CRITTER CONNECTIONS by Bob Mangile



Somewhere around 1970 a co-worker delivered to me a Barred Owl in a pasteboard box. The owl was found on the front lawn near what was then known at the State Park, just north of Frontenac, KS. The bird had its neck rolled under, a condition I've seen in pigeons, but it did not appear to have any injuries. So what should I do with this helpless critter that cannot feed itself? First things first – give it a physical exam! Neck seemed to be functional at times, no broken legs or wings, all feather in place suggesting it wasn't attacked or hit by a vehicle. Next step; make a "guess" what might be the cause of its rolled-under head.

My experiences with pigeons suggested it was possibly an infection of the brain or perhaps something more bizarre, polyneuritis. Polyneuritis is an inflammation of multiple nerves brought about by vitamin deficiency and my pigeon literature suggested

administering brewers yeast tablets. Polyneuritis was my diagnosis and I began administering brewers yeast tablets with its food. And to my surprise the Barred Owl began to hold its head upright.

Early on I force fed him various food items and added some pigeon feathers to the morsels as well as the brewers yeast tablets. All seemed to be going well. At night I would enter my garage to see those wide-open eyes looking at me through the wires of its cage. So I stopped the brewers yeast tablets and within a week it was rolling his head again. So back to the brewers yeast tablets and the head position became normal again. I continued treatment for several weeks, during which time a friend's young son gave it the name of "Herkimer". (The kid must have been on to something because there is a Herkimer Brewery in Minnesota and surely they use brewers yeast!)

The owl appeared in good shape so I decided to release it near where it was found and let nature take its course. And so one evening we released the bird at the State Park and it flew away with great fanfare from our family and relief knowing I didn't have to keep finding food for the owl. Our hopes were that the bird would resume a normal life but in reality the problem would likely return in time. We must come to understand that Nature is full of wonder and beauty as well as some unpleasant events. # # #

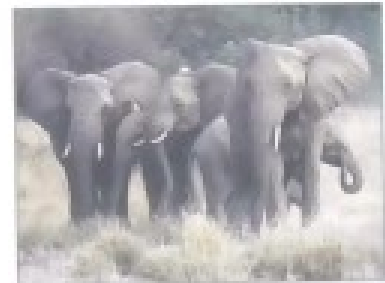


October Audubon Presentation Rod and Ellen Sallee

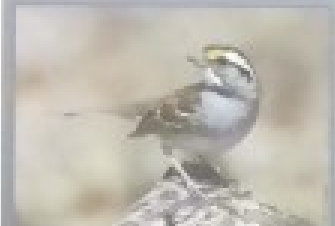

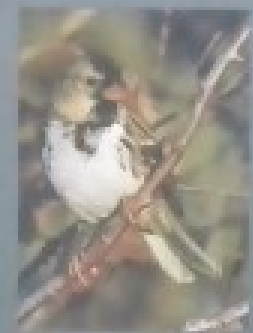

Refreshments for Meetings

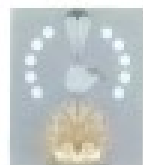

Fieldtrip to Bone Creek

Saturday, October 27, 2012, Mavis Benner picked up Donna Mansell at 6:45 a.m. and they met Liz and Bob Mangie at the Applebee's parking lot to go to Bone Creek Lake. Since it was still dark we stopped at McDonalds' before heading on. The thermometer read a very cold 29 degrees.

Along our journey we saw 51 species of birds. Initially the birds were quiet, but as the sun got higher in the sky, we saw many birds flying, including a large group of Canada geese, red-winged blackbirds and European starlings. The thickets along the country roads were full of small birds and some larger birds. We saw several species of woodpeckers, ducks, and sparrows.

Bob thought he saw two western grebes but Liz and Mavis did not believe they were. (However, western grebes were sighted at Shawnee Lake the same day.) Bob spotted a beautiful bald eagle perched on a dead tree in the lake. There were several hundred American coots along the north edge of the lake. We also saw 16 white-tailed deer, including three young deer. The cold temperatures did not stop us from having fun and seeing lots of birds. We all enjoyed ourselves.
