## Citizens Criticize Y.W.C.A. Policies At Public Meeting

A group of citizens, variously estimated at from 200 to 400 in number, appeared at the YWCA board meeting Monday night and presented a written statement in which a number of policies fol-lowed by the local organization were criticized.

FURTHER, THE STATE-MENT called for the removal of

Betty Davis as secretary of the YWCA, monthly reports, and made a number of other suggestions, Mrs. Don Anderson was spokesman for the group and read the statement.

THE YWCA BOARD went into executive session after the presentation of the statement and after the crowd had left, and Tuesday morning the board, through Mrs. L. V. Chaney, president, issued a statement in answer to the group's statement.

The spirit of fellowship which has long prevailed here has shown marked signs of disintegration under the onslaught of the proponents of the new social order. The pursuit of ideas, theoretically unassallable, but beyond the boundaries of general acceptance, tends to retard rather than accelerate the progress toward the ultimate goal of complete understanding and fellowship among all peoples.
