Body of Late President to Lie in
State There From 10 A. M.;
Homecoming Activities
Are Postponed.

The College today prepared to pay tribute to its fallen leader, Dr. W. A. Brandenburg, in funeral services to be conducted at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon in College auditorium.

Outstanding figures in the education and business world will participate in last rites for the man who as president of the College for 27 years earned a distinguished place in educational circles of the state and nation and as a civic leader.

Body Lies in State.

The body of the president will lie in state in Science hall from 10 o'clock tomorrow morning until the time of the funeral. Dr. O. P. Dellinger, dean of the College, who was appointed acting president by the state board of regents today, announced that there will be no regular assembly tomorrow, and no classes will be held in Science hall after 9 o'clock tomorrow morning. Classes in all other buildings will continue until noon tomorrow, when all class work will discontinue for the rest of the day.

Superintendent M. M. Rose of the Pittsburg city schools, said today that all city schools will be closed during the time of the funeral.

Addresses at the funeral services will be given by F. W. Brinkerhoff, and by Dr. O. P. Dellinger, representing the College faculty, while the scripture reading and prayer will be given by G. W. Trout, former dean of the College, and Rev. V. G. Nalley, pastor of the Christian church.

Music for the service will be an organ prelude, "Funeral March," (Chopin) by Miss Rose Buchmann; "The Twenty-third Psalm" (Schubert) to be sung by the Polymnia club with Miss Gabriella Campbell as director; violin solo, Miss Rhetia Hesselberg with Miss Ruth Stamm as accompanist, and "Lead Kindly Light" (Dykes) to be sung by Prof. Claude R. Newcomb of the College music department.

Closed After Service.

The body will be taken to the home at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon from the Brenner chapel, and will be taken to Science hall at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. The casket will not be open after the services. Burial will be in Highland Park cemetery.

In order to accommodate the large crowd expected for the funeral, arrangements have been made for loud speaker facilities in the College gymnasium, where the overflow crowd may congregate.

Mayor W. O. Myers announced of Dr. Brandenburg. City offices will close tomorrow for the funeral of Dr. Brandenburg. City offices will close at 2 p. m., and will be closed until 4 p. m. in tribute to the civic leader, Mayor Myers said.

A committee of administrative heads of the College, presided over by former Dean Trout, decided today that all activities in connection with homecoming such as house decorations, crowning of the queen, and the homecoming dance, scheduled for this week-end at the College, will be postponed until the time of the Hays game Nov. 18. The St. Benedict's-Pittsburg Teachers College football game will be played as scheduled at 2 p. m. Saturday afternoon.

Memorial Meetings.

All general organization meetings planned by fraternity and sorority groups for this week-end will be held as scheduled, it was said.

The annual Pittsburg Teachers College alumni reunions scheduled for Friday in six Kansas cities where sectional meetings of the Kansas State Teachers Association will be held, will be in the form of memorial services for Dr. Brandenburg.

The one at Parsons, which will be attended by the largest group of Pittsburg alumni, will be at 5:30 o'clock Friday afternoon in the Municipal building, with former Dean Trout in charge. At Topeka in the Hotel Kansan, Prof. R. W. Hart and Miss May Hare will be in charge and at Wichita in the Hotel Lassen, Dean O. P. Dellinger and Dean Jennie Walker will be in charge. Prof. J. A. G. Shirk and Miss Thelma Carnagey are planning the meeting at Salina, Dr. Jacob Uhrich at Garden City and Prof. J. C. Straley at Hays. The meetings at Salina, Garden City and Hays will be at noon.

Students of the College were called together at 10 o'clock this morning by Dean Dellinger to observe a silent hour in honor of President Brandenburg.
