## ***Class History***

As we, the Senior Class of '24, are leaving the protecting walls of dear old C. H. S., we think over all we have ever done or accomplishment during our four years in High School that will benefit us or add to the fame of our dear old Alma Mater. All our work has been to this end and we are proud of the fact that we have left behind us some records of achievements that will never be forgotten and that will be hard to break. We are proud of this, not so much because it adds to our fame, but because it adds to the glory of dear old C. H. S.

The Seniors of '24 have always taken part in all the High School activities, including football, basketball, track, music, debate and everything else that goes with High School life for developing the mind and body, or for having some "fun." The social life has never been neglected.

We entered High School in September, 1920, a bunch of noisy children. There were eighty-six of us and "Steve" was our president. We had many enjoyable times, including a Halloween Party in which nature helps us wonderfully by sending a rain to keep the upper classmen away. Even while Freshmen we occupied an important place in athletics. One of our members, Harold Harvey, made the football team and the second team in basketball which won the championship in the Santa Fe League. Tat and Fern made the girls' championship basketball team and Fern was awarded the honor medal for being the star player of the tournament. Four of our members, two boys and two girls, were in the selected Glee.

In our Sophomore year our number had decreased to sixty-three and Kenneth was our president. This year our number in the various activities increased, especially in athletics and in music. There were five Sophomores on the Girls' Basketball Squad. Many were in the Select Glee and in "Miss Cherry Blossom." Two class members, Irene and Effie, were on the debate teams. This year the High School paper, the *Nakenak*, was started and the Sophomores had five members on the staff.

As a "peppy bunch" we started our Junior year determined to make it the most successful year yet. We won the inter-class track tournament that year. The most valuable man on the whole track squad, Ralph Skaggs, was in our class. Ralph holds the record for the 220-yard dash in the Verdigris Valley League. This year Ralph also won the 100-yard dash at the V. V. track meet. Three of the football team including the captain were Juniors. The majority of the Girls' Glee and three members of the Girls' Quartet were Juniors. Several of the boys were in the Boys'





Glee and one, Kenneth, was on the quartet. Irene sang the solo in the Verdigris Valley League contest and won third place. Three of the leading characters in "In the Garden of the Shah" were Juniors and the majority of the members of the choruses were Juniors. Two Juniors, Irene and Marie, were on the debate team. It was acknowledged by every one that the best banquet that had ever been arranged in C. H. S. was given this year. "Miss Caney," Caney's representatives at the Newallah at Independence was Dee Hale, a Junior. Steve was our president again this year.

As Seniors we were leaders. We won the inter-class basketball tournament and the inter-class debate and have good prospects for track. Seniors participated in the following activities: Four on the debate teams, the entire Girls' Quartet, three in the Boys' Quartet, entire mixed Quartet, four on the football team, three on the first team squad in basketball and a lot of promising material for track. Many Seniors had parts in the operetta and plays. Seven Seniors were in "Hurry, Hurry, Hurry." The main characters in "Cynthia's Strategy" were all Seniors and one of the leaders in "The Family Doctor" was a Senior. Kenneth was our able president. There were leaders in the class of '24. Many members took part in all the activities. Our president held many important class offices during his four years in High School. He also held many important positions in the many student activities and was in most of the operettas and plays. Carl was football captain for two years and on the football and basketball teams three years. He was also a valuable track man. Tat has been on the basketball team four years and was captain in her senior year. Several of our boys and girls were exceptionally good in music. Neither did we lack in popularity. Virginia Wallar was elected "Miss Caney" by popular vote of the school as was Dee the year before, thereby making the first two Caney Queens to the Newallah come from the class of '24.

We consider it an honor to graduate from C. H. S., the school we love and always will love although our path of life may lead us far away from here. We are happy at the thought of graduation, but there is also sadness within us when we think of leaving dear old C. H. S. forever. But we will have done our best for her and now we must leave our place for others. Some of us will go on higher education, others into vocations.

As we depart we leave this record of achievements to guide other classes that they may follow in the footsteps of the illustrious Seniors of '24.

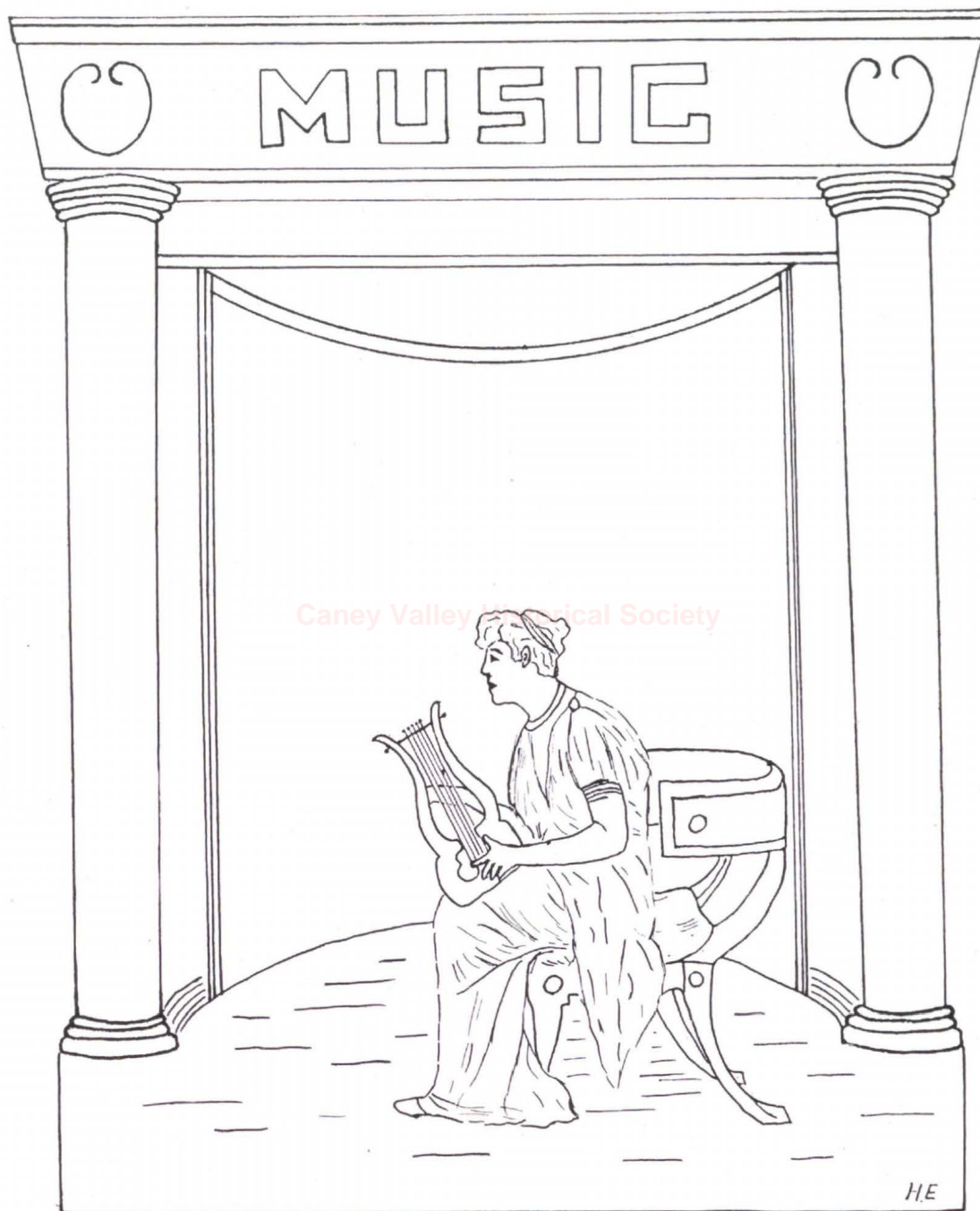
On Hobo Day, Lorenzo Torres and Mary Lambdin received first and third places respectively.

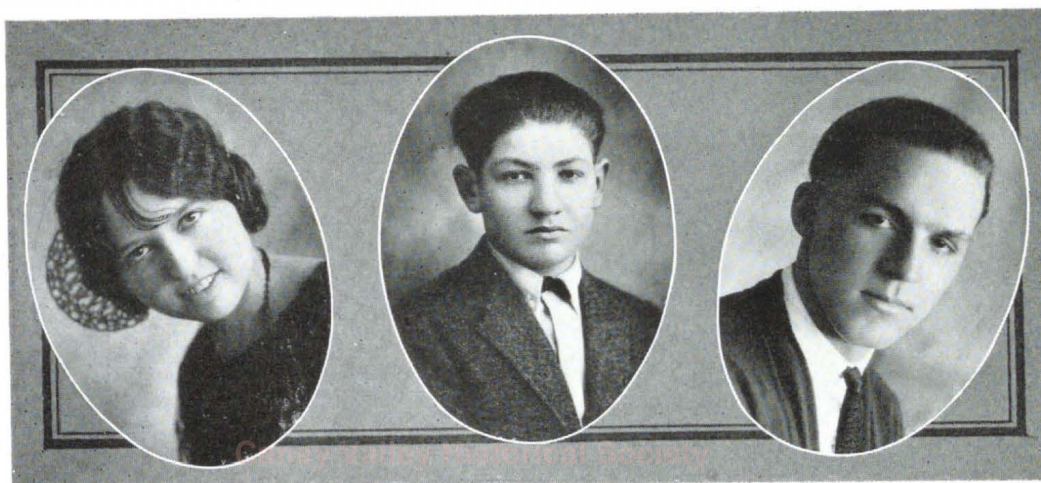

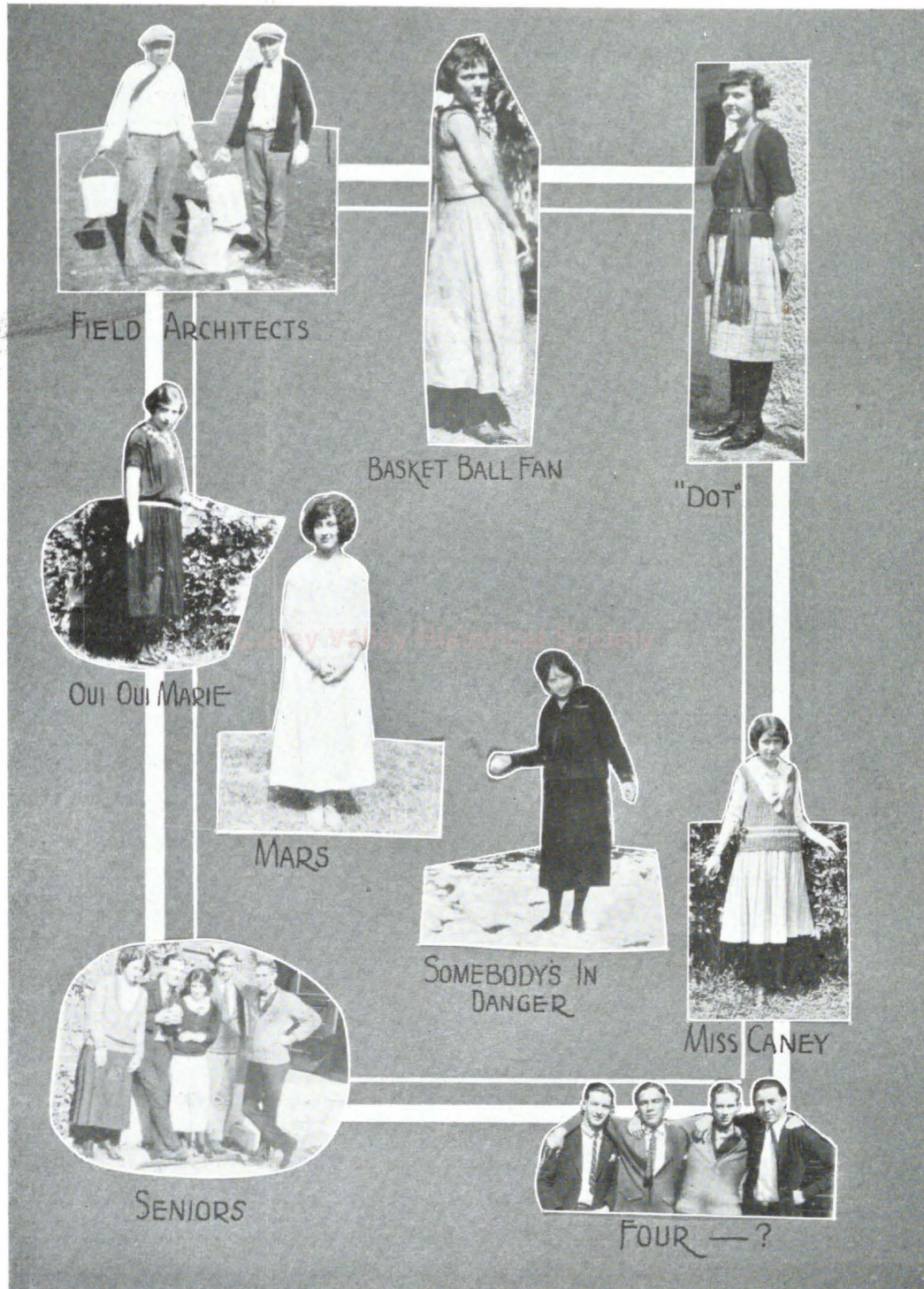

All ends happily with Madge and James, Joan and Dr. Willoughby, Nell and Jack being married and living happily ever after.

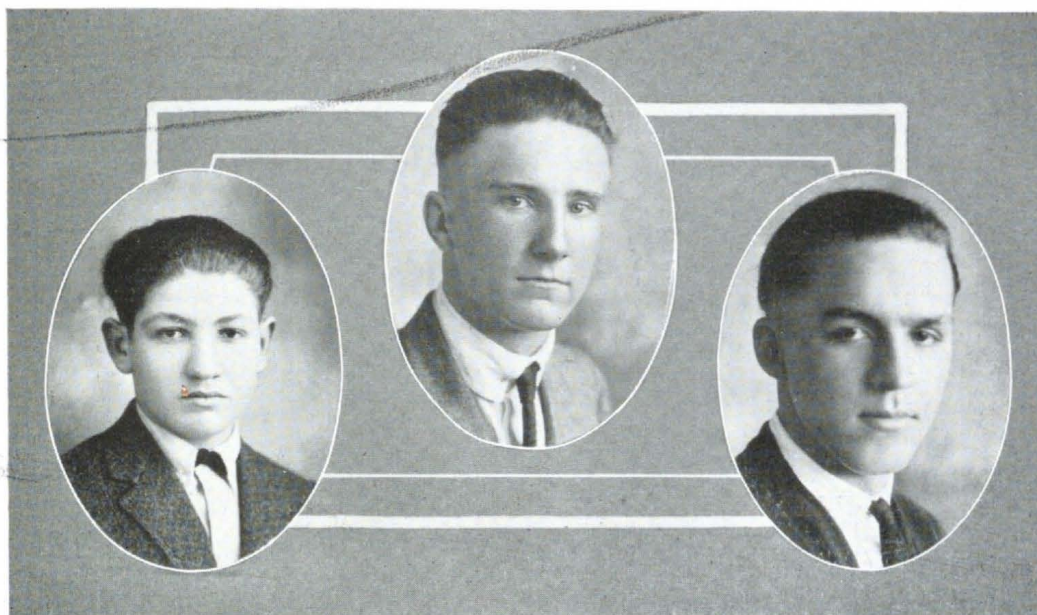

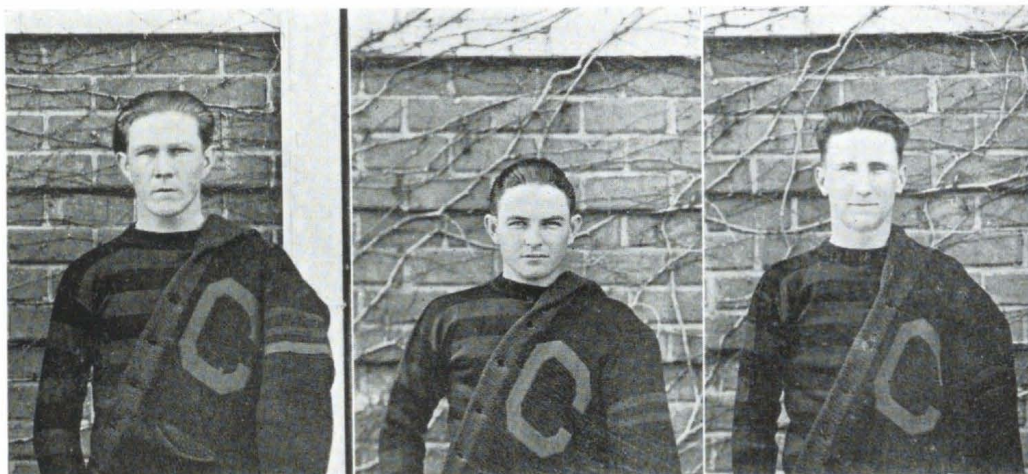
### *The Individual of the Team*

The first Valley game was January 4, at Independence. Caney was not in the best of shooting trim and did not do the best team work as it was their first time to play on a strange court. After all, under these handicaps, Caney kept the score a tie until ten minutes after the allotted time when Independence secured one point more than Caney. Independence 13, Caney 12.

January 11 found a double header at Caney. Tyro and Oswego. The boys' second team played a good game considering their inexperience. Tyro won 10-8. Then followed the second game of the Valley. This was a lucky game because Caney would have been beaten if the whistle had not been blown when it did. Caney won 10-9.

Coffeyville came over on February 1 and entangled with Caney's cagers. Coffeyville may have been great one day but this day had passed for Caney mopped the floor with the two teams till they said enough. Caney's cagers of the first team won, 18-12, while Caney seconds won 12-8.

Now for the deciding game as to who were in the high four. Neodesha was the victim on the local court on February 8. Caney took the lead and stayed there to the finish of the game. Caney won, 15-14. Now for the final game of the year in which Independence fell to our lot. Chalmers could think of nothing but defeat or the cup. He chose the cup and again flipped nine field goals. And when the total score was added Caney soaked Independence to the tune of 31-16.

With the reliable old material and the promising new men, Coach McNair should be able to perfect a team which will rank high for the Valley honors.
