THE REPORT WAS prepared after four months' study by Ralph Hudson, state librarian; Miss Frances Kennedy, Oklahoma City university librarian; Mary Hays Marable, and Esther M. McRuer, president of the Ok lahoma Library Association, ex officio."

"A self-named and self-constituted citizens' committee of Bartlesville appears to have insti-gated the difficulty" said the report and concludes that Miss Ruth Brown was unjustly and cavallerly discharged because of her private beliefs and because of her professional belief in free libraries. Had she been profes-sionally unfit to be the librarian then Bartlesville is somewhat tardy in discovering it only aft-er 30 years.

"WE FEEL THAT the public library was made the scapegoat for a misguided group. . . Miss Brown has suffered the loss of her position, but Bartlesville has suffered more. It has transgressed against the freedom of its library and thereby transgressed upon its distinction as an in-stitution for free public information. It has denied its patrons free access to reading matter.

The report concludes with the admonition to Bartlesville to 'rectify' the situation itself.
