The Story of Apple Day

On February 21, 1903, Governor William J. Bailey signed the bill creating the Kansas State Manual Training Normal School Auxiliary, the first name of what is today Pittsburg State University. Classes began the following September in the city-owned Central School building at the northwest corner of Fifth and Walnut. Very soon the growing enrollment created a need for a larger facility. Senator Ebenezer F. Porter of Pittsburg led a successful fight for a building appropriation with the assistance of Principal Russell Station Russ, the faculty, and community leaders. After the funding bill was passed, Clarence Price, then mayor of Pittsburg, was fined a barrel of apples for lobbying on the floor of the legislature. Senator Porter, it should be noted, graciously donated two boxes of cigars to the House for passing the bill. Upon their triumphal return to Pittsburg, the story of the fine was told. In those days, students were disciplined for their absences. In the spirit of the celebration, Principal Russ and members of his faculty were fined a barrel of apples by the students because they had been gone to Topeka to help lobby. Thus, with the funding of the building we now call Russ Hall by the Kansas Legislature, the tradition of Apple Day was established in 1907.

August and Helen Rua

August, who died earlier this year, and Helen Rua are long-time benefactors to the university. August received both a bachelor's and master's degree from PSU. The Ruas have been members of the PSU Centennial Society, were original members of the President's Society and are charter members of the Heritage Society. They established the August and Helen Rua Athletic Scholarship Fund, supported KRPS radio and were benefactors of the August and Helen Rua Press Box at Carnie Smith Stadium.

Additionally, August served as a member of the PSU Foundation Board of Trustees, a member of the Athletic Advisory Board and was a Gorilla Ambassador. He was the 1969 PSU Alumni Association president and was a recipient of the PSU Meritorious Achievement Award. August was a PSU Half-Century Club inductee and was a Community Campaign volunteer.

Jack Overman

Jack Overman received both a bachelor's degree and a master's degree from PSU and returned to join the staff in 1940. After a long career at the university, Overman retired, but continues to support PSU as a volunteer.

His volunteer service has included playing a pivotal role in the site selection, planning and dedication of the Wilkinson Alumni Center. He has served as chairman of the Annual Fund and president of the PSU Alumni Association. A life member of the Alumni Association, Overman has served on the Phonathon Committee and is a member of the PSU Foundation and the President's Club. He is a recipient of the PSU Meritorious Achievement Award and is a member of the Alumni Centennial Society. Overman is also a recipient of the Kaye Lynne Webb Spirit Award.

Overman is a familiar face at a wide variety of university events. He has an almost unbroken attendance record for PSU football championship games and frequently attends other sporting, music and theater events.

Golden Gorilla Student Leadership Award





Dr. James AuBuchon Vice President for University Advancement



Dr. James AuBuchon was born in Baxter Springs, Kansas and attended schools in Riverton and Baxter Springs. He graduated from Pittsburg State University in 1963 with a Bachelor of Science in Education and a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Army. He completed a Master's degree from PSU in 1969 and a Ph.D. from Kansas State University in 1978.

From 1963 until 1967, he served in the U.S. Army, completing assignments at Ft. Benning, Georgia; Ft. Riley, Kansas; The Republic of Vietnam; and Ft.

Leonard Wood, Missouri. He left active duty in 1967 and returned to Pittsburg where he joined the staff at Pittsburg State University as Assistant Director of the Student Center. He held the following administrative positions at PSU: 1972 to 1982 - Associate Director of Student Affairs and International Student Advisor; 1982 to 1992 - Director of Placement and Student Development Programs; 1992-1995 - Associate Vice President for Student Affairs; 1995 - 1998 - Director of Major Giving. He was named Vice President for University Advancement in 1998.

Some of the more recent accomplishments in his career at PSU include his involvement in raising \$6 million in corporate, government, foundation, and private funds to complete the nearly \$30 million funding package for the Kansas Technology Center. He managed the successful \$100 million capital campaign completed in June 2000. More recently, he provided leadership in the \$5.7 million campaign to renovate and expand the football stadium, construction of the \$1.3 million PSU Veterans Memorial Amphitheater, and the \$120 million capital campaign currently underway. As executive director, he manages the affairs of the PSU Foundation, Inc., which has \$51 million in assets.

Dr. AuBuchon retired from the U.S. Army in 1999 after 36 years of active and Reserve Duty with the rank Brigadier General. He currently serves as chairperson of the Kansas Committee for Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve, and ambassador for the State of Kansas to the U.S. Army Reserve. He is a member of the Kansas Transportation 2000 Task Force and the Governor's Economic Review Panel. He previously served as president of the U.S. Highway 69 Association and transportation council chair of SEK, Inc.

In the Pittsburg community, he served as chairman and member of the Board of Trustees of Mt. Carmel Medical Center. Currently he is a member of the Board of Directors of the Family Resource Center, Inc., and has served two terms as board president. He is also a member of the advisory board of Gold Bank of Pittsburg. He previously served as the mayor of Pittsburg and as a Pittsburg city commissioner.

Dr. Robert K. Ratzlaff Vice President for Academic Affairs



Dr. Robert K. Ratzlaff joined the Pittsburg State University faculty in 1966 as a history instructor. Except for a leave of absence from 1969 to 1970 to complete work on his Ph.D. at the University of Kansas, Dr. Ratzlaff has continuously served PSU as a faculty member and/or administrator.

A native of Garden City, Kan., Ratzlaff earned a Bachelor of Science in history from Kansas State University; a Master of Science in history from Pittsburg State and a Ph.D. in history from the University of Kansas.

He served as an instructor at Independence Community
College and Independence High School prior to joining the PSU staff.
He served PSU as a full-time faculty member in history until 1978,
when he was named chairman of the History Department. He served
as chairperson and continued to teach each semester until January
1987, when he was named Interim Vice President of Academic
Affairs. In October 1987, he was named Vice President for Academic
Affairs. In addition to his administrative duties, he has always continued to teach classes. Some of the highlights during his tenure as Vice
President for Academic Affairs are:

- Acquisition of funding, design and construction of the Kansas
 Technology Center
- Development of the PSU Honors College

- Earning accreditation for the College of Business from AACSB
- Design and construction of the Family and Consumer Sciences
 Building
- Successful completion of agreements with PSU/KNEA
- Recruitment of numerous deans, directors, chairpersons and faculty
- Development of new degree programs in International Business, Nursing, Accounting, Instructional Technology, Engineering Technology, Criminal Justice and many more
- Development of numerous degree completion programs offered at various locations throughout the state
- Working with Cessna to provide training for the work force at the Independence plant
- Merging the Vocational Technical Institute with the College of Technology Development of the Writing Across the Curriculum program
- Development of the internal program review process
- Development of the General Education Assessment program
- Continually working on the internationalization of the curriculum
- Working with the Faculty Senate on numerous issues
 Dr. Ratzlaff has published two books and has published or coauthored numerous articles in professional journals.

In the Pittsburg community, Dr. Ratzlaff has been involved in Kiwanis, American Legion Baseball and Little League Baseball.
