Brandenburg Week Plans Pronounced In Final Stages

Governor Huxman And Three
Ex-Governors Come

SIX DAYS OF FETE

District Friends, Acquaintances,
Alumni and Students, Other
College Presidents Are
To Be Present

Plans for the celebration of President Brandenburg's silver anniversary are taking definite shape rapidly, according to Miss Irma Gene Nevins, chairman of publicity for the event.

During the week of March 14-19 the faculty, students, alumni and friends of "Prexy" will commemorate his 25 years of service as president of K.S.T.C. Many prominent speakers, including Governor Walter A. Huxman, C. M. Harger, chairman of the Board of Regents, and State School Superintendent W. T. Markham will address various meetings and banquets.

A program is planned for every day of the anniversary week. Various committees are working on special parts of the program which is coordinated with a general committee of which Dr. O. P. Dellinger is chairman.

According to Dr. Dellinger everything is being worked out in detail by special committees. A meeting of these committees together, which comprise the general committee, was held Thursday. Excellent progress was reported and everything was found to be working out satisfactorily.

The biggest day of the anniversary will be Friday, "visitors day," for which a very extensive program is planned. Governor Huxman will be the principal speaker in a morning observance and an unusual event will be five minute speeches by three former governors of Kansas during whose administration President Brandenburg has served — Jonathan Davis, Ben S. Paulen and Clyde Reed. Greeting from other former governors will be read.

Radio programs will play an important part in the celebration. Many of the events will be broadcast, some over KGGF, and some over KOAM, Pittsburg. The program committee will write to key alumni members in the different towns and cities asking that they have meetings to listen to the broadcasts in case they do not attend the events here. They will be asked to report concerning their get-togethers. It is hoped that those groups which have not already done so will elect officers and form permanent organizations.

Music will form part of many programs. The college orchestra under direction of Professor Walter McCray will furnish the larger share of it. A feature of the musical side of the program will be the singing of "If All Those Fond Memories of K.S.T.C." Miss Belle Provorse, secretary of the president, composed it for the occasion. The orchestra will give at least four performances during the week.

Presidents of Kansas Colleges and other noted educators will be present on Friday. Among those expected to attend are Pres. E. E. Rarick of Kansas State college of Hays; Professor George Gimmell of Manhattan; Pres. L. A. Pittenger of Ball State Teachers college, Muncie, Indiana; and State Superintendent W. T. Markham of the state board of education.

The Pittsburg Chamber of Commerce will give a dinner to Governor Huxman and other noted visitors Friday noon. Out of town visitors will be given the opportunity to make reservations for this event. Following the dinner, which will be given at 1 o'clock, the chamber of commerce will sponsor a sight seeing tour around Pittsburg for the guests of honor.

Students will honor "Prexy" on Thursday at a program given at the regular chapel hour, 10 o'clock. Lewis Corporon, student council president, will have charge and an address by Kenneth McFarland, alumnus, will be the principal feature.

Not all speakers for the week have been announced. Miss Nevins will announce the final and complete program in a broadcast from station KOAM Pittsburg, 4:30 to 5:00 P. M. on Monday, March the fourteenth.
