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Governor Huxman Speaks Friday Morning at Chapel

Chief Executive Begins Day Complete with Attractive Events as Visitors from Entire Middlewestern Section Nucleate on Campus to Observe Prexy's Silver Anniversary

Governor Walter A. Huxman will arrive in Pittsburg tomorrow morning a few minutes before 10 o'clock for the special assembly of the Visitor's Day of President Brandenburg's Silver Anniversary.

The Governor will be the featured speaker on a program including talks by a host of eminent official friends of the College.

Visitor's Day activities will get under way at 9:30 Friday morning with Dean G. W. Trout presiding over the program in the College auditorium. The Festival Orchestra, under the direction of Walter McCray, will open the program with the Overture "Pique Dame" by Suppe.

Before the address by Governor Huxman greetings will be given by F. M. Harris, member of the Board of Regents, and by former governors Jonathan M. Davis ('23-'25), Ben S. Paulen ('25-'29), and Clyde M. Reed ('29-'31). Greetings from other former Kansas chief executives who were unable to attend the festivities will be read from the platform. They will come from George Hodges ('13-'15), Arthur Capper ('15-'19), Henry J. Allen ('19-'23), Harry Woodring ('31-'33), and Alf M. Landon ('33-'37).

Following Governor Huxman's speech, felicitations will be given by the following Kansas educators:

Grubbs will present a memorial to President Brandenburg, speech. Rev. Phillip Schmidt, mayor, who will then make his acceptance will give the benediction.

Friday noon the Chamber of Commerce will entertain with a luncheon for out-of-town speakers and other guests. In the afternoon it will sponsor a sightseeing tour for the guests of honor. Presidents of former senior classes will also be guests.

At 7 o'clock Friday night there will be a dinner in the Cafeteria annex with Dr. O. P. Dellinger as toastmaster. Invocation will be given by Dean Trout and F. W. Brinkerhoff, editor of the Pittsburg Headlight and Sun, will give the toast to President Brandenburg. Dr. L. A. Pittinger, president of Ball State Teachers College, Muncie, Ind., will deliver the principal address of the evening.

Prof. Matthews Has Alumni Day

Saturday is Alumni Day and will be in charge of Prof. W. H. Matthews. Federal trainees from 1920-

'25 will have breakfast in the cafeteria at 8 o'clock and will spend the rest of the morning visiting various shops on the campus.

Those who have taken Smith-Hughes work, on or off the campus, have meetings throughout the day. Department and honorary fraternities will give luncheons, teas, and receptions during the day.

Sororities and fraternities will have open house from 5 to 7 p. m. and most of them will have luncheons at noon for their alumni.

C. M. Harger Speaks

At 3 o'clock there will be a concert in the College auditorium by an orchestra and glee clubs made up partly of alumni. President Brandenburg will also speak.

At a 7 o'clock dinner C. M. Harger, chairman of the Board of Regents, will be the principal speaker, and C. M. Miller, of Topeka, director of state vocational education, will be toastmaster. A pageant entitled "Endearing Young Charms," written by Mrs. Lena M. Smith of Girard, an alumna, and directed by Miss Irma Gene Nevins, will be presented.

The dinner will be followed by a picture show in the College auditorium and a dance in the Gymnasium. At the show Prof. J. A. G. Shirk will give an illustrated lecture on the early history of the College.

The week honoring President Brandenburg officially opened Monday afternoon with an address over KOAM by Dr. O. P. Dellinger and music by Helen Marchbanks, soprano, and Elsie Clark, accompanist.

Many guests were on the campus Tuesday for the College's "Open House." All faculty and the other

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staff members were at their post during the afternoon and from 7 to 8 at night. The visitors strolled about from building to building and found the faculty ready.

A concert by the festival orchestra followed by a reception for President and Mrs. W. A. Brandenburg on the second floor of Carney Hall gave the Anniversary Week program an auspicious start with a crowd of 500 townspeople, faculty, and students in attendance, Tuesday evening.

Most of the Wednesday program took place in Coffeyville, as the teachers of that city, many of them alumni, honored President Brandenburg with a 7 o'clock banquet which was broadcast over station KGGF. Dr. Brandenburg and Miss Eulalia Roseberry, head of the Geography department, were the speakers.

Wednesday afternoon the Festival Orchestra played over KOAM, and Dr. Mellicent McNeil, chairman of the invitation committee, urged alumni and friends of the College to attend further programs of the week.

Thursday morning Lewis Corporation, president of the Student Council, had charge of the Campus Day program at which time Kenneth McFarland, superintendent of schools at Coffeyville, spoke to the assembly. Virginia Clemens gave a reading and Lola Stewart sang.

A number of departments of the college are planning special programs to welcome their alumni Saturday, March 19.

The Industrial Education department will hold open house for alumni between 3 and 5 and 7 and 8 p.m. All regular classes and the Smith-Hughes classes for women in upholstery and furniture finishing will be in session.

The History department will welcome alumni back with open house Saturday afternoon from 3 to 5 and from 7 to 8 by having the department open for inspection and serving them refreshments.

In the Mathematics department open house will be held from 1 to 3 p.m. and from 5 to 6 p.m. This department has an excellent collection of meteorites which will be available for inspection, and the observatory will be open since sun spots are visible almost every day now. The class in field mathematics will demonstrate types of apparatus suitable for field work in secondary geometry.

The English department will hold open house from 10 to 5:30. There will also be a twenty-five-cent cafeteria luncheon at 12 o'clock and a tea in room 308, Russ Hall from 4 to 5 o'clock.

The art department will have a tea and an exhibit of work from 4 to 5 p.m. in the art rooms of the industrial arts building.

The Home Economics department will have exhibits in various rooms in Carney Hall. Some of the exhibits will be students' work and others will be special exhibits from outside. At noon there will be a luncheon in the cafeteria for alumni.

At 1:30 a program will be given for members of the adult education classes from surrounding towns. C.M. Miller, director of the Kansas State Board of Vocational Education and Miss Hazel Thompson, State supervisor of Vocational Homemaking, will speak to the women. After the talks there will be a tour of the campus, including a visit to Mr. George E. Braley's class to view the work in upholstery and wood refinishing for homemakers that has been done by adult education classes on the campus.

Following the general program a tea will be served for the alumni in the dining room on the third floor of Science Hall.

The Commerce department will have a program and refreshments for its alumni in Room 404 Russ Hall at 2:30. The program will consist of greetings by Dr. W.S. Lyerla, head of the commerce department; Fred Jarvis, president of Pi Omega Pi, honorary commerce fraternity; and Waldine Cavanagh, who will represent the student body. Responses will be made by Prof. Victor Hiatt, who graduated from the College in 1929.

The Mathematics department will offer an exhibit including apparatus used in the teaching of mathematics. In addition the department will keep the observatory open all afternoon.

Many former Smith-Hughes stu-

dents are expected to attend the Physical Science department's open shop. Welding demonstrations will be given by manufacturers of welding material and apparatus.

Prof. George Braley will have an exhibit of upholstery and wood refinishing done by members of the Smith-Hughes classes.

The physical science laboratory will conduct several demonstrations in electricity and radio and the Biology department will have its laboratories open all day with open house and a tea in the afternoon.

The Home Economics department will have open house all day with many exhibits. A luncheon is planned for all those who care to attend.

At an adult education meeting in the afternoon Miss Hazel Thompson of Topeka, state director of Home Making, will be here to address the Adult Home Making classes.

The English department has announced that it will have open house from 10 a.m. on and has reserved eight tables at the cafeteria for noon luncheon.

The Art department will have a special exhibit and open house throughout the day.

The Music department will give a concert at 3 o'clock at the general assembly in which many of the graduates are expected to take part.

The Foreign Language department will have a tea from 4:30 to 6 in the afternoon at Dr. Pease's house for senior songs majors and alumni of the department. During the affair songs will be sung in foreign languages.

The instructors in Geography department will be in their rooms to greet alumni during the day.

The Men's Physical Education department will welcome alumni at noon in the gym and then go to town for a dinner. A smoker and get-together will follow.

The Women's Physical Education department will have open house all day. A tea will be given during the afternoon.

Psychology professors will be in their rooms all day to greet the alumni.
