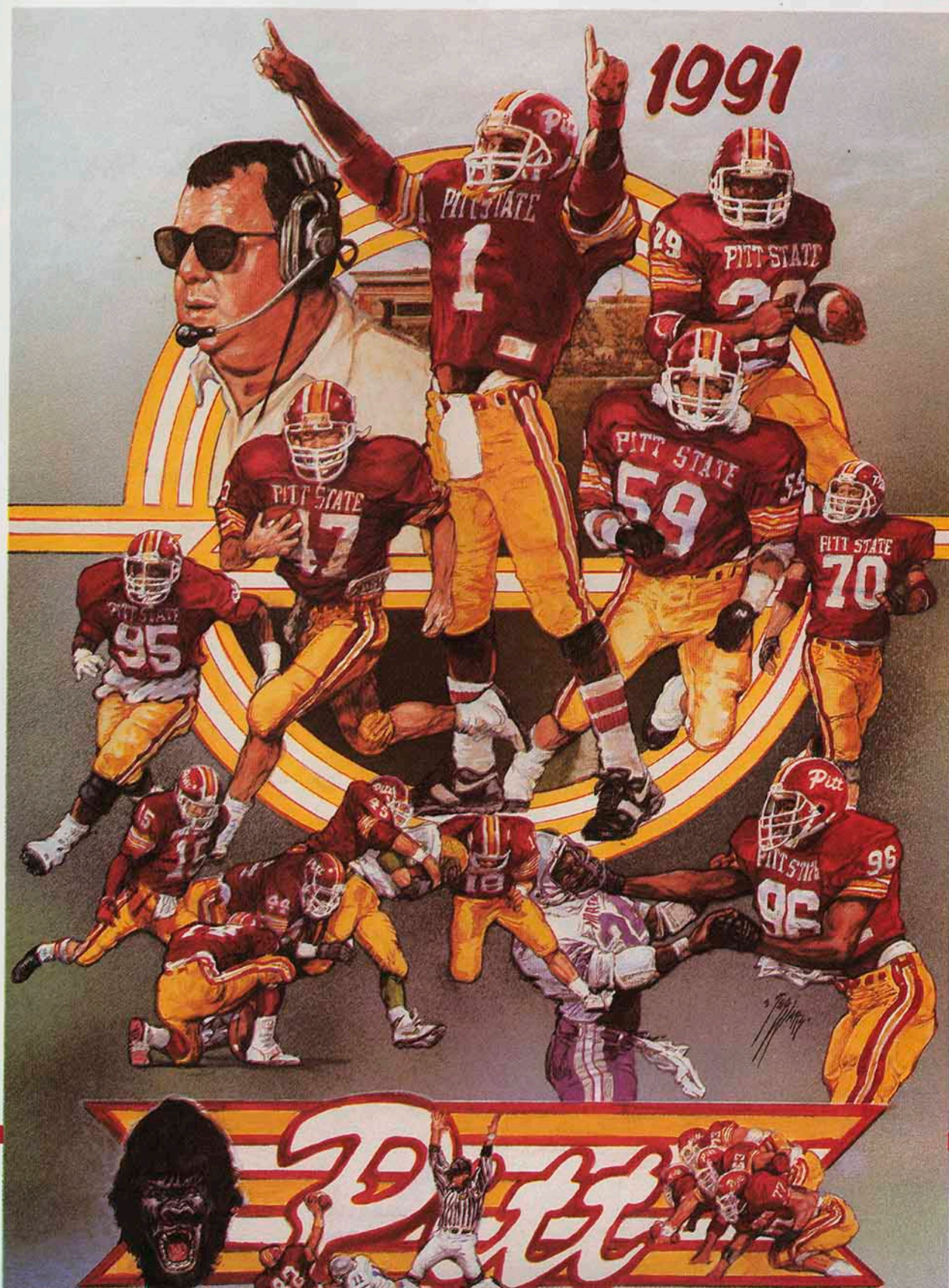

Gorilla Tradition Continues with Amazing Winning Streak!

Back on September 28, 1985, Pittsburg State lost a football game to in-state rival Emporia State. The Gorillas were beaten 41-9 by the Hornets, and at the time the loss wasn't very significant since it was only the third game of the '85 season.

But now, that defeat at Emporia is very significant because it's the last time Pitt State has lost a regular season football game!

Since the loss at Emporia six seasons ago, PSU has reeled off an amazing string of 55 consecutive regular season wins (entering the '91 campaign). During the past six years, Pitt State has lost a grand total of seven games, with six of those defeats coming in post-season playoff games.

PSU has put together five straight unblemished regular seasons, and the Gorillas have won six straight league titles before advancing to the post-season playoffs every year.

PSU's tradition of success goes back many years. As an NAIA member, the Gorillas captured a pair of national championships in 1957 and 1961, then returned to national prominence in the 1980s, earning five playoff invitations.

The program's success has certainly continued during the transition from NAIA membership to NCAA Division II status in 1989. PSU advanced to the NCAA-II national semifinals last season, after reaching the second round of the playoffs in the program's first season as an NCAA member.

Pitt State enters its third season of NCAA Division II competition with high expectations and several team goals. One of those goals includes continuing PSU's amazing winning streak!

NFL DRAFT PICK: Pittsburg State cornerback Darryl Wren was selected in the third round of the 1991 National Football League Draft by the Buffalo Bills in April. Wren, the 82nd pick overall, became PSU's highest selection ever in the NFL Draft. He was a two-time first-team All-MIAA selection, and a second-team All-American as a senior. Perhaps just as important as his success on the playing field, Wren earned a bachelor's degree in physical education/recreation last spring.

The University offers more than 100 undergraduate and graduate degree programs through the schools of business, technology, and education, and the college of arts and sciences.

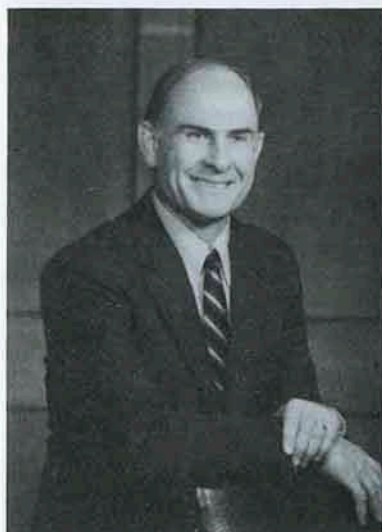
Pittsburg State currently has an enrollment of approximately 5,900 students with more than 350 dedicated faculty members. The student-faculty ratio is approximately 17:1.

Dr. Donald W. Wilson, President



Dr. Donald W. Wilson became the President of Pittsburg State University in December of 1983. During the past eight years, he has been a tremendous leader on campus, in the southeast Kansas community, and in international circles as well.

Dr. Wilson's educational philosophy is based on the belief that colleges and universities should help develop the entire person: mentally, physically, aesthetically and spiritually. He has a special personal and professional interest in cross-cultural understanding, which stems from his varied international background.

Born in Poona, India, the son of missionary parents, Dr. Wilson attended school in Australia, Singapore and Indonesia. He has lived in five foreign countries and has speaking or reading knowledge of eight languages.

During Dr. Wilson's tenure at PSU, many accomplishments have been realized including: enrollment records continue to be broken; an Honors College has been established; many cooperative exchange agreements have been signed with more than 65 universities in foreign countries; and most of the renovation of Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium has been completed as part of a major capital campaign.

Prior to his appointment at Pittsburg State, Dr. Wilson served as President of Southampton University in New York for four years, and as President of Castleton State College in Vermont.

He is an avid sports participant, as well as the No. 1 fan of PSU athletic programs.

History of Pitt State Football (1908-1990)

Pittsburg State University has built a tradition as one of the finest small-college football programs in the nation, with two NAIA national championships and a current string of six straight post-season appearances highlighting an illustrious gridiron history that dates back to the early 1900s.

After competing for 81 years as an NAIA program, PSU joined the NCAA Division II ranks and the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1989. The Gorillas captured the MIAA football championship their first two seasons in the new league, after winning four straight championships in the NAIA's Central States Intercollegiate Conference.

PSU qualified for the national playoffs for the sixth consecutive year in 1990, and reached the national semifinals for the fourth time in five years. The Gorillas also continued an amazing string of regular season victories last season. PSU has won 55 straight regular season contests entering the 1991 campaign.

Pittsburg State has posted 47 winning seasons in its football history, capturing the NAIA national championship under Coach Carnie Smith in 1957 and 1961. The Gorillas also have won 22 league titles, including nine championships in the last 12 years.

Pitt State fielded its first team in 1904, but no scores or results exist. Since its first official season in 1908, PSU has celebrated 443 victories, ranking the program sixth on the NCAA Division II all-time winningest teams list.

Pittsburg State joined the Kansas Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (KIAC) in 1911 and won its first conference championship in 1924 under Garfield W. Weede, compiling a 7-0-1 record, PSU's first undefeated season.

In 1925, Pitt State adopted the "Gorilla" as its official mascot. PSU is proud to be the only college or university in the country with the Gorilla as its athletic mascot.

The Gorillas became members of the Central Intercollegiate Conference (CIC) in 1928. The Gorillas won ten league championships in 41 years in the league, six of which came between 1949 and 1966 under Carnie Smith. As the winningest coach in PSU history, Smith guided the Gorillas to 116 wins, 52 losses and six ties in his 18 seasons as the school's head coach.

The stadium where the Gorillas have played their home games since 1922, now bears the name of the legendary coach.

Under Smith, Pittsburg State won two NAIA national championships. The Gorillas achieved perfect 11-0 seasons in 1957 and 1961 to win the national honor.

Pitt State left the CIC for the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference in 1969, and won a pair of conference titles during its three seasons in the league. PSU competed in the Great Plains Athletic Conference from 1972-75 before joining the Central States Intercollegiate Conference (CSIC) in 1976. PSU won or shared the CSIC championship seven of 13 years in the league.

During the 1980's, Pitt State regained its national prominence. PSU earned a trip to the NAIA playoffs in 1981 for the first time since the '61 championship. The Gorillas completed a 10-2 season with a national runner-up finish, losing 3-0 in the NAIA title game.

PSU's success in the '80s continued under head coach Dennis Franchione, as the Gorillas won the CSIC championship and earned NAIA post-season playoff berths in 1985, 1986, 1987, and 1988. PSU reached the NAIA national semifinals the last three years the program was a member of the organization.

From 1980 to 1988, Pittsburg State won six CSIC championships, appeared in the NAIA national playoffs five times, and produced 34 NAIA All-Americans. During the 1980s, PSU compiled one of the best records of any football program, ranking second among NCAA Division II schools with a winning percentage of .800 and a record of 88-22.

Between 1908 and 1990, Pittsburg State has built a record of 443 wins, 277 losses, and 45 ties, making it one of the most successful in small college football programs in the nation. PSU's 443 victories rank sixth among NCAA Division II schools.

The Pittsburg State University Gorillas nearly turned the dream of winning a national title into reality in 1990.

Under the leadership of first-year head coach Chuck Broyles, Pitt State compiled a 12-1 overall record, and came within a play or two of winning the school's third national championship and the team's first NCAA Division II title.

The highlights of Pittsburg State's illustrious 1990 gridiron campaign were many:

- PSU reached the semifinals of the NCAA-II playoffs. The Gorillas 39-29 loss to eventual national champion North Dakota State was the team's only defeat of the season.
- Pitt State posted its fifth consecutive undefeated regular season in 1990. The Gorillas will enter the 1991 season with the nation's longest regular season winning streak, an amazing 55 consecutive games without a loss!

• The Gorillas won the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship for the second straight year. The '90 title was the team's sixth consecutive league championship -- PSU won four Central States Intercollegiate Conference crowns before joining the MIAA in 1989.

• Since joining the MIAA, PSU is 19-0 in regular season conference games, and 21-0 overall versus MIAA opponents including a pair of playoff wins.

• Pitt State's appearance in the 1990 national playoffs was the Gorillas' sixth straight berth in post-season play. PSU reached the semifinals of national playoff competition for the fourth time in the last five years.

• Pitt State was ranked third in the 1990 final NCAA Division II national poll, after a fourth-place national ranking in the final '89 poll.

PSU Extends Win Streak to 55 Games

Pittsburg State University will open the 1991 regular season at home Sept. 7 against Friends University with the nation's longest **regular-season winning streak**—an amazing 55 straight games!

The Gorillas have put together five consecutive undefeated regular seasons during the winning streak, with the only loss each year coming in post-season playoff competition.

PSU's last regular season loss came back on Sept. 28, 1985, in Dennis Franchione's third game as head coach. In-state rival Emporia State defeated PSU, 41-9 at Emporia, Kan. Pitt State has not lost a regular season game since, winning 55 straight.

"THE STREAK" has had a few close calls during the past five years, yet PSU has managed to pull out victories to keep the record alive in every regular season game.

The closest call? Last year's Homecoming game, when Central Missouri State University returned a fumble for a touchdown and a had 7-0 lead at halftime. Pittsburg State cut the lead to 7-3 with a third-quarter field goal, then Ronald Moore plunged in for a 1-

yard touchdown in the fourth quarter to give Pitt State the win.

The Gorillas kept the winning streak intact in 1989, even though the program moved from NAIA to NCAA Division II competition.

In the third game of the season, Southwest Baptist University jumped out to a 17-0 first quarter lead. PSU answered with a 20-point second quarter explosion, but the Bearcats regained the lead, 24-20, midway through the fourth quarter. PSU scored the winning TD with 1:30 left in the game after a Southwest Baptist penalty kept an 80-yard drive alive. An SBU field goal attempt that would have tied the game with 31 seconds to play was wide, and PSU survived 27-24.

It appeared the winning streak would surely end on November 4, 1989, as PSU travelled to Jonesboro, Ark., for a contest against Arkansas State University, and NCAA Division I-AA affiliate. But Pitt State rose to the occasion, handing ASU its first loss ever to a Division II school with a 34-13 upset.

1991 Pittsburg State Outlook

Experienced Gorilla Team Ready for Run at National Title

After posting a 12-1 overall record and competing in the NCAA Division II national semifinals last season, the Pittsburg State University Gorillas have a talented and experienced football team returning for the 1991 gridiron campaign.

Under the direction of second-year head coach Chuck Broyles, PSU will have eight starters back on each side of the football. Sixteen starters return from a team whose only loss last year was to eventual national champion North Dakota State, 39-29 in the semifinals at Fargo, N.D.

"We came close to winning the national championship last year, and we didn't lose many players. We lost some quality players in key positions that will affect the personality of this year's team, but we are capable of competing for the national championship again."

Broyles said that even though the loss at North Dakota State was disappointing, it also was encouraging.

"Reaching the semifinals last year lets our players, coaches, and fans know that when we set a team goal of winning a national title, it's not some pipedream," said Broyles. "Coming so close proves we really can win it if we work hard enough and stay healthy."

THE PSU OFFENSE

Part of the reason Pittsburg State could challenge for a national title in 1991 is the Gorillas' powerful option veer attack, which should be explosive again this year.

Last season, Pitt State was ranked third in the nation in scoring, averaging 41.5 points per game. PSU's offense pounded out 325.2 yards per contest on the ground,

second-best among NCAA Division II schools. The Gorillas compiled an average of 451.4 total yards per contest, fourth among NCAA-II teams.

Pitt State must replace quarterback **Jay Padden**, who finished his three-year career as PSU's starter with a 35-3 won-loss record, and set school records for career completion percentage and TD passes.

Junior **Todd Hafner**, who probably had the edge for the starting nod at QB, injured his knee and will most likely miss the entire '91 campaign after reconstructive surgery. Sophomore **Brian Hutchins**, PSU's starting punter and third-string quarterback last year, will have the opportunity to direct the Pitt State veer attack. At 6-0, 176 pounds, Hutchins is an excellent runner with good speed, and he has a strong arm.

"I have total confidence in Brian," said Kill. "He improved a great deal this spring, and with the athletes and experience he'll have around him, I'm certain he can get the job done."

With no other returning QB's on the roster, Hutchins' back-up will most likely be a true freshman. Highly touted **Jeff Moreland**, who threw for over 2,600 yards at Blue Springs (MO) High School, or **Johnny Bilby** from Sapulpa (OK) High School look to develop quickly.

HARLON HILL AWARD

Ronnie West, a 6-2, 215-pound wide receiver/kick returner, will be one of the leading candidates for the 1991 Harlon Hill Award presented to the top player in NCAA Division II.

West earned first-team Kodak All-America honors as a wide receiver as a junior, and also was voted the MIAA Newcomer of the Year by league coaches. Professional scouts feel he is one of the top prospects in the nation because of his size strength and speed.

Including playoff games, West compiled 2,070 all-purpose yards and scored 18 TDs in his first collegiate season. As a receiver, he led the Gorillas in catches (49 for 1026 yards; 20.9 ypc). As a return specialist, West led the nation in punt return average (16.9 ypr) and he was second in Division II in kickoff returns (29.8 ypr).

In the semifinal playoff game at North Dakota State, West had a career-high 8 receptions for 189 yards and 2 TD's. He had a total of 14 receptions for 291 yards and 4 TD's in three playoff games. His regular season receiving yardage (735) was the second highest season total in PSU history.

Shad Klinge, a 5-7, 165-pound sophomore, had a very solid freshman campaign backing up West last year, playing in all 13 games. He'll see action once again in '91.

NATION'S FINEST TANDEM

Pitt State's backfield tandem of senior **Darren Dawson** and junior **Ronald Moore** could be the best set of backfield mates in the nation, and it's possible they're the best duo since Johnny Bailey and Heath Sherman set NCAA-II records for Texas A&I before beginning NFL careers.

Dawson and Moore were the only NCAA Division II tandem to eclipse 1,000 yards each last year, and both were unanimous first-team All-MIAA selections.

Dawson, a 6-1, 195-pound senior who runs a 4.48 in the 40, is a slashing tailback who is very dangerous on the perimeter. He went over the 1,000-yard mark for the second straight season last year, gaining 1170 yards on just 150 carries (7.8 ypc) during regular season action. He added a pair of 100-yard rushing performances in the playoffs for a 13-game total of 1415 yards on 196 carries.

Dawson earned third-team All-American honors from *Football Gazette*.

As a sophomore in 1989, Dawson gained 1184 yards in 11 regular season games, giving him 2354 yards rushing in two seasons as a running back -- he played defense as a freshman. He has a career average of 112.1 yards per game, the best in school history, and 7.85 yards per carry. His 2,354 yards rank fourth on PSU's all-time list.

Moore, a 5-10, 207-pound powerhouse would rather go through defenders than around them. He has the strength to break tackles then uses his 4.5 speed once he breaks free.

Moore needed 192 yards in the 1990 season finale to go over the 1,000-yard mark for his sophomore season. He gained a career-high 205 yards (on only 19 carries) to finish with 1013 yards on 159 carries (6.37 ypc) in 10 regular season games.

"I don't know if they're the best pair of running backs in the nation," said Kill. "But if they aren't, I wouldn't want to play against the team who has the best, 'cause Moore and Dawson are pretty darn good."

NOT JUST TWO DEEP

PSU has excellent support at running back to go along with Dawson and Moore.

Junior running backs **Don Tolar** (5-10, 200) and **Craig Jordan** (5-10, 200) both

gained good experience as key reserves last year, and sophomore **Joey Tobin** (5-9, 205) is back after knee surgery ended his 1990 season after just three games. All three will see more action in 1991.

Including two playoff games, Tolar gained a total of 131 yards on 30 carries (4.37 ypc) with 1 TD, while Jordan picked up 66 yards on 20 carries (3.3 ypc). Tobin gained 40 yards on 10 tries in three games.

EXPERIENCED LINE LEADS WAY

Five of seven starters up front return for PSU, and all five players earned some form of All-Conference recognition last year. However, the Gorillas have to replace their anchor, second-team All-American **Tim Sinclair**, and strong tight end **Jody Truit**. Both players were two-time first-team All-MIAA selections.

"Replacing Sinclair was my greatest concern entering spring ball," said Kill. "Everyone talks about the quarterback situation, but our center position is extremely important to our offense."

Doug Bullard, a 6-2, 278-pound sophomore will most likely be PSU starting center this year. He is big and strong and should continue improve with experience in a starting role this year.

The rest of the group of returning linemen is solid, and several newcomers in the fall should provide better depth than PSU had a year ago.

Seniors **Kendall Gammon** (6-6, 280) and **Brian Hooyer** (6-3, 300) have started the past two years in the interior line, while **Brian Pinamonti**, (6-2, 225) is a returning two-year starter at tight end.

Gammon earned first-team All-MIAA the past two seasons - in '89 at tackle and in '90 at guard -- while Hooyer was a first-team selection as a tackle in '89 and was a second-team pick last year. Pinamonti was a third-team All-MIAA pick as a junior.

Senior **Jeff Mudhenke** (6-5, 305) and junior **Mike Brockel** (6-1, 267) earned starting spots last year and return in 1991 as well. Mudhenke earned second-team All-MIAA honors last year, while Brockel was a third-team pick by the league coaches. Mudhenke missed spring football after knee surgery in February, but should be ready.

Letterwinner **Andy Kesinger** (6-2, 280) should see considerable action this year, and PSU signed six or seven huge linemen between 270 and 305 pounds who should

provide depth.

Scott Lutz, a 6-3, 235-pound transfer from Butler CC will challenge returning letterwinners **Todd Fry**, a 6-2, 228-pound junior and **Paul Sparkman**, a 6-1, 228-pound sophomore for playing time at the other tight end position.

"Overall, I think this year's offense has the opportunity to be better than last year's," said Kill. "Everyone is a year older and has a full year playing together in the same system. Our quarterback will have a mature group of veterans around him which takes a lot of the pressure off."

THE PSU DEFENSE

Like Pitt State's offense, the Gorilla defense also has a talented and experienced group of returnees leading the charge in '91.

Chuck Broyles will have eight or nine starters back from last year's unit that was nationally ranked in points allowed (13.4 ppg; 8th in NCAA Division II), rushing defense (116.5 ypg; 20th) and total defense (258.3 ypg; 13th). PSU led the conference in all three statistical categories.

"We have an experienced group of talented athletes back, but we also lost two great players in Darryl Wren and Ira McMillian," said Broyles, who serves as PSU's defensive coordinator. "I don't think we have any glaring weaknesses on defense. Overall you won't see many changes in the lineup other than us playing without Darryl and Ira."

DEFENSIVE LINE DEEP

Highlighted by the return of a pair of first-team All-MIAA defensive ends, PSU's front four should be solid again in 1991.

Phil McCoy, a 6-2, 240-pound senior, had a great second half of the season last year and earned first-team All-MIAA, while PSU's other bookend, 6-4, 220-pound junior **Troy Wilson**, was selected first-team All-MIAA at defensive end as a sophomore.

1991 Pittsburg State Outlook

Wilson, who also earned honorable mention All-American honors from *Football Gazette*, led PSU in QB sacks during the regular season with eight, then McCoy took over in the playoffs, getting five in three games. Wilson was third on the team last year in total tackles with 91 stops in 13 games. McCoy had 52 total tackles.

At tackle, 6-2, 250-pound senior **Ky Kiger**, a second-team All-MIAA pick last season, and 6-1, 270-pound sophomore **Chris Hanna**, an honorable mention All-MIAA selection as a freshman, lead the way. Kiger is one of PSU's strongest players, with a bench press of 430 pounds and a squat of 705, while Hanna is an imposing force as well.

Several other players are expected to play key roles up front for PSU's defense this year. At defensive end, 6-1, 235-pound sophomore **Derek Blackburn** is an intense competitor who had an excellent freshman year. At defensive tackle, 6-4, 260-pound senior **Kent Winder** and 6-3, 255-pound senior **Kline Minniefield** also return after solid seasons in 1990.

LINEBACKERS ALSO DEEP

PSU returns a solid corp of linebackers both inside and outside in 1991.

Leading the inside backers is 5-11, 223-pound senior **Shane Tafoya**, who has been named a pre-season All-America by several publications, and 6-3, 220-pound junior **Lance Gosch**.

Tafoya earned first-team All-MIAA honors as a junior after leading PSU in tackles during both the regular season (84) and playoffs (23). Tafoya had a team-leading nine tackles for losses, and also earned second-team All-American honors from *Football Gazette*. Gosch started along side Tafoya most of last season, making a total of 59 tackles in 13 games.

Junior **Kris Mengarelli** (5-11, 230) also has been a spot starter during the past two seasons, while **Kevin Crane**, a 5-9, 200-pound sophomore had a solid freshman year. Mengarelli made a total of 41 tackles in 13 games last year, while Crane had 19 stops total mainly as a special teams player.

At outside linebacker, 6-1, 218-pound senior **Jamie Goodson** has been a two-year starter on the strong side, while 6-0, 210-pound senior **Michael Rose** shared starting time on the other side in 1990.

Goodson, a three-year letterwinner at PSU, earned second-team All-MIAA honors last year. He was fourth on the PSU team in tackles (67) during the regular season and added 16 more stops in the playoffs. Goodson has returned two interceptions for TD's during his career.

Rose made 48 stops in 10 regular seasons contests last year, including five tackles for losses. He added 13 more tackles in the playoffs.

SECONDARY LOOKS TO REGROUP

With the loss of two of the best defensive backs in the MIAA, corner **Darryl Wren** and free safety **Ira McMillian**, the PSU secondary looks to regroup in 1991.

"The personality of our defense will change a little without Wren and McMillian," said Broyles. "We won't have the luxury of having Wren's speed or Ira's hitting ability, but overall we should be pretty solid because everyone else is back."

Senior **Michael Wilber** (5-10, 183), a three-year letterwinner, will probably replace McMillian at free safety, while 6-0, 195-pound junior **Joel Thornton** should return as a starting cornerback. The other two spots are pretty much wide open.

Wilber earned a starting spot at free safety as a sophomore in '88, before a knee injury forced him to miss the '89 campaign. Last year, he backed up McMillian, making 29 tackles in eight regular season games and six stops in the playoffs. Thornton, who runs a 4.4 in the 40-yard dash, started every game at corner last year, and could see some action at outside linebacker this spring. He made 42 tackles during the regular season and 17 tackles in the playoffs.

Several players look to improve their status in the PSU secondary this spring. Junior **Duke Palmer** (5-10, 182) returns after missing the '90 campaign after knee surgery. Palmer started part of the '89 season, playing in every game at either corner and safety. Sophomore returnee **Bob Tavernaro** (5-9, 173) and redshirt freshman **Steve Kyler** (5-10, 165) will challenge for playing time at cornerback, while several other players battle for playing time including: senior **John Black** (5-10, 180), sophomore **Edgar Blackmon** (5-5, 155) and red-shirt freshmen **Brian Carson** (6-0, 185), who has been clocked in 4.45 in the 40-yard dash, and **Chris Wilkerson** (5-8, 167). Newcomer **Eric Perks** (5-10, 170), a transfer from Itawamba (MS) Junior College could make an immediate impact.

KICKING GAME

Senior **James Jenkins** will be PSU's placekicker again this season, while sophomore **Brian Hutchins** returns as PSU's punter.

Jenkins had an outstanding year last season. Including playoff games, Jenkins converted 12 of 14 field goals, and he made 63 of 67 PAT's. He did not miss a kick in the playoffs (five field goals, 17 extra points).

With 22 career field goals, Jenkins is tied for the PSU career lead. His 121 successful PAT's in 133 attempts also are the most in PSU history. With 18 successful extra points during his senior season, Jenkins will break the current NCAA Division II record for career extra points (138, set by Jim Trueman of Edinboro, PA).

Hutchins also had a solid '90 campaign as the team's only punter. He averaged 36.4 yards per punt during the regular season and 32.6 yards per punt in the playoffs.

Pittsburg State has qualified for post-season play 11 times in the 83-year history of the football program, highlighted by nine appearances in national playoff competition.

In 1957, the Gorillas captured the first of two NAIA National Championships under Coach Carnie Smith, completing a perfect 11-0 campaign with a 27-26 victory over Hillsdale College in the Holiday Bowl at St. Petersburg, Fla. In 1961, Smith led PSU to another NAIA National Title with a 12-7 win over Linfield College at the Camellia Bowl in Sacramento, Calif.

In 1981, the Gorillas returned to the NAIA National Championship game under Coach Ron Randleman, but PSU's bid for its third NAIA national crown came up short as Pitt State fell to Elon College of North Carolina, 3-0 on a frozen field.

In 1985 under Coach Dennis Franchione, the Gorillas qualified for the NAIA playoffs once again, but lost a first-round contest. Pitt State reached the semifinals the next three seasons, but each year, PSU's quest for a national crown ended in bitter defeat.

In 1989, PSU made the transition from the NAIA to the NCAA Division II ranks. The Gorillas won their first NCAA-II playoff game, a 28-7 victory over MIAA rival Northwest Missouri, before falling to Angelo State of Texas, 24-21 in the NCAA quarterfinals.

PSU returned to the NCAA playoffs in 1990, posting impressive home wins over Northeast Missouri (59-3) and East Texas State (60-28), before falling to eventual national champion North Dakota State, 39-29 in a thrilling semifinal game.

The Gorillas have compiled a 9-5 record in seven NAIA playoff appearances, and a 3-2 mark in the NCAA Division II playoffs for a combined 12-7 record in playoff competition. PSU is 10-3 at home in the playoffs, and 2-4 on the road. PSU's only two road playoff wins were in championship games in 1957 and 1961.

PSU has played in three post-season bowl games, the '50 Shrine Bowl, the '79 Boot Hill Bowl, and the '80 Moila Shrine Bowl.

Chuck Broyles, Head Football Coach



In his first season as a college head football coach, Chuck Broyles led Pittsburg State to the semifinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs and a 12-1 overall mark.

The achievements of the 1990 Gorillas were many.

The team matched the school record for victories, won the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association title, and extended the nation's longest regular season winning streak to 55 games.

But Broyles' first team will most likely be remembered for the near-upset of eventual national champion North Dakota State.

About the only thing that Broyles, the co-recipient of the MIAA Coach of the Year honor last season, can do for an encore is lead Pitt State to a berth in the '91 national championship game.

"Chuck and his staff did a great job last year," said PSU Athletic Director Bill Samuels, a Gorilla assistant coach for more than 20 years. "Expectations here at Pittsburg State are always high, and last year's team more than exceeded those expectations."

Following in the footsteps of the winningest football coach (based on percentage) in Pitt State history, Dennis Franchione, Broyles quickly established his own identity as PSU's head coach.

"I believe the only way you can be successful as a player or coach is through hard work," Broyles said. "But at the same time, I try to run a fun program. I want everyone to enjoy their work and the success they achieve."

Broyles became head football coach at Pittsburg State after serving as the Gorillas' assistant head coach and defensive coordinator the previous two years. In addition to coaching responsibilities, Broyles also has additional administrative duties as Pittsburg State's associate director of athletics.

Broyles came to Pitt State from the University of Missouri-Rolla, where he served as the Miners' defensive coordinator from

1974-1983, and again during the 1986 and '87 seasons. At Rolla, Broyles helped guide the Miners to a share of the MIAA title in 1977, and the outright conference championship and an undefeated season in 1980. UMR also shared the MIAA title in 1983, just after Broyles left the program to become the defensive coordinator at Miami High School in Miami, Okla., where he served for three years (1983-85). Broyles also was the head baseball coach at Rolla from 1974-83 and at Miami High School.

For the past three years, Broyles has directed a PSU defense that has been ranked among the best in the nation.

Last year's unit was eighth in NCAA Division II statistics in points allowed (13.4 ppg), 13th in total defense (258.3 ypg), and 20th in rushing defense (116.5 ypg). At one point last season, PSU's defense held the opposition scoreless in nine straight quarters and 14 of 15 quarters. In Pitt State's first season of NCAA-II competition in 1988, the Gorillas' were ranked sixth in scoring defense (11.1 ppg), and ninth in total defense (233.1 ypg).

In 1980, Broyles' defense at Missouri-Rolla was one of the best in the county, allowing just 34.6 yards per game on the ground, tops among NCAA Division II schools. The 1980 UMR defense forced an incredible 7.2 turnovers per game.

Broyles was an eight-man football standout at Mulberry High School, before continuing his playing career at PSU. He played both offensive and defensive line for the Gorillas, earning four varsity letters under Coach Carnie Smith. As a senior captain in 1968, Broyles earned NAIA All-American honorable mention honors at defensive tackle, and he was selected PSU's most outstanding player. Broyles earned a free agent tryout with the NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers the next year.

Chuck completed his bachelor's degree in education at PSU in 1970 while serving as a student coach, and earned a master's degree as a graduate assistant in 1972-73. After a year as head football and track coach at Stockton High School in Missouri, he accepted his first full-time college coaching position at Rolla in 1973.

Chuck is married to the former Helen Ellwood of Cameron, Mo. They live in rural Pittsburg with their three sons, Scott 17, Kyle 12, and Mark 11.

(The following interview between PSU Head Football Coach Chuck Broyles and PSU Sports Information Director Shawn Ahearn took place on July 11, exactly one month before PSU's players reported for fall camp)

What are some of the biggest differences this year compared to your first season as head coach? Our coaching staff returns intact this year, so we should all be a little more comfortable. Our coaches know exactly what they have to do to get the job done, so our organization should be better. It helps having the same coaches back so the players don't have to adjust. Everyone knows exactly what's expected, the commitment it takes to get the job done.

Could you talk a little more about the commitment of your coaching staff? I'm really fortunate to have some extremely dedicated coaches working with me. All of our coaches are extremely loyal and hard-working, willing to do whatever it takes to get the job done. I think our coaching staff has earned respect. We had over 160 coaches here for our clinic, and members of our staff have been speakers at various clinics around the country. I think our players respect our coaches and enjoy playing for them.

Let's talk a little about your players. For the most part, we try to recruit talented players who are willing to work hard and know what it takes to win. One thing that is so special about our football program is that our older players take care of and teach our younger players. From the first day a new player joins our program, they learn from the example our older players set. Our younger players see the work ethic on the practice field, in the classroom, in the weight room. They quickly learn how important being a part of the campus and community is to our program.

Why does PSU have such an outstanding tradition? Loyalty. When I'm asked what's so special about Pitt State football, the only way I can describe it is that it's an honor to be a Gorilla. There's only one group of Gorillas and that's here at Pittsburg State, and Gorillas stick together. Our football lettermen are so supportive of our program that you feel honored to be a part of that group. Our lettermen play such a key role in our success, not only through their financial contributions, but by attending games home and away and through other ways they support us.

Could you talk about the pressure of continuing the PSU tradition? There's always going to be pressure to win at Pittsburg State. This year is the 30th reunion of the 1961 national championship team. We've had some great teams since then, teams that have earned a special place in the history of Pitt State Football. But, no one has won it all. And until we do, the players, coaches and fans won't be satisfied. But the pressure can be good in the sense that it creates a situation where you strive for more than just a winning season, more than a conference championship or playoff berth. Expectations can motivate you to achieve great things.

Since you mentioned playoffs and competing for a national title, could we take one last look at the 1990 Gorillas? We couldn't have scripted last season any better. Last year's team got better and better each week, and going into the playoffs, we felt we could play with anyone in the nation. When the playoff brackets

were announced, we saw we'd have to beat North Dakota State to reach the championship game. They're the class of Division II football, and we would have liked to have seen them in the other bracket and met them in Alabama.

But, we beat two very good football teams and earned a trip to Fargo, and I couldn't have been prouder of the way we played. The team earned a lot of respect, not only as one of the best in PSU history, but on the national level as well.



Some of that respect from last year is coming in the form of high pre-season national rankings this year. What does that mean to you? It's exciting to pick up a magazine and be ranked No. 1 or near the top. The attention we receive comes from running a first-class program. A lot of times we don't give ourselves the credit we deserve. National recognition I think is a token of respect. But, the bottom line is you don't win championships on paper, or because of last year's performance.

How significant is Darryl Wren's selection in the NFL Draft to your program? It's an honor to have a player drafted in the third round, and hopefully that will help our recruiting. Darryl is a great example of what our program did for a young man. He came here as a 155-pound kid who could barely bench press 180 pounds. He left here weighing 187 pounds and bench-pressing 300. He also developed and matured as a person, and earned a degree. But he's only one of many good players we have in our program, and the interest he generated should help some of our other players. All 28 NFL teams were on campus last year looking at game films and evaluating players, and most said they'd be back this year.

You touched on Darryl's academic success, could you elaborate on the program's commitment to academics? We try to do everything we can to give our players the best chance to earn a degree. We're striving for a 100% graduation rate whether you're an NFL prospect or a scout team player. We have a tremendous support system in place led by a full-time academic advisor. We have mandatory study halls for any player below a 2.5 GPA, and an excellent academic enhancement program for new players. And again our older players are committed to helping our younger players adapt to college life as an athlete and in the classroom.

What makes PSU Football so special? There are so many people who are very sincere and caring about what we're doing. We're so fortunate to have a supportive administration led by President Wilson, who is our No. 1 fan. He has a proper perspective of academics and the role intercollegiate athletics plays in the college experience. Our fans want to see us win, but not at all costs. Our program is built on integrity and loyalty, and is part of an excellent university. The people associated with our program make it great.

Coaching Staff

Tim Beck Linebackers Coach

Tim Beck begins his third season as a full-time assistant football coach at Pitt State, after serving as a graduate assistant coach at PSU for two years.

Beck worked with defensive ends, tight ends, and receivers as a GA, before concentrating primarily on the linebacking corps for the first time last season. He was named a full-time assistant during the summer of 1989, after completing work on his master's degree at PSU.

Beck was a two-year football letterwinner at Pitt State, playing defensive back for the Gorillas from 1985-86. He was a team captain as a senior in 1986, and his playing honors included two seasons on the CSIC All-Conference team, and one year on the NAIA District 10 team. He was also a recipient of the Carnie Smith Scholarship. Beck played football at Dodge City Community College for two years, before joining the Gorilla program.

In addition to his coaching duties, Beck has taught classes on coaching football, and he works closely with the PSU football camps and clinics. Tim was married to the former Gina Thomas of Altamont, Kan., this past June.

Jerry Kill Offensive Coordinator

Jerry Kill is in his second season as Pittsburg State's offensive coordinator, and fifth year as an assistant football coach at PSU. Last year, he directed a Gorilla offense that was ranked second among NCAA Division II schools in rushing yards per game (325.2 ypg), third in scoring (41.5 ppg) and fifth in total offense (451.4 ypg).

Kill rejoined the PSU coaching staff in January of 1990 after leading Webb City High School to the Missouri Class 4A State Championship. Webb City compiled a perfect 14-0 overall record en route to the state title, and Kill was named the 1989 Missouri State Coach of the Year. The Cardinals were 25-1 during his two seasons as head coach.

Prior to his tenure at Webb City, Kill served as an assistant coach at Pittsburg State for three years (1985-88) under former PSU head coach Dennis Franchione. He attended Southwestern College, where he played football under Franchione, earning a bachelor's degree in 1983. He coached at Southwestern the following year, served as an assistant football coach at Midwest City High School during the 1984-85 season, then joined Franchione's staff at PSU in 1985.

Jerry is a native of Cheney, Kan. He is married to the former Rebecca Smith of Liberal, Kan. They have two daughters, Krystal Nicole, 3, and Tasha Marie, who was born in January.

Fred Redd Offensive Line Coach

Fred Redd enters his second season as offensive line coach at PSU, after serving as head football coach at Springfield Catholic High School for two years. He guided Springfield Catholic to a pair of conference titles and two district crowns as head coach, while Springfield Catholic compiled a 29-1 regular season record his last three years.

Redd has over 15 years of football coaching experience at the collegiate and high school level. He was an assistant coach along with PSU head coach Chuck Broyles at Missouri-Rolla from 1976-79, and later served as offensive coordinator at Central Methodist College (1985-86). He also was a defensive assistant at the United States Military Academy, West Point from 1969-72, and he has held a variety of teaching and administrative positions.

Redd was born in Kansas City, Missouri, and attended Westport High School. He played football at Southwest Missouri State University from 1957-60. Upon graduation, he served in U.S. Army for 20 years, earning many medals for his tours of duty in Vietnam, Germany and Japan. Redd attained the rank of Regular Army Major.

Redd earned a master's degree in education at Central Missouri State University in May of 1969, and has earned additional graduate credits in education from Southwest Missouri State. Fred and his wife, Donna, have two sons, Jeffrey, 25, and Matthew, 24.

Anton Stewart Defensive Line Coach

Anton Stewart begins his third season as a full-time assistant football and track coach at Pittsburg State, after serving the PSU football and track programs for four seasons as a student assistant coach.

Stewart assumed full responsibility for coaching the defensive line in 1989, in addition to serving as the athletic department's NCAA eligibility compliance officer. He also will help monitor the academic progress of PSU student-athletes as part of the athletic department's enhancement program. Stewart also works closely with various PSU camps, and he was a featured speaker at the College Football Association coaches convention in New Orleans this past January.

During Stewart's tenure at PSU, the Gorillas' have been nationally ranked in several defensive categories each year, highlighted by the top scoring defense in the nation in 1987, allowing just 7.9 points per game. Last season, all four of PSU's starting defensive linemen earned some form of all-conference honors.

Stewart was an All-American offensive lineman under former PSU coach Dennis Franchione at Southwestern (KS) College, and he also competed on the track and field team as a thrower. As a football player, Stewart was a two-year All-Conference performer and an NAIA All-District 10 selection.

Anton earned his bachelor's degree at PSU in 1989. He is single and lives in Pittsburg.



John Johnson
Strength & Conditioning Coach

John Johnson enters his sixth year as Pittsburg State's strength and conditioning coach. He also is the director of the PSU Fitness Center located in the Garfield Weede Physical Education Building.

Johnson is primarily responsible for designing and implementing a complete weight training and dietary program for each PSU student-athlete.

Johnson is a 1981 PSU graduate, and a 1976 graduate of Pittsburg High School. Johnson is an AAU and Master Weightlifter who once held the Kansas squat record.



John Pierce
Running Backs

John Pierce is his third season coaching PSU's running backs and second stint as a coach at his alma mater.

Pierce was a three-year letterman on the Gorilla football team from 1976-79 before serving as a student coach at PSU from 1980-83 while earning his bachelor's and master's degrees. He has served as an assistant coach and physical education instructor at Frontenac High School since 1984.

John is married to the former Sunny Gay York of Lawton, Kan. They live in Girard with their three children, Nikki, 6, Timothy, 5, and Cody, 1.



Kenny Crandall
Wide Receivers

After a successful career as a player at Fort Hays State University, Kenny Crandall joins the PSU coaching staff as a graduate assistant this fall.

Crandall will assist with coaching wide receivers, the same position he played at Fort Hays State.

As a player, Crandall caught at least one pass in 21 of his 22 starts. He earned a bachelors degree in education in 1990.



Chris Curtis
Defensive Line

Chris Curtis enters his second season as a graduate assistant coach at PSU. He will assist with coaching the defensive line.

Curtis spent five months in Saudi Arabia as a part of Operation Desert Storm. He served the Marines in a weapons company.

Curtis was a three-year starter and team captain as a senior at Southwest Baptist University graduating in the spring of 1989.

Bill Kroenke
Tight Ends

Bill Kroenke begins his second season as a graduate assistant coach at Pitt State. He will coach PSU's tight ends in 1991.

Kroenke completed a bachelor's degree in education at the University of Arkansas in 1989. He was a three-year letterwinner in football and wrestling at Harrisonville High School, and also earned a pair of letters in track. Harrisonville compiled a three-year record of 30-7, including a state runner-up finish his junior year.

Bill Samuels Athletic Director

On December 6, 1989, Bill Samuels was named Athletic Director at Pittsburg State University after serving as a coach, instructor and athletic administrator at his alma mater for over 23 years.

Samuels spent 33 years coaching football at the collegiate and high school level before deciding to devote his energies toward athletic administration full time in 1987. Prior to his appointment as AD, Samuels served as PSU's associate athletic director for business administration for two years. He was a guiding force in the athletic program's transition from membership in the NAIA, to the program's current affiliation in NCAA Division II and the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Samuels also has been an instrumental part of building a solid athletic booster club, the Pittsburg State Athletic Association, which does most of the fundraising for the Gorilla athletic program.

Samuels earned a bachelor of science degree in education from PSU in 1958, after playing quarterback on Pitt State's 1957 NAIA national championship team. In addition to playing quarterback, Samuels kicked the winning extra point that gave PSU a 27-26 victory over Hillsdale in the title game in the Holiday Bowl in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Upon graduation, Samuels served in the military before returning to PSU to earn a master's degree in education. He was an instructor and coach at Riverton High School for three years, before joining the PSU coaching staff in 1967 under Tom Lester.

In addition to coaching football at PSU for 20 years, Samuels also has been an instructor in the Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Department. Bill is a native of Carthage, Missouri, where he played football for Carthage High School. He and his wife, Frances, have three children. Their daughter, Susan, is a graduate assistant track coach at PSU.



Russ Jewett Assistant Athletic Director

Russ Jewett has served as an Assistant Athletic Director at PSU since the fall of 1987. In addition to serving as PSU's head track and field and cross country coach, his primary duties as an assistant AD lie in the area of game administration for home events.

Jewett recently completed his fifth season as head coach for PSU's women's programs, and fourth year as head coach of the Gorilla men. He led both teams to the 1990 MIAA outdoor track and field championship, ending Southeast Missouri State's impressive string of titles. PSU's women repeated as conference champions this past season and Russ was honored as the MIAA Coach of the Year for the second time.

Jewett earned a bachelor's degree in computer science at PSU in 1983 after earning All-American honors as a decathlete in 1982. Russ' wife, Janice, serves as director of Pittsburg's Parks and Recreation Department.



Dr. David Kendall Academic Counselor

Pittsburg State athletic teams are fortunate to have the services of a full-time academic advisor, Dr. David Kendall. He has served as the academic counselor for athletes since 1982, and has been instrumental in PSU's outstanding reputation for success in the classroom.

Last spring, PSU student athletes earned a 2.9 cumulative grade point average, and 35 student-athletes earned academic honors from the University based on a minimum 3.6 GPA. PSU had more MIAA Scholar Athletes (33) last year than any other conference school. Kendall provides study hall assignments, tutoring service, grade monitoring and scheduling services for all PSU athletes.

Kendall earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees at PSU, and his doctorate in education from the University of Kansas in 1970. Dr. Kendall and his wife, Wanda, are the parents of two children, Dave, who is the head athletic trainer for the Kansas City Chiefs, and Catherine Meindsey.



Steve Bever Assistant Athletic Director

Steve Bever begins his second year as an assistant athletic director at PSU, and he also serves as the Gorillas' head baseball coach. Bever assists with game administration duties at home events, in addition to other administrative jobs in the athletic department.

Bever recently directed the return of Pitt State's baseball program as the Gorillas completed their first season of intercollegiate competition in 18 years last spring. PSU will play their second full season under Bever in 1992. Prior to his appointment as baseball coach, Bever served as PSU's golf coach for three years, leading the Gorillas to a runner-up finish at the 1990 MIAA championships.

Bever played baseball at PSU from 1966-69, earning a bachelor's degree in education. Steve and his wife Johna live in Farlington, along with their two children, Dawn and Gabe, who both attend PSU.



Shawn Ahearn Sports Information Director

Shawn Ahearn begins his third year as Pittsburg State's Sports Information Director.

Ahearn is responsible for a wide range of duties, including: coordinating media coverage of Pitt State's athletic teams, writing, editing and designing PSU's athletic media guides and game programs, maintaining complete results and statistics for all Gorilla sports, and reporting the data to the MIAA and NCAA, supervising press box operations, and assisting with home event management and athletic promotions.

Ahearn earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Clarion University of Pennsylvania in 1985. He served as SID at Chicago State University for three years before joining the PSU staff in July of 1989. He is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America.

Shawn and his wife, Karen, have a daughter, Ashlyn Elizabeth, who was born in January.





Al Ortolani Head Athletic Trainer

Al Ortolani has been the athletic trainer at Pittsburg State for the past 35 years, and he truly is one of the most respected individuals in his profession in the nation. Ortolani also is an associate professor in the health, physical education and recreation department at Pittsburg State.

Ortolani joined the PSU athletic department staff as trainer in 1955, after earning his bachelor's and master's degree in education at PSU. He became a certified trainer shortly after his appointment, and quickly established an outstanding reputation among his peers.

Among numerous honors and accomplishments, Ortolani served as a trainer for the United States at the 1984 and 1976 Olympic Games. In 1982, he was a trainer at the U.S. World Cup in Ecuador, and he also served as the head trainer for the World Championship Games in Romania in 1981. He was the trainer for the U.S. team at the 1979 Pan American games in Puerto Rico, and the 1973 World University Games in the Soviet Union. He also has worked with the U.S. Swim team on several occasions.

Ortolani was PSU's first full-time baseball coach from 1962 to 1966, and was honored as the NAIA District Coach of the Year in 1965. He also has been honored for his contributions to the University, the community and his profession many times. The University is currently exploring the possibility of building an on-campus baseball facility which would be named the Al Ortolani Field.

Al and his wife Virginia are the parents of five children. They live in Pittsburg along with their daughter Jennifer, 22, a member of the PSU athletic training staff.

For the fifth straight year, all Pittsburg State home and away football games can be heard live on KKOW Radio, 860 on the AM dial. Coverage of Gorilla Football on game day will begin with an expanded pre-game show beginning one hour before kickoff.

Veteran sportscaster Tom Van Hoy returned to the Pitt State broadcast booth last year as the Gorillas' play-by-play man. In addition to calling PSU football and basketball games, Van Hoy is the host of KKOW's nightly sports call-in show. He'll be joined in the booth once again by Lynn Meredith, former defensive coordinator at PSU and currently the general manager at KKOW. Tom McNally will once again provide game updates from the sidelines.

As part of KKOW's expanded sports coverage this year, PSU head football coach Chuck Broyles will be Van Hoy's guest Monday evenings on the sports show from 6-6:30 p.m. Local high school coaches also will be featured in the time slot Tuesday through Thursday, with a special four-hour Football Fridays show from 3-7 p.m. leading into high school games each week.

In addition to carrying PSU football games, KKOW also will broadcast all of PSU's men's basketball games this year, and carry several women's basketball games as well. The station also will be a major sponsor of several promotions throughout the football and basketball season, including a pom pon giveaway at the football home opener, a fireworks display following PSU's game on October 5, and tailgate parties before each home game.

KOAM-TV Channel 7

"Home of the Chuck Broyles Show"

For the fourth consecutive year, KOAM-TV Channel 7 will telecast the Pittsburg State Coach's Show, a weekly half-hour television program featuring previews, reviews and feature stories on Pittsburg State Gorilla Football.

The "Chuck Broyles Show" can be seen every week throughout the 1991 season on KOAM. The show will once again be aired late-night on Friday, and again on Saturday. Check local listings for air times.

KOAM-TV sports director Darren Prather will serve as host of the television show once again this year, with sports reporter Jay Radzavicz providing weekly features.

Prather, a graduate of Southwest Missouri State University, has worked at KOAM Sports for the past eight years, serving as sports director for the past six. Radzavicz has been with the TV station for nearly three years.

In addition to airing the Chuck Broyles Show last season, KOAM televised the 1991 NCAA semifinal playoff game between Pitt State and North Dakota State live from Fargo, N.D., with Prather handling play-by-play duties.

The PSU coach's show has received several awards during the past three years. In 1989, the Association of News Broadcasters of Kansas recognized the program for a segment entitled "48 Hours to Gametime."

Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium



The Pittsburg State University football stadium and field, now known as Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium, was built in 1923 with volunteer labor and money donated by students, alumni, faculty and citizens of Pittsburg.

The facility was first named in honor of William Aaron Brandenburg, the first president of the University. In 1987, the University announced that the field would continue to bear the name of PSU's first president, but the stadium would now be called Carnie Smith Stadium in honor of the legendary PSU football coach who led the Gorillas to two NAIA national championships (1957 and 1961) and six conference titles during his tenure from 1949 to 1966.

During the past three years, Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium has undergone over a million dollars worth of renovations, making the stadium one of the finest small college athletic facilities in the nation.

The state-of-the-art August and Helen Rua Press Box was completed in time for the 1989 football season, and PSU hosted its first outdoor track meet on the new polyurethane Prentice Gudgen Track in the spring of 1989. Other parts of the major renovation project included the installation of an electronic message center and scoreboard, a new sound system, new lights, comfortable seating mounted in the bleachers, as well as a new bermuda grass playing surface.

Construction of the facility began with volunteer labor during the summer of 1923, after a successful fund drive raised the necessary \$100,000 to build the stadium. To ensure the stadium would be built in time for the 1924 season, PSU faculty members were required to contribute up to eight hours of labor per week.

On October 11, 1924, the first varsity football game was played between PSU (known as Kansas State Teachers College) and Baker University in front of approximately 4,000 fans. The Gorillas didn't disappoint the many people who worked so hard to build the new facility, earning a 6-0 victory over Baker.

The west stands of the stadium seat 3,600 spectators, and the east stands, added in 1940, seat an additional 2,000 people. The stadium is architecturally notable for the concrete relief over the front entrance, which was sculpted by PSU alumnus Waylande Gregory.

Pitt State Hosts Friends in '91 Opener

No. 2 Gorillas Seek 56th Straight Regular Season Win Today

Welcome to Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium for today's opening game of the 1991 college football season.

Today's contest features the Pittsburg State University Gorillas, one of the top NCAA Division II football programs in the country, and the Falcons of Friends University, a solid NAIA Division II program.

Pitt State, ranked second in the NCAA Division II pre-season football poll last week, is seeking its 56th consecutive regular season victory today. The Gorillas posted a 12-1 overall record last year and advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs after capturing the program's sixth straight conference championship.

Friends University also is coming off an excellent season. The Falcons were 8-2 overall last season and finished as the Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference runner-up with a 7-2 league record.

THE SERIES

Pitt State and Friends have not played each other in football since 1927, when PSU defeated Friends, 33-0. The Gorillas hold a 5-3 series record vs. the Falcons. All three of Friends wins have been shutouts. Here's a look at the PSU/Friends series year-by-year:

THE PSU WINNING STREAK

Pittsburg State is the proud owner of the nation's longest regular season winning streak. A victory today would extend the amazing string of regular season victories to 56 games.

PSU has not lost a regular season contest since the third game of the 1985 season, 41-9 at Emporia State. The Gorillas have put together five perfect regular seasons from 1986-90.

FORMER PSU ALL-AMERICANS COACHING IN TODAY'S GAME

Both head coaches in today's game were All-American football players at Pittsburg State.

Pitt State mentor Chuck Broyles was an NAIA honorable mention All-American as a defensive tackle in 1968. Friends head man Brian Byers was a two-time NAIA All-American at PSU as an offensive tackle, earning second-team honors as a junior in 1977 and first-team accolades as a senior in 1978.

Broyles begins his second year as PSU's head coach after serving as the Gorillas' assistant head coach and defensive coordinator for two seasons. With a one-year record of 12-1, Broyles has the best winning percentage (.923) of any coach in school history.

Broyles' immediate predecessor, Dennis Franchione, compiled a 53-6 overall mark at PSU (.898) in five years.

Broyles served as the defensive coordinator at Missouri-Rolla from 1974-83 and again during the '86 and '87 seasons.

Byers begins his third year at Friends with a 10-10 overall record as a college head coach. After posting a 2-8 record in 1989, Byers reversed the Falcons fate last year, leading a young team to an 8-2 mark. Byers was a graduate assistant coach at PSU in 1980.

QUOTING COACH BROYLES

"We have a lot of respect for their coaches and football program. They had a great season last year and they have a lot of talented players back, several with Division I playing experience. They have several individuals who are as good or better than some of our players.

"Friends will be coming in here as an underdog, but you saw what happened a few years ago when we went down and beat Arkansas State when they were a top Division I-AA program. We need to be focused and ready to play."

QUOTING COACH BYERS

"My biggest concern about playing Pittsburg State is our lack of practice time in pads. We'll only have four days of contact before we play because of our

conference rules. So having some continuity is a big concern. But when we talked about scheduling Pittsburg State with our players, they voted unanimously to play the game.

"We're an experienced team and we've got some good players. We're coming down to play the best we can and try to win the game. If we lose, it's not that big a deal because we're playing a team at a higher level that's one of the best in the country. But we're coming there to win."

THE GORILLA OFFENSE

Jerry Kill begins his second season as PSU's offensive coordinator. Last year, Kill directed a Pitt State offense that was third in the nation in Division II in scoring (41.5 ppg), second in the country in rushing (325.2 ypg) and fourth in total offense (451.4 ypg).

PSU returns eight starters on offense, but the Gorillas must replace three key players, quarterback Jay Padden, who posted a 35-3 record in his three years as PSU starting signal caller, center Tim Sinclair, an All-American last season, and strong tight end Jody Truitt.



Sophomore Brian Hutchins will make his first start as Pitt State's quarterback today. He'll have an experienced and talented unit around him, led by senior wide receiver Ronnie West, the backfield duo of Darren Dawson and Ronald Moore, and a big offensive line.

HARLON HILL CANDIDATE

Pittsburg State has one of the top players in the nation in 6-2, 215-pound senior wide receiver/return specialist Ronnie West, a leading candidate for the Harlon Hill Award -- Division II's version of the Heisman Trophy.

West was one of only three juniors selected first-team Kodak All-American last year. Including playoff games, he piled up 2,070 all-purpose yards and scored 18 TDs last season.

BACKFIELD DUO RETURNS

PSU has one of the nation's top backfield duos in senior tailback Darren Dawson and junior fullback Ronald Moore. Both backs went over 1,000 yards rushing in 10 regular season games in 1990, earning unanimous first-team All-Conference honors.

Dawson rushed for 1,170 yards on only 150 carries (7.8 ypc) in regular season games, and he added a pair of 100-yard performances in the playoffs. Moore gained 205 yards on 19 carries in the season finale to finish the regular season with 1,013 yards rushing.

VETERAN O-LINE PAVES WAY

Four of Pitt State's five interior offensive linemen earned some form of All-Conference recognition last year. Not only is the line experienced, but it is large with an average height and weight around 6-3, 284 pounds.

Seniors Brian Hoover (6-3, 300) and Kendall Gammon (6-6, 280) have started two years at strong tackle and guard, respectively, and both have been first-team All-MIAA selections.

On the quick side, tackle Jeff Mundhenke (6-5, 295) and guard Mike Brockel (6-1, 267) earned starting berths and all-league honors last year. The only newcomer in 1991 is sophomore center Doug Bullard (6-2, 278).

GORILLA "D" GETS TOUGHER

PSU's powerful offense gets most of the headlines, but the Gorilla defense really played well last year and returns eight starters in 1991. Last year's unit was ranked eighth in NCAA Division II in points allowed (13.4 ppg), 13th in total defense (258.3 ypg) and 20th in rushing defense (116.5 ypg). Pitt State led the MIAA in all three categories.

At one point last season, PSU's defense held opponents scoreless in nine consecutive quarters and in 14 of 15.

FRONT EIGHT LEADS CHARGE

Like the Pitt State offensive line, the Gorilla D-line returns four All-MIAA performers from last year. Ends Troy Wilson (6-4, 225) and Phil McCoy (6-2, 240) were both first-team picks. Senior tackle Ky Kiger (6-2, 250) was a second-team selection, while Chris Hanna earned honorable mention as a freshman. Wilson and McCoy have been named to several pre-season All-America teams.

Coach Broyles said, "This may be the best defensive line we've ever had."

PSU's linebackers are solid as well, led by senior Shane Tafoya (6-0, 220), a second-team All-American last year, and junior Lance Gosch (6-3, 220) on the inside and seniors Jamie Goodson (6-1, 218) and Michael Rose (6-0, 216) on the perimeter.

SECONDARY REGROUPING

With the loss of cornerback Darryl Wren, a third round pick by Buffalo in the NFL draft, and free safety Ira McMillen, Pitt State's secondary will look to regroup in 1991.

Junior cornerback Joel Thornton (6-0, 190) is a returning starter, while Michael Wilber (5-10, 183) is a veteran free safety who played behind McMillen. Junior Duke Palmer (5-10, 182) missed last season after knee surgery, but was a part-time starter in 1989. He can play corner or safety. Newcomers Eric Perks (5-10, 160) and Brian Carson (6-0, 185) should challenge.

SCOUTING THE FALCON "O"

Look for Friends to use a wide open offensive attack, often with a single-back formation. The Falcon attack is led by 6-2, 215-pound senior quarterback Will Johnson, who was a first-team All-KCAC pick last year after throwing for 1,662 yards and 9 TDs.

Johnson will probably look for newcomer Kevin Elam, a 6-2, 185-pound transfer from Western Arizona JC, or senior tight end Dan Falk, who made 19 receptions last year.

THE FALCONS ON DEFENSE

Friends returns 10 of 11 defensive starters from a year ago, and there could be some interesting matchups when PSU has the ball. Friends has a very large defensive line going up against a strong PSU offensive line, and the Falcons have a pair of quality defensive backs who will try to shut down PSU's air attack.

Kevin Palmer, a 6-6, 305-pound defensive end, and Bob Lawrence, a 6-2, 250-pound tackle who started two years at Kansas State, lead the line, while juniors Morris Lollar (6-1, 180) and Shawn Jergenson (6-0, 170) lead the secondary. Lollar returned 3 of his 6 pass interceptions for TDs last year and he also averaged 30 yards on kickoff returns with 2 TDs. Jergenson led the team with 8 INTs.

REMATCH NEXT WEEK

Pitt State will play at No. 7 East Texas State in Commerce, Texas, in a rematch of last year's NCAA quarterfinal playoff game won by Pitt State, 60-28.

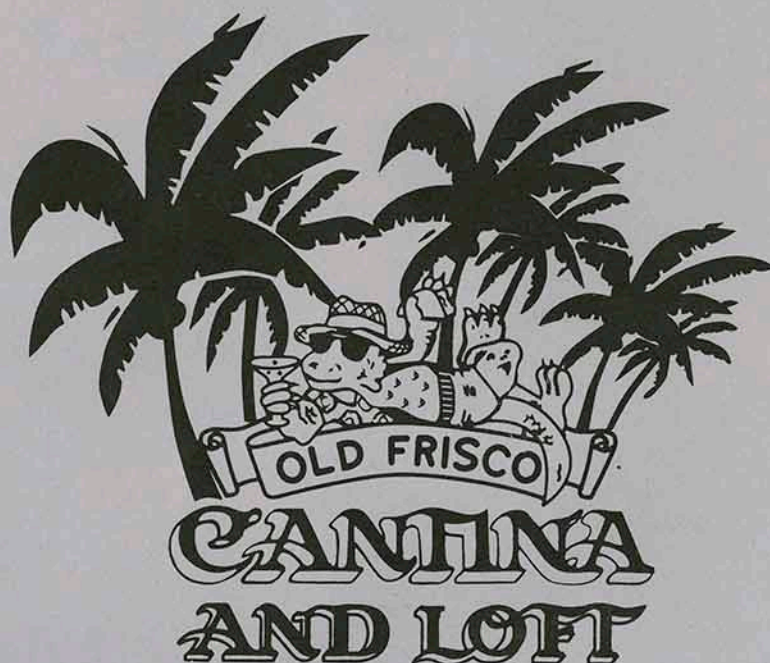

Is Pitt State's West the Best?

Ronnie West is a little embarrassed by all the fuss that is being made over him.

"That sounds good," he said of his status as one of the best players in college football for the upcoming season, "but I have to consider myself the underdog to stay on top. As underdog, you play harder, try harder, work harder."

West is Pittsburg State University's candidate for the Harlon Hill Award, NCAA Division II's equivalent to the Heisman Trophy. He is also rated as the No. 1 wide receiver prospect among the 1991 senior class in all of college football.

"The kid has been the talk of all the scouting meetings the last four months," said Dave Thomas, director of operations for the NFL Draft Bureau. "He is the top-rated receiver in the country among seniors. He's the best-kept secret in football. There are very few flaws in his game. He's a consummate athlete."

"I challenge anybody out there to find a better all-around athlete, especially at the wide receiver position," Thomas added, calling West the best wide receiver prospect to come out of the college ranks since Jerry Rice, now an All-Pro receiver for the San Francisco 49ers.

That's high praise, especially since two wide receivers — Tim Brown and Raghil "Rocket" Ismail of Notre Dame — have won Heismans since Rice came out of Mississippi Valley State.

Just how high is Thomas on West?

"We're talking Pittsburg State," Thomas said. "If we were talking Penn State, we'd be talking Heisman Trophy candidate. He's the best wide receiver to come out (of college) since Jerry Rice. He's the best thing to come out of there (the state of Kansas) since Dorothy."

And it won't be Oz at the end of his yellow brick road. It will be the NFL.

"My feeling is that Ronnie will be a top-15 pick in the first round of the NFL draft," Thomas predicted boldly.

That has taken everyone at Pitt State by surprise.

"I don't know if we're quite sure what kind of talent he is," suggested head coach Chuck Broyles. "You sit there and see him in practice all the time and you feel that he's going to be a pro prospect, but you never know. Maybe he (Thomas) knows something."

"I'm not surprised," said former PSU head coach Dennis Franchione, now head coach at Southwest Texas State. Franchione never got to see West play but he did see him practice for a year after the wide receiver transferred to PSU from Northeastern Oklahoma A&M.

Is West actually Heisman caliber?

"That's pretty strong," Franchione admitted. "It's difficult to say, to compare players at different levels like that. But he's got everything. Great speed, great strength, size, hands. All the things you want."

"I'd like to have him just to return kickoffs and punts. And a wide receiver on top of that. He's such a threat."

Broyles agreed that West has all the tools that a coach could want in a wide receiver.

"He just happens to be a great athlete here at the right time," Broyles said. "The right place at the right time."

The vital statistics on West: He's 6-foot-2, 215 pounds. He runs a 4.5-second 40-yard dash, has a vertical jump of nearly 40 inches and can bench press 370 pounds. This summer, he did 80 pushups in one minute.

"He has all the physical talent necessary — and the mental talent necessary — to be as good as he can be," Broyles said. "But like he'll be the first one to tell you, he's got a lot of work to do. We're talking about a kid who's played one year of college football."

And that Thomas emphasized, is precisely why the NFL scouts are so high on the Pineview, Ga., native.

"The scary part is what is he going to be like in five years?" Thomas asked rhetorically. "The thing I like about him is he's so effortless out there. He does things so easily."

Thomas laughed at the notion that two colleges — Valdosta (Ga.) State and NEO — tried to make West a defensive back.

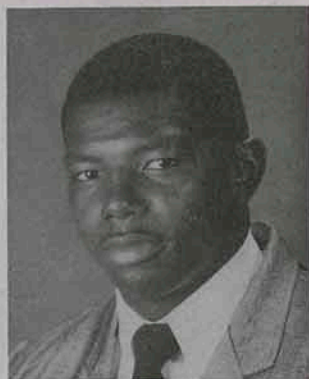
"When you've got a Mona Lisa," he said, "you don't hang it in the garage. You have to show it off."

West got a chance to show off at Pittsburg State last year. He was a first-team Kodak All-American, was voted the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association's newcomer of the year and helped the Gorillas climb into the upper echelon of Division II. Pitt State advanced to the playoff semifinals before losing to eventual champion North Dakota State 39-29. West had eight receptions for 189 yards and two touchdowns in that game at Fargo, N.D.

West accounted for 2,070 all-purpose yards (rushing, receiving and returns) and led Division II players with an average of nearly 17 yards on each punt return. He was second in Division II in kickoff returns, averaging nearly 30 yards a try and had 1,026 receiving yards. He scored 18 touchdowns for the year.

West is being touted as a preseason All-American by nearly every football publication — he even landed on the cover of two of them — and is one of the reasons that Pitt State is being cast as the No. 1 preseason pick in Division II by several experts.

"To the victors go the spoils," Broyles said of West's chances as a Harlon Hill candidate. "The tradition, the winning streak and six conference championships all help. Now they say 'Boy, I wonder who one of their best players is.' And if Ronnie West wasn't here, they might be picking Darren Dawson as a possible Harlon Hill winner. And if not Darren Dawson, maybe Ronald Moore."

"Surely, they've won 55 games, there's got to be a player or two there," Broyles added. "That's just the way it is. You don't get to be an All-American on a 2-8 team."

PSU Sports Information Director Shawn Ahearn noted that last year's Harlon Hill winner, quarterback Chris Simdorn of North Dakota State, won the award after leading the Bison into the national championship game. And he also pointed out that All-American honors are usually bestowed on players from winning programs."

"Jason Agee was a first-team All-American when Northwest (Missouri State) made the playoffs," Ahearn said. "They went 2-8-1 last year and he wasn't an All-American any more."

West is trying to take all the attention in stride.

"I'm not going to think about it. I'm just going to try to do my best," he said. "You know, any receiver is going to say that they're the best to stay on top. Every receiver wants to stay on top. But if you get a big head and think you're better than anyone else, pretty soon you get knocked down off the top."

West won't say whether the Harlon Hill Award is one of his goals for the 1991 season. In fact, he won't say anything at all about his personal targets.

"I like to keep my goals to myself," he said. "First of all, I set my goals. I'll be disappointed to myself if I don't reach them, not my teammates. The only goal I have for my team is to win the national championship."

West said the team should come before the individual, even if the individual is attracting attention from professional scouts before the season has begun.

"I guess I'm just more of a team player than anything," he said. "Whatever's best for the team is best for me."

And as a team player, he's quick to share his accolades with others.

"I'm crazy about the offensive line," he said with a grin. "If it doesn't start from the line, I would never get the ball. That's what makes it happen for me."

"If I had a chance, I'd take them out to dinner every day."

The way Dave Thomas is talking, West will get that opportunity next year.



Fate Brings Football Star to PSU

If it were not for the U.S. Army Reserves, Ronnie West might have never attended Pittsburg State University. Were it not for as broken collarbone he inflicted upon another player, he might not have ever left his home state of Georgia in the first place.

A few strange circumstances — call it fate if you will — led Ronnie West to the football program at Pittsburg State University. He enters his senior season as one of the top-rated wide receivers in the country according to many National Football League scouts.

West's football career began at Pineview, Ga., where he was a high school standout as a wide receiver and defensive back. He was an all-conference selection, catching 65 passes for 1,137 yards to earn a spot in Georgia's North-South All-Star Game.

He was recruited as a defensive back, but really didn't want to play that position. "I like offense a little better," he said.

But he had another reason for wanting to be a wideout.

"Playing defensive back in high school, I hit a quarterback and broke his collarbone and the bone came out of his shoulder," he said, shuddering a bit at the memory. "I didn't want to play defensive back after that."

He was worried that he might hurt other players as a defensive back, even though Valdosta State, an NCAA Division II school in Georgia, recruited him to play in the secondary. Eventually, he realized that the injury was just part of football.

"It took about a year to get over that," he said. "I guess that's why I didn't play (at Valdosta State). I got over that. If the opportunity came again for me to play defensive back, I would play."

PSU head coach Chuck Broyles has no intentions of moving West from offense to defense. Broyles is just thankful that he has West on either side of the football.

West left Valdosta State for Northeastern Oklahoma A&M, a junior college in Miami. But there he again was faced with becoming a defensive back and, because of his late transfer to the school, wasn't eligible to play for the Norsemen.

He sought relief from the U.S. Army, signing up in the reserves as a member of the 1010th Service and Supply Co. based in Pittsburg.

"I was getting ready to play (at NEO) but left and went to the service," West recalled. "From the service I came back to Pittsburg. I just came here to join the reserves. I didn't know about the place. I didn't know where the place was. I just wanted to join the reserves."

He said once he discovered Pittsburg and found that the city had a university, he inquired about the football program and his chances of joining it.

"I just wanted to come to school and try out for the football team," he said, adding that his first contact with Pitt State was through assistant coach Tim Beck.

"He was living in a house in Quapaw," Beck said. "He had a friend down there who told us about him."

Broyles said that West might have gotten lost in the shuffle at NEO. "He can come here and be our best wide receiver where he might not have been their best wide receiver or gotten that chance," Broyles said.

1991 Lion Outlook

The Lions are on a mission in 1991 to win their second straight Lone Star Conference championship and contend for the NCAA Division II national title again as well. ETSU, ranked in the top five in most pre-season polls, will have an opportunity to avenge a 60-28 loss to Pittsburg State in the quarterfinals of last year's NCAA playoffs in its first home game. Under the direction of coach Eddie Vowell, ETSU returns nine starters and an All-Conference placekicker on offense. Quarterback Bob Bounds, who broke ETSU's single season total offense mark with 2,103 yards, returns to lead the Lion attack. Placekicker Billy Watkins broke the ETSU kick scoring mark last year with 76 points, and was the LSC Freshman of the Year. The Lions look strong again on defense, led by a secondary that was one of the best in the country. All-America cornerback Eric Turner, who lead NCAA II with 10 interceptions in 1990, and All-LSC strong safety Jimmy Hooker, who had eight INTs lead the defense. The line will be anchored by noseguard Micah Haley, a second team All-LSC pick.

Emporia State will begin its first season of MIAA competition this fall, as the Hornets are reunited with four rivals from the old Central States Intercollegiate Conference. Emporia will still be eligible for the NAIA playoffs this year, as the ESU athletic program completes its final year of dual membership in the NAIA and NCAA Division II. Head coach Larry Kramer begins his ninth season at Emporia State. Kramer's teams have qualified for the NAIA national playoffs three of the past four seasons, including an appearance in the NAIA national championship game in 1989. Offensively, the Hornets will be lead by TB Quincy Tillmon, who was thrust into the starting lineup during the sixth game last season when All-American Alvester Bobby went down with a foot injury. Tillmon rushed for 780 yards on 147 carries. ESU has some gaps to fill on defense with the loss of NAIA All-Americans Leon Lott and Matt Koehler. DT Karl Burrell will anchor the Hornets defensive line.

1991 Ichabod Outlook

Washburn closed out its 1990 season by winning three of its last four games and the Ichabods hope to continue the momentum into the 1991 campaign. Dennis Caryl returns as the permanent head coach this season after serving as interim head coach for the Ichabods last season. The key to Washburn's success last year was a strong defense, and six starters return from the defensive unit which was ranked third in the conference in total defense last season. Leading the returnees is linebacker Todd McGhghy, who earned first-team All-MIAA honors and was named the team's MVP last year after leading WU in tackles (9.7 avg.). Also returning are third-team defensive end Mike Barnhill and HM defensive back Kevin Marshall. The workhouse in the Ichabods' run-dominated offense will again be running back Greg Lane. Lane earned third-team All-MIAA honors in 1990, leading Washburn with 758 yards on 178 carries. Other third-team All-MIAA honorees returning to Coach Caryl's team include punter Alan Kaniper and center David Hurst.

1991 Mule Outlook

Despite losing leading rusher Mark Brown (969 yds., 7TDs) to graduation, the Mules may run the ball even more in 1991. Head coach Terry Noland, in his ninth season, is counting heavily on junior college transfer Marcus Frazier to put the Mules back into MIAA title contention. Frazier, from Taft (CA) JC, helped his team to an 8-1 regular season and a win over top-ranked Bakersfield JC in a bowl game. Noland also has a handful of other talented runners returning, led by sophomore Henry Caldwell (437 yds., 5 TDs). The Mules return their interior offensive line intact, but must replace their top three receivers. On defense, the Mules return seven starters, including leading tacklers Greg Sloan and Joe Grubb, from a unit that ranked 18th in Division II scoring defense and 20th in total defense. The Mules have to replace MIAA defensive player-of-the-year Mike Glass at tackle and three-time All-MIAA performer Mark Peoples at cornerback.

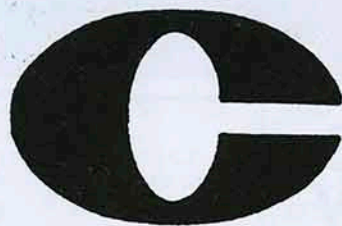

The Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association is a 12-member conference of schools located in Missouri and Kansas which compete at the NCAA Division II level. First organized as a 14-member league in 1912, the MIAA has undergone several changes during the past decade, highlighted by expansion and increased participation in national championship competition.

In 1924, the league included only the five regional state colleges in Missouri: Central Missouri State, Northeast Missouri State, Northwest Missouri State, Southeast Missouri State, and Southwest Missouri State. In 1935, the MIAA added what is now known as the University of Missouri-Rolla, with Lincoln University joining the league in 1970. Ten years later, the University of Missouri-St. Louis joined the conference, while Southwest Missouri State withdrew from the league following the 1980-81 season to seek NCAA Division I status. Southwest Baptist University became the eighth league member in 1986.

July 10, 1987 marked a major milestone for the MIAA as league institutional representatives voted to admit Missouri Southern State College, Missouri Western State College, Pittsburg State University and Washburn University. The four new schools competed for MIAA championships in all men's and women's sports during the 1989-90 academic year. Southeast Missouri left the MIAA following the 1990-91 season to pursue NCAA Division I status. Emporia State University replaces Southeast as the MIAA's 12th school in the 1991-92 year.

The MIAA has gained recognition as one of the top NCAA Division II athletic conferences in the nation, conducting championships in eight men's and seven women's sports. For the men, champions are crowned in football, cross country, basketball, indoor and outdoor track and field, baseball, tennis, and golf. For women, the MIAA conducts championships in volleyball, cross country, basketball, softball, indoor and outdoor track and field, and tennis.

Ken B. Jones is the commissioner of the MIAA, and his appointment in July, 1981, as the first full-time commissioner, marked the beginning of a new era of conference organization and activity. Jones previously served as Vice-President of Tarkio College and Assistant Commissioner of the Big Eight Conference. The conference headquarters are located in Maryville, Missouri.

The MIAA in the NCAA Playoffs

For the past two years, the top two MIAA football teams have clashed in the first round of the NCAA Division II football championships.

In 1989, Pittsburg State and Northwest Missouri State battled in a first round playoff contest, with Pitt State emerging victorious, 28-7. The next week, the Gorillas were defeated by Angelo (TX) State, 24-21.

Last season, Pitt State defeated Northeast Missouri State, 59-3 in another first round match-up of MIAA foes. PSU then beat East Texas State, 60-28 in the quarterfinals, before falling to eventual national cham-

pion North Dakota State, 39-29 in the semifinals.

Pitt State's win over Northwest in 1989 was the MIAA's first playoff victory. The Gorillas' triumph over East Texas last season marked the MIAA's first playoff win over a non-league opponent, and the first time a conference team reached the semifinals.

Northeast Missouri was the first MIAA team to appear in NCAA post-season play in 1982. The Bulldogs were beaten by Jacksonville (AL) State, 34-21 in a first-round game. Northwest Missouri qualified in 1984 and lost a first-round game to Nebraska-Omaha, 28-15.

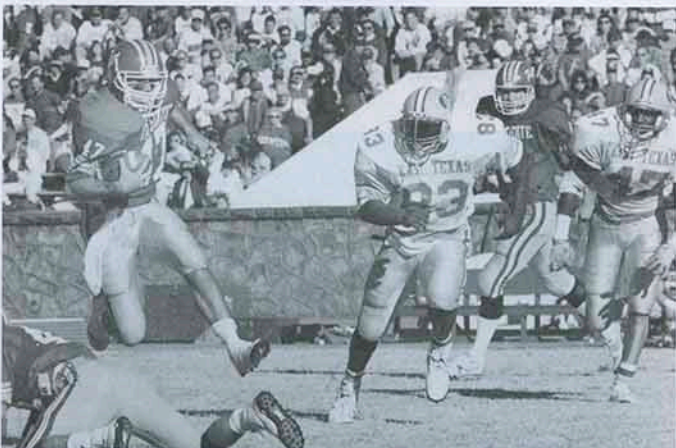

Pittsburg State capitalized on eight East Texas State turnovers and rolled to a 60-28 victory over the Lone Star Conference champions. The Gorillas exploded for 39 points in the first half, the second straight playoff game PSU hit its opponent with an insurmountable first-half scoring explosion. Darren Dawson and Jody Truitt each scored a pair of first half TD's to lead the Gorillas to a 39-14 halftime advantage. But East Texas scored a pair of third quarter TD's to pull within reach at 39-28 with over a quarter to play. The PSU defense then took control, forcing ETSU turnovers on the on the Lions next four possessions, a fumble and three interceptions (two by Darryl Wren). The Gorillas scored 21 points in the final quarter to seal the win. Dawson scored four TD's and gained 101 yards rushing on the day, while tight end Truitt had a career-high six catches, including two for scores. ETSU had 421 total yards to PSU's 404, but costly turnovers doomed the Lions.

NCAA Division II Semifinal Playoff Game

For the past decade, the road to the NCAA Division II national championship has passed through Fargo, North Dakota. But in 1990, the Division II national championship game may have actually been played in Fargo a week earlier than scheduled. In a semifinal battle of Division II's only remaining undefeated teams, the 12-0 Pittsburg State Gorillas and the 12-0 Bison of North Dakota State put on a playoff show that will long be remembered by players, coaches and fans of both schools. The contest featured seven lead changes as two of the nation's top offenses went head-to-head. But in the end, it was the Bison defense that came up with the crucial play of the game. With Pitt State leading 29-25 early in the fourth quarter, North Dakota State marched 74 yards on 12 plays to take a 32-29 lead with 5:22 left to play. Trailing by three, the Gorillas faced a third and three situation near midfield, when NDSU's Todd Wash deflected a Jay Padden pass intended for an open Ronnie West. Defensive tackle Brian Sweeney picked the ball out of the air and returned it to the PSU 33. It was the first turnover all day for either team, and it proved costly for the Gorillas. The Bison needed just four plays to punch the ball into the end zone, and suddenly Pitt State was behind 39-29 with 2:06 remaining. PSU drove to the Bison 39, but Padden's desperation fourth down pass with 1:18 to play was picked off and NDSU ran out the clock. The game featured several great individual efforts. PSU's West had 8 catches for 189 yards and 2 TDs, while Ronald Moore electrified the crowd with an 80-yard kickoff return just before halftime which put the Gorillas ahead 15-14. NDSU quarterback Chris Simdom scored 3 TDs and gained 75 yards rushing, and Bison tailback Tony Satter had 176 yards rushing. North Dakota State extended its undefeated streak at home to 25 games (24-0-1), and the Bison defense extended its string of consecutive quarters without giving up a rushing TD to 33. PSU finished the season 12-1, the fourth time in five years the Gorillas only loss of the season was in the semifinals of the playoffs. The following week in Florence, Alabama, Simdom was presented with the Harlon Hill Award honoring the top player in Division II. Simdom then led the Bison to a 51-11 blowout victory over Indiana (PA) in the title game the following afternoon.

Gorillas in the Pros

Pittsburg State University cornerback Darryl Wren was selected in the third round of the 1991 National Football League draft by the AFC champion Buffalo Bills.

Wren, the 82nd pick overall, was chosen higher in the draft than any other player in PSU history. Wren made his professional debut in a nationally televised pre-season game on August 5th against the defending Super Bowl champion New York Giants.

Before Wren, the last Pitt State NFL draftee was end Alan Spencer, who was picked in the 12th round by the Minnesota Vikings in 1973. Running back Albert Schmidt was selected in the 11th round by the LA Rams in 1972, and lineman Mike Potchad was a fourth-round pick

of the Atlanta Falcons in 1971.

Eldon Danenhauer, an offensive tackle for the Gorillas in the late 1950's, was not selected in the draft, but he is probably PSU's most successful pro player. Danenhauer played with the Denver Broncos from 1960-65, and earned All-AFL twice.

LeRoy Andrews, who played on some of PSU's earliest teams, coached nine years in the NFL. As a player/coach for the Detroit Wolverines in 1928, Andrews led his team to a 7-2-1 record in their only season of play. Andrews coached six teams, four as a player/coach, and posted a 53-32-6 overall record.

John Levra never played professional football, but he is entering his 12th season as an

assistant coach at the pro level. After working under O.A. "Bum" Phillips in New Orleans from 1981-1985, Levra joined the staff of the Chicago Bears as defensive line coach in 1986.

Others Gorillas who have played pro football include: Ron Freeman, a linebacker for the Pittsburgh Maulers and Orlando Renegades of the defunct United States Football League, Joe Murphy, who coached football and swimming at PSU from 1949 to 1976, played briefly for the St. Louis Gunners in 1934, and Bob Tarrant, a split end who played one season with the New York Giants in 1936.

Many other Gorillas have earned free agent tryouts with NFL teams, the most recent being Monte Weathers with Seattle in 1988-89.

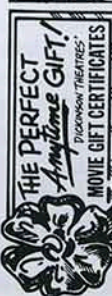

History of the PSU Gorilla



The Pittsburg State University Gorilla is without a doubt one of the most unique mascots on any university campus today.

In 1920, a group of young men dissatisfied with the state of school spirit, organized themselves as the Gorillas in order to "accelerate college spirit and enthusiasm until it shall permeate the state."

Thereafter, the Gorillas (a 1920's slang term for roughnecks) sponsored pep rallies, picnics, freshman hazing, special trains to athletic events, mock burials and weddings, and "night-shirt stampedes" through downtown Pittsburg.

Their membership quickly grew in just a few years.

In 1923, the Gorillas had art student Helen Waskey make a drawing of their new mascot. Two years later, they offered their symbol as the official mascot of the school.

On January 15, 1925, the student body unanimously adopted the "ferocious beast...as a name and synonym for the athletic teams."

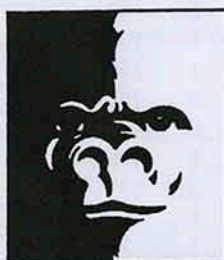
During his first half century, the Gorilla

became less ferocious and more loveable in appearance, being dubbed "Gus" and eventually finding a mate, "Gussie" (created by Charles Galvin in 1952 for a Student Union display). Gus became a cartoon figure (first by Lee Green, *Kanza* art editor, in 1952) and a regular "Joe College" before the Class of '65 had him cast in fiberglass by Larry Wooster and set in front of the Student Union.

In the summer of 1980, artist Ted Watts set about to recreate the original ferocity of the mascot. And thus for the first time in 30 years, the mascot is once more a symbol of strength and power.

On October 31, 1989, another chapter in the history of the Pittsburg State's Gorilla was written. Members of PSU's women's athletic teams voted to change their name from Gussies, which had been used since the women's program began in 1974, to Gorillas.

Pittsburg State is proud to be the only college in the nation with the Gorilla as its official mascot for its men's and women's teams!
