## PROGRAM FOR SILVER

### JUBILEE IS ANNOUNCED

ALL NEXT WEEK GIVEN OVER  
TO HONORING PRESIDENT  
BRANDENBURG.

Opens With Reception Tuesday  
Night, Various Programs  
Scheduled; Saturday Is  
Alumni Day.

Committeemen have announced completion of the program for the silver jubilee celebration of next week in commemoration of President W. A. Brandenburg's 25th anniversary as president of the College.

The celebration will open on Tuesday, March 15, with an open house and reception. From 7 until 8 p. m. Tuesday every College building will be lighted with each faculty member in his room or office. The public is urged to visit the College and each of its departments.

At 8 o'clock Walter McCray's festival orchestra will present a concert in College auditorium. Ushers at the concert will be members of the women's clubs of the city.

#### Reception.

Following the concert, a reception for President and Mrs. Brandenburg will be held on the second floor of Carney hall. President and Mrs. Brandenburg and Dr. Weede, chairman of the reception committee, will be in the receiving line.

Decorations for the reception are supervised by Miss Annie Marriott. Directions concerning the movement of persons attending the musicale will be made by Dr. Paul Murphy. The second floor reception will be in charge of Mrs. J. U. Massey and Miss Josephine Marshall. Six faculty women and six city club women will be assisted by members of the pep club as circulating hostesses.

#### McFarland Speaker.

On Thursday, designated as campus day, the celebration will be carried to College auditorium. Lewis Corporon, president of the College student council, will be in charge of the program there. An address will be given by Kenneth McFarland, superintendent of Coffeyville schools and a College alumnus.

Friday of anniversary week is visitors' day. Following a morning program in College auditorium, there will be the Chamber of Commerce dinner in the Hotel Besse. During the afternoon the Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a sight-seeing tour for the guests.

At the College auditorium, Governor Walter A. Huxman will be the speaker. He was personally invited to attend the celebration several weeks ago by Aaron Butler, editor of the Collegio. Three former governors, Ben S. Paulen, Clyde M. Reed and Jonathan M. Davis, will also be present.

#### Hear Pittinger.

At a dinner Friday night, Dr. O. P. Dellinger of the College will be the toastmaster. A toast to President Brandenburg will be given by F. W. Brinkerhoff, editor of The Headlight and The Sun. Dr. L. A. Pittinger, president of Ball State Teachers College, Muncie, Ind., will be the principal speaker.

Saturday has been named as alumni day. The program is in charge of Prof. W. H. Matthews. President Brandenburg will speak at 3 p. m. At a dinner Saturday night, C. M. Harger, chairman of the state board of regents, will be the principal speaker.

The silver jubilee celebration has attracted attention all over the Midwest. Stamps announcing the event have been placed on outgoing mail at both the Chamber of Commerce and the College for more than a month.
