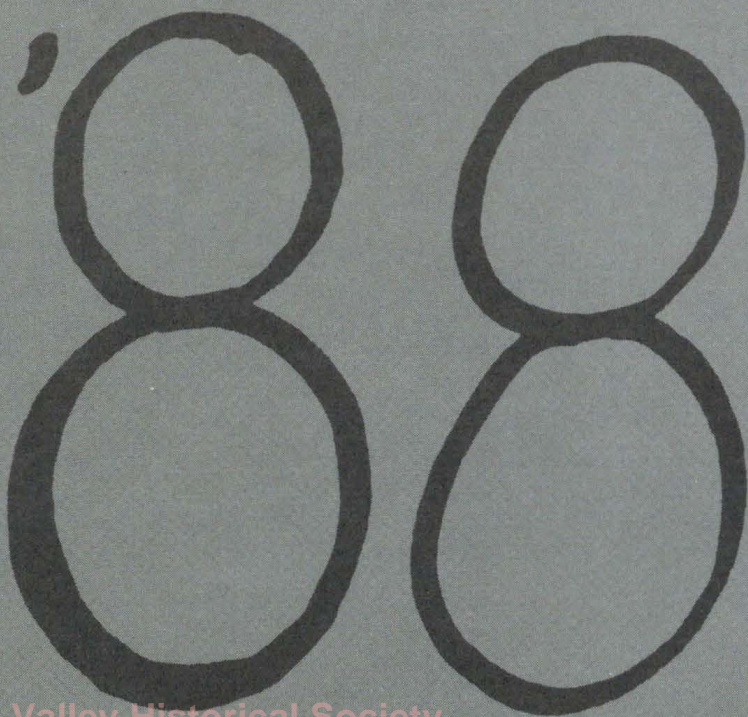

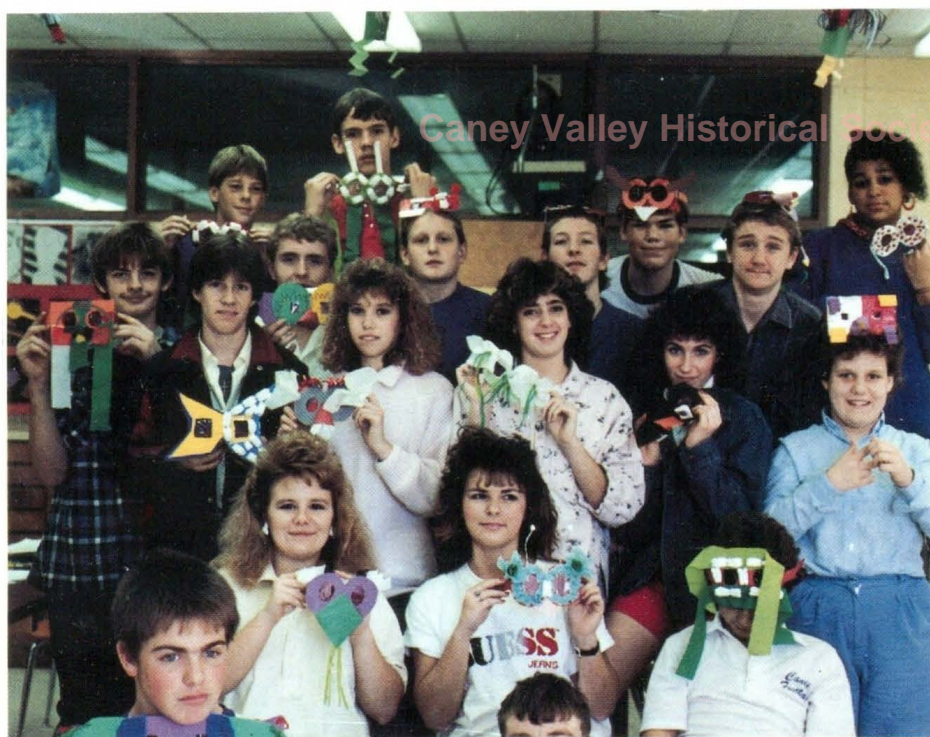
Overall, running has helped me be a healthier, happier person.

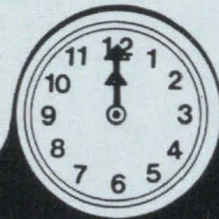

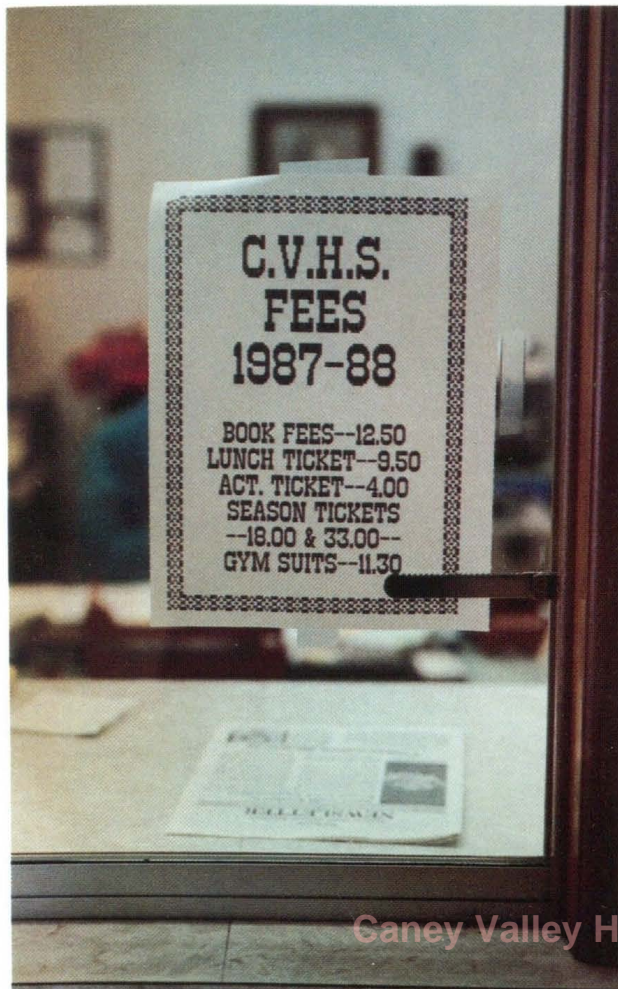

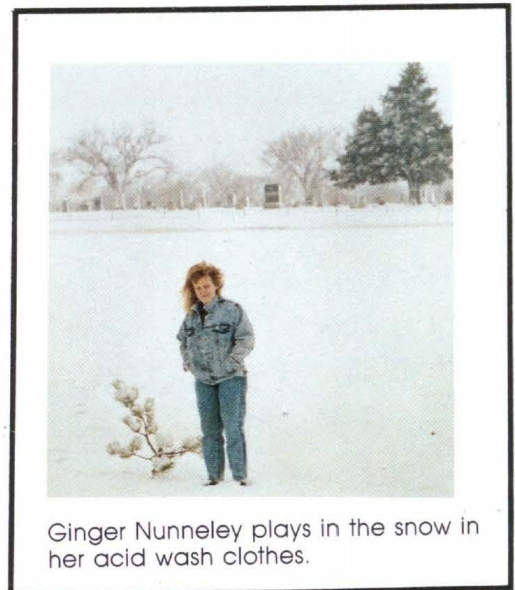
Be aware of teenage cost\$\$\$

Fannigan's Isle consisted of two men, Rick Fannin, 36, and Tom Scheidt, 40. Rick is married and has two children 6 and 9. Tom is presently divorced from his third wife. Rick and Tom have been together for about 3½ years.

They were both born and raised in Daytona, Ohio and, both have been part of Daytona's rock since way back. They don't have to practice much and very rarely do. When they do it's mainly to practice a new song. Rick's favorite instrument to play is the Irish Drum and Tom's is the Classical Harp. Tom also enjoys lead guitar a lot.

Rick and Tom thought of the name "Fannigan's Isle" by putting Fannin, Rick's last name and Gilligan's Isle together. The styles for the guys are also different. Some don't care what they dress like and wear sweats or old ragged 501's. Then there are the guys who care about themselves and wear dress slacks.

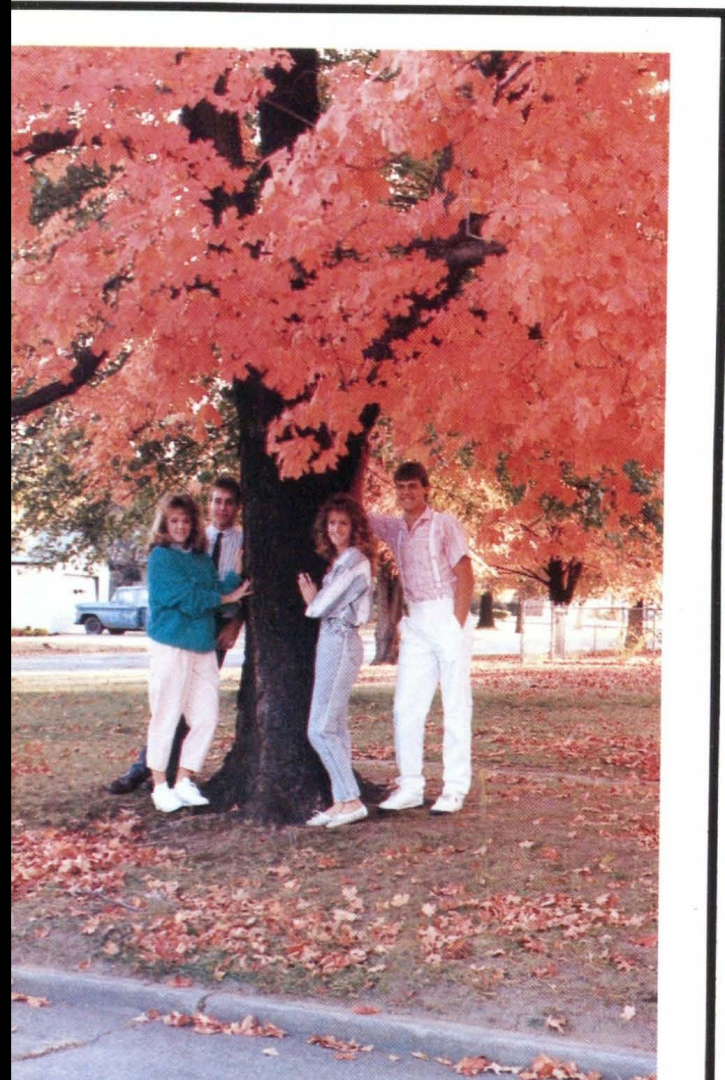
So as you can see, there are many different styles of clothing in CVHS.

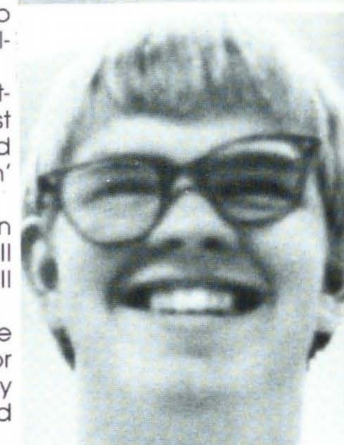

College admissions are discussed by seniors

The Kansas Board of Regents has recently proposed that state-funded colleges stiffen their admissions policies.

The requirements suggested would be at least a 2.0 GPA on a scale of 4.0, an ACT (American College Testing Assessment) score of at least 23, or a class ranking in the top third.

There are several sides for and against this proposition. One argument for it is that too much money is being wasted on remedial classes that students should have taken in high school.

Of course, there are many who feel there should be no restrictions on admissions. Most people of this school of thought feel that if they, adult taxpayers, are going to support these Regents schools by paying taxes, they and their children should be allowed to attend them.

In conversations with some members of the CVHS senior class, it is apparent that the idea of stricter admissions policies is not very popular. Here are some of their comments:

...

JAMIE EVENSON—I don't think it is fair because some students want to go to a certain college, but if these policies are passed, their dreams will be shattered.

JEAN PFALSER—I think it is illegal because the parents pay the taxes.

BETH ENGLAND—Some people try their hardest and can't meet the standards, so they shouldn't be penalized.

CARRIE NEWBY—I think anybody should be able to go since they are paying for it.

ERNIE FIELDS—I don't believe they should base going to college on standardized tests, and since I don't believe in standardized testing, I don't like it.

The Regents are also suggesting that high schools stiffen requirements for a diploma, including a foreign language requirement.

CVHS counselor Johnson doubts that this proposal will be passed soon by the Legislature. She does point out, however, that is is a strong suggestion to high school students that they should take more college preparatory courses.

Six Caney Valley High School seniors were honored Nov. 30 at the area-wide Kansas Honors Program held in Coffeyville at Butterfield's Restaurant.

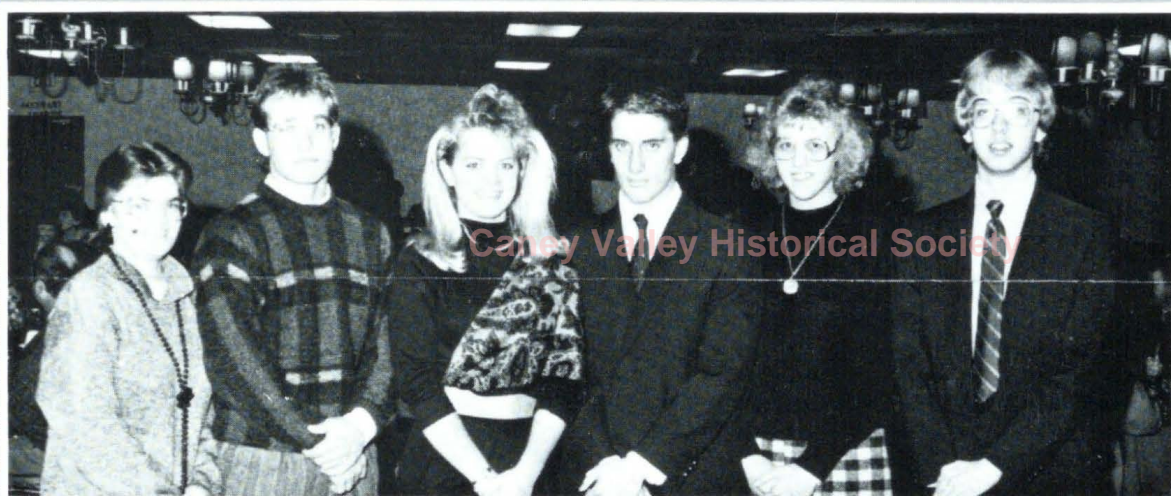

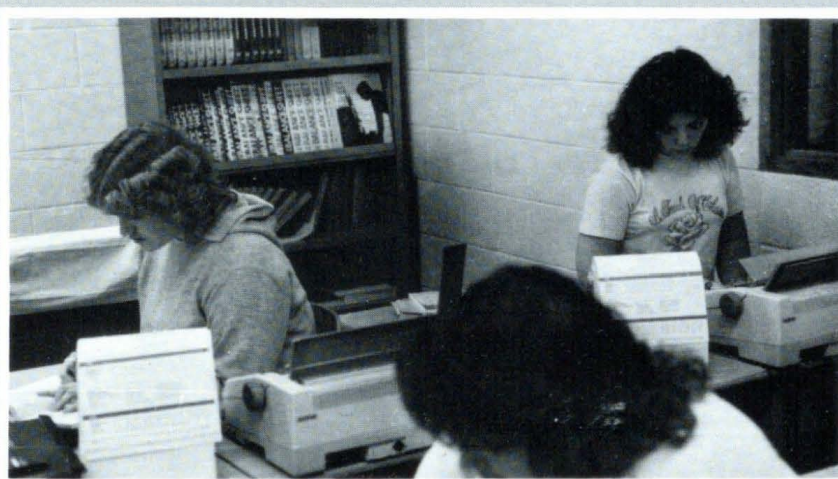
Past the diploma...

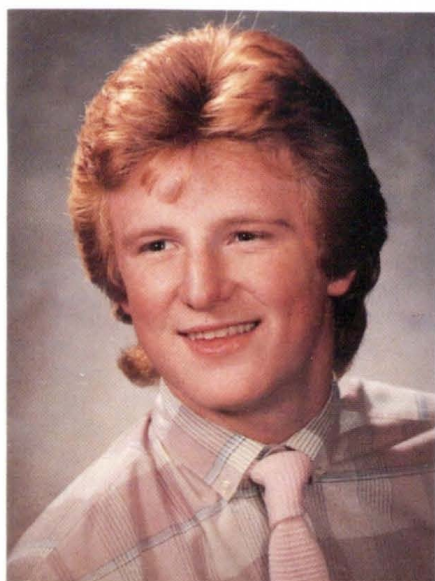

The honors band met in Iola, practiced for most of the day and then presented a concert at night.



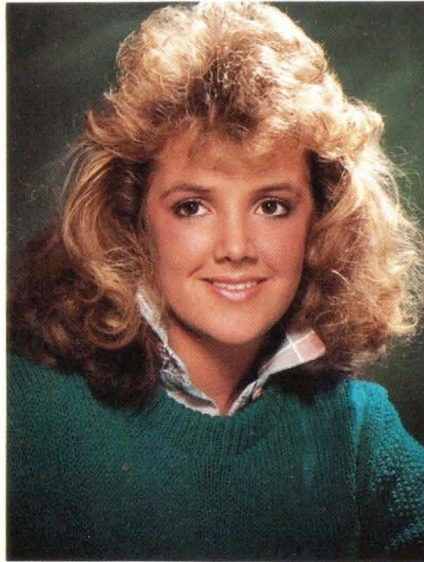

"Now understand the first part of that isn't what I'm stressing. I want you to remember the last part. 'happiness is liking what you do.'"

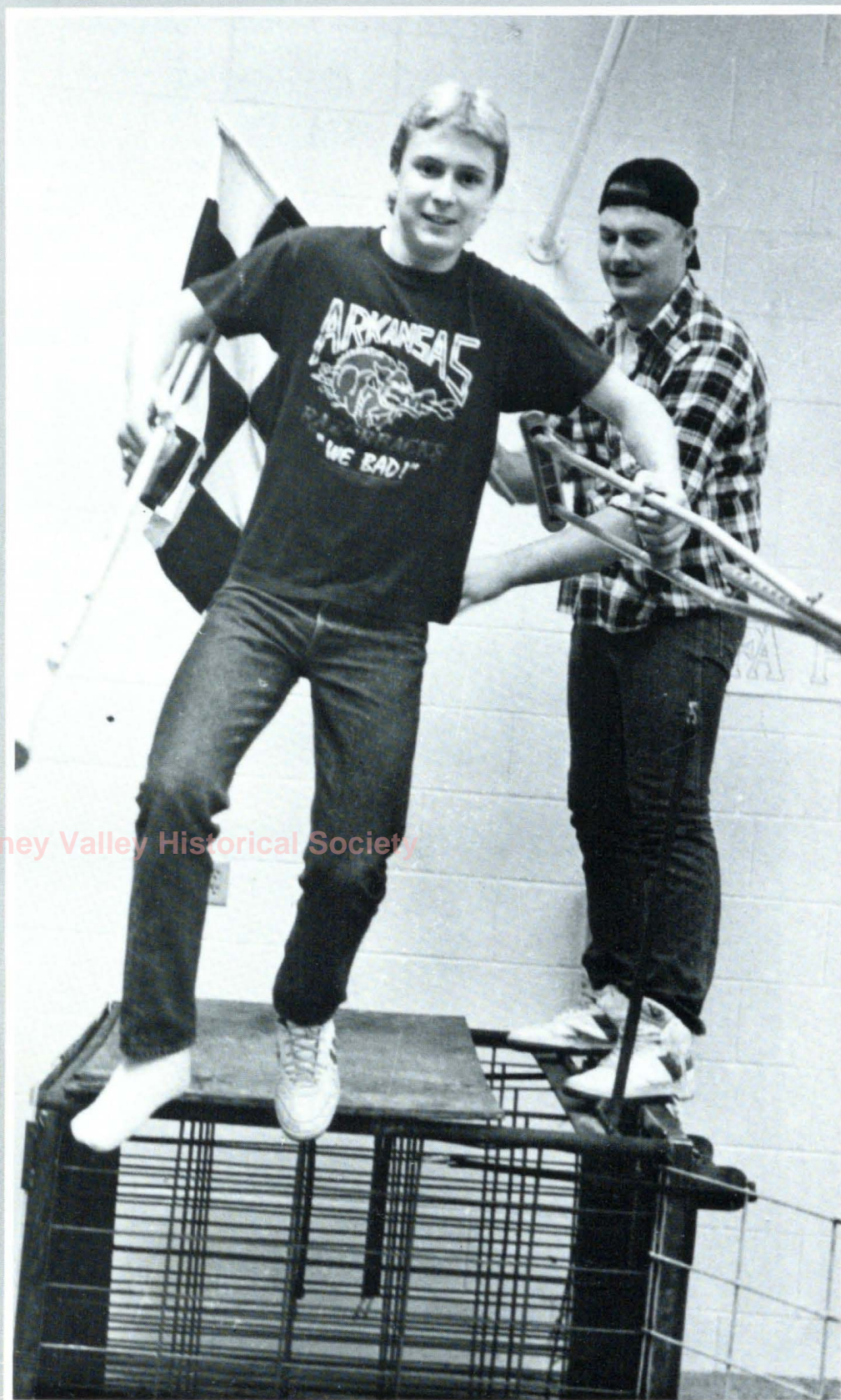

Tracy Butts studies for Mr. Metsker's famous American Government "presidents" test.

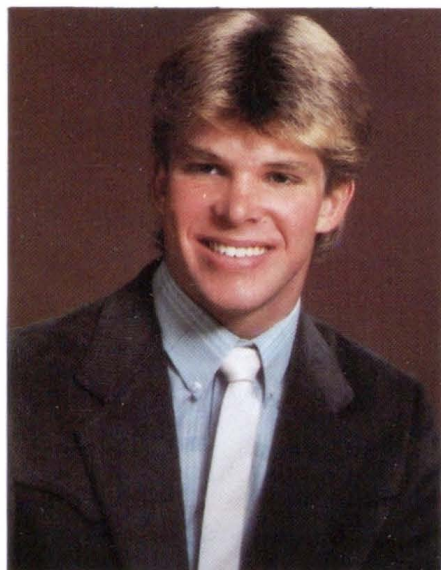

"I have always been proud to say that I was a graduate of Caney High School," Taylor said. "I have heard all the advantages listed of attending larger schools and living in a city rather than in a little burg like Caney, but I have found many advantages to having Caney, Kansas as my roots."

The speaker added, "I would hate for the Class of 1988 to leave today without someone letting you know, loudly and clearly, that you are the fortunate ones, because you are emerging from a unique experience. . .that of growing up in a wonderful community full of very special people."

After Taylor listed several advantages which he believes small schools offer students, he added, "Unfortunately, all the good leadership opportunities you've gained, all this fine education your community has provided you, will out of necessity be put to use in larger communities for most of you. My generation and the one before me simply let you down in that regard."

"Perhaps your generation can help put our small towns back in good shape, because here in these little towns and villages, is Americana in its finest form."

"We have the very thing which most Americans are seeking—a slower pace of life, a sense of community where people care about people, a low crime rate, clear clean air, and a lack of fear on the streets and in hometown neighborhoods."

Taylor concluded that the small towns of this school district—Caney, Tyro, Niotaze, Havana and Wayside, are towns with heart, "the most precious stuff in life." He challenged the seniors to take the "heart" they have received from growing up here, and carry it on to the next generation.

Evenson said, Miss Reitz pointed to the value of lasting memories the class will have of their student days.

In his meditation, Rev. Bob Frank-Plumlee of the First Christian Church told graduates that the ten commandments are guides for their lives. He said they teach great moral, social and religious values.

The CVHS band played the tradi-

tional "Pomp and Circumstance" as the graduates entered the auditorium. The invocation was by Rev. Mike Morris of the Assembly of God church.

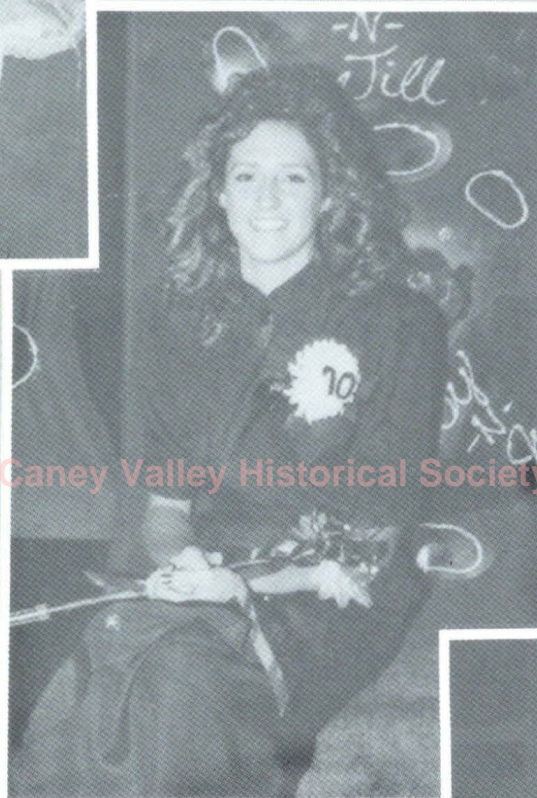

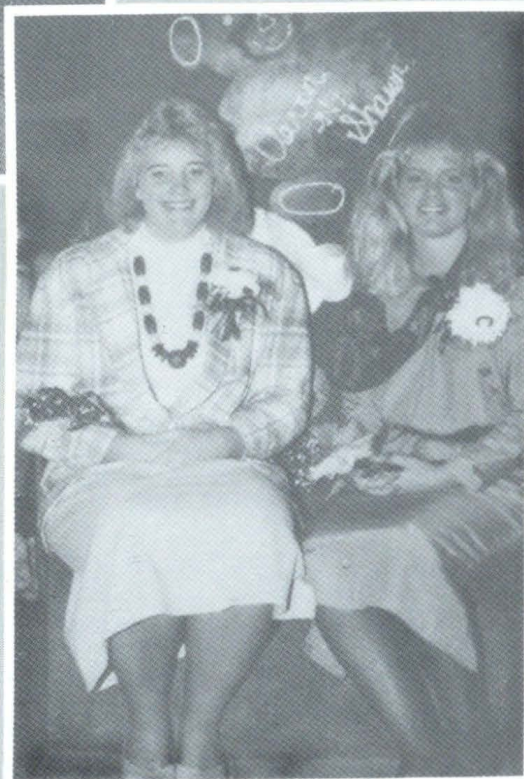

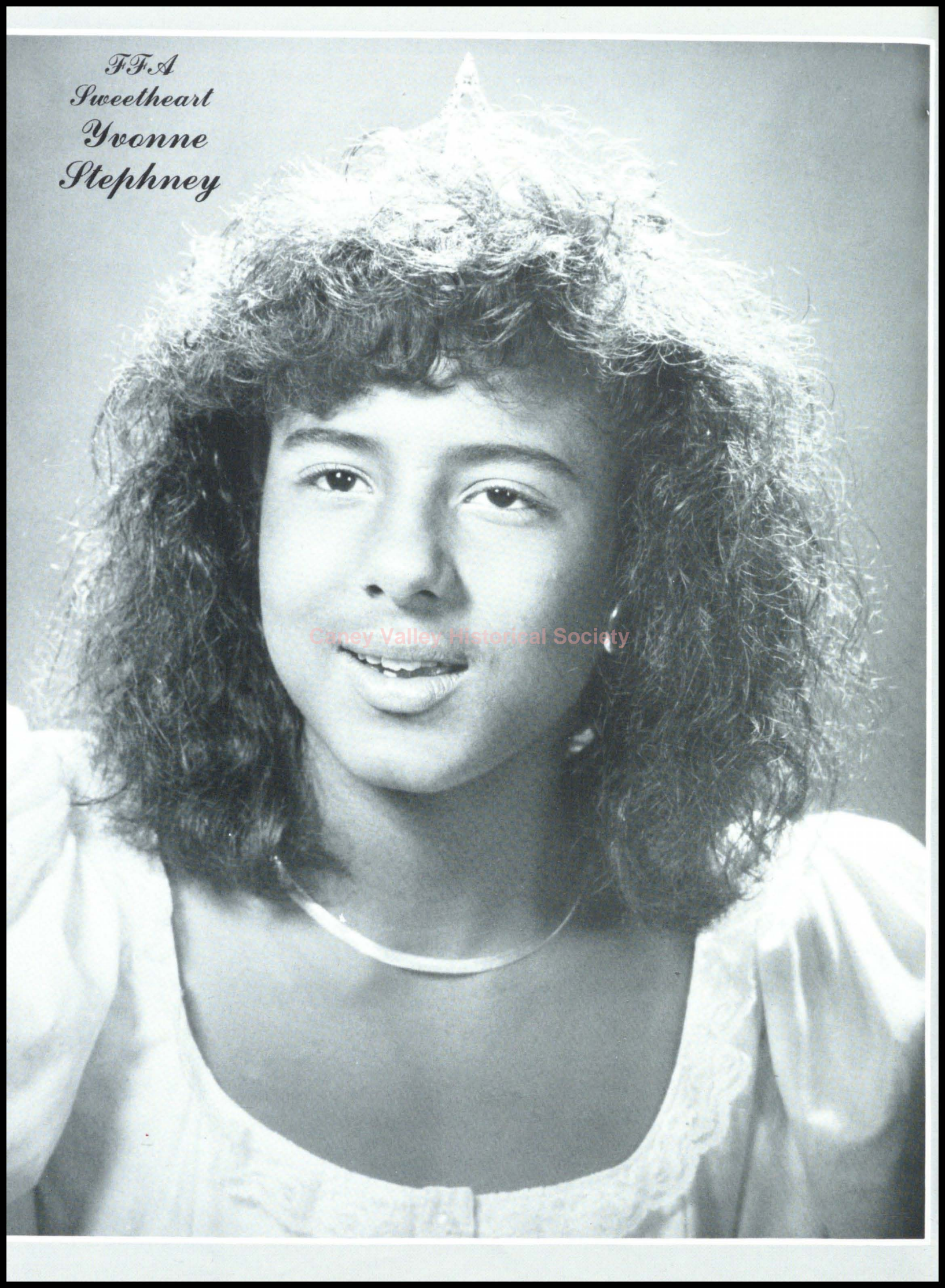

The evening ended with a dance after the varsity basketball game with Fredonia. The coronation was sponsored by the cheerleaders and their sponsors.

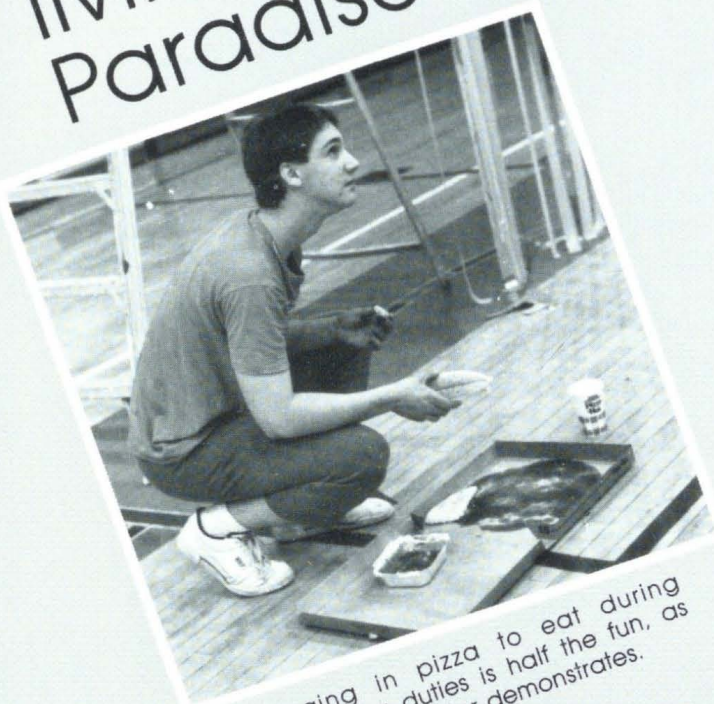

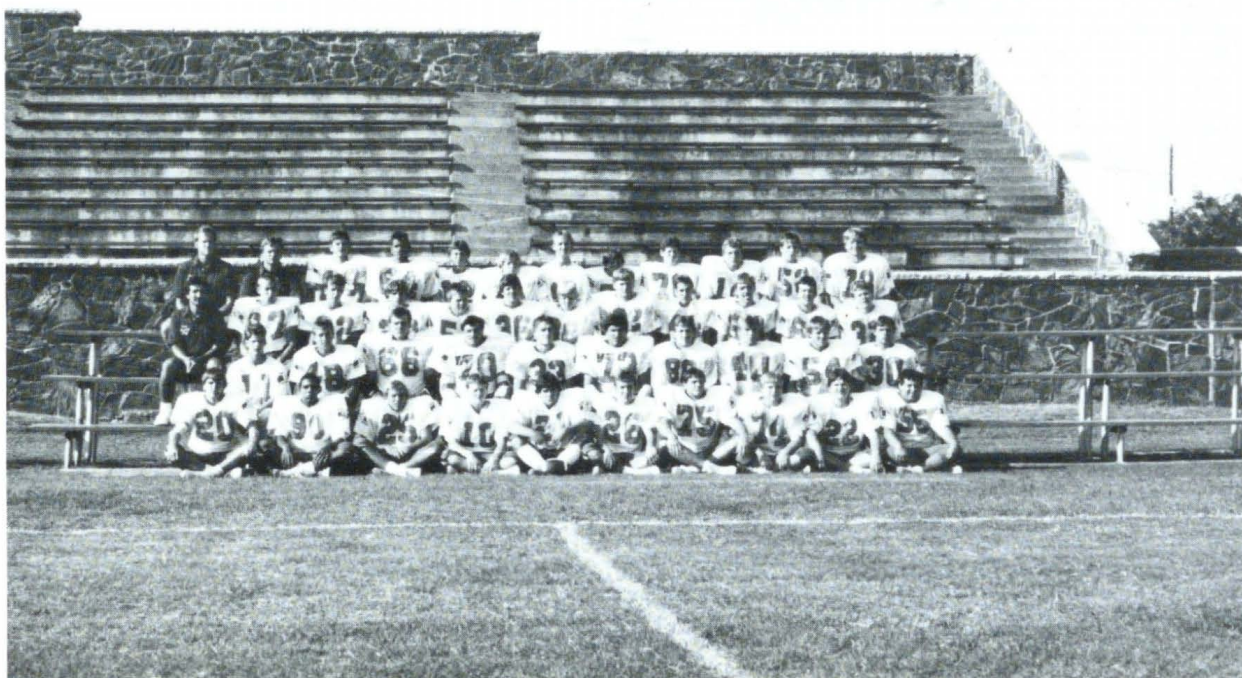

Caney 7, Fredonia 13

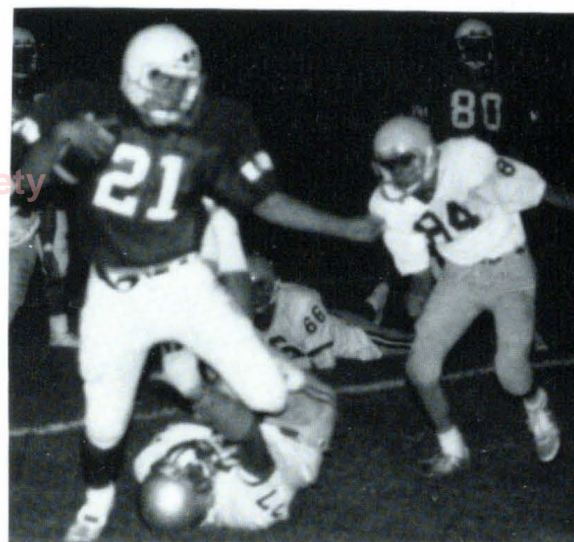
"I just didn't have enough tape to keep us together," a saddened but proud Criss Davis said this morning.

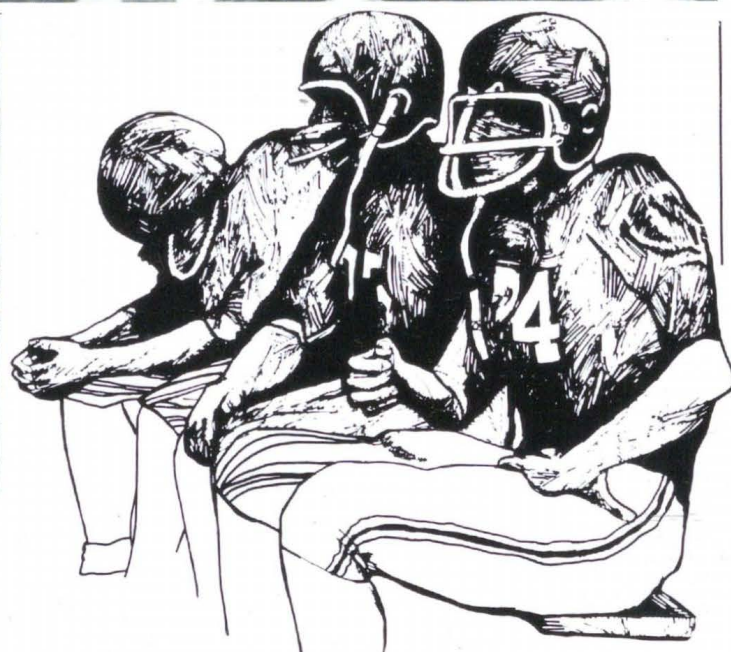

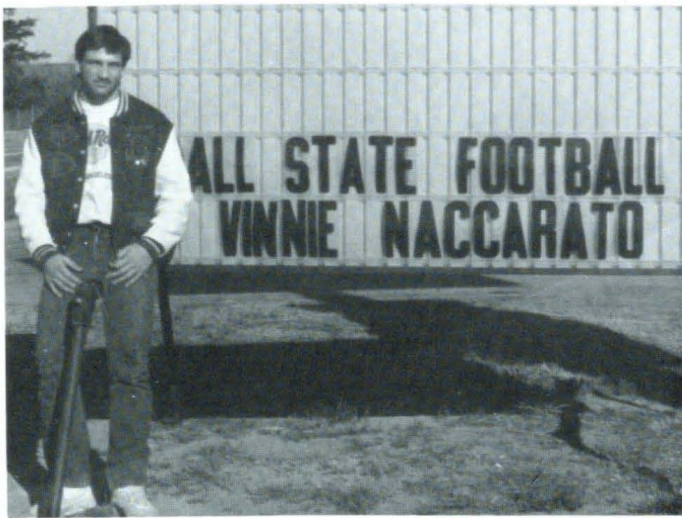

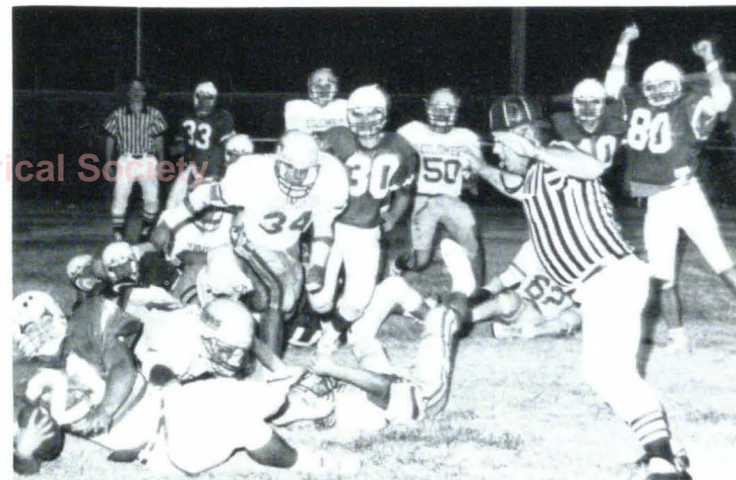

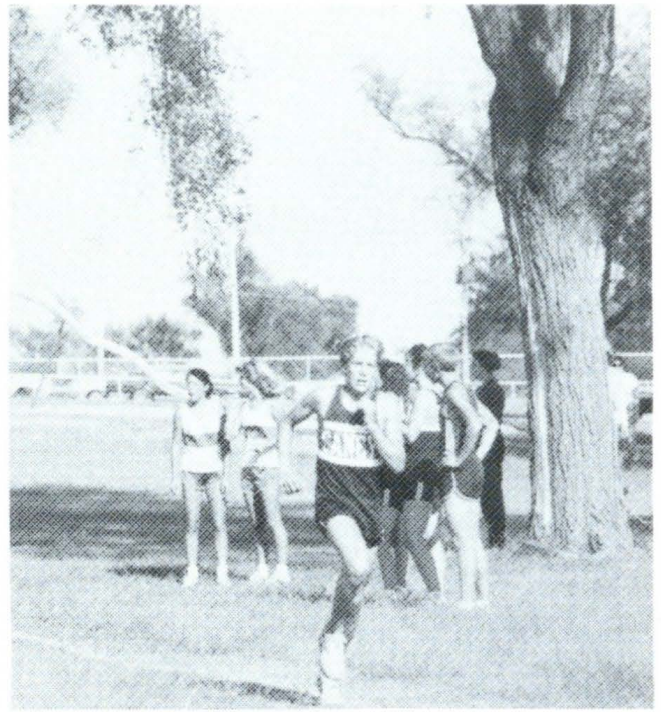

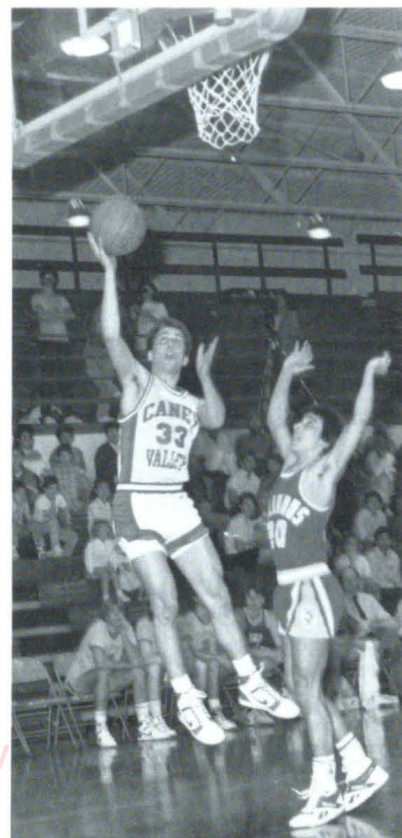

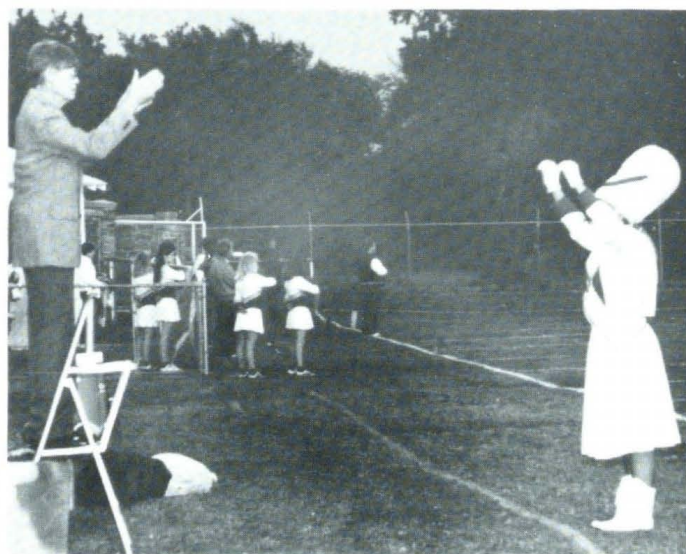

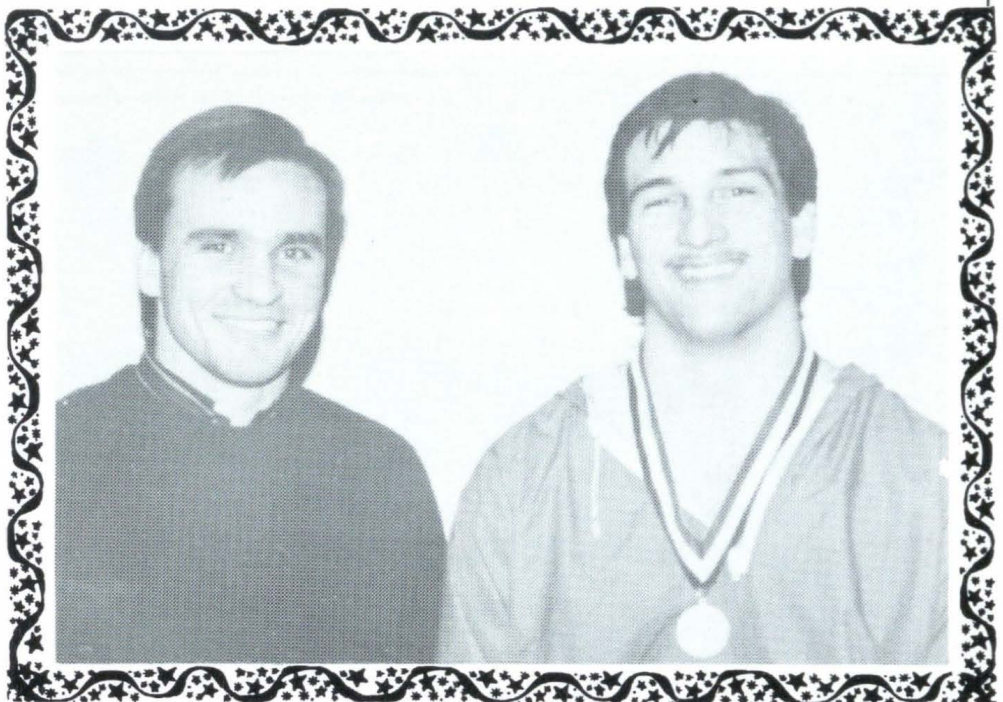

Superintendent Harold Howard added, "I'm always pleased when a student achieves an honor of this sort. . . especially at state championship."

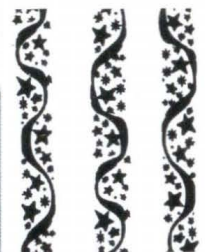
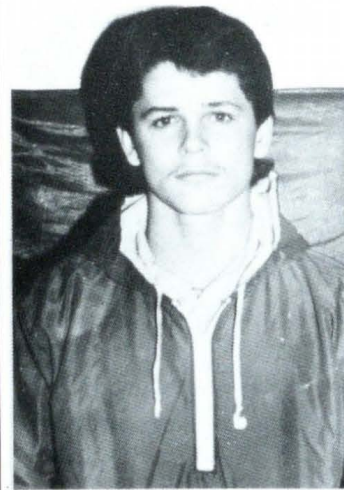
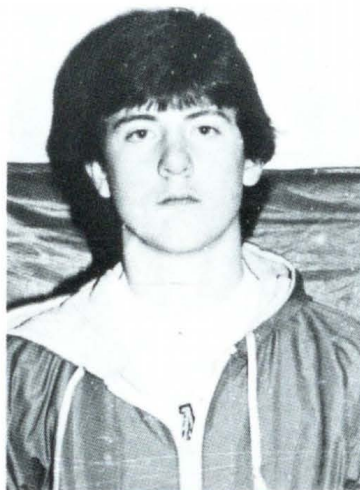

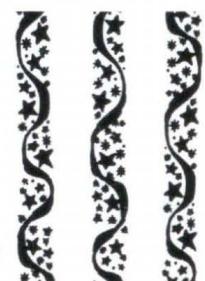
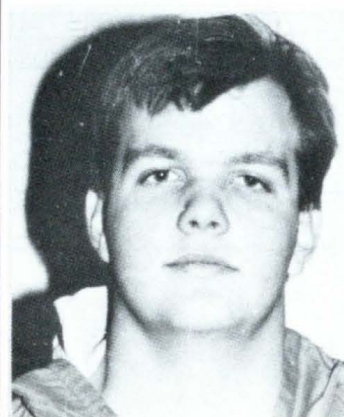
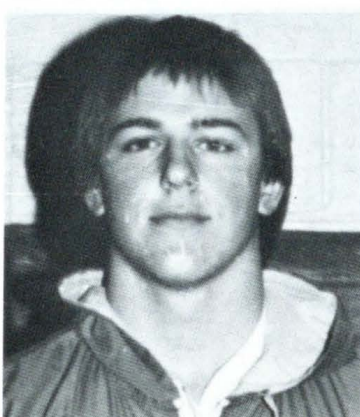
Mr. Chris Kastler and Vince Naccarato after he wins 1st at State.

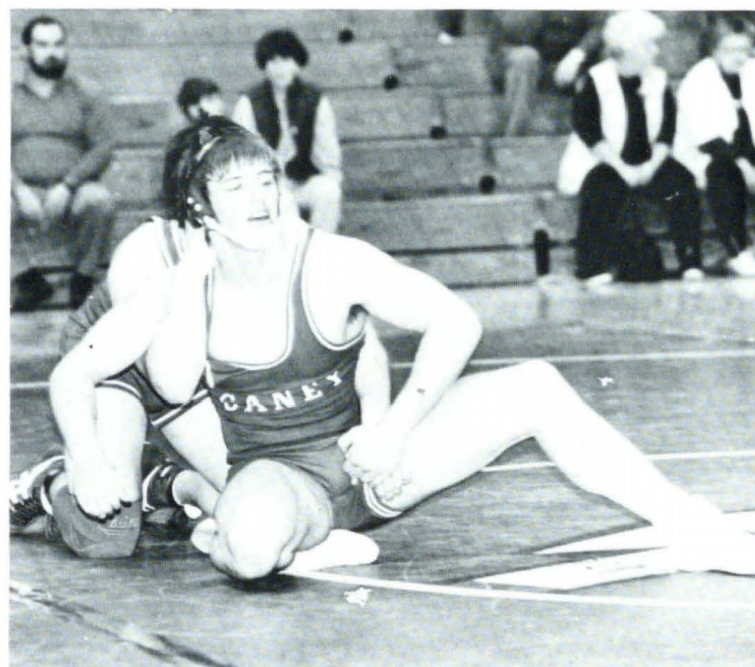

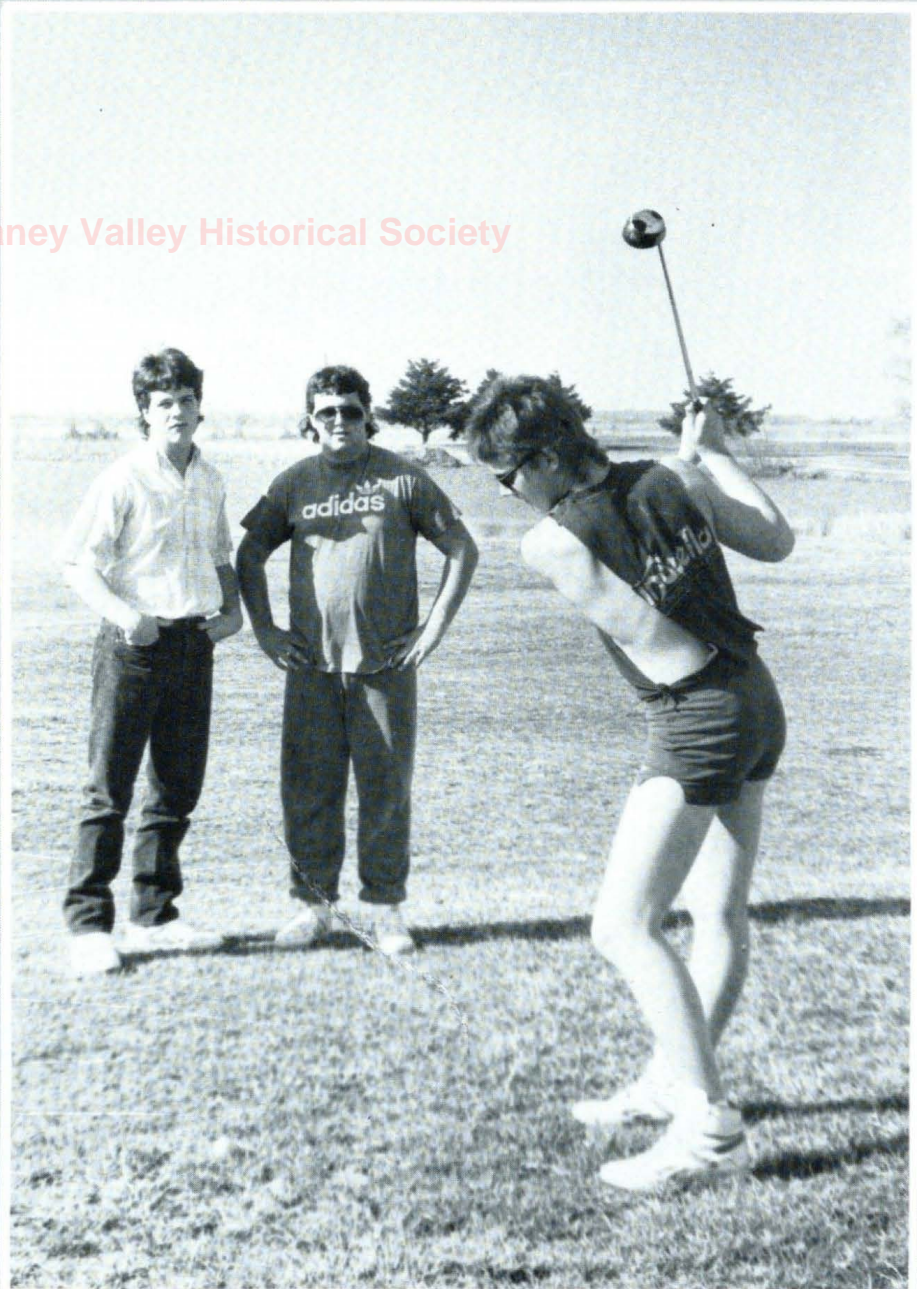

Richey gets medal at state

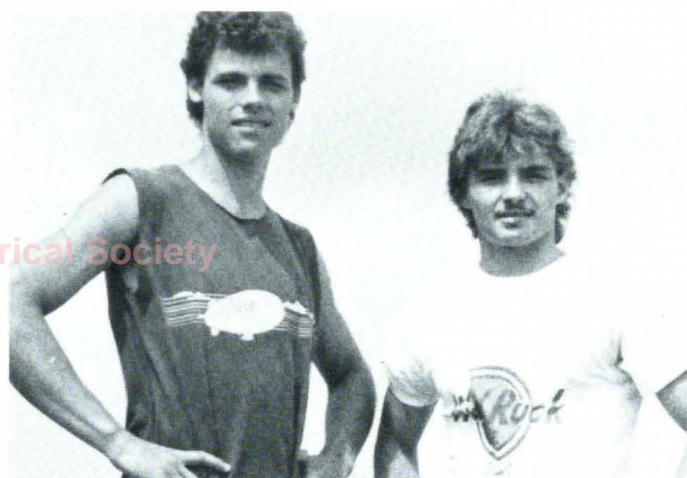

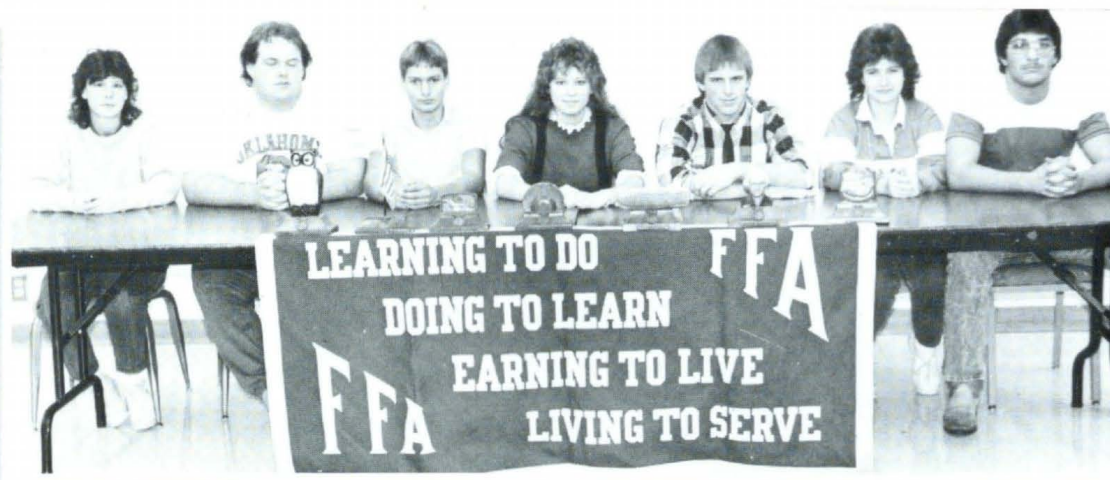

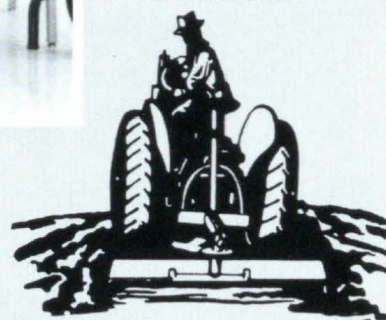

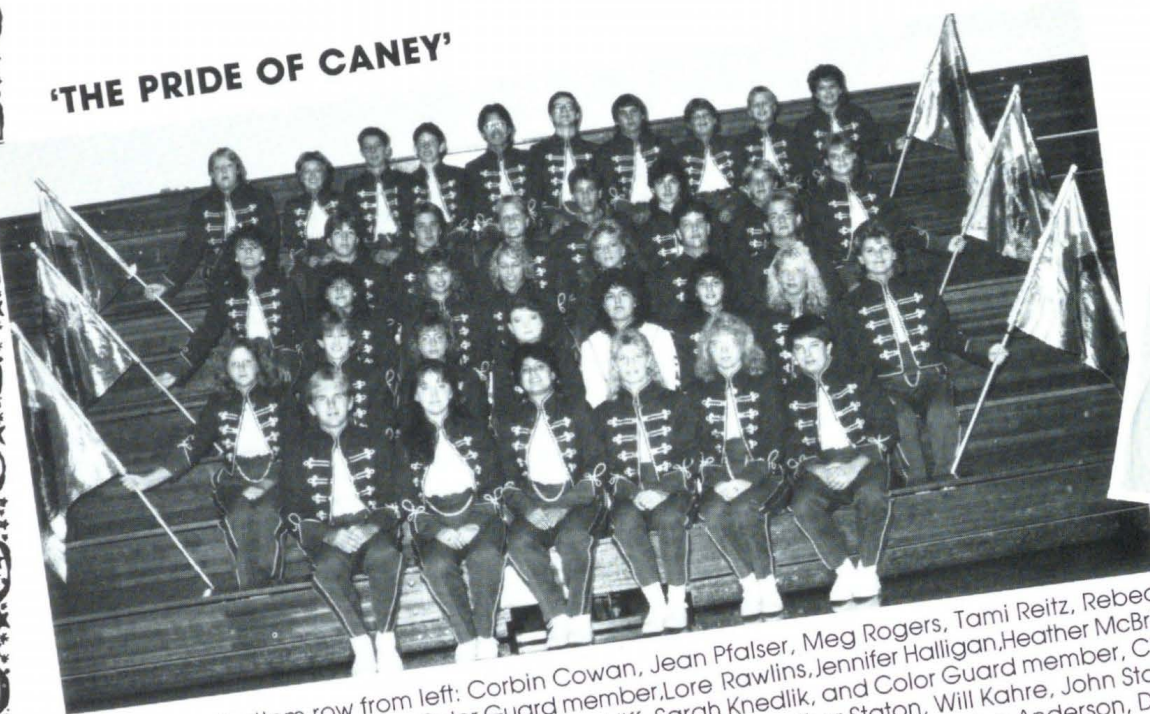
At the close of the program, Mrs. Faulkenberry presented "Willies," which she termed "dumb awards for dumbest deeds done."

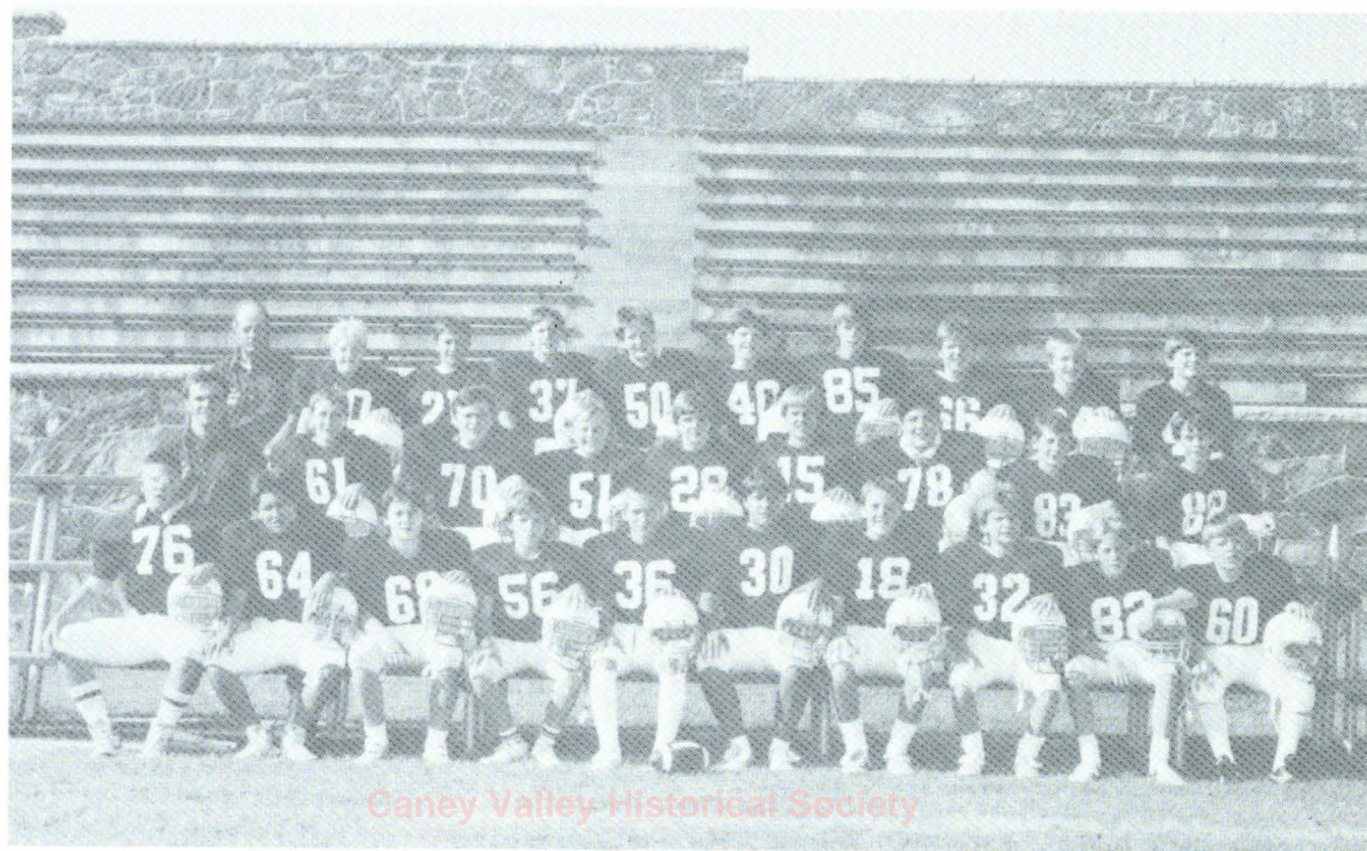


The junior high wrestling team was very young and mostly inexperienced. Nathan Mellen was the lone returning 8th grader, and everyone else was new to the program.

Volume 68 of the Kane-Kan, yearbook of Caney Valley High School, was printed by Josten's of Topeka. The cover color is "smoke" with blue foil, and the silk screen drawing on the cover was by art teacher Chris Exline. End pages are white with a 60 percent screen overlay. Pages are printed on 80-pound gloss stock. Process color is used on eight feature pages and on the senior portrait section. Other pages are black and white. The type was set by Kopco of Caney, and that firm furnished many type faces used in the book for page headings; however, the basic type design is Avant Garde.

Layout design and paste-up was done by members of the yearbook production class. Photography of underclass individuals, many of the senior portraits, royalty and school organizations was done by Doyal's Studio of Independence. Taylor and Robbie Mason.

Individual copies of the Kane-Kan were sold for \$16 each, and 270 books, each containing 184 pages, were printed.

Publication costs were financed by the sale of advertising to business firms, page space to school organizations and sale of the book itself.

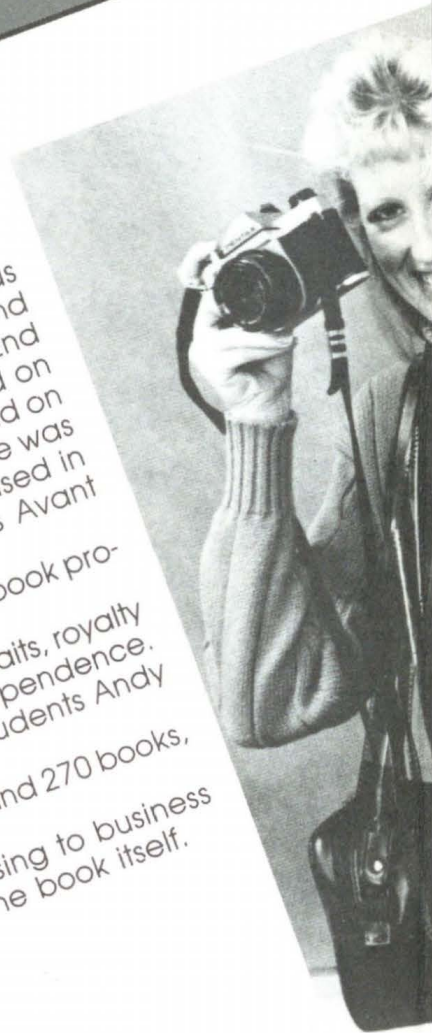
