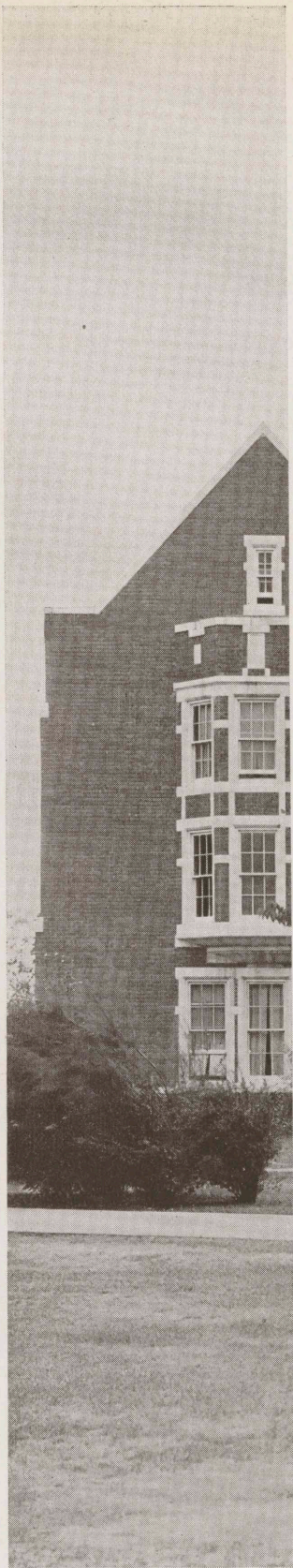
HARBINGERS OF SPRING

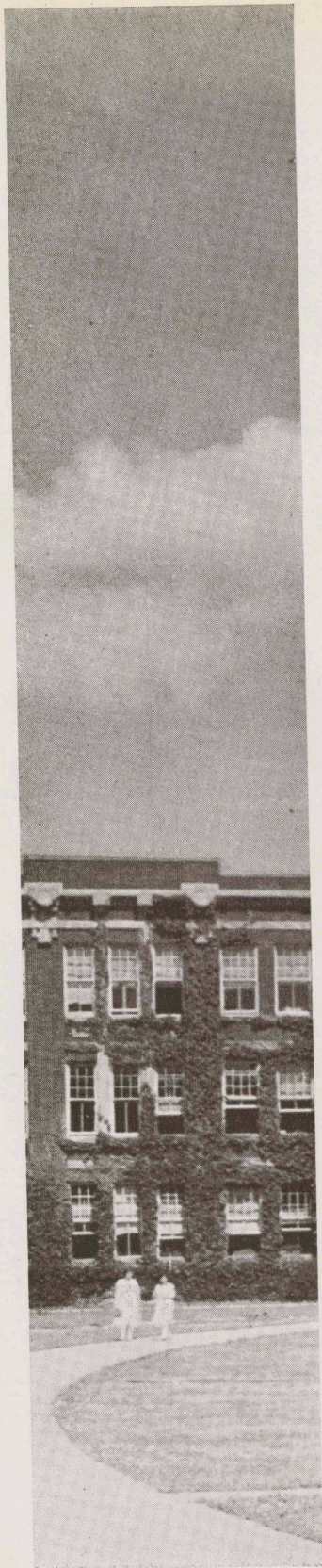


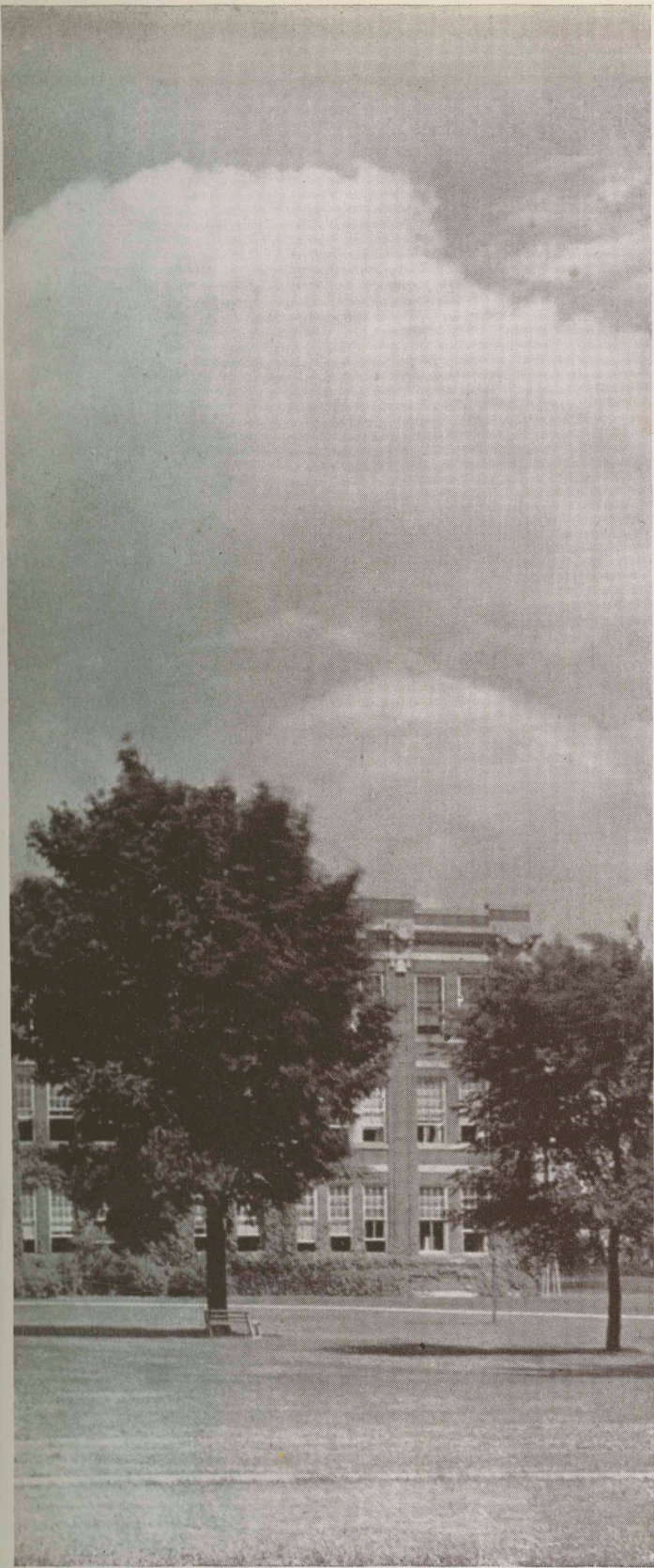




The thud of machines, the buzz

all.

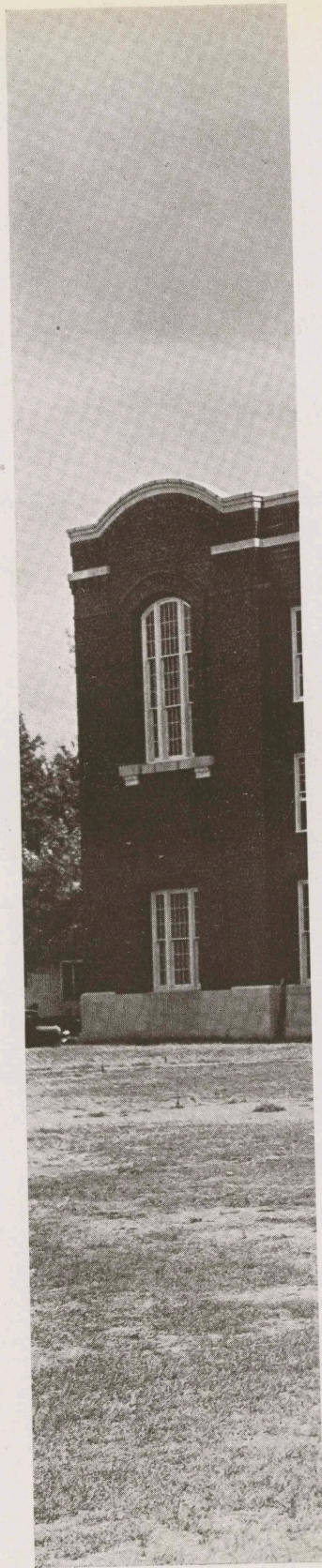


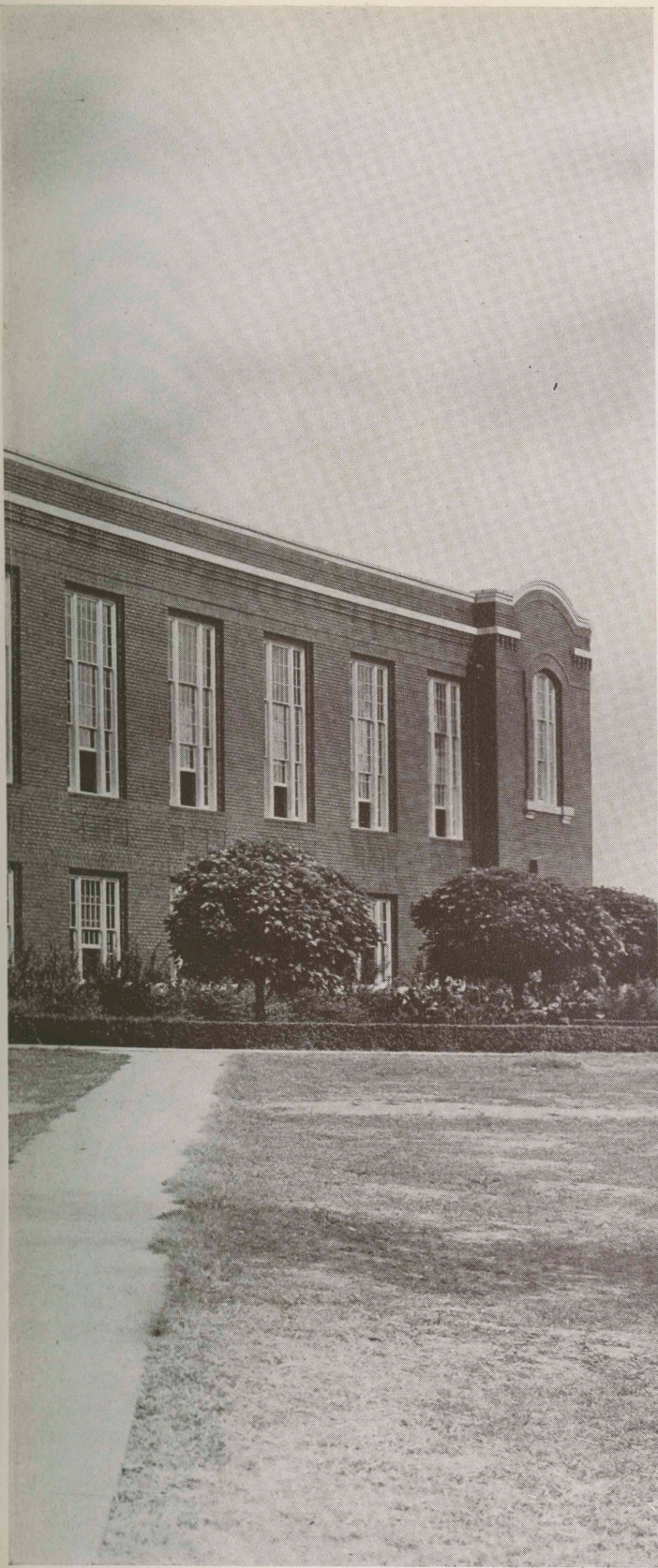




The smell of pickled dog-fish,

are all an integral part of *Science Hall*.

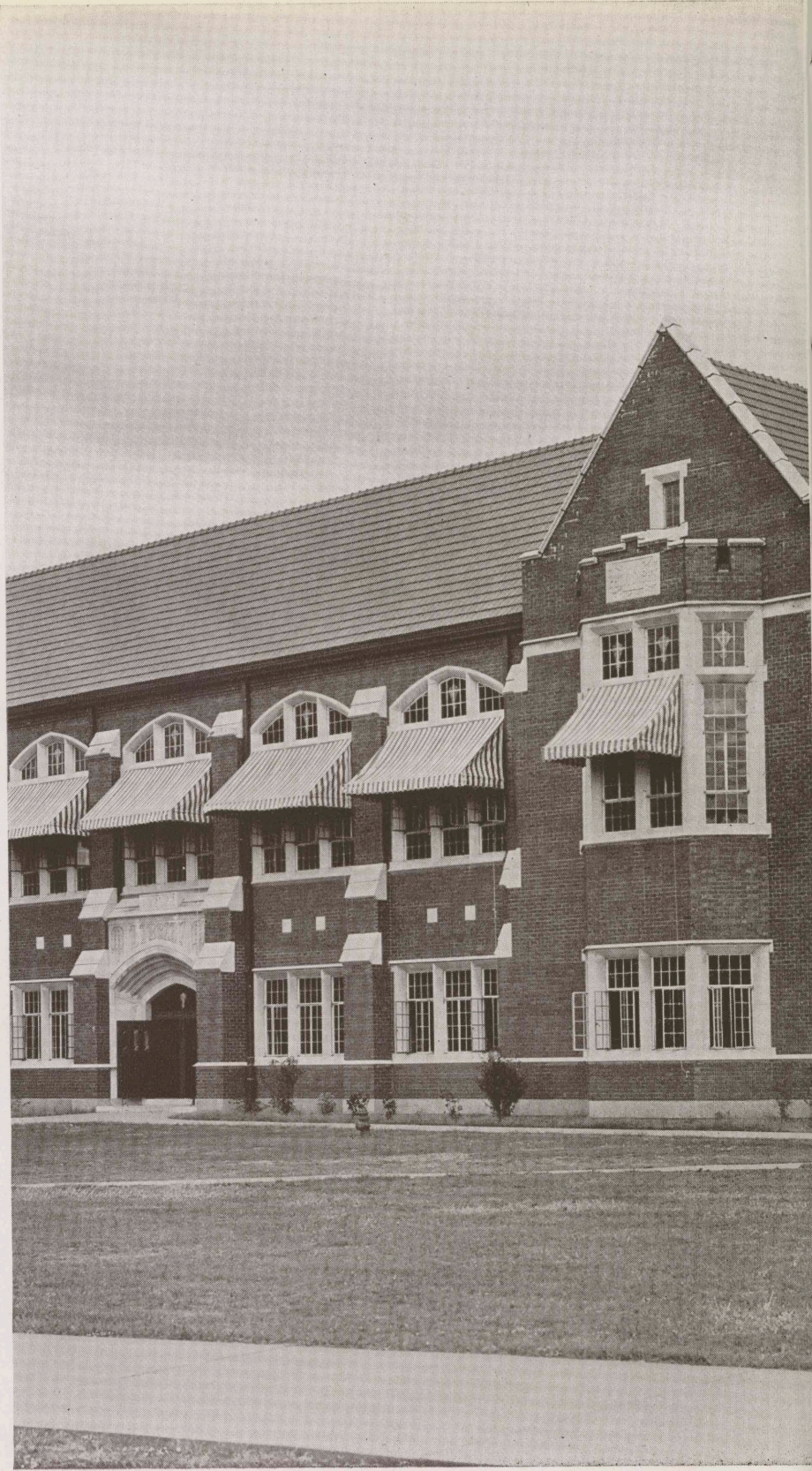
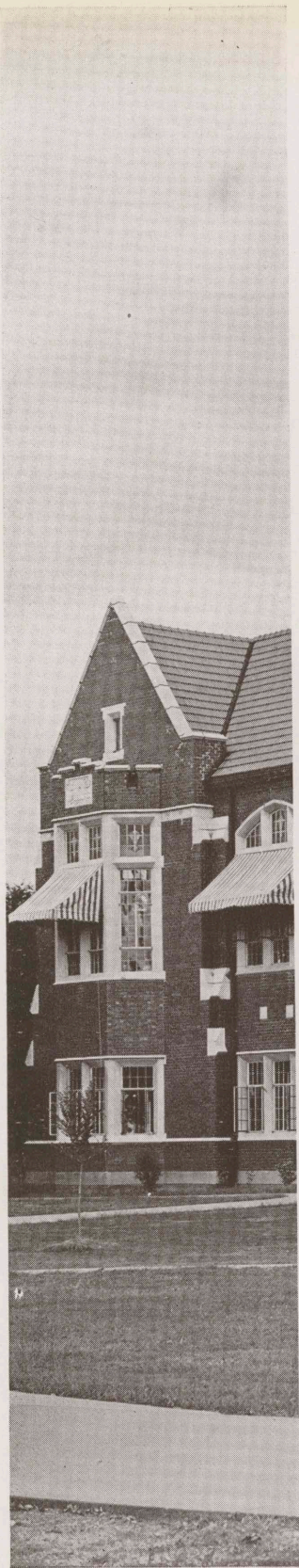


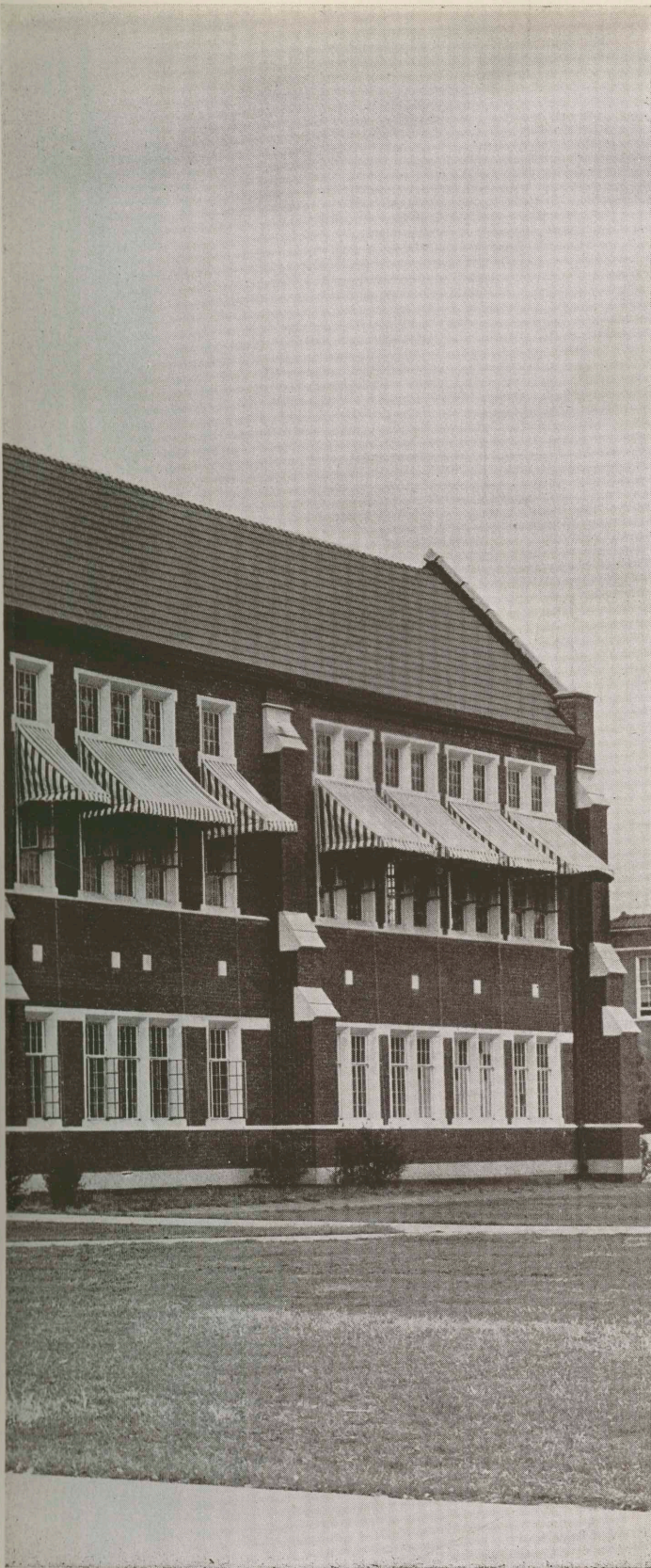




Shouts from the locker-rooms,

reading papers from their home towns;

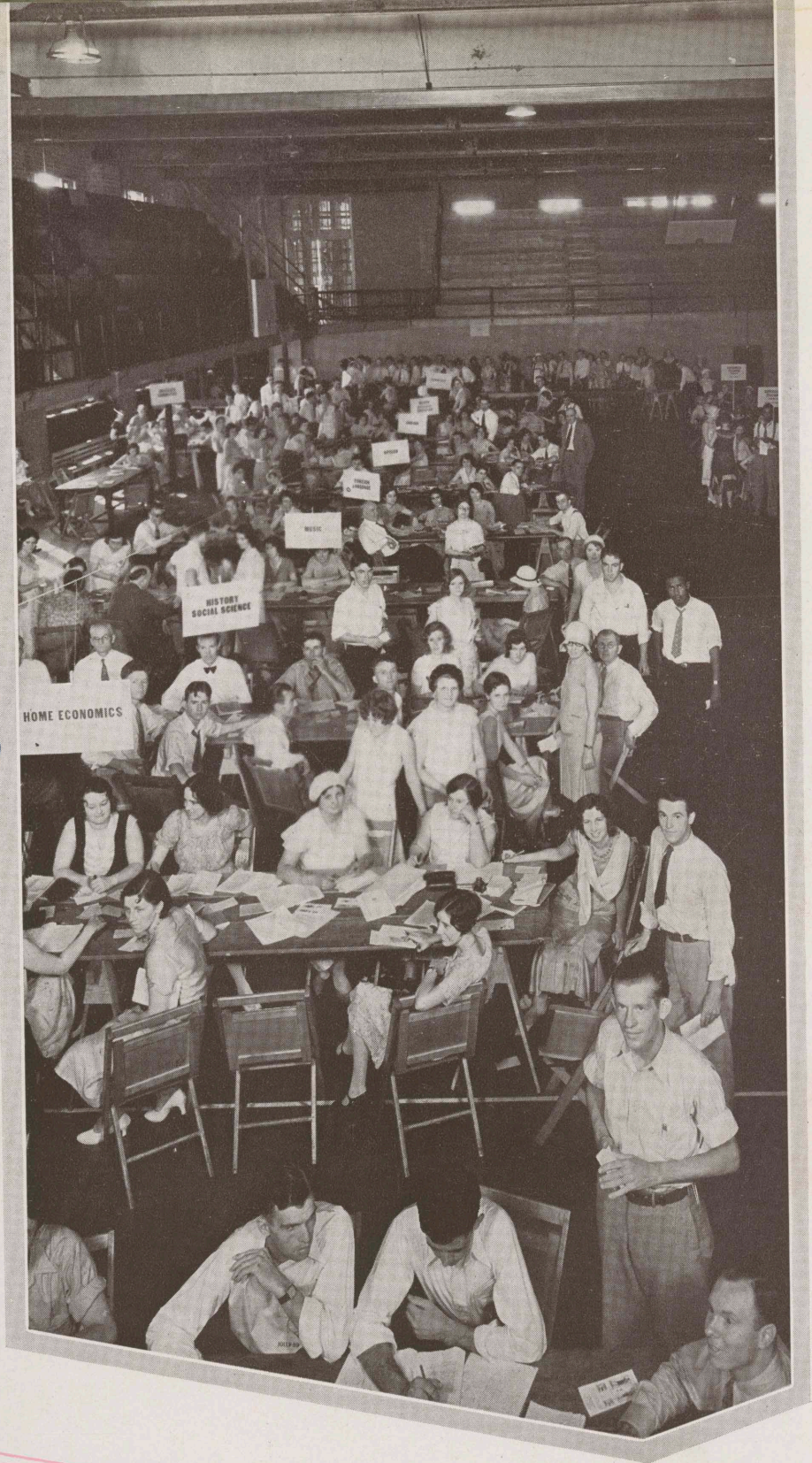

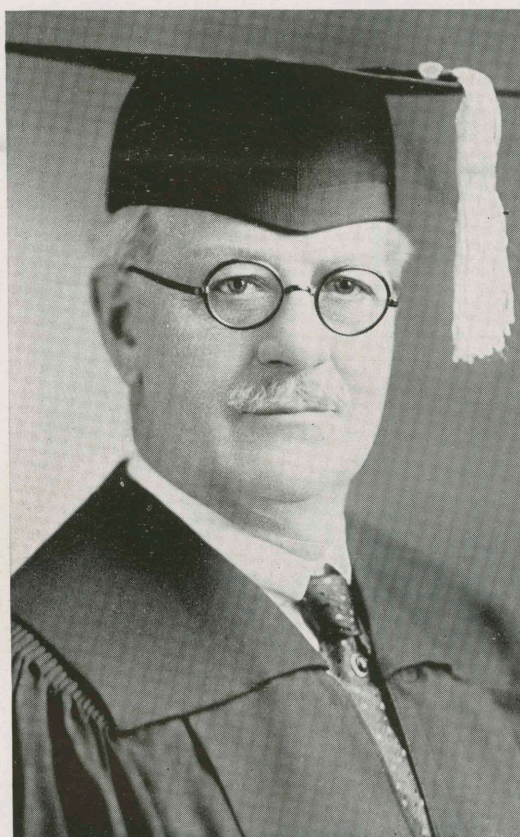
W. A. BRANDENBURG, A. M., LL. D.

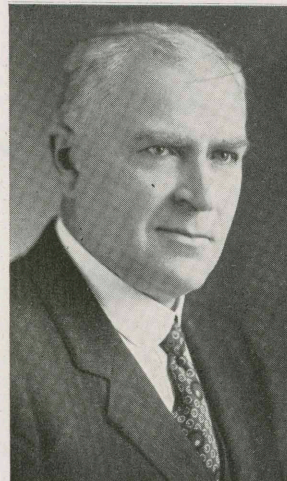

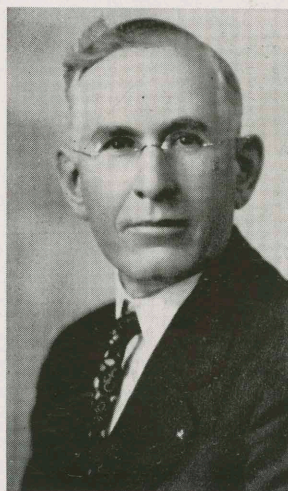


Music

The 1931 football season ended with Pittsburg in fourth place. Washburn and Wichita divided up the championship with five wins and one defeat each. Emporia Teachers filled third place. In conference play, the Gorillas broke even with three wins and three losses.

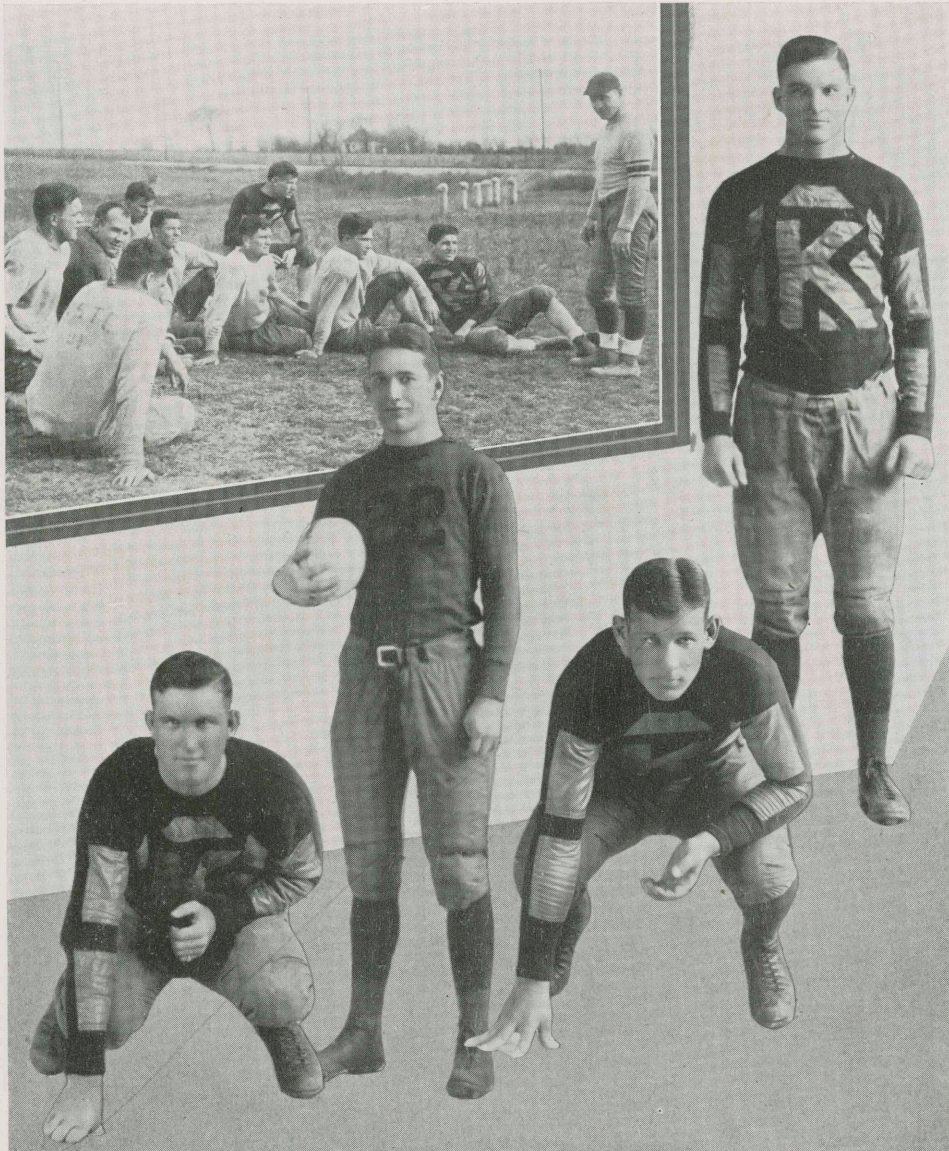
The first Gorilla practice last fall exhibited a field of forty aspirants and a great many more turned out during the next week.

Howell's men began the season with some games which were anything but set-ups. The first preparation for the conference race was the duel with Rolla School

of Mines, September 25. The Gorillas thoroughly frightened the highly-touted Miners by two crushing offenses which carried the ball twice to the five-yard line in the first quarter. The second time, Kahler, at quarter, went through the line for a touchdown and Moroconi kicked goal. Just before the half ended a double-pass by the Miners ended the period in a tie. Outplayed in the second half, the Gorillas resorted to a passing attack which was effectively handled by their opponents, the game ending 19-7.

Coach Charley Morgan directed the practice for the Kansas Aggie game, October

Line plays proving useless, Pittsburg gathered a touchdown in the first quarter by a series of passes, only to be flattened in the later stages of the game to the dirge of 28-7. Kennedy, Lucas, and Vanek gained favor by snagging a number of Kahler's long passes.

Southwestern came to Brandenburg Field for the first conference battle and met a 60 defeat. The touchdown came early in the game. Some bone-crushing line plays mixed with a few passes carried the ball rapidly down the field. The Pittsburg line

opened up some nice lanes for the back-field. George Wilson, Roberts, Martin, and Steele were clearing the decks in a very efficient manner. Later in the game, Pittsburg continued to threaten but couldn't put it over. Saey, a first-year fullback collected the lone touchdown. Pittsburg gained 250 yards from scrimmage against Southwestern's 66. So the game was really more one-sided than the score would infer.

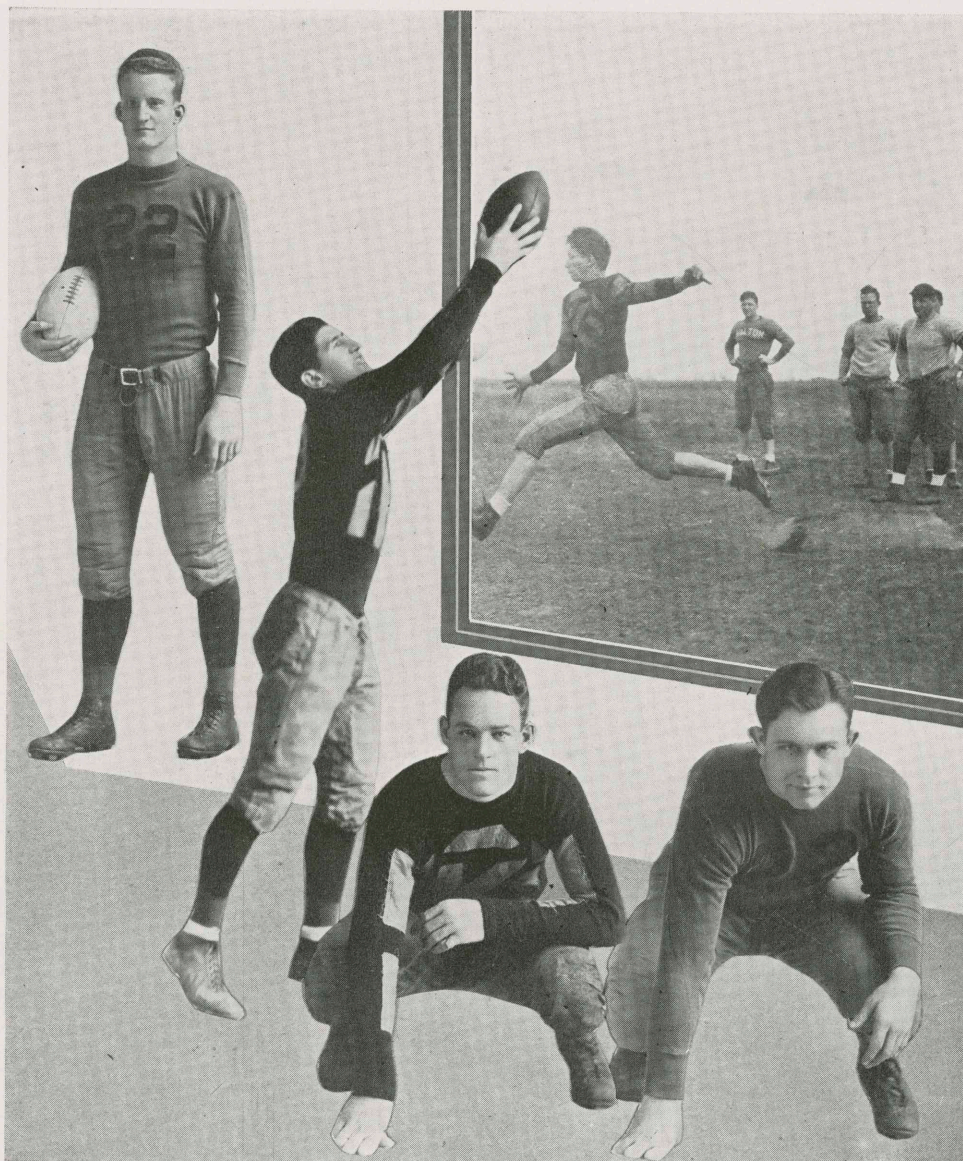

Friday, November 6, the Gorillas went to Emporia and flogged C. of E. 31-12. McCoy and Kahler showed off a great pass-catching combination and Saey to Kahler,

to Bettega was the personnel of one pretty triple pass which earned six points. Glen Browne was smacking them down as usual and Grossman caught a mighty pretty pass for one counter. Coach Howell substituted rather freely. Bert Gould played a consistently good game in the line.

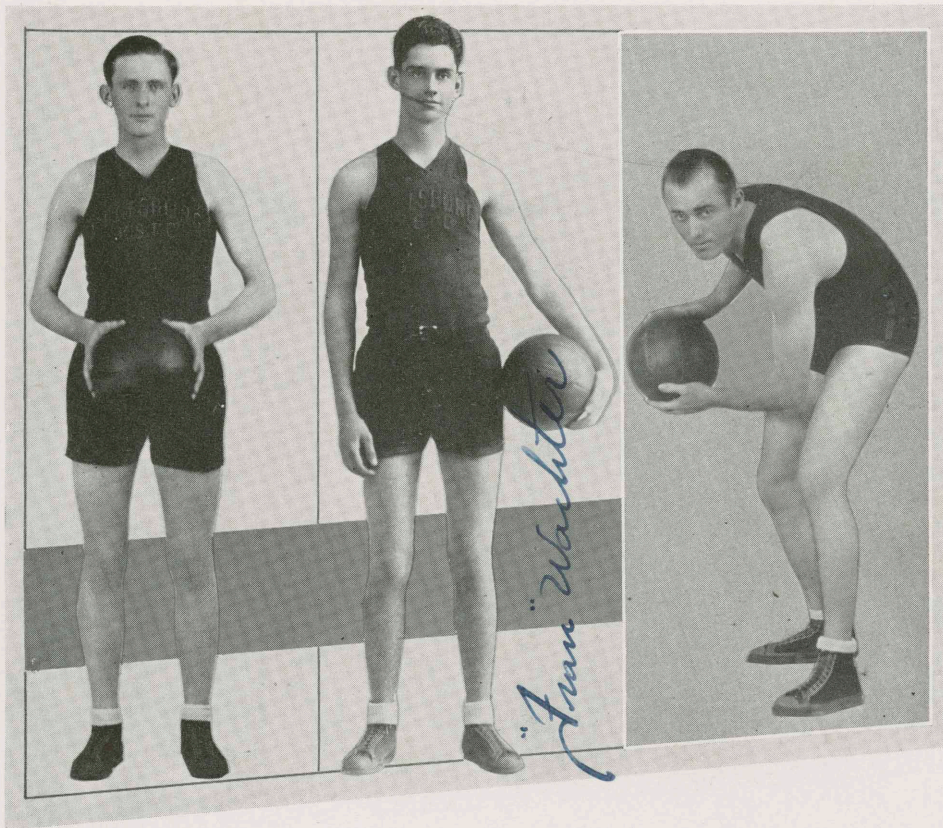

As a concluding remark, we wish to state that John Lance is a great coach.

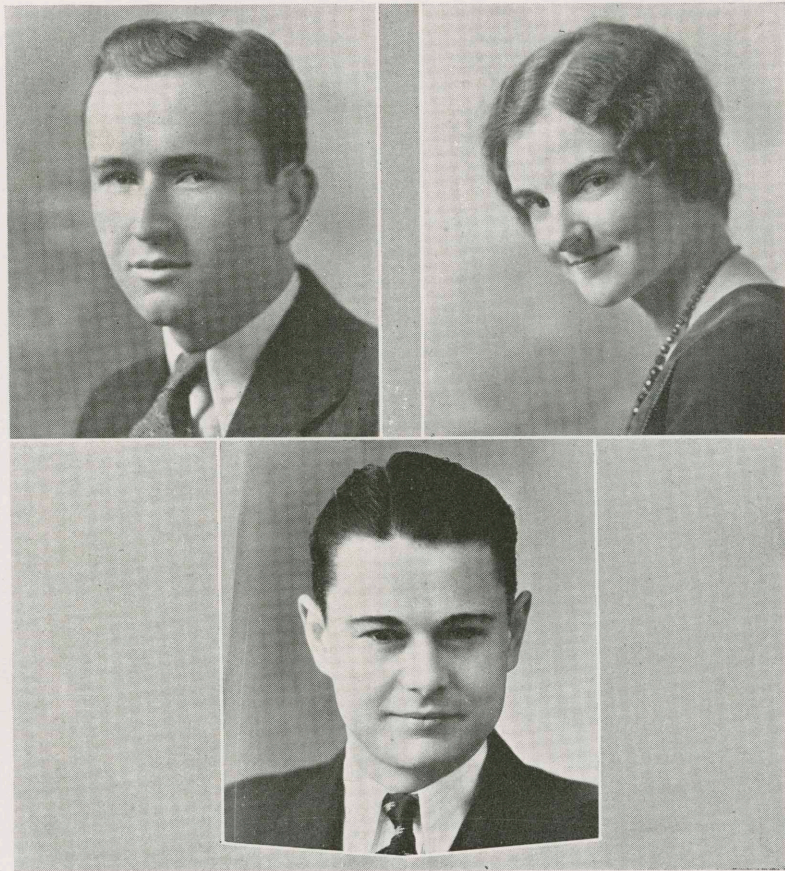

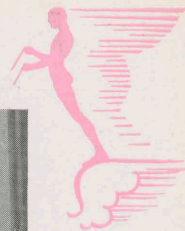


FESTIVAL CHORUS

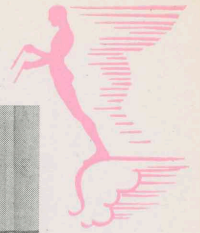


COLLEGE BAND

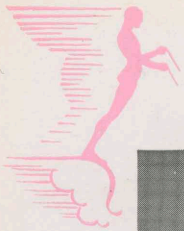

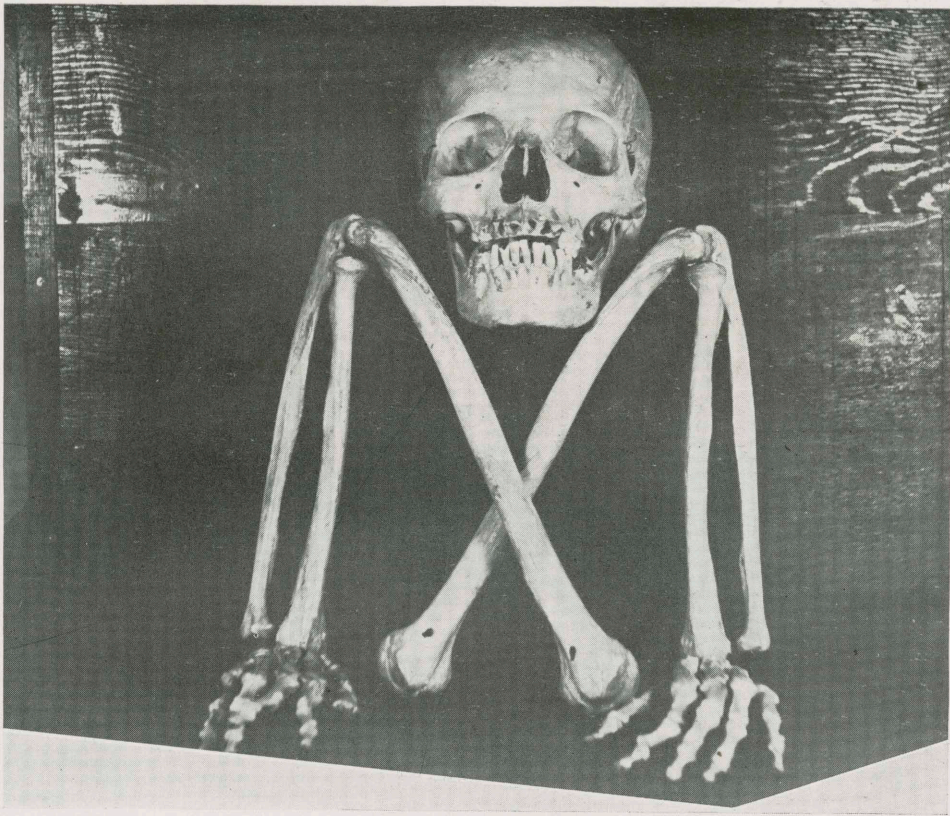

The minimum qualifications for membership are a vital interest in history with an average of "B" plus, and two-thirds of the remaining grades must average at least "B."

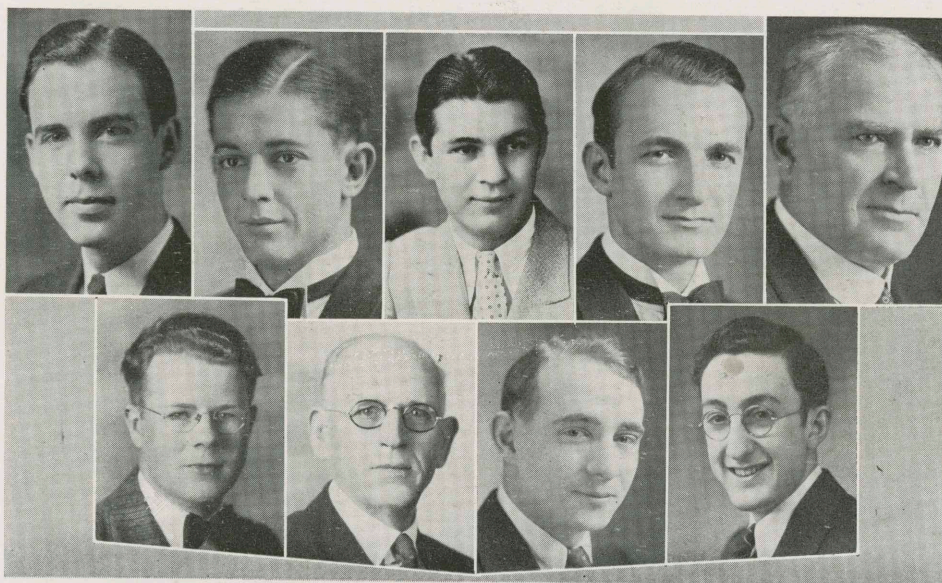

At the close of the 1931 track season, Pittsburg exhibited a remarkable record. For seven years, they had maintained a perfect record in dual meets, having won all in which they participated. Since 1920, they had taken part in 32 meets, winning 26 and losing only six. During this time, they scored 2,562 points against 1,400 for their opponents.

Last year, they held six records in the central conference. Shaw held the hundred; McEnterfer, the quarter; Winchester,

the half; White the shot; Roberts, the discus; and the one mile relay.

The conference meet was easy for Doc's men. They scored 82 1-5 points. Wichita was second with forty counters. Cliff Madison was high point man of the meet, scoring first in the broad jump, second in the hundred, third in the 220, and a tie for second in the high jump. He also ran anchor position on the one-mile relay team for a total of 13 1-4 points. Delbert White was right with him, scoring 13

points. A high-spot of the meet was Bob Schroeder's high jump of 6 ft. 3 in., breaking the old record by six inches.

Cragg, of Pittsburg bettered the pole-vault mark. Swisher continued his extraordinary performances of the earlier part of the season by winning the hundred and smashing the 220 record.

Clark and Vanek of the Gorillas grabbed first and second in the javlin. Brown won the half by nosing out the flashy Manning of Wichita. The conference meet was a

fitting end to a great season with a great team coached by a great coach.

Four of the team graduated last spring. Snodgrass, Briggs, Morgan, and Taylor were missed this year.

A surprising number of freshmen made good in competition. White, Swisher, Cragg, Brown, Clark, Stambach, Bell, and Birch were very welcome additions. We predict great things for them and sincerely believe that next year's Kanza will bear out our forecast.

SECOND: Meeting shall be held each week in the breakfast room, and initiations performed in the hall closed for secrecy.

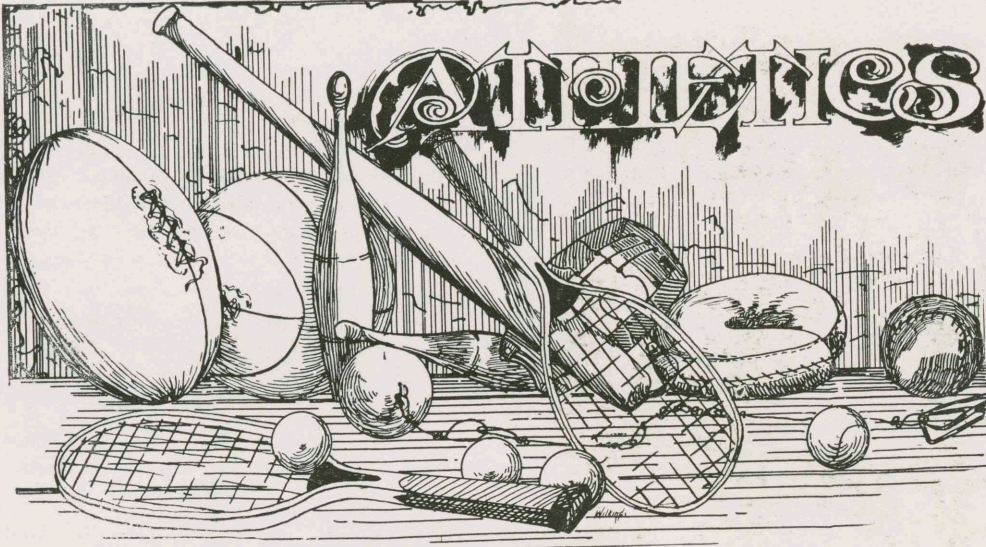
