Memorial Contributed to Sperry-Galligar in Walt DeGruson's Name

Walter DeGruson passed away on August 6, 2017. He was a longtime member of Sperry-Galligar Audubon.

It was always good to see Walt at the monthly Audubon meetings. He often had a story to tell—often about something he'd seen recently on his ranch, or while hunting or fishing. Walt spent more time out of doors observing nature than many of us do watching our bird feeder out of a window. Once a year he could also be seen on campus at the Gene DeGruson Lecture, named after his late brother who established the University's Special Collections Library.

The trailer in the parking lot of Meadowbrook Mall at the annual bird seed sale is a very good venue for stories. Between carrying 50-pound bags of black oil sunflower seeds there is plenty of time for talk. Walt entertained us with a generous share of tales that were mostly true.

Walt may have been the only member to supply such a generous share of home-made sausage when his time came for refreshments at

the monthly meeting.

His funeral at the Bedene Chapel in Arma was well attended with an adjacent room opened for overflow. Many people spoke on the importance of friends and family to Walter, and for his active enjoyment of life. They were generous with their gifts.

It seems as if Summer 2017 flew by in an instant! I was lucky enough to take four wonderful students with me on Study Abroad to the Peruvian Amazon. Despite this being my 4" trip to Iquitos, Peru, I still see plenty of new things. A few "firsts" (and hopefully not "lasts") for me include a two-toed sloth, owl monkey, umbrella bird, horned screamer, and young collared peccary. As usual the Peruvians were wonderful, and the students were beyond excited to get up every day to explore and have their eyes opened to a new culture.

Three days after returning from Peru I jetted off to Shepherdstown, West Virginia to spend a week at the National Conservation Training Center. I was one of fifty environmental education leaders across the US invited to participate in a leadership clinic by the North American Association for Environmental Education. The week was intense, but we all learned a lot and the venue was quite beautiful. As a board member of the Kansas Association for Conservation and Environmental Education (KACEE), I am quite proud to say that Kansas is well represented, and is a major leader in the field. I encourage everyone to check out the KACEE website (www.kacee.org), become a member, attend a workshop, come to a conference, donate, or volunteer. You won't be disappointed.

The rest of my summer was filled with garden and bee-keeping duties, Day Camp, Library Programs, and a Pre-K Reading program. 
