The Apple Day Tradition

Pittsburg State University opened as the Auxiliary Manual Training Normal School in 1903. The bill establishing the Auxiliary Manual Training Normal School was passed by the Kansas Senate on Feb. 11, by the House of Representatives on Feb. 20, was approved by the governor, Willis J. Bailey, on Feb. 21, and became law upon publication in the official state paper, "The Topeka Capital," on Feb. 26, 1903.

The first day of classes, with 54 students and five faculty members, was held Tuesday, Sept. 8, 1903. The Central School Building, at 5th and Walnut Streets in Pittsburg, served as temporary quarters for the new school. Russell Station Russ, then Superintendent of the Pittsburg schools, was elected Principal of the Normal School which he helped to found.

In 1907, Russ spent considerable time in the State Legislature during the debate for an approriation for the school's first building. As the debate was drawing to a close, the legislators lightheartedly reviewed the problem of nonmembers of the House appearing on the floor, and the motion was made that the next offender be fined a barrel of apples. Shortly after, Russ appeared to inquire about the progress of the bill and was duly fined a barrel of apples.

The incident was reported in Pittsburg, and Russ, discussing this with students, suggested that they fine the faculty a barrel of apples. The motion passed unanimously, and the bewildered faculty paid the fine. Since that first observance on March 8, 1907, Apple Day or Commemoration Day has become an event to be noted on the Pittsburg State campus. Annually, this traditional fine is assessed by the student body, and the apples furnished by the Faculty Association are distributed to all those present at the Apple Day Convocation.

Pittsburg State University 1993 Distinguished Service Award Recipients

For more than 50 years, **Helen Kriegsman** has been associated with Pittsburg State University as a student, faculty member, administrator and volunteer. In 1944, she earned a bachelor's degree and in 1947 a master's degree, both from Pittsburg State. Her employment at PSU has included serving as the Mathematics Supervisor of College High Laboratory School, and a faculty member in the PSU Department of Mathemathics from 1956 until she was named Chair of the Department in 1967. She served as Chair until her retirement in 1989, but then began her volunteer work for the University as the Coordinator of Scholarship Programs. She continues in that role today serving as a vital link between the University and its many scholarship donors.

Wayne P. Allai is the founder and driving force behind the Pittsburg State University Endowment for Excellence in Athletics Fund. He initiated the fund in 1987 with his own contribution. Since then, he has personally conducted an ongoing campaign among alumni and friends of the University to raise funds for the endowment. That endowment now comprises more than half of the overall athletic endowment fund of nearly \$500,000. He has also been an active participant and leader for many years in the annual athletic fund drive. A retired Pittsburg businessman, he is a 1949 business graduate of Pittsburg State University.
