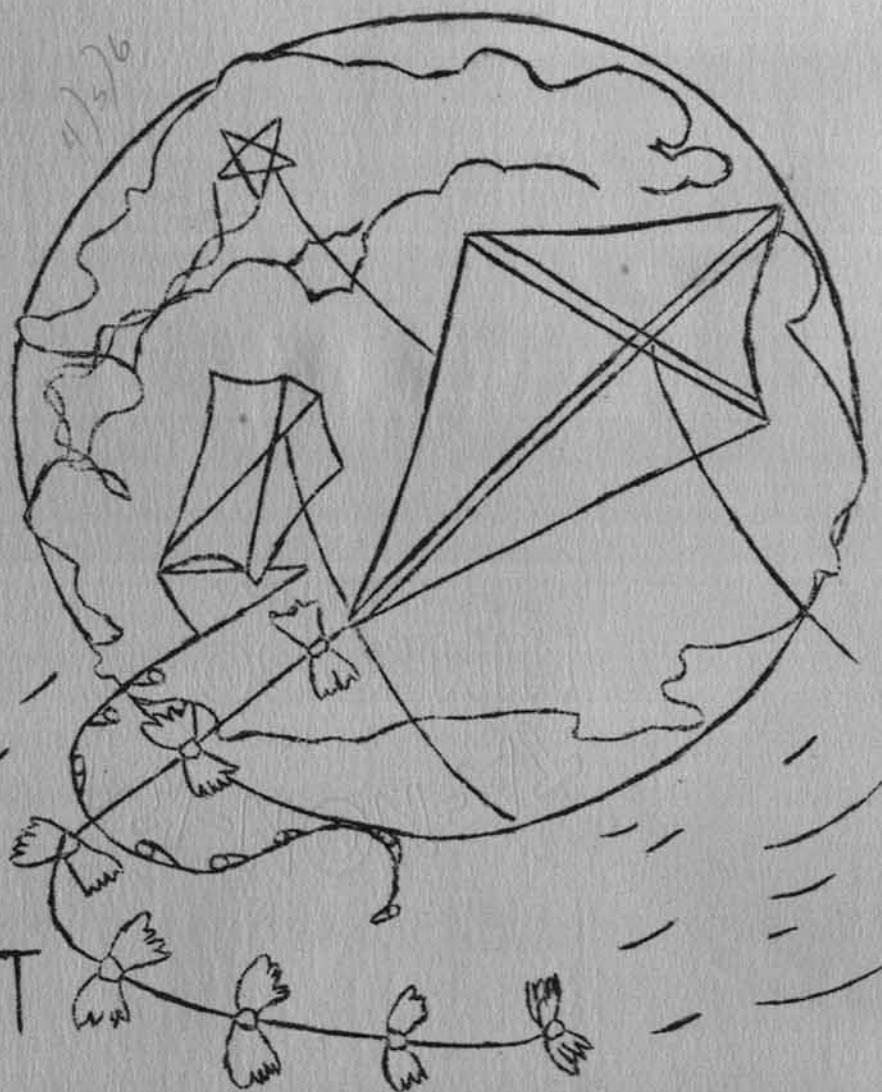

The other supervisors of the Horace Mann Laboratory School have asked me to say a few words about why we planned this occasion.

We wished to openly express our love and appreciation for one whom we all know very well, Dr. Jane Carroll, or "Jane" as we all call her when we are not around the children or the student teachers, and even then it slips out occasionally.

If time can give a better understanding of, and insight into human nature, then I should be able to speak with confidence about our honored guest, as I have been associated with her in work and play for more than twenty five years.

However, it does not take long to observe in her certain qualities. Whether working one year, five years, or twenty-five years with Dr. Jane Carroll, one can easily see in her outstanding qualities of character and personality.

I should like to bring to your attention a few of these which we supervisors have observed and which have stood out during our association together.

One of her outstanding characteristics has been that of loyalty, Loyalty to the parents, loyalty to the children, to student teachers and the supervisors, and loyalty to the college of which our school is a part.

A second quality that has always been outstanding is a high degree of intelligence which displays itself through good common sense. As any one knows it is no easy job to be principal of a laboratory school. There are numerous responsibilities and problems coupled at times with large or small irritations.

Which leads to the third characteristic which Dr. Jane Carroll has always shown to have, that is a sense of humor. This ability to clear up the atmosphere at times by seeing the funny side, she probably inherited from her Irish ancestry.

The fourth and last, but by no means least, quality which I shall mention is one of which every supervisor has at some time been definitely aware, that of kindness and sympathy. Many times in the past years she has added to an already crowded schedule, by taking over work for one who has been ill or has illness in the home. She has also at times taken over our work to permit us to experience some happy event in our homes or outside of school. She has listened sympathetically to our tales of joy and sorrows. We knew any confidence would be kept.

With these few words, I hope I have been able to convey to you, and to her, at least a part of the esteem, love, and appreciation, which we supervisors feel for Dr. Jane M. Carroll who is "Jane" to us.

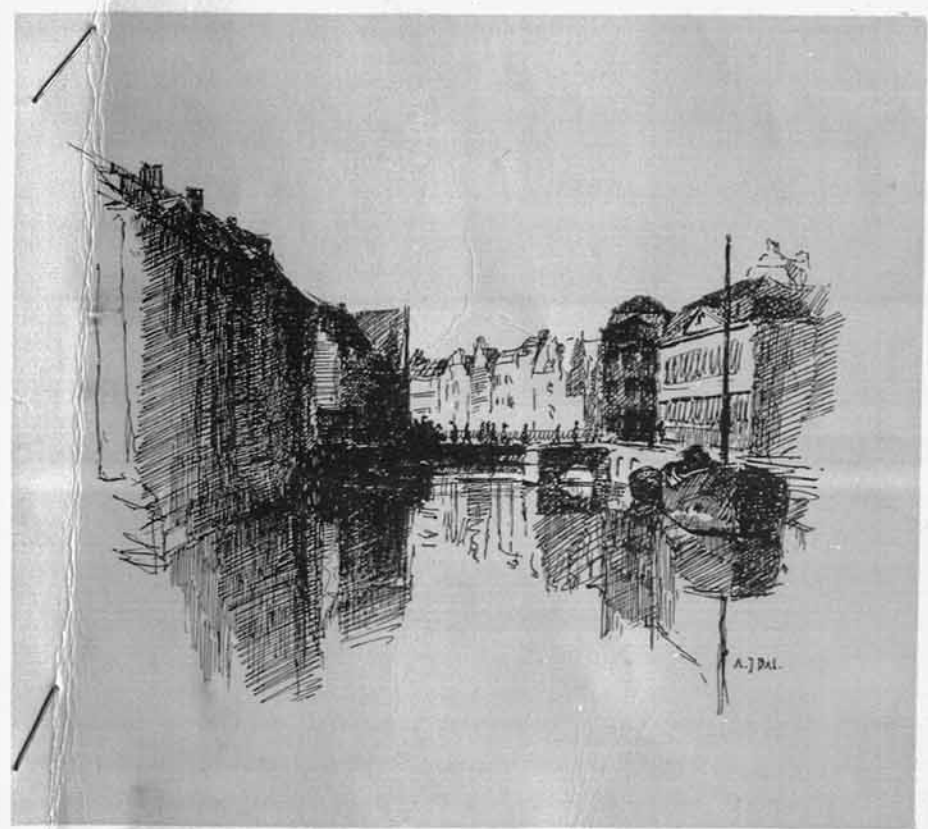

Whooping Cough is more often fatal in the very young than at older ages and should be prevented during the first year of life. Statistics show that 50 per cent of deaths from whooping cough occur in children during the first year of life.

Immunization of thirteen million members of the armed services against Tetanus with outstanding protective results has proved this of value, and is likewise recommended early in life.

A new vaccine is now available that will immunize the child against Whooping Cough and Tetanus as well as Diphtheria. This is the Triple Antigen (Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus), and is administered in the same manner as the Plain Diphtheria Toxoid. Three (3) injections of one-half (1/2) cc at intervals of one month are required with a refresher dose one year after completion of the initial series.

The County Commissioners have arranged with the local physicians to furnish the immunizations and vaccinations free of charge for all children up to 10 years of age. The Commissioners request that every parent whose children have not previously received these immunizations avail themselves of this offer for the protection of their children. In order to take advantage of these immunizations, you must sign the attached request slip indicating your desires, and return it to the teacher of your school district. You will be notified of the time, place, and the date the immunizations will be given.

DIPHTHERIA, WHOOPING COUGH, TETANUS, AND SMALLPOX ARE PREVENTABLE

TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS: KEEP THIS INFORMATION HANDY.

Diphtheria is one of the most dangerous diseases of childhood. The death rate is high among children less than five years of age. Be sure to have the pre-school children in your family immunized.

One method of immunization against diphtheria consists in giving injections of toxoid under the skin. Two doses are recommended at four (4) week intervals. Few reactions occur in children up to seven years of age, but in older children occasionally a local reaction may occur lasting from one to three days. The baby should be given toxoid before it becomes nine months of age. An additional one (1) cc of toxoid should be given the child one year after the initial series and again on becoming of school age, if three or more years have elapsed since the last booster.

Let us make sure that no child shall strangle to death from diphtheria, as hundreds of Kansas children did every year before the diphtheria immunization was discovered. There has been a 95 per cent reduction in cases and a 98 per cent reduction in the number of deaths since 1921 as compared with the years prior to 1921, when there were practically no children in the state who had received the immunization against diphtheria. The result of these immunizations is apparent to any person. DIPHTHERIA CAN BE PREVENTED.

A successful vaccination is the only protection against SMALLPOX. There has been developed the multiple pressure method of vaccination. By this method the skin is not broken and only rarely do severe sore arms occur as a result of vaccination.

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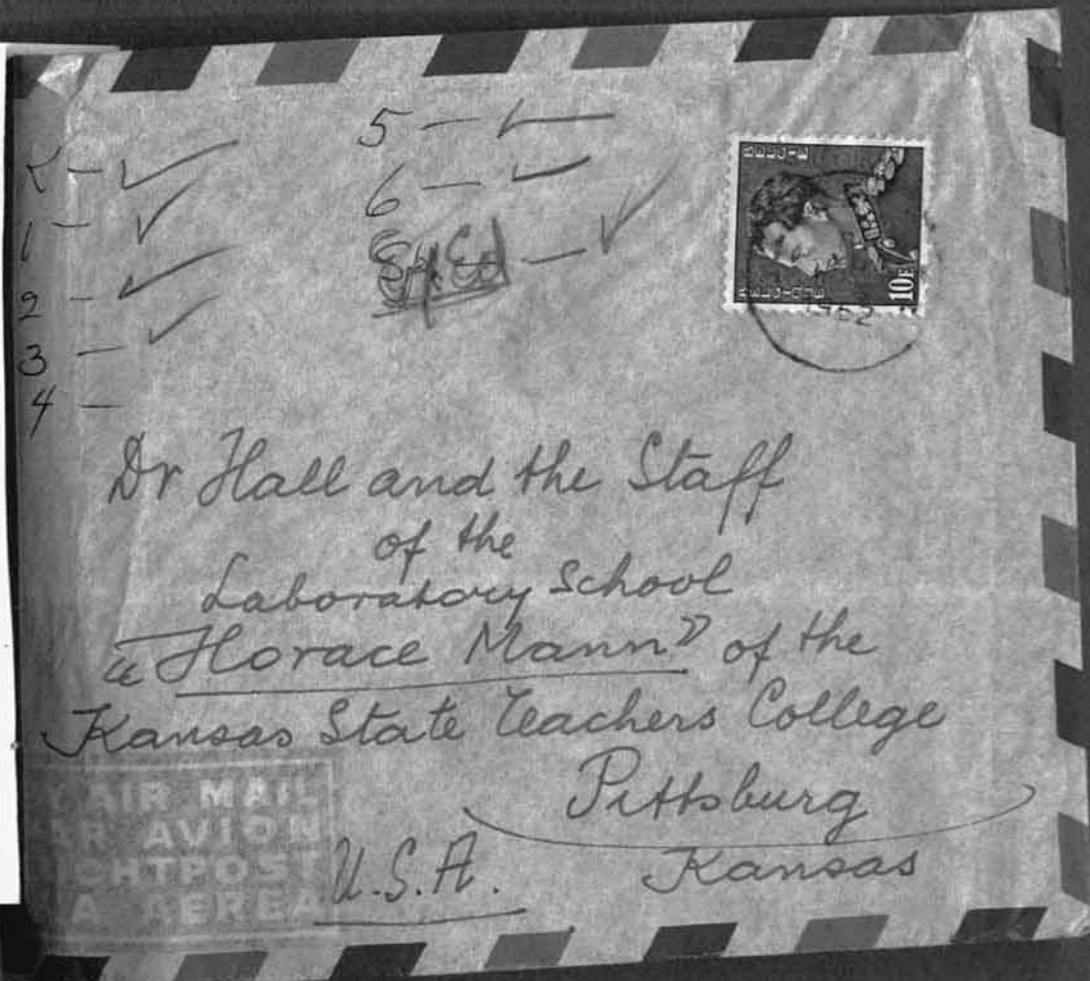
