The envoy was sent to James Clement Dunn, political adviser on European affairs, who told the Prince that it had been expected that Italy would obediently follow along, since Germany had carried out a threat against this hemisphere and the United States."

Henry Gradstein, Principal Of P.S. 152 in Queens, Dies

Henry Gradstein, principal of Public School 152, Woodside, Queens, died yesterday in Long Beach (L. I.) Memorial Hospital, after a short illness. He was 65 years old and lived at 138-10 77th Avenue, Kew Gardens Hills, Queens.

Mr. Gradstein had earlier been principal of Public Schools 5, 14 and 166, all in Queens, and before that had taught social studies in Central Commercial High School.

He was a graduate of City College and Brooklyn Law School. He served as a lieutenant in the Army Air Force in World War II.

Surviving are his widow, Hannah, and a son, Mark.

DR. WILLIAM CARLO

Dr. William E. Carlo, professor of philosophy at the University of Ottawa Graduate School, who was an authority on neo-Thomist studies, died yesterday of cancer in Ottawa. His age was 49.

Dr. Carlo, who was widely known in American philosophical circles, was the author of several books and 50 articles. He graduated from St. Joseph's College, Yonkers, and received a Ph.D. degree from the University of Toronto.

He had taught at New Rochelle College, St. John's University, and Boston University and had lectured at Oxford University, before going to Ottawa.

Surviving are his widow, Eleanor, and five children.

SIDNEY J. FLAMM

Sidney J. Flamm, president and general manager since 1959 of radio station WMM and of WGJ-FM, both of Westport, Conn., died yesterday of a heart attack in Hackensack (N. J.) Hospital. He was 69 years old and lived at 1364 Somerset Road, West Englewood, N. J.

Mr. Flamm, a former reporter on The Brooklyn Daily Eagle, later published The Flushing News. He entered radio in 1924 and with his brother, Donald, had operated station WMCA, WPAT in Peterson, N. J., and WNRC in New Rochelle.

Surviving are his widow, Blanche; two daughters, Mrs. Carol Akiyama and Jacqueline, and two brothers, Donald and Milton.

HARRY MAZE IS DEAD; EX-CITY COUNCILMAN

Harry Maze, a former member of the City Council, died yesterday at his home. He was 69 years old and lived at 5518 Clarendon Road, Brooklyn.

Mr. Maze, a lawyer active in Brooklyn Democratic politics, retired on July 1 as law secretary to Controller Abraham D. Beame. He served as an assistant district attorney of Kings County from 1947 to 1963 and assistant deputy controller from May, 1963, to December, 1964.

Mr. Maze was elected to the City Council in 1965 from Brooklyn's 23d district and was defeated for re-election in 1969.

He leaves his wife, Fannie; a son, Stanley; a daughter, Mrs. Marilyn Reinert; a brother, four sisters and four grandchildren.

DANIEL E. WADE

Daniel E. Wade, a former member of the New York Stock Exchange who had been a partner in the brokerage firm of Wade Brothers & Co. here, died Thursday in Grosse Pointe, Mich. He was 84 years old and lived at 245 East 72d Street.

Mr. Wade, who retired in 1960, had also been a member of the New York Cotton and Cocoa Exchanges. He was born in Philadelphia and graduated from Yale in 1907 and the University of Pennsylvania Law School in 1910.

A sister, Mrs. Emmet Dwyer of Grosse Pointe Farms, Mich., survives.

Waylande Gregory, Sculptor With Work at '39 Fair

WARREN TOWNSHIP, N. J., Aug. 20 (AP)—Waylande Gregory, well known for innovations in ceramic sculpture, died Wednesday. He was 68 years old.

Mr. Gregory was credited with the development of a technique for using ceramics, commonly restricted to small sculpture, in such large works as his "Fountain of the Atoms," which stood at the main entrance of the New York World's Fair in 1939.

He was also known for a ceramic mural in the Municipal Center in Washington, which is reported to be the largest piece of ceramic sculpture in the world.
