NORMAL BASKET BALL TEAM PLAYED AT FORT SCOTT LAST NIGHT, from the Pittsburg Headlight, December 3, 1904.

The girls' basket ball team of Manual Training Normal School was defeated last night by the Fort Scott High School team, in a close game played in the Fort Scott convention hall. The score was 18 to 15 in favor of the Fort Scott team.

It is claimed by the Normal girls that the reason for their defeat was because they were accustomed to playing by regulation rules, while the Fort Scott team played by a set of local rules of their own, and used a smaller ball than the regulation ball, which made the game confusing to the Normal girls.

The Pittsburg girls put up by far the best game, and even with the handicap of playing according to strange and unfamiliar rules, the Normalites would have won in five minutes longer, as the Fort Scott girls were completely exhausted.

However the Normalites were shown a splendid time by the Fort Scott High School, and an elegant reception and banquet was served the visitors after the game.

The Normal went to Fort Scott last evening on the Frisco, and returned on the early Frisco train this morning. The team was accompanied by about twenty of the Normal students and several members of the faculty. A splendid time was enjoyed by all.
