Focus on Fieldtrips for Excellent Spring Birding

If you have not ventured out on a field trip with the Sperry-Galligar Audubon-ers, you are in for a treat. A dedicated group of birders find southeast Kansas "hotspots" and come back with many stories to tell.

Spring is an excellent time to get involved in these fieldtrips because the birding is fantastic. The species of birds will keep increasing as the season progresses. There will be exciting opportunities to see species that you may not know exist around here.

If you feel a bit rusty in identifying species of birds, these fieldtrips are the perfect chance to go with enthusiastic and experienced birders. They will help you get the best views of birds and you will undoubtedly expand your "list" of sightings.

Property Tour Results (Steve): After walking around on December 7 with Chuck Delp and Jim Triplett, the participating members concluded that the area was already wildlife-friendly, with various habitats. The railroad tracks cutting through made it hazardous (and potentially illegal) for walking paths, although we might consider constructing paths on selected parts of the property in the future.

Bird Seed Sale Final Report (**Bob**): We cleared \$700 (seed, \$382, crafts, \$318).

Programming in May (Steve): Max Good has agreed to speak, perhaps on the topic of re-establishing wildflowers on the prairie.

Featured Speaker:

Steve introduced Rick Laas, who is currently a pest exterminator but has maintained an interest in bats since studying under Dr. Horace Hays for his bachelor's degree at PSU in the 1970s. In tonight's presentation, he concentrated on bringing us up to date on the disastrous effects of white nose syndrome on various bat population across the country. Some species are coming close to extinction in the eastern U.S., and the fungus is working its way to Kansas (It has been detected in Missouri and Oklahoma). After Rick and Steve did a survey, they determined that our gray bat colony—the only one in Kansas—is down in population numbers this year. It is encouraging to know that the federal government has been spending millions of dollars to survey and study bats; as Rick emphasized, populations must be conserved because billions of insects not eaten by bats will cause epidemics affecting humans and other animals. The disease is still a mystery...

One of the items of discussion mentioned in the board meeting minutes is a letter to USD 250 (Pittsburg) concerning the capping off of chimneys at three local schools. The letter will go out this week, and we will wait for a reply. I hope we can change their minds about capping the chimney, but if not, I have a "plan B" to be discussed later.

Finally, don't forget to attend Dr. Joe Arruda's talk on snails this month. As a former student of Dr. Arruda's, I can attest to the fact that you'll never look at snails the same way again!

Natural Events of Spring

The Missouri Department of Conservation has an interesting and useful calendar that can give you a "heads up" on what is happening in nature. The 2011 Natural Events Calendar can be purchased from The Missouri Department of Conservation Nature Store or contact a Department of Conservation Nature Center.

First week: of March:

Ducks & geese start migrating north; begin setting up bluebird boxes; great blue herons begin arriving at heron ries; barred owls are nesting; wood ducks nest around wooded ponds

Second week of March:

Bald eagle chicks begin hatching in southern Missouri; bluebirds begin nesting; field sparrows are arriving; American woodcocks begin courtship

Third week of March:

Wild turkeys gobble; purple martins arrive this week; mourning doves are nesting

Canada geese begin nesting; pileated woodpeckers drum to establish territories; swallows return

Double-crested cormorants arrive at wetlands; phoebes return this week


