WILL DRAW MANY NOTED  
GUESTS.

Several Other Programs Arranged  
for Brandenburg Silver Anniver-  
sary; Huxman and Three Ex-  
Governors Here on Big Day.

A "visitors' day" program at 9:30 o'clock Friday morning, March 18, will feature the Brandenburg silver anniversary at the College March 14 to 19. The complete program for anniversary week, honoring the 25th year of President W. A. Brandenburg's administration, was announced today by Miss Irma Gene Nevins, chairman of the publicity committee.

Numerous celebrities, including three former governors, Jonathan M. Davis, Ben S. Paulen and Clyde M. Reed, and the present chief executive of the state, Walter A. Huxman, will be here for the occasion.

The educators' section will be headed by W. T. Markham, state superintendent of public instruction, and will include President C. E. Rarick of Fort Hays State College, Prof. George Gimmell of Kansas State College, Manhattan; President David M. Edwards of Friends University; Dean King of Kansas Wesleyan University; President F. F. Schwalm of McPherson College; President Frank E. Mossman of Southwestern College; Dr. Earl K. Hilbrand of the University of Wichita; Miss Evelyn Butler, head of the Baker University music department, and Frank L. Pinet, secretary of the Kansas State Teachers Association.

### Regent Head Here.

The citizens' section will be represented by John A. Fenimore, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

The Friday morning program will include greetings by C. M. Harger, chairman of the state board of regents. A song, "If All Those Fond

Memories of K. S. T. C.," written by Miss Belle Provorse and set to music by Walter McCray, will be a part of the program. The orchestra will play and Dean G. W. Trout will preside. The main address will be by Governor Huxman. Greetings will be read from George Hodges, Arthur Capper, Henry J. Allen, Harry Woodring and Alf M. Landon, all former governors.

Following the regular program Prof. O. F. Grubbs will present the memorial and President Brandenburg will accept.

### Luncheon at Noon.

The Chamber of Commerce has planned a noon luncheon to follow the program Friday morning, at which out-of-town speakers and others will be guests. It will be in the Collegiate room of the Hotel Besse. In the afternoon the Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a sight-seeing tour for the guests of honor.

Speaker at a dinner Friday night will be Dr. L. A. Pittinger, pres-

ident of Ball State Teachers College, Muncie, Ind.

Other outstanding events of anniversary week will include the concert by the festival chorus, directed by Mr. McCray, at 8 o'clock Tuesday night, March 15. At 9 o'clock there will be a reception for President and Mrs. Brandenburg on the second floor of Carney hall. Decorations for the reception are under the direction of Miss Annie Marriott.

### "Campus Day" Thursday.

Thursday will be known as "campus day," and Kenneth M. McFarland, superintendent of the Coffeyville schools, will be the speaker at a program at 10 a. m. in College auditorium. Miss Virginia Clemens will give a reading and Miss Lola Stewart, soprano, will sing. The program is in charge of Lewis Corporon, president of the student council.

"Alumni day" will be observed Saturday. The different departments will have luncheon, teas and receptions during the day. Sororities and fraternities will have open house from 5 to 7 o'clock in the afternoon. Those who have taken Smith-Hughes classes will have meetings throughout the day. Federal trainees from 1920 to 1925 will have breakfast at 8 o'clock in the College cafeteria and they will visit the various shops in the morning. They will have another meeting at 1:30 p. m.

At 3 p. m. Saturday the orchestra and glee clubs will give a concert in College auditorium and President Brandenburg will talk.

### Dinner Is Saturday.

The final event of the week will be a 7 o'clock dinner Saturday night, with C. M. Miller, director of the state board for vocational education, as toastmaster. Mr. Harger will give the principal address. Mrs. Lena Martin Smith of Girard will present a pageant, "Endearing Young Charms," honoring President Brandenburg. The banquet will be followed by a picture show and dance in the gymnasium. At the movie, Prof. J. A. G. Shirk will give an illustrated lecture on the early history of the College.
