

The Round Dance and the Tail Waggle Dance were discussed. The method in which bees can communicate to other bees the direction and distance to a food source was very interesting indeed. Tim Tucker gave the group detailed information about the dances and the way the bees orientate direction based on the location of the sun. The program was very enlightening to those present and is just another example of the many excellent programs presented to the members of the Sperry-Galligar Audubon Society at our meetings at Pittsburg State University. Minutes of the Board Meeting 12/706

Members present were Steve Ford, Bob and Liz Mangile, Barb Robins, Jim Brumfield, Mavis Benner, Roger Willis, Carol Newcomb and Diane McCallum.

The meeting began with a brief overview of the previous meeting's minutes by Diane.

Liz distributed a financial statement for November 2006. She reported a beginning balance of \$5,780.32 and an ending balance (as of 11/10/06) of \$5,758.11.

Steve thanked the board for their help in the Christmas parade and in making crafts for the bird seed sale. Members made suggestions for the parade next year.

The board then reviewed plans for the bird seed sale on Saturday, Dec. 9. Bob reported that KAMO had everything ready and the truck would be in the mall parking lot a day early. Roger said he would contact the mall to notify them of the truck's early arrival.

Mavis announced that Rick Hildebrand will be available to attend upcoming meetings due to a change in his schedule.

Steve then mentioned that Delia Lister has a DVD of "An Inconvenient Truth," the movie about global warming with Al Gore. Steve suggested a viewing party, and after a discussion about possible times, he decided on Friday, Dec. 15, at 6:30 at the Fords' house. Steve also reported that Pegg Smith would like SGAS to find a different newsletter editor. Delia Lister is considering the position but anyone who wishes to volunteer should contact Steve Ford or any board member.

The Christmas Bird Count will be held on Monday, Jan. 1, starting at 7:00 a.m. at the Express Lame Convenience Store near Scammon. The group discussed a possible informal party afterward and the Mangiles volunteered to host it at their house at 6:00.

Bob will collect the forms for the wildlife habitat program.

Roger discussed his idea for a backyard birdwatching program. He handed out a brief description and a tally sheet. This will be an informal program, with members invited to discuss their sightings at later meetings. Bob said he could send out the tally sheet by e-mail.

Liz suggested handing out the leftover bird seed packets from the parade at the general meeting.

Bob mentioned information from Martha Price about bundles of trees available to order from the Kansas Forest Service.

Bob also presented a handmade wooden flute that was donated by Gary Reed for fund-raising purposes.

The group briefly discussed the budget for treats at the general meetings. Jim reported that the speaker at the January meeting will be Harry Krug, an artist who works with nature-related themes.

The meeting was then adjourned.

Minutes of the General Meeting 12/7/06

Steve Ford opened the meeting with a reminder for attendees to sign up for the door prize.

He then reported that the Christmas Bird Count will be held Jan. 1, beginning at 7:00 a.m. at the Express Lane Convenience Store in Scammon. Participants don't need to be knowledgeable about birds and can pair up with more experienced birders. The results will be sent to the national Audubon Society. The Mangiles will host a compilation party at their house at 6:00 that same day, with soup/ chill and refreshments.

The annual Bird Seed Sale will be held Saturday, Dec. 9, 9:00 to 5:00 at Meadowbrook Mail. KAMO will provide the seed and several members will contribute crafts and baked goods. Volunteers were needed both inside and outside, and were asked to sign up with Bob Mangile.

There will be a showing of the movie "An Inconvenient Truth" (starring Al Gore) at the Fords' house on Friday, Dec. 15, at 6:30 p. m. Refreshments will be provided.

This evening was the first deadline for the backyard wildlife habitat program. The next deadline is March and completed forms may be given to Bob Mangile anytime between now and then. There will be a presentation in May for those who were accepted.

Martha Price provided information from the Kansas Forestry Service about "wildlife bundles," groups of trees that are attractive to birds and wildlife, available for sale.

Jim Brumfield announced that the speaker next month will be Harry Krug, an artist whose experiences in nature are reflected in his artwork.

Roger Willis made a presentation on an informal program called "Your Yard Bird Count." Participants are encouraged to learn to identify the birds in their yards and keep a list. Roger provided a suggestion sheet and a tally sheet, and he said people might be asked to report at the next meeting what they have seen. Bob Mangile pointed out that this program goes well with the SGAS Birder Certification Program and the Backyard Bird Count, to be held in February.

Steve reported on the SGAS participation in the Pittsburg Christmas Parade and thanked Carol Newcomb for the use of her trailer, as well as those who handed out bird seed packets.

Steve also thanked Carol Newcomb and Barb Robins for providing the refreshments for the meeting.

Jim Brumfield then introduced Tim Tucker, a past president of the Honey Producers' Association and current board member of the American Beekeeping Association, who gave a presentation on bee behavior and the "bee dance." He also offered honey and honey-related items for sale.

After the program, Steve reported that Delia Lister passed the final test for her Master's.

The door prize winners were Emmett Sullivan, Steve Ford and George Weeks. Prizes were donated by John and Julie Hartley. The next meeting will be on January 25, 2007.

About two months ago Gary Reed, of Joplin, MO, participated in a joint Chapter Field Trip to Neosho Wildlife Area near St. Faul, KS. Gary makes Native American Flutes and during our Field Trip he selected tree limb and said he would make turn it into a flute and give it to Sperry-Galligar Audubon to raise some money for the Chapter. Well, a few days later it came to me in the mail. Unfortunately no one in our group seems to know the



value of the flute but John Hartley did managed to play a few notes on the flute at our last meeting. We do not know what the flute is worth so if anyone has any suggestion on how to use this beautiful flute to raise money for our Chapter please let us know. It is a real beauty, to say the least, but it seems that most of our members have a problem banging on a drum, much less playing a flute. Help us if you can!

Bird Tracks

Just got an email mentioning that the first "family" of Whooping Cranes, from the migrating population established in the eastern part of the United States, successfully migrated from north to south after hatching the first baby Whooper in the eastern flock. These are the birds from the flock that was taught to migrate by following ultralite flying machines (from 2001) from the northern U.S. to Florida. Just couldn't keep this information to myself. I've been following the plight of this species all of my life and can remember reports back in the 1950's when the central flock's numbers were around 15 birds. It appears that after 40+ years the birds are beginning to show some progress - thanks to the dedicated people involved in their protection. The central flock count at Aransas, in Texas, for this year (2006) is about 224 birds. I'm smiling as I write this message! ;-) ;-) ;-) Bob Mangile


