She has been here a good deal since it happened but is now living out on the place in the studio and has rented the other house so she is not alone there. She is trying hard to finish a book that he left unfinished.

Kate O'Hare's husband was in the office the other day and told George D Kate was soing to return before very long. He was back there a while with her but seemed he had things here to attend to so returned.

We had a letter from John Gunn some time ago--about the time he heard the report that George Kirk had passed away. He told us that he had called you up one night to inquire if it was not George D. John always writes a good letter. Will try to write to him today. I got out my machine this morning to do quite a little letter writing but typing it harder for me all the time as I do not practise enough.

So you say you and Jim are thinking of leaving Pittsburg. Well, I would not blame you if you did but when we think of Girard and vicinity now about all we think of are you and Jim and Eva Pease and if you go away there will not be much for us to think about there. Be sure and let us know where you do locate as we might come back some time before long and want to see you.

I spend a good deal of ~~time~~ time at Santa Ana with the folks, do all I can and the other girls also are there a lot--Ellie is down there night now making them a visit. Mother and father are both well and seem to enjoy life quite a lot.

The weathere here is grand. Have to wrap up every night when you go out and you sleep under ~~blanket~~ blankets and this morning as I sit here with the breeze blowing in the apartment I am a little ~~cool~~ too cool.

We were up in San Francisco in March but have not been ~~p~~ since the

Golden Gate bridge was opened. Mary Cordray was hurt in a street car accident recently. Nothing very serious but she has had to be under the Drs care for a while. We have not seen Charlie for quite some time.

Ben Wilson and wife spent a night with us not long ago. First time Ben has been down since his terrible illness. He is not quite the same and perhaps never will be but he has a lot of the old ~~fixer~~ fire and we were surely glad to see him.

Dorothy Clark, Stanley Clark's ex-wife- paid us a visit not long ago. She had been back to Oklahoma and was enroute to San Francisco. She had seen quite a few of the old folks in and around Oklahoma City.

Will leave this letter open and perhaps George D. will insert a few lines.
