

Pitt State's Third National Champ

Gorilla Gridiron Highlights

- **1904** — Auxilary Manual Training School fields its first football team (no results available).
- **1908** — Under the leadership of Albert McLelend, the "Manualites" post the first recorded victory in school history.
- **Oct. 11, 1924** — Kansas State Teachers College defeats Baker, 6-0, in the first game played at Brandenburg Field.
- **1924** — KSTC completes its first undefeated season at 7-0-1 under the direction of Coach Garfield Weede.
- **Jan. 15, 1925** — The student body unanimously adopts the "Gorilla" as the official mascot of the KSTC athletic teams.
- **1932** — The Gorillas defeat the College of Emporia, 15-2, for the program's 100th win.
- **1943** — KSTC goes undefeated and untied (6-0-0) for the first time in school history under Coach Charles Morgan.
- **1949** — Carnie Smith leads the Gorillas to an 8-2-1 overall record and a share of the CIC conference championship in his first of 18 seasons as head coach.
- **Dec. 21, 1957** — KSTC defeats Hillsdale (MI) College, 27-26, in the Holiday Bowl at St. Petersburg, Fla. to win the NAIA National Championship with a perfect 11-0-0 record under Coach Smith.
- **Dec. 9, 1961** — Kansas State College defeats Linfield (OR) College, 12-7, in the Camellia Bowl at Sacramento, Calif. to capture the school's second NAIA National Championship in five years under Coach Smith. The Gorillas again finished a perfect 11-0-0.
- **Oct. 19, 1963** — Carnie Smith win his 100th game as head coach with a 42-12 victory over Fort Hays State.
- **1966** — The Gorillas post a 7-2 mark in Coach Smith's final season. Smith finished his career with 116-52-6 overall record.
- **Nov. 21, 1970** — KSCP defeats Western New Mexico, 52-6, to win the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference title. The Gorillas finished the season with a 9-2 record under Coach Tom Lester.
- **Dec. 19, 1981** — Pittsburg State drops a 3-0 decision to Elon (NC) College in the NAIA Championship game at Elon, N.C. under Coach Ron Randleman to finish at 10-2 overall.
- **April, 1985** — Dennis Franchione hired to rebuild PSU program.
- **1985** — Dennis Franchione leads the Gorillas to the Central States Intercollegiate Conference title, an 8-2 overall record, and a berth in the NAIA national playoffs in his first season as head coach.
- **Oct. 1986** — The University announces plans to renovate and rename the stadium Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium.
- **Dec. 13, 1986** — Top-ranked Pitt State falls, 17-6, at Cameron (OK) in the semifinals of the NAIA playoffs to finish the year 11-1.
- **Dec. 12, 1987** — Cameron again defeats No. 1 PSU in the NAIA semifinals (20-10 in Pittsburg) to end the Gorillas season at 11-1.
- **Dec. 10, 1988** — For the third straight year, Pitt State falls in the NAIA semis, losing 13-10 to Adams (CO) State at Alamosa, Colo.
- **July 1, 1989** — PSU officially becomes a member of the NCAA Division II and the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association.
- **Sept. 2, 1989** — Pitt State defeats Northeast Missouri, 43-0 at Kirksville in the program's first NCAA and MIAA game.





- **Sept. 9, 1989** — The University formally re-names and dedicates newly renovated Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium.
- **Nov. 4, 1989** — The Gorillas beat I-AA member Arkansas State, 34-13, at Jonesboro to spoil ASU's homecoming.
- **Nov. 25, 1989** — After winning the MIAA title and a first-round NCAA playoff game, the Gorillas fall, 24-21, to Angelo (TX) State in the NCAA quarterfinals to finish 12-1.
- **Dec. 6, 1989** — Chuck Broyles replaces Franchione as PSU's head coach when Franchione accepts a coaching post at I-AA Southwest Texas State.
- **Nov. 24, 1990** — Pitt State beats East Texas State, 60-28, in the NCAA quarterfinals to set a new school record for wins in a season with 12.
- **Dec. 1, 1990** — No. 1 North Dakota State defeats No. 3 Pitt State, 39-29, in a semifinal battle between a pair of 12-0 teams at Fargo. The Bison won the NCAA title the next week.
- **Sept. 14, 1991** — East Texas defeats Pitt State, 20-13, at Commerce, Texas, ending the Gorillas 56-game regular season winning streak.
- **Sept. 28, 1991** — Pitt State and Missouri-Rolla battle to a 6-6 tie in Pittsburg, snapping PSU's 20-game MIAA winning streak.
- **Oct. 26, 1991** — PSU defeats arch-rival Missouri Southern, 43-21 at Joplin to regain sole possession of first place in the MIAA.
- **Nov. 9, 1991** — The Gorillas blank Washburn, 21-0 to win the program's seventh straight league title.
- **Dec. 7, 1991** — Pitt State earns a berth in the NCAA-II championship game with a 53-21 semifinal playoff victory at Portland (OR) State in front of 17,036 fans.
- **Dec. 13, 1991** — PSU wide receiver Ronnie West is named the winner of the Harlon Hill Award presented to the NCAA Division II Player of the Year.
- **Dec. 14, 1991** — Pittsburg State defeats Jacksonville (AL) State, 23-6, in the NCAA Division II championship game at Florence, Ala. for the program's third national title.
- **April 27, 1992** — West and offensive lineman Kendall Gammon are chosen in the NFL draft, marking the first time in school history two players were selected in the same year.



Gorillas Win NCAA National Title

After coming so close to winning a national title several times during the last decade, the Pittsburg State University Gorillas finally realized their dream of winning it all in 1991.

Under the direction of second-year head coach Chuck Broyles, Pittsburg State won the NCAA Division II National Championship last December, posting a 23-6 victory over the Gamecocks of Jacksonville (AL) State in the championship game at Florence, Ala.

Pitt State's victory over the previously undefeated Gamecocks capped a 13-1-1 campaign, in which the Gorillas bounced back from a rough 2-1-1 start with 11 consecutive victories to end the season.

The 1991 championship is the football program's first national title in 30 years, and the Gorillas first national championship since the program joined the NCAA in 1989.

Pitt State had won NAIA national titles under Coach Carnie Smith in 1957 and 1961, and PSU also reached the NAIA championship game in 1981, finishing as the national runner-up. The Gorillas also advanced to the national semifinals four times in the last five years (1986-90), but each time came up short of reaching the ultimate goal.

But PSU would not be denied in 1991, winning its third national title with a very diversified and explosive offense, and a defense that was truly dominant at times.

In the semifinal play-off game at Portland State, the Gorilla offense racked up 636 total yards — including 510 on the ground — in a 53-21 victory. Pitt State's defense shutout a potent Portland State offense in the second half.

In the championship game, PSU's offense relied on the pass catching of Ronnie West early

(6 catches for 106 yards, 1 TD in the first half), then wore down Jax State's defense with a grind-it-out attack in the second half. Meanwhile, the PSU defense held its opponent scoreless in the second half for the second straight game.

The Gorilla offense, led by West — the winner of the Harlon Hill Award honoring the NCAA Division II Player of the Year — the running tandem of Darren Dawson and Ronald Moore, and a massive offensive line, averaged 37 points, and 454 total yards per game.

West established new PSU records for career receiving yards (1,779) and career receiving TDs (21), and finished with the highest punt return average (15.7 ypr) and kickoff return average (29.8 ypr) in school history. He also set PSU single season receiving records for catches (50), yards (1,044) and TD's (12), and established a new NCAA-II record for receiving yards in a post-season playoff series with 451.

Dawson, with 1,698 yards and 22 TDs including playoff games, and Moore, with 1,576 yards and 20 TDs, proved they were the finest backfield duo in the nation. Dawson finished his career second on PSU's all-time rushing yardage list with 3,530 yards, while Moore is now No. 4 on the chart with 2,435 yards and a season to play.

Sophomore Brian Hutchins and true-freshman Jeff Moreland did an outstanding job at QB. Hutchins began the year as PSU's starter, but was sidelined by a shoulder injury. Moreland then directed PSU to a 8-0-1 record as a starter, setting a PSU freshman record for total yardage (1,779 yards). Hutchins returned as PSU's starter in the playoffs.

The defense, which allowed just three points in the fourth quarter in the four playoff games, was led by MIAA Defensive Player of the Year, linebacker Shane Tafoya, and defensive end Troy Wilson, who finished the season with 23 sacks, including 12 in the playoffs. Defensive end Phil McCoy, linebackers Jamie Goodson and Michael Rose, and many others also made significant contributions on defense in '91.

Even before the kickoff of Saturday's game at Florence, AL, I was overcome by a feeling of pride.

Proud to have attended Pittsburg State University. Proud to be from Pittsburg. Proud to know the players, coaches and fans who were the 1991 Pittsburg State University Gorillas.

And when singer Lee Greenwood belted out his now-famous "I'm Proud to be an American," during pregame ceremonies, that wave of pride returned.

When you see some 3,500 fans who dropped everything to attend one football game, you have to feel proud. Proud that the Gorillas have such a loyal following, that nothing—expense, distance, inconvenience—could keep them from being a part of the event.

They prove that you can mix academics with athletics and be successful at both.

I was proud to be a friend and associate with Ronnie West when he was named the 1991 Harlon Hill Award winner as the top player in Division II football. In fact, I was proud to know West long before he was named a finalist for the trophy.

I was proud and happy for Pittsburg State Sports Information Director Shawn Ahearn, who worked so hard publicizing West to the national media and to his fellow SIDs, the people who voted for the award. I was especially happy for him because he got to share the moment with several members of his family, including his father and two sisters who drove from Pennsylvania to be a part of the event.

I was happy for the four fifth-year seniors—offensive lineman Kendall Gammon and Jeff Mundhenke, linebacker Jamie Goodson and safety Michael Wilber—who have meant so much to the Gorilla program during its transition from an NAIA power to the top program in NCAA Division II.

I was happy for the other seniors on the Gorilla squad—tight end Brian Pinamonti, running back Dawson, placekicker Jenkins, offensive lineman Brian Hoover, West,

defensive end Phil McCoy, defensive tackles Ky Kiger and Kline Minnifield, linebackers Michael Rose, Shane Tafoya and Doug Deines—who had the chance to finish their collegiate careers as national champions.

I was happy for freshman quarterback Jeff Moreland, without whom the Gorillas would not have been in Alabama on Saturday. Moreland didn't get to play—sophomore Brian Hutchins earned his starting spot back for the playoffs—but it was Moreland, an 18-year-old kid two weeks into his collegiate career, who had to take over when Hutchins was hurt, carrying more of a load than he or anyone else expected him to have to bear at such an early stage of his career.

I was happy for Todd Hafner, who might have been the starting QB this year were it not for a knee injury suffered during spring football. Hafner was still very much a part of this team, helping tutor Hutchins, Moreland and PSU's other young quarterbacks. He couldn't play, but he didn't abandon the Gorillas. He was there in film sessions, in unit meetings and at practice to lend a hand.

I was happy for people like John Roderique, Jay Padden, Dale Fuchs, Ted Adams, Tim Sinclair and Bryan Mahnken, guys who played at Pitt State and felt that they, too, should have won a national title. They finally got one, albeit as graduate assistants or student assistants. Those players, and others like them, helped Pitt State get to a level where they contend for the national championship every year. This season, they helped the Gorillas get to the top.

And last, I was happy for myself. In my profession, I'm supposed to remain as impartial as possible. I write for a Pittsburg newspaper, for Pittsburg-area readers, yet I must try to maintain a balance. Yet because of my job duties, I know all of the Pitt State players and coaches, both on a professional and personal level. It is difficult to separate the two, yet that is part of my job.

Except now, for a day or so, that separation need not exist. It's OK for me to be a Gorilla fan. And believe me, I'm proud to be one.

Pittsburg State University, a dynamic four-year liberal arts university, is starting its 90th year serving as the educational hub of southeast Kansas.


Founded in 1903, the University has grown on a 142-acre site in the southern part of Pittsburg, which has a population of about 18,000 residents. The University is easily accessible, located approximately two hours from major metropolitan areas such as Kansas City, Wichita, Topeka, Springfield, and Tulsa.

Pittsburg State began as the Auxiliary Manual Training School under the State Normal School of Emporia and grew into a four-year college by 1913 and was known as Kansas State Teachers College. It was during this time that the institution developed graduate degree programs.

By 1959, the year that KSTC became known as Kansas State College of Pittsburg, the school had an enrollment of 2,800, and more than 20 buildings on campus. In 1966, the current structure of four schools — education, business and economics, technology and applied science and arts and sciences — and the graduate division was established.


On April 21, 1977, KSCP achieved university status when it was named Pittsburg State University. Today, the university has an enrollment of over 6,000 students.

Since 1977, PSU has added new facilities, including the McPherson Nursing Education Building, the Leonard H. Axe Library, and Heckert-Wells Hall. Construction will begin in 1994 on a \$25.7 million East Campus expansion for technology programs.

Dr. Donald W. Wilson, President



Dr. Donald W. Wilson became the President of Pittsburg State University in December of 1983. During the past nine years, he has been a tremendous leader on campus, in the southeast Kansas community, and in international circles as well.

Dr. Wilson's educational philosophy is based on the belief that colleges and universities should help develop the entire person: mentally, physically, aesthetically and spiritually. He has a special personal and professional interest in cross-cultural understanding, which stems from his varied international background.

Born in Poona, India, the son of missionary parents, Dr. Wilson attended school in Australia, Singapore and Indonesia. He has lived in six countries and has speaking or reading knowledge of eight languages.

During Dr. Wilson's tenure at PSU, many accomplishments have been realized, including: enrollment records that continue to be broken; the establishment of an Honors College; cooperative exchange agreements signed with more than 65 universities around the world; and the renovation of Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium has been completed as part of a major capital campaign.

Dr. Wilson previously served as president of Southampton (NY) University for four years, and as president of Castleton (VT) State College. He is an avid sports participant, as well as the No. 1 fan of PSU athletic programs.

Pitt State Offers Variety of Programs

The curriculum features a variety of academic, cultural and social programs. PSU offers more than 100 undergraduate and graduate degree programs in the schools of business, technology, and education, and the college of arts and sciences. In addition to associate, bachelor's and master's degree programs, the curriculum also offers certificate courses and education specialist degree opportunities.

Pittsburg State currently has an enrollment of more than 6,000 students with more than 350 dedicated faculty members. The student-faculty ratio is approximately 19:1.

PSU also is an important resource for the community, hosting nationally-recognized speakers and artists, as well as a competitive intercollegiate athletic program.

Pittsburg State provides a wide array of specialized services to Pittsburg and the four-state region through outreach programs such as the Institute for Economic Development, and the Center for Technology Transfer.

Campus life at Pittsburg State is an exciting blend of experiences. PSU offers more than 100 student organizations and is the home to several national Greek fraternities and sororities.

Athletics at Pittsburg State

Pittsburg State University's athletic program joined the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division II and the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) in 1989, after a long and successful membership in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

PSU has a very competitive athletic program, which includes six men's and five women's varsity sports. Men's programs are baseball, basketball, football, cross country, golf, and track and field. Women's sports include basketball, cross country, track and field, softball and volleyball.

Philosophy On Athletics

The mission of PSU's Department of Intercollegiate Athletics is two-fold and simply put, that mission is to strive for both academic and athletic excellence.

The university's goal for each of its student-athletes is graduation, while athletic excellence can be measured by success in NCAA Division II national competition, as well as within the MIAA.

The Pittsburg State Gorilla

The Pittsburg State University Gorilla is without a doubt one of the most unique mascots on any university campus today.

In 1920, a group of young men dissatisfied with the state of school spirit, organized themselves as the Gorillas in order to "accelerate college spirit and enthusiasm until it shall permeate the state."


Thereafter, the Gorillas (a 1920's slang term for roughnecks) sponsored pep rallies, freshman hazing, special trains to athletic events, mock burials and weddings, and "nightshirt stampedes" through downtown Pittsburg. Their membership quickly grew in just a few years.

In 1923, the Gorillas had art student Helen Waskey make a drawing of their new mascot. Two years later, they offered their symbol as the official mascot of the school. On January 15, 1925, the student body unanimously adopted the "ferocious beast...as a name and synonym for the athletic teams."

During his first half century, the Gorilla became less ferocious and more loveable in appearance, being dubbed "Gus" and eventually finding a mate, "Gussie" (created by Charles Galvin in 1952 for a Student Union display). Gus became a cartoon figure (first by Lee Green, *Kanza* art editor, in 1952) and a regular "Joe College" before the Class of '65 had him cast in fiberglass by Larry Wooster and set in front of the Student Union.

On October 31, 1989, another chapter in the history of the Pittsburg State's Gorilla was written. Members of the women's athletic teams voted to change their name from Gussies, which had been used since the women's program began in 1974, to Gorillas.

Pittsburg State is proud to be the only college in the nation with the Gorilla as its official mascot for its men's and women's teams!



Young Team Ready to Defend NCAA Title

Pittsburg State University head football coach Chuck Broyles must replace 14 seniors from last year's NCAA Division II national championship team, including six starters on offense, and five starters and several key reserves on defense.

Broyles, the 1991 Kodak College Division I national coach of the year, begins his third season at the Gorilla helm with a solid nucleus on each side of the football. Senior fullback Ronald Moore, a 5-11, 220-pound candidate for the Harlon Hill Award honoring the NCAA Division II player of the year, will lead PSU's option veer attack, while senior All-American Troy Wilson anchors the defense from his end position.

After guiding the Gorillas to a 25-2-1 overall mark in two seasons — including a school-record 13-1-1 overall record last year — Broyles must rely more on younger players and newcomers to defend the title.

"The character of this year's team will be a little different than the last two," Broyles said. "You just don't replace some of the players we had who played such a key role in our success. But with the young players we have in our program, and the talented newcomers we brought in, we should challenge for another MIAA title and NCAA playoff berth."

The losses from the '91 championship team were many. For the first time in two years, PSU will be without wide receiver Ronnie West — last year's Harlon Hill Award winner and a two-time Kodak All-American who is now a member of the Minnesota Vikings — tailback Darren Dawson, who

rushed for over 4,500 yards in his career, linebackers Shane Tafoya, Michael Rose and Jamie Goodson, several offensive linemen, including Kendall Gammon, an 11th round pick in the NFL draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, defensive end Phil McCoy, and several others.

MOORE LEADS OFFENSE

Even though Dawson and West accounted for nearly 50% of Pitt State's all-purpose yardage last year, Gorilla offensive coordinator Jerry Kill is excited about who is returning, especially at fullback and quarterback.

"Ronald is definitely one of the premier running backs in the nation -- he's got such power and strength as a runner and blocker, then has that outstanding speed to break plays wide open," said Kill.

"Look at the numbers he put up the last two years... and that's playing with Dawson and West in an offense that really spread the ball around."

A two-year starter at fullback beside Dawson in PSU's split-back set, Moore and Dawson both rushed for over 1,000 yards the past two seasons in regular season games. Moore enters his senior year ranked fourth on PSU's all-time rushing list

(2,435 yards) and eighth on the school's rushing TD list (26). Including playoff contests last year (15 games total), Moore gained 1,544 yards rushing and scored 20 TDs. He also paved the way for Dawson, who gained 1,698 yards and scored 22 TDs.

With Dawson and West both gone in '92, Moore will most likely shoulder more of the offensive burden and should have a great season. Perhaps good enough to become PSU's second straight Harlon Hill winner.

"Ronald will probably carry it a little more this year," said Broyles. "He shared the duty the past two years, but he'll probably be more of a focus in our offense this season. But we feel good about our whole group of backs. We have a strong group of experienced athletes."

Two-year letterwinners Craig Jordan, Don Tolar, and Joey Tobin have good experience, while Niel Smith and several talented newcomers including Sean Scott and Jarron Cherry look to make an immediate impact.

DEEP AT QUARTERBACK

The key to the Gorilla option game is the triggerman, and PSU is deep at quarterback. Junior Brian Hutchins started the Gorillas' first two games last season, injured his shoulder, then returned to lead Pitt State through the playoffs. While Hutchins was out, Jeff Moreland, a true-freshman at the time went 8-0-1 as PSU's starter, leading Pitt State into the playoffs. In 15 games, the duo combined to complete 100 of 187 passes (53.5 percent) for 1,905 yards with 17 TDs and only 8 INTs. They also combined for 952 yards and 13 TDs on the ground.

Junior Todd Hafner, who missed the '91 campaign with a knee injury and most of spring ball this year with a muscle pull, should also return next fall. Sophomore Benny Borden, PSU's No. 3 quarterback last season, is expected to red-shirt.

"We feel great about our situation at quarterback," said Kill. "With Todd healthy, we'll have three quarterbacks who are very capable of running our offense effectively."

Shad Klinge, Ray Staton and Chris Wilkerson lead PSU's wide receiving corps. Klinge, a 5-8, 168-pound junior, has been PSU's No. 2 receiver the past two seasons behind West. He caught just 12 passes for 195 yards in 15 games last year, but had a clutch 24-yard reception in PSU's championship game win. Staton is a transfer who was a quality wide receiver at West Virginia University last year.

Junior center Doug Bullard, a third-team All-MIAA selection last year in his first season as a starter will anchor the line again, along with Mike Brockel, a first-team All-MIAA pick

at guard, and veteran tackle Andy Kesinger, a starter the last seven games last season. Sophomore Chris Sharp and a host of other young players will battle for starting positions and playing time up front.

DEFENSE SHOULD BE SOLID

With many experienced players back, PSU's defense — which led the league in points allowed, rushing yards allowed, total yards allowed, and passing efficiency — should be strong once again.

The secondary "is probably the strength of the defense" according to Broyles, with several top performers returning.

PSU is deep at cornerback as four players with starting experience return, including: seniors Joel Thornton, a third-team All-MIAA pick last season, Duke Palmer, a two-year letterwinner, and Eric Perks, along with junior Bob Tavernaro.

At safety, sophomore letterwinner Brian Carson and newcomer Birk Sopsher, a junior transfer from Antelope Valley (CA) Junior College, had excellent springs. Both have excellent speed and close on the ball quickly. Either player could move to outside linebacker to keep them both on the field.

Pitt State's defensive line should also be strong, led by All-American defensive end Troy Wilson who recorded a total of 23 sacks last year, including 12 in four playoff games. At the other end, senior Ronnie Fuller returns after missing the entire '91 campaign with a shoulder injury, along with junior letterwinner Derek Blackburn. Pre-season All-American (*Football Gazette, College Football Preview*) Chris Hanna is the only returning letterwinner at tackle, but junior college All-American Chance Rudzik from Garden City (KS) CC, could earn a starting role immediately.

"Our line won't be very deep, but we have some very solid players and one of the premier players in the country in Troy Wilson," said Broyles.

At linebacker, Pitt State must replace three of four starters, including Shane Tafoya, the '91 MIAA defensive player of the year, and the team's leading tackler the past two years. Fifth-year seniors Lance Gosch, a starter beside Tafoya last year, and Kris Mengarelli should do the job inside with support from Kevin Crane, Andy Sweet, Jason Gardner and several newcomers.

The Gorillas must also replace a pair of additional first-team All-MIAA picks on the outside, three-year starter Jamie Goodson and two-year starter Michael Rose. Returnees Jerry Boone, Tim Wheeler and Denny Routh will fight for spots along with several newcomers including Carlos Nevins.

BROYLES ON THE MIAA

"The league gets better and better every year," said Broyles. "Even though we're still undefeated in the conference, we haven't completely dominated. We've had a few scares — two close games at Southwest Baptist and against Central Missouri State, and two really hard-fought battles with Northwest Missouri State. Kirksville (Northeast Missouri State) is going to have a great offense once again, and so is (Missouri) Southern. Missouri Southern went 8-3 last year and was a good football team."

"If you look around the league, you'll find a lot of MIAA players on pre-season All-America teams," he continued. "And they are legitimate picks. The league had three players drafted last year, so we have some great players in our league and the talent keeps getting better and better. People from around the country are realizing that our conference has some teams with great players, and teams that are on the rise."

DEFENDING THE TITLE

"There's always pressure here at Pittsburg State to win, and winning the national championship did nothing to change that," said Broyles. "The expectations are extremely high again, we always play under a lot of pressure. You always worry about being able to compete in the MIAA and getting into the playoffs."

"We lost 14 quality players, but we feel we had a great recruiting year," Broyles continued. "So in one sense, it's hard to

replace a Harlon Hill winner, a 1,000-yard running back, three 280-pound offensive linemen, three starting linebackers. But, on the other hand, we have some pretty good players in our program, and some quality athletes joining us in the fall, so we still feel we'll be pretty good on both sides of the ball."

Good enough to win another national title?

"It's too early to speculate," said Broyles. "I think there are about 15 or 20 teams every year that have a legitimate shot at winning it all. We hope we'll be one of them. It's certainly our goal."

"I'll say this about winning the national championship," Broyles continued. "It's a done deal. Right now (August), we are the champions of NCAA Division II football, and nobody can ever take that away from us. Sometime soon, we'll start being referred to as the 'defending' national champions. Then on Sept. 5, we'll be just one of 127 teams that will be competing for *the* national championship. So very soon, we'll be back on the same level as everyone else."

After winning more football games (70) than any other college program at any level the past six years (1986-91), claiming seven straight conference titles, and making seven consecutive trips to the national playoffs, it's a pretty safe bet the Gorillas will be very competitive again in 1992. And if some young players excel in key spots as the season progresses, maybe competitive enough to challenge for another national crown.

1991 AFCA/Kodak College Division I National Coach of the Year



Pittsburg State University head football coach Chuck Broyles directed the Gorillas to the 1991 NCAA Division II National Championship last December in only his second year as a college head coach.

He was honored by the American Football Coaches Association as the Kodak College Division I National Coach of the Year (includes NCAA Division II and NAIA Division I schools).

Broyles, an All-American defensive tackle at Pitt State in 1968, has led his alma mater

to a 25-2-1 overall record the past two years -- a winning percentage of .911. PSU posted a 12-1 overall mark and reached the semifinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs in 1990, Broyles' first year as head coach. Last season, the Gorillas set a school record for victories during the team's 13-1-1 national championship campaign.

After a rocky 2-1-1 start last year, Broyles' leadership was instrumental in turning the season into one of the best in school history. Pitt State ended the season with 11 consecutive victories, including a 53-21 victory at Portland (OR) State in the national semifinals, and a 23-6 win over Jacksonville (AL) State in the NCAA Division II championship game.

"I have a great deal of respect for the tremendous job Chuck and his staff have done the past two years," said PSU athletic director Bill Samuels. "The expectations at Pittsburg State are always high, and Chuck has handled the pressure admirably. He provided great leadership last year when the team had some early season setbacks, and because of his character and work ethic, our team regrouped and won the national championship when we could have folded."

Broyles became head football coach at Pittsburg State on December 6, 1989 after serving as the Gorillas' assistant head coach and defensive coordinator the previous two years.

His first team matched the school record for victories, won the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association title, and extended the nation's longest regular season winning streak to 55 games.

But Broyles' first squad will always be remembered for the near-upset of eventual national champion North Dakota State at Fargo, ND. In one of the greatest games in school history, PSU lost to the powerful Bison, 39-29 in a game that featured seven lead changes.

About the only thing that Broyles, the co-recipient of the MIAA Coach of the Year honor in 1990, could do for an encore was direct the Gorillas to the national title. And that's exactly what he did!

"I believe the only way you can be successful as a player or coach is through hard work," Broyles said. "But at the same time, we try to run a fun program where everyone can enjoy their work and the success they achieve."

Broyles came to Pitt State from the University of Missouri-Rolla, where he served as the Miners' defensive coordinator from 1974-1983, and during the '86 and '87 seasons. At Rolla, Broyles helped guide the Miners to a share of the MIAA title in 1977, and the outright conference crown and an undefeated season in 1980. UMR also shared the MIAA title in 1983, just after Broyles left the program to become defensive coordinator at Miami (OK) High School, where he served for three years (1983-85). Broyles also was the head baseball coach at Rolla from 1974-83 and Miami.

For the past four years, Broyles has directed a PSU defense that has been ranked among the best in the nation. Last year's unit was 12th in NCAA Division II statistics in points allowed (14.1 ppg) and 19th in rushing defense (118.5 ypg). In 1990, the defense was ranked eighth in scoring defense (13.4), and 13th in total defense (258.3 ypg). In Pitt State's first season of NCAA Division II competition in 1989, the Gorillas were ranked sixth in scoring defense (11.1 ppg) and ninth in total defense (233.1 ypg). In 1980, Broyles' defense at Missouri-Rolla was one of the best in the country, allowing just 34.6 yards per game on the ground, tops among NCAA Division II schools, while forcing 7.2 turnovers per game.

Broyles was an eight-man football standout at Mulberry High School, before playing both offensive and defensive line for the Gorillas. Broyles earned four varsity letters under Coach Camie Smith, and as a senior captain in 1968, he earned NAIA All-American honorable mention honors at defensive tackle and was selected PSU's most outstanding player. Broyles earned a free agent tryout with the NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers the next year.

Chuck completed his bachelor's degree in education at PSU in 1970 while serving as a student coach, and earned a master's degree as a graduate assistant in 1972-73. After a year as head football and track coach at Stockton (MO) High School, he accepted his first full-time college coaching position at Rolla in 1973.

In addition to coaching responsibilities, Broyles also has additional administrative duties as Pittsburg State's associate director of athletics. Chuck is married to the former Helen Ellwood of Cameron, Mo. They live in Pittsburg with their three sons, Scott 18, Kyle 13, and Mark 12.

What has winning the national championship meant to your program?

I don't know all the things it's meant to our program, but I know this, they can never never take it away from us. Right now, we are the champions of NCAA Division II football, and it feels good. Sometime soon, we'll start being referred to as the defending national champions, then on September 5, we'll be one of 127 teams that will be competing for the national championship. So we'll just be back on the same level as everyone else. But our players feel good about themselves. Our coaches feel good. Our fans feel good. It's helped our recruiting. It's been exciting for everyone.

Now that PSU has won the national title, is there any less pressure on your team?

I don't really think it takes any pressure off us. There will always be a lot of pressure to succeed at Pittsburg State. Winning the national championship is a done deal. Our fans are very happy we won, but now the question is 'can you repeat?' We play under a lot of pressure and just do our best to meet the high expectations. But the pressure can be good in the sense that it creates a situation where you strive for more than just a winning season, more than a conference championship or playoff berth. We set our goals high and try to achieve them.

Talk a little about the Pitt State tradition. When I'm asked what's so special about Pitt State football, the first thing I think about is the tradition. The only way I can describe it is that it's an honor to be a Gorilla. There's only one group of Gorillas and that's here at Pittsburg State, and Gorillas stick together. Our football lettermen are so supportive of our program that you feel honored to be a part of that group. When we played for the NCAA championship this year, there were 25 or 30 lettermen from the 1957 and '61 teams in the stands. Our lettermen established the tradition, and now they play such a key role in our success through their financial contributions, and by attending games home and away.

What about the '92 Gorillas — how will you replace some of the key players you lost? You can never replace some of the personalities. Last year, we knew we had players with more talent than we ever had here before in four or five positions. Not just Ronnie West, who was a great player, but many others who are gone now. You can't replace some of those guys with a player who's as good or better. We've got some good football players, but we don't have the great athlete to replace them. We have some question marks, some people who are transferring in and some young talented freshman that we hope will come through for us. We'll only be as good in some positions as some of the people transferring in here, but there still unknown quantities.

What are the strengths and weaknesses of your team? Offensively, we feel good at every position we have except for the offensive line, we'll be young. There's two places you don't want to be young, on the offensive line and in your defensive secondary. But, in that line you have three returning starters and we have two tight ends back. We'll need to find a tackle and a guard. There's no doubt we'll miss some of the players up front who have been such a key part of our success, but we've got some back-ups who are hopefully ready to step up. We may have to move someone over from the defense. We feel very good about our running backs and quarterbacks.

Defensively, we felt our strength last year was the depth on our defensive line, and that will be a little bit of a concern there this year. We also lost three All-Conference linebackers who we need to replace, and we don't have the great linebacker we've had in the past. But we've got several good solid football players, and maybe that will be better than one great one. The key for us to be successful will be our secondary having a great year, and we hope they'll do that. We have good depth in our secondary and should be fairly solid overall.

Talk a little about your players. For the most part, we try to recruit talented players who are willing to work hard and know what it takes to win. One thing that is so special about our football program is that our older players take care of and teach our younger players. From the first day a new player joins our program, they learn from the example our older players set. Our younger players see the work ethic on the practice field, in the classroom, in the weight room. They quickly learn how important being a part of the campus and community is to our program. It's an honor to be a Gorilla, and we're very proud of our players.

How does the MIAA look this year? The MIAA has improved every year. Everybody seems to be getting better. Even though we're still undefeated in the conference, we've had a few scares — two close games at Southwest Baptist and against Central Missouri, and two really hard-fought battles with Northwest. Kirksville (Northeast Missouri) is going to have a great offense again, Missouri Western can put some points on the board, Emporia State is improving defensively. Missouri Southern finished 8-3 last year and was a good football team. If you look around the league, you'll find a lot of MIAA players on pre-season All-America teams, and they are legitimate picks. The league had three players drafted last year, so we have some great players in our league. And I think us winning the national championship has brought a lot of notoriety not only to our school but to our conference. People realize that our conference has improving teams with great players.

Talk about the commitment of your coaching staff. I have some extremely dedicated, hard-working, loyal coaches working with me. All of our coaches are willing to do whatever it takes to get the job done. I think our players respect our coaches and enjoy playing for them, and I believe our coaching staff has earned respect from our peers. We have great coaches who put everything they have into their jobs. They're great people.

Would you explain the program's commitment to academics? We try to do everything we can to give our players the best chance to earn a degree. We're striving for a 100% graduation rate whether you're an NFL prospect or a scout team player. We have a tremendous support system in place led by a full-time academic advisor. We have mandatory study halls for any player below a 2.5 GPA, and an excellent academic enhancement program for new players. And again our older players are committed to helping our younger players adapt to college life as a athlete and in the classroom.

What about the support you receive from the local community? There are so many people who are very sincere and caring about what we're doing. We're so fortunate to have a supportive administration led by President Wilson, who is our No. 1 fan. He has a proper perspective of academics and the role intercollegiate athletics plays in the college experience. Our fans want to see us win, but not at all costs. Our program is built on integrity and loyalty, and is part of an excellent university. The people associated with our program make it great.

Tim Beck **Defensive Coor.**

Tim Beck begins his fourth season as a full-time assistant football coach at Pitt State, his first as defensive coordinator, after serving as a graduate assistant coach at PSU for two years.

Beck worked with defensive ends, tight ends, and receivers as a GA, before concentrating primarily on the linebacking corps for the first time in the 1989 season.

He was named a full-time assistant during the summer of 1989, after completing work on his master's degree at PSU. He also serves as Pitt State's recruiting coordinator, and also plans PSU's football camps.

Beck was a two-year football letterwinner at Pitt State, playing defensive back for the Gorillas from 1985-86. He was a team captain as a senior in 1986, and his playing honors included two seasons on the Central States Intercollegiate Conference All-Conference team, and one year on the NAIA All-District 10 team. He was also a recipient of the Carnie Smith Scholarship.

Beck played football at Dodge City Community College for two years, before joining the Gorilla program.

In addition to his coaching duties, Beck has taught classes on football coaching, and he works closely with the PSU football camps and clinics. He is married to the former Gena Thomas, who ran track and cross country for PSU from 1987-88.



Jerry Kill **Offensive Coor.**

Jerry Kill is in his third season as Pittsburg State's offensive coordinator, and sixth year as an assistant football coach at PSU. Last year, he directed a Gorilla offense that was ranked fifth among NCAA Division II schools in rushing yards per game (320.6 ypg), sixth in scoring (37.7 ppg) and seventh in total offense (447.9 ypg).

Kill rejoined the PSU coaching staff in January of 1990 after leading Webb City High School to the Missouri Class 4A State Championship. Webb City compiled a perfect 14-0 overall record en route to the state title, and Kill was named the 1989 Missouri State Coach of the Year. The Cardinals were 25-1 during his two seasons as head coach.

Prior to his tenure at Webb City, Kill served as an assistant coach at Pittsburg State for three years (1985-88). He attended Southwestern College in Winfield, Kan., where he played football and earned a bachelor's degree in 1983.

Kill coached at Southwestern the following year, served as an assistant football coach at Midwest City High School during the 1984-85 season, then joined PSU's staff in 1985.

Kill also serves as PSU's assistant athletic director for promotions. Jerry is a native of Cheney, Kan. He is married to the former Rebecca Smith of Liberal, Kan. They have two daughters, Krystal Nicole, 3, and Tasha Marie, who turned 18 months in July.



Fred Redd **Offensive Line Coach**

Fred Redd enters his third season as offensive line coach at PSU, after serving as head football coach at Springfield Catholic High School for two years. He guided Catholic to a pair of conference titles and two district crowns as head coach, while Catholic compiled a 29-1 regular season record his last three years.

Redd has over 15 years of football coaching experience at the collegiate and high school level. He was an assistant coach along with PSU head coach Chuck Broyles at Missouri-Rolla from 1976-79, and later served as offensive coordinator at Central Methodist College (1985-86).

He also was a defensive assistant at the United States Military Academy, West Point from 1969-72, and has held a variety of teaching and administrative positions.

Redd was born in Kansas City, Missouri, and attended Westport High School. He played football at Southwest Missouri State University from 1957-60. Upon graduation, he served in U.S. Army for 20 years, attaining the rank of Regular Army Major.

Redd earned a master's degree in education at Central Missouri State University in May of 1969, and has earned additional graduate credits in education from Southwest Missouri State. Fred and his wife, Donna, have two sons, Jeffrey, 26, and Matthew, 25.



Anton Stewart **Defensive Line Coach**

Anton Stewart begins his fourth season as a full-time assistant football and track coach at Pittsburg State, after serving the PSU football and track programs for four seasons as a student assistant coach.

Stewart assumed full responsibility for coaching the defensive line in 1989, and is the athletic department's NCAA eligibility compliance officer.

He also will help monitor the academic progress of PSU student-athletes as part of the athletic department's enhancement program. Stewart also works closely with various PSU camps, and he was a featured speaker at the College Football Association coaches convention in New Orleans in January of 1991.

During Stewart's tenure at PSU, the Gorillas' have been nationally ranked in several defensive categories each year, highlighted by the top scoring defense in the nation in 1987, allowing just 7.9 points per game. Last season, all four of PSU's starting defensive linemen earned some form of all-conference honors.

Stewart was an All-American offensive lineman at Southwestern (KS) College, and he also competed on the track and field team as a thrower. As a football player, Stewart was a two-year All-Conference performer and an NAIA All-District 10 selection.

Anton earned his bachelor's degree at PSU in 1989. He is single and lives in Pittsburg.



John Johnson Strength & Conditioning

John Johnson enters his seventh year as Pittsburg State's strength and conditioning coach. He also is the director of the PSU Fitness Center located in the Garfield Weede Physical Education Building.

Johnson is primarily responsible for designing and implementing a complete weight training and dietary program for each PSU student-athlete.

Johnson, a 1981 PSU graduate and an AAU and Master Weightlifter, once held the state squat record.



John Pierce Wide Receivers

After coaching the running backs for three seasons, John Pierce begins his first season with PSU's wide receivers.

Pierce was a three-year letterman on the Gorilla football team from 1976-79 before serving as a student coach at PSU from 1980-83 while earning his bachelor's and master's degrees. He has served as an assistant coach and physical education instructor at Frontenac High School since 1984.

He lives in Girard with his wife, the former Sunny York of Lawton, Kan., and their three children, Nikki, 7, Timothy, 6, and Cody, 2.



Dave Wiemers Defensive Line

Dave Wiemers enters his first season as a graduate assistant coach at PSU. He will assist with the defensive line.

Wiemers was quarterback coach for Seaman High School in Topeka, KS last season.

Wiemers' playing career concluded as a starting quarterback at Washburn University in 1990. He also played two years of baseball for the Ichabods.

Bill Kroenke Tight Ends

Bill Kroenke begins his third season as a graduate assistant coach at Pitt State. He will coach PSU's tight ends.

Kroenke completed a bachelor's degree in education at the University of Arkansas in 1989. He was a three-year letterwinner in football and wrestling at Harrisonville High School, and also earned a pair of letters in track. Harrisonville compiled a three-year record of 30-7, including a state runner-up finish his junior year.



John Roderique Running Backs

John Roderique enters his third season as an assistant coach. He will coach running backs after coaching outside linebackers for two years.

Roderique was a four-year letterman at PSU (1986-89), earning first-team Kodak All-American as an inside linebacker and MIAA Defensive Player of the Year as a senior in 1989.

He led Pittsburg State in tackles his last two seasons, and holds the PSU record for most tackles in a season with 126 in his senior season. He's married to the former Heather Schnackenberg of Parsons.




Linebacker Lance Gosch chases a loose ball during the 1991 title game vs. Jacksonville State.






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Bill Samuels, Athletic Director

Bill Samuels was named Athletic Director at Pittsburg State University on December 6, 1989 after serving as a coach, instructor and athletic administrator at his alma mater for over 23 years.

Samuels spent 33 years coaching football at the collegiate and high school level before deciding to devote his energies toward athletic administration full time in 1987. Prior to his appointment as AD, Samuels served as PSU's associate athletic director for business administration for two years. He was a guiding force in the athletic program's transition from membership in the NAIA, to the program's current affiliation in NCAA Division II and the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association. Samuels also has been an instrumental part of building a solid athletic booster club, the Gorilla Club, a vital support group for PSU athletics.

Samuels earned a bachelor of science degree in education from PSU in 1958, after playing quarterback on Pitt State's 1957 NAIA national championship team. In addition to playing quarterback, Samuels kicked the winning extra point that gave PSU a 27-26 victory over

Hillsdale in the title game in the Holiday Bowl in St. Petersburg, Fla. Upon graduation, Samuels served in the military before returning to PSU to earn a master's degree in education. He was an instructor and coach at Riverton High School for three years, before joining the PSU coaching staff in 1967 under Tom Lester. In addition to coaching football at PSU for 20 years, Samuels also has been an instructor in the Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Department.

Bill is a native of Carthage, Mo., where he played football for Carthage High School. He and his wife, Frances, have three children.



Russ Jewett Asst. Athletic Dir.

Russ Jewett has served as an Assistant Athletic Director at PSU since the fall of 1987. In addition to serving as PSU's head track and field and cross country coach, his primary duties as an assistant AD lie in the area of facilities administration and planning.

Jewett completed his sixth season as head coach for PSU's women's programs, and fifth as men's head coach, leading both teams to the 1992 MIAA outdoor track and field championships. PSU's women also won the MIAA cross country and indoor titles, and he was named MIAA coach of the year. Bever played baseball at PSU from 1966-69, earning a B.S. in education. He and his wife Johna live in Farlington with their two children, Dawn and Gabe, who both attend PSU.



Dr. David Kendall Academic Counselor

Pittsburg State athletic teams are fortunate to have the services of a full-time academic advisor, Dr. David Kendall. He has served as the academic counselor for athletes since 1982, and has been instrumental in PSU's outstanding success in the classroom.

Last spring, PSU student athletes earned a 2.85 cumulative grade point average, and Pittsburg State claimed five GTE Academic All-Americans in the 1991-92 academic year, including three members of the Gorilla football team.

Kendall earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees at PSU, and his doctorate in education from the University of Kansas in 1970. Dr. Kendall and his wife, Wanda, are the parents of two children, Dave, who is the head athletic trainer for the Kansas City Chiefs, and Catherine Meindsey.

Shawn Ahearn begins his fourth year as Pitt State's Sports Information Director.

Ahearn is responsible for a wide range of duties, including coordinating media coverage of Pitt State's athletic teams, writing, editing and designing PSU's athletic media guides and game programs, maintaining complete results and statistics for all Gorilla sports, result reporting, supervising press box operations, and assisting with home event management, game promotions, and promotion of student athletes.

Ahearn earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Clarion University of Pennsylvania in 1985. He was SID at Chicago State University for three years before joining the PSU staff in July of 1989. Al Ortolani Head Athletic Trainer

Al Ortolani has been the athletic trainer at Pittsburg State for the past 35 years, and he truly is one of the most respected individuals in his profession in the nation. Ortolani also is an associate professor in the health, physical education and recreation department at Pittsburg State.

Ortolani joined the PSU athletic department staff as trainer in 1955, after earning his bachelor's and master's degree in education at PSU. He became a certified trainer shortly after his appointment, and quickly established an outstanding reputation among his peers.

Among numerous honors and accomplishments, Ortolani served as a trainer for the United States at the 1984 and 1976 Olympic Games. In 1982, he was a trainer at the U.S. World Cup in Ecuador, and he also served as the head trainer for the World Championship Games in Romania in 1981.

He was the trainer for the U.S. team at the 1979 Pan American games in Puerto Rico, and the 1973 World University Games in the Soviet Union. He also has worked with the U.S. Swimming team on several occasions.

Ortolani has been enshrined in the NAIA Hall of Fame and this past summer, was named to the National Athletic Trainers Association Hall of Fame at its annual meeting in Denver, CO.

Ortolani also was PSU's first full-time baseball coach from 1962 to 1972, and was honored as the NAIA District 10 Coach of the Year in 1965. He posted a 96-94 record in those 11 seasons, winning Central Intercollegiate Conference championships in 1965 and

1992 Lion Outlook

Missouri Southern is coming off a second place finish in the MIAA and a 7-2 record overall in 1992. Head coach Jon Lantz has only four starters returning on offense, but two of them comprise the one of the most potent passing combinations in the country. Senior QB Matt Cook returns after passing for 2,637 yards and 25 TDs his junior season earning him All-MIAA honors. 1992 Ichabod Outlook



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
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No. 1 Pitt State Hosts Washburn for Family Day

THE GAME

Pittsburg State University — 9-0 overall, 7-0 in the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association, and the No. 1 ranked team in the NCAA Division II football poll for the 10th straight week — will host an intrastate rival, the Washburn University Ichabods, Saturday (Nov. 7) for PSU's annual Family Day game. Washburn is 2-6 overall, and 2-5 in the MIAA. Kickoff is set for 1:30 p.m. at Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium.

ON THE AIR

Saturday's game will be broadcast live in the four-state area on KKOW Radio (860 AM) beginning with the pre-game show at 12:30 p.m. The Chuck Broyles Show on KOAM-TV will be shown 11:05 p.m. Friday and 12 p.m. Saturday.

GORILLAS RECORD STREAKS CONTINUE

With last week's 49-38 triumph over 12th-ranked Emporia State, Pitt State extended its school record for consecutive victories to 20, and the Gorillas increased their school-record unbeaten streak to 22 games (21-0-1).

The last blemish on PSU's ledger came in week four of the 1991 campaign, a 6-6 tie at home with Missouri-Rolla. After the deadlock, Pitt State reeled off 11 straight wins to capture the '91 NCAA Division II national title. PSU is 9-0 this year. The previous school records for consecutive victories and consecutive games without a loss was 18, set from 1960-62.

The longest current winning streak in the nation belongs to Miami (Fla.) They've won 26 straight games.

MORE WINS THAN ANYONE

Since 1986, Pitt State has posted more victories (79) than any other college football program in the country at any level, including Miami, which has won 75 games during the span.

Pitt State is 79-6-1 overall since 1986, and 87-8-1 overall since 1985. The Gorillas are 75-1-1 in their last 76 regular season games dating back to a 41-9 loss at Emporia State during the '85 campaign. The only team to beat PSU during a regular season game since the '85 defeat at Emporia State was East Texas State, 20-13 last year in Commerce. That loss ended a 56-game regular season winning streak.

PITT STATE IN THE MIAA

Since joining the MIAA in 1989, the Gorillas have posted a 34-0-1 overall record in their 35 conference games. PSU clinched at least a tie for its fourth MIAA title in as many years with last week's win. A victory over Washburn this week will win the championship outright. Pitt State's only blemish in MIAA play was the 6-6 tie against Missouri-Rolla in '91.

The last team to beat PSU in a conference game was Emporia State in '85 when both schools were members of the Central States Intercollegiate Conference. PSU is unbeaten in its last 62 conference games (CSIC and MIAA) since then. Pitt State is attempting to win its eighth straight league crown overall. The Gorillas captured four straight CSIC titles before joining the MIAA in 1989.

THE PITT STATE - WASHBURN SERIES

Pitt State has won the last 12 meetings between the schools, including last year's game, 21-0 at Topeka.

The Gorillas also have posted three straight shutout wins over the Ichabods, and PSU has blanked the 'Bods four times in the last five years. The Gorillas posted a 61-0 win in the last game played in Pittsburg in 1989, then won 17-0 and 21-0 at the Moore Bowl the last two years. Topeka native Duke Palmer preserved the shutout with an interception in the endzone on the game's final play last year. The last time the Ichabods scored against the Gorillas was in the fourth quarter of PSU's 23-14 win in 1988 at Topeka.

The Gorillas lead the series with Washburn 45-18-1. It is PSU's second longest series at 64 games, behind only the Emporia State series (73 games). Pitt State and Washburn have met every year since 1946, playing 47 games in 46 seasons. The teams met in the '86 NAIA playoffs, with PSU winning 58-24 in a first-round game.

THE COACHES

Pitt State's Chuck Broyles is in his third season as head coach at his alma mater (PSU '70). Broyles has a 34-2-1 overall mark, the best winning percentage (.932) of any coach in school history. He led PSU to the national title last season and was the Kodak/AFCA College Division I National Coach of the Year (NCAA Division II and NAIA-I).

Washburn's Dennis Caryl (Northwestern [IA] '64) is in his third season with the Ichabods and his sixth year as a college head coach. He currently has a 7-22 mark at WU (.241), and a 23-37 overall record (.383) as a college head coach. Caryl coached previously at Upper Iowa University.

NCAA DIVISION II NATIONAL STATS

After nine games, Pitt State appears prominently among NCAA Division II schools in several statistical categories.

Pittsburg State is first in Division II in rushing offense (360.2 ypg), third in total offense (492.1 ypg), and sixth in scoring offense (39.1 ppg). Pittsburg State's defense is ranked 27th against the run (112.7 ypg) in Division II.

Several individuals are ranked in the national stats. PSU senior fullback Ronald Moore now leads Division II in rushing (177.1 ypg) and scoring (15.8 ppg) and he is eighth in kickoff returns (29.3 ypr). Senior cornerback Duke Palmer is fifth nationally in interceptions with seven pick-offs in nine games (.778 per game). Sophomore placekicker Jeff Wood is 19th in field goals made per game (8 in 9 games; .889 per game).

OFFENSE ROLLS OVER TOUGH HORNET D

Pitt State rushed for 358 yards against an Emporia State team that had allowed an average of just 88.6 rushing yards entering the game, and the Gorillas rolled to a 49-38 victory over the No. 12 team in the nation.

PSU had 510 yards of total offense on the day, led by Moore, who had another record-setting performance. The Harlon Hill candidate rushed for 199 yards and 4 TDs on 27 carries and added a two-point conversion to account for 26 of Pitt State's 49 points.

Moore, who last week became PSU's all-time career rushing and scoring leader, set a new career record for rushing touchdowns (48), breaking the old mark of 47 set by Richard Overton (1977-80). He also set single-season PSU records for yards rushing (1,596), breaking Steve Howard's 1970 standard of 1,568, and rushing touchdowns (22), breaking Overton's record of 20 set in 1979.

Junior running back Joey Tobin added 80 yards on 12 carries, and junior quarterback Brian Hutchins had 79 yards on 21 carries. Hutchins also was 11-of-17 passing for 152 yards and 2 TD's.

BRADBURY EARNS MIAA HONOR

Sophomore linebacker Tim Bradbury earned MIAA Defensive Player of the Week after recording 11 tackles, picking off a pass, breaking up two others, and sacking ESU quarterback Curtis West, which caused a fumble that senior defensive end Troy Wilson picked up returned 17 yards for a TD. Wilson also had 11 tackles and two QB sacks.

West earned MIAA Offensive Player of the Week. He completed 24 of 42 passes for 326 yards with 3 TDs and 2 INTs. He also fumbled twice, and had -17 yards rushing.

CHASING JOHNNY BAILEY'S RECORD

Ronald Moore just missed his third straight 200-yard game (by one yard), but he is still in a position to challenge Texas A&I's Johnny Bailey's NCAA Division II single-season rushing mark of 2,011 yards set in 1986.

Moore now has 1,596 rushing yards through 9 games, an average of 177.1 yards per game. He is 416 yards away from breaking the three-time Harlon Hill Award winner's mark, or 208 yards per game.

CRACKING THE NCAA TOP 20

Moore also has a chance to crack the NCAA Division II career rushing leaderboard, even though he gained just 382 yards as a freshman on 48 carries.

With 4,031 career rushing yards (in 41 regular season games), Moore needs 139 yards to move into 19th place on the all-time list, which is headed by Bailey's 6,320 yards from 1986-89. Ricke Stonewall (1981-84) of Millersville (PA) is currently in 19th place with 4,169 career yards.

Through 9 games, Moore leads NCAA Division II in rushing with an average of 177.3 yards per game. He's just ahead of Roger Graham of New Haven (CT) who is averaging 176.8 yards per game. Moore also leads the nation in scoring, averaging 15.8 points per game. David McCrtney of Chadron (NE) State is next, averaging 13.8. Moore has scored five more touchdowns (23), than both Graham and McCartney, who both have 18. Moore also is ranked ninth in Division II in kickoff returns (29.3 ypr), but he has not had the opportunity to return a kickoff in the last two games.

33 HARLON HILL CANDIDATES ANNOUNCED

Moore is one of 33 candidates from four regions for the Harlon Hill Award honoring the NCAA Division II Player of the Year that were officially announced Wednesday (Nov. 4).

The top two players in each region will be chosen by the Division II Sports Information Directors and announced Friday, Nov. 20. The winner of the award will be announced at the Seventh Annual Harlon Hill Award Banquet in Sheffield, Ala. Dec. 11.

TOBIN EMERGES AS QUALITY BACKFIELD MATE

Junior running back Joey Tobin has established himself as PSU's No. 2 back along side Moore. In his last five games, Tobin has rushed for 515 yards (including 80 yards vs. Emporia State) on 52 carries — that's an average of 9.9 yards per carry and 103.0 yards per game.

For the season, Tobin has rushed for 620 yards on 84 carries to rank sixth in the MIAA in rushing (77.5 ypg).

While Pitt State's string of *three* consecutive seasons with *two* 1,000 yard backs will most likely end this year, Tobin and Moore will combine for more rushing yardage than Moore and tailback Darren Dawson did in their two years as backfield mates.

This year, with two games remaining to play, Moore and Tobin have combined for the exact same rushing yardage total (2,216) that Moore and Dawson compiled last year. Moore and Dawson combined for 2,183 yards in 1990.

DON'T FORGET ABOUT STATEN

Senior Ray Statén is quietly putting together an excellent season catching the football. He had 7 catches for 72 yards, including a 20-yard TD, against Emporia State. For the season, Statén has 38 catches for 651 yards with 7 TDs.

Statén needs 13 catches in PSU's final two games to set a new Gorilla record for receptions in a season. Former PSU All-American Ronnie West, the winner of the '91 Harlon Hill Award, set the Pitt State record with 50 catches last year.

HUTCHINS' LEADS THE MIAA IN PASSING

Junior Brian Hutchins continues to lead the MIAA in passing efficiency with a 154.1 rating, and he was ranked third in the MIAA in total offense this week (183.7 ypg).

Hutchins completed 11 of 17 passes for 152 yards and 2 TD's against Emporia State and added 79 yards rushing on 21 carries. For the season, Hutchins has completed 65 of 125 passes (.520) for 1,159 yards with 11 TDs and 3 INTs. He's also rushed for 494 yards and 5 TDs on 163 carries.

With 1,653 total yards, Hutchins has a good shot at breaking PSU's single-season total offense record of 1,875 yards set by Rick Clark in 1970. Hutchins also could make a run at Mark Hittner's single-season passing yardage mark of 1,502 set in 1978.

NFL UPDATE

Ronnie West saw limited action as a receiver Monday night in the Vikings blowout win over the Chicago Bears. West was activated two weeks ago from the Vikings practice roster. He was moved from receiver to running back in training camp, then back to receiver recently. West has yet to touch the ball in a regular season game, but he did score a couple of TDs rushing in the Vikes final pre-season game.

PSU's other NFL Rookie, long-snapper/offensive lineman Kendall Gammon of the Pittsburgh Steelers, has played in every game this year as Pittsburgh's long snapper on punts and place kicks.

In fact, it was Gammon's snap that led to the winning extra point in Pittsburgh's 21-20 victory over Houston on Sunday.

Both the Vikings and Steelers are 6-2 under new coaches, Dennis Green with Minnesota, and Bill Cowher of the Steelers.

WASHBURN LAST WEEK

The Ichabods survived a fourth-quarter charge to defeat the Southwest Baptist University Bearcats 21-17 at Topeka's Moore Bowl.

Southwest Baptist had a 5-0 halftime lead following a 26-yard field goal by Scott Winters, and a safety. Washburn took the lead, 7-5, in the third quarter on freshman quarterback Jeremy Smith's 2-yard run. Smith then hit Michael Dritlein with a 15-yard pass to extend the lead to 14-5, and later scored a second rushing TD early in the fourth quarter to put the 'Bods ahead 21-5.

SBU quarterback Trevor Spradley rallied the Bearcats with a pair of TD passes, but missed on both of his passes for two-point conversions that could have tied the game.

Smith threw for 209 yards on 14-of-22 passing. Cameron Pitcher led the way on the ground with 66 yards on nine carries.

BROYLES ON WASHBURN

"Washburn is playing as well as they have all year the last four games. They beat a good Central Missouri team, played Emporia State tough, and then just last week defeated Southwest Baptist. Their defense is playing aggressive and Jeremy Smith has given them a spark and they're moving the ball a lot better and putting points on the board.

"We hope the weather isn't a big factor in the game. I think it's important for us to get off to a good start, if we can, get a lead on them. They're a young team, the kind of team that the longer we keep them in the game the harder they'll play.

The Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association, a 12-member conference of NCAA Division II institutions located in Missouri and Kansas, begins its 80th season of competition this fall.

First organized in 1912 as the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association, the league has undergone several changes during the past decade, highlighted by expansion, increased participation in national championships, and as of July 1, 1992, a name change.

The MIAA has gained recognition as one of the top NCAA Division II athletic conferences in the nation, producing two NCAA National Championship teams last year — Pittsburg State University in football, and Missouri Southern State College in women's softball — and several individual NCAA champions and All-Americans.

The MIAA conducts conference championships in eight men's and seven women's sports. Men's champions are crowned in football, cross country, basketball, indoor and outdoor track and field, baseball, tennis, and golf. Women's championships are held in volleyball, cross country, basketball, softball, indoor and outdoor track and field, and tennis.

Ken B. Jones has served as the only full-time commisioner of the MIAA since his appointment in July of 1981. Judy Willson was named the MIAA's first Director of Sports Information in August of 1992.

History of the MIAA

- 1912 • Fourteen colleges in the state of Missouri organized the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Cape Girardeau State Teachers College (now SE Missouri St.), Kirksville State Teachers Colege (now NE Missouri St.), Maryville State Teachers College (now NW Missouri St.), Springfield State Teachers College (now SW Missouri St.), Warrensburg State Teachers College (now Central Missouri St.), Central College, Central Wesleyan College, Culver-Stockton College, Drury College, Missouri Valley College, Missouri Wesleyan College, Tarkio College, and William Jewell College
- 1924 • The conference reorganized to include only the five regional state colleges (SE Missouri St., SW Missouri St., NE Missouri St., NW Missouri St., Central Missouri St.)
- 1935 • The conference added the Missouri School of Mines, (now known as the University of Missouri-Rolla)
- 1970 • The conference added Lincoln University.
- 1980 • The conference added the University of Missouri-St. Louis
- 1981 • Orginal MIAA member Southwest Missouri State left the conference to pursue NCAA Division I status. Ken B. Jones named the conference's first full-time commisioner in July.
- 1982-83 • The MIAA began sponsoring championships in women's athletics.
- 1986 • Southwest Baptist University joined the conference, bringing the membership back up to eight schools.
- 1987 • On July 10, the institutional representatives voted to expand the membership of the conference to 12 schools, approving the addition of Missouri Southern State College, Missouri Western State College, Pittsburg State University, and Washburn University of Topeka. The addition of Pittsburg State and Washburn marked the first time that schools outside of the state of Missouri had received membership.
- 1989-90 • Missouri Southern, Missouri Western, Pittsburg State , and Washburn began MIAA competition.
- 1991 • Original MIAA member Southeast Missouri State left the conference to persue NCAA Division I status. Emporia (KS) State University joined the MIAA keeping the membership at 12 schools. Judy Willson was named the MIAA Director of Sports Information.
- 1992 • The MIAA voted to change its name to the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association
- 1992-93 • The 80th anniversary season of MIAA competition.

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The MIAA in the NCAA Playoffs

Pittsburg State has represented the MIAA in the NCAA Division II playoffs for the last three years. The league runner-up also earned a playoff berth in 1989 and 1990.

In 1989, Pittsburg State, the league champion, and Northwest Missouri St., the league runner-up battled in a first round playoff contest, with Pitt State emerging victorious, 28-7.

In 1990, Pitt State, again the league champion, defeated Northeast Missouri St., the league runner-up, 59-3 in another first round match-up of MIAA foes. PSU then beat East Tex. St., 60-28 in the quarterfinals, before falling to eventual national champion North Dakota St., 39-29 in the semifinals.

Pitt State's win over

Northwest in 1989 was the MIAA's first playoff victory. PSU's triumph over East Texas in 1990 marked the MIAA's first playoff win over a non-league opponent, and the first time a conference team reached the semifinals.

Then last season the Gorillas defeated four non-conference foes enroute to their first NCAA Division II National Championship and the first for the conference.

Northeast Missouri was the first MIAA team to appear in NCAA post-season play in 1982. The Bulldogs were beaten by Jacksonville (AL) State, 34-21 in a first-round game. NW Missouri qualified in 1984 and lost a first-round game to Nebraska-Omaha, 28-15.

Pittsburg State has qualified for post-season play 12 times in the 83-year history of the football program, highlighted by ten appearances in national playoff competition.

In 1957, the Gorillas captured the first of two NAIA National Championships under Coach Carnie Smith, completing a perfect 11-0 campaign with a 27-26 victory over Hillsdale College in the Holiday Bowl at St. Petersburg, Fla. In 1961, Smith led PSU to another NAIA National Title with a 12-7 win over Linfield College at the Camellia Bowl in Sacramento, Calif.

In 1981, the Gorillas returned to the NAIA National Championship game under Coach Ron Randleman, but PSU's bid for its third NAIA national crown came up short as Pitt State fell to Elon College of North Carolina, 3-0 on a frozen field.

In 1985 under Coach Dennis Franchione, the Gorillas qualified for the NAIA playoffs once again, but lost a first-round contest. Pitt State reached the semifinals the next three seasons, but each year, PSU's quest for a national crown ended in bitter defeat.

In 1989, PSU made the transition from the NAIA to the NCAA Division II ranks. The Gorillas won their first NCAA-II playoff game, a 28-7 victory over MIAA rival Northwest Missouri, before falling to Angelo State of Texas, 24-21 in the NCAA quarterfinals.

PSU returned to the NCAA playoffs in 1990, posting impressive home wins over Northeast Missouri (59-3) and East Texas State (60-28), before falling to eventual national champion North Dakota State, 39-29 in a thrilling semifinal game.

Finally in 1991, PSU won their first national title in 30 years and its first title as a member of the NCAA-II with a victory over Jacksonville (AL) State, 23-6 in Florence, AL. Under the direction of second-year head coach Chuck Broyles, Pitt State's victory over previously unbeaten Jacksonville State came after a tough 2-1-1 start to the season and 11 consecutive wins to end the season. It was a diversified and explosive offense, and a dominant defense that propelled the Gorillas to their third national crown.

The Gorillas have compiled a 9-5 record in seven NAIA playoff appearances, and a 7-2 mark in the NCAA Division II playoffs for a combined 16-7 record in playoff competition. PSU is 12-3 at home in the playoffs, and 4-4 on the road. Three of PSU's four road playoff wins were in championship games in 1957, 1961 and 1991.

PSU has played in three post-season bowl games, the '50 Shrine Bowl, the '79 Boot Hill Bowl, and the '80 Moila Shrine Bowl.

Pittsburg State University has built a tradition as one of the finest small-college football programs in the nation, with two NAIA national championships and an NCAA Division II national championship highlighting an illustrious gridiron history that dates back to the early 1900s.

After competing for 81 years as an NAIA program, PSU joined the NCAA Division II ranks and the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1989. The Gorillas captured the MIAA football championship their first three seasons in the new league, after winning four straight championships in the NAIA's Central States Intercollegiate Conference.

PSU qualified for the national playoffs for the seventh consecutive year in 1991, and reached the national semifinals for the fifth time in six years. The Gorillas also won their first NCAA Division II national title with a 23-6 victory over Jacksonville (AL) State. PSU won 56 straight regular season contests from 1985 to 1991 as well.

Pittsburg State has posted 48 winning seasons in its football history, capturing the NAIA national championship under Coach Carnie Smith in 1957 and 1961 and the NCAA-II national championship last season under Coach Chuck Broyles. The Gorillas also have won 23 league titles, including 10 championships in the last 13 years.

Pitt State fielded its first team in 1904, but no scores or results exist. Since its first official season in 1908, PSU has celebrated 460 victories, ranking the program sixth on the NCAA Division II all-time winningest teams list.

Pittsburg State joined the Kansas Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (KIAC) in 1911 and won its first conference championship in 1924 under Garfield W. Weede, compiling a 7-0-1 record, PSU's first undefeated season.

In 1925, Pitt State adopted the "Gorilla" as its official mascot. PSU is proud to be the only college or university in the country with the Gorilla as its athletic mascot.

The Gorillas became members of the Central Intercollegiate Conference (CIC) in 1928. The Gorillas won 10 league championships in 41 years in the league, six of which came between 1949 and 1966 under Carnie Smith. As the winningest coach in PSU history, Smith guided the Gorillas to 116 wins, 52 losses and six ties in his 18 seasons as the school's head coach.

The stadium where the Gorillas have played their home games since 1924, now bears the name of the legendary coach.

Under Smith, Pittsburg State won two NAIA national championships. The Gorillas achieved perfect 11-0 seasons in 1957 and 1961 to win the national honor.

Pitt State left the CIC for the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference in 1969, and won a conference title during its three seasons in the league. PSU competed in the Great Plains Athletic Conference from 1972-75 before joining the Central States Intercollegiate Conference (CSIC) in 1976. PSU won or shared the CSIC championship seven of 13 years in the league.

During the 1980's, Pitt State regained its national prominence. PSU earned a trip to the NAIA playoffs in 1981 for the first time since the '61 championship. The Gorillas completed a 10-2 season with a national runner-up finish, losing 3-0 in the NAIA title game.

PSU's success in the '80s continued under head coach Dennis Franchione, as the Gorillas won the CSIC championship and earned NAIA post-season playoff berths in 1985, 1986, 1987, and 1988. PSU reached the NAIA national semifinals the last three years the program was a member of the organization.

From 1980 to 1988, Pittsburg State won six CSIC championships, appeared in the NAIA national playoffs five times, and produced 34 NAIA All-Americans. During the 1980s, PSU compiled one of the best records of any football program, ranking second among NCAA Division II schools with a winning percentage of .800 and a record of 88-22.

Between 1908 and 1991, Pittsburg State has built a record of 460 wins, 275 losses, and 46 ties, making it one of the most successful in small college football programs in the nation. PSU's .618 winning percentage ranks 10th.



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
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

After mounting a 30-7 halftime lead, the 12th-ranked Gorillas exploded for 29 points in the third quarter and piled up 549 total yards of offense in a big Homecoming victory. Ronald Moore rushed for 152 yards and three TD's on just 13 carries and Darren Dawson had 102 yards and one touchdown on 17 carries as the Gorillas rushed for 421 yards on the day. All-American Ronnie West caught two passes for 113 yards, including a 79-yard TD reception which broke the game wide open in the second quarter. QB Jeff Moreland passed for 128 yards including the scoring pass to West, and also added a rushing touchdown.

Pitt State made their first trip to Florence, Alabama a memorable one as the Gorillas won their first NCAA Division II National Championship, and the third national championship in school history, with a stellar performance against the Gamecocks of Jacksonville (AL) State. PSU started off slowly punting on their first possession and turning the ball over on downs on their second possession. That is when QB Brian Hutchins and Harlon Hill Award winner Ronnie West started to work their magic. Hutchins completed a key third down pass to keep the drive alive and then threw a 17-yard touchdown pass with 1:33 left in the first quarter to put PSU on top, 7-0. Jax State took the ensuing kickoff 70 yards on 15 plays, with Terence Bowens' 3-yard TD run pulling the Gamecocks to within one, 7-6. The Jax State defense contained the Gorilla rushing game throughout the first half as Ronald Moore had 44 yards and Darren Dawson had only 13. But the Gamecock defense couldn't stop Hutchins, as the sophomore engineered another successful drive, again utilizing West for 42 yards and Shad Klinge for 24, setting up a first down on the JSU 13 with 24 seconds left in the first half. Hutchins then rolled out and scampered into the end zone with a 13-yard TD. He finished the day 10-of-14 for 159 yards and a TD. Dawson added a third-quarter TD run of 10 yards and James Jenkins kicked a 22-yard field goal to cap the scoring. Jax State's hopes were dashed in the third quarter as starting QB Nickey Edmondson went down with an ankle injury and the Gorillas adjusted to the Gamecock's wishbone attack. The Gorilla defense dominated in the second half, led by DE Troy Wilson, who tallied two critical sacks, while DE Phil McCoy and LB Kris Mengarelli also had a sack each and several key tackles.



The Wildcats put together a march in the fourth period that looked unstoppable, until KSC's Archie Ringgenberg stepped in front of Bill Parrish's pass and returned it 89 yards to the Wildcat 6. An LC penalty on the return moved the ball to the 3, and two plays later Gary Snadon dove across for the 1-yard score. Parrish hit Bernie Grant for a 9-yard score late in the game for Linfield's lone TD, followed by Gary Olsen's extra point.

Elon's third lost fumble set up a third Hammons field goal attempt, but his 27-yard try sailed off the mark to keep the game scoreless.

EC's Phil Renn broke the scoring drought early in the fourth quarter with a 23-yard field goal. Hammons had one more opportunity to connect, but his 47-yard attempt with 10:27 left was short. PSU's final attempt at a victory ended with 4:30 remaining, when the Gorilla drive ended with a turnover at the Elon 34. The Fighting Christians ran out the clock from there.

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


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

Regular Season Winning Streak Ends at 56

Pittsburg State University won an amazing 56 consecutive regular season football games from 1985-91. The Gorillas posted five straight unblemished regular season campaigns (from 1986-90) before the streak ended last year.

After suffering a 41-9 defeat at Emporia (KS) State University on Sept. 28, 1985, Pitt State was perfect in regular season play for nearly six years — winning 56 straight regular season contests. PSU's 20-13 loss at East Texas State University on Sept. 14, 1991 ended the streak.

PSU won its last six regular season games of the '85 campaign after the Emporia State loss, then went 10-0 in regular season play in 1986, 9-0 in regular season action in '87 and '88, and 11-0 in '89. Pitt State posted a 10-0 regular season mark in '90, and the Gorillas won the '91 season opener against Friends University, before losing at East Texas State in week two.

Entering the 1992 season, PSU is 66-1-1 in its last 68 regular season games. PSU won its last seven regular season contests last year.



Gorilla Ground Game

The Pittsburg State University football program's success in the past seven years can be directly related to its potent rushing attack.

The Gorillas have finished in the top five nationally in rushing offense during the last seven years, leading the nation twice (1986 & 1987). In each of those seasons, Pitt State has been in the national playoffs.

The last time Pittsburg State didn't have a 1,000-yard rusher was 1983. Since 1983, 11 Gorillas have gained more than 1,000 yards.

For the last three seasons, Pittsburg State has had two players finish with more than 1,000 yards rushing, a feat that has only been accomplished seven other times in the history of Division II football.

The following is a list of players that have surpassed the 1,000-yard plateau, and PSU's team rushing since 1985.



Three former members of the Pittsburg State University football program have been selected in the National Football League Draft during the past two years, and will be attempting to earn roster spots this season.

Former PSU cornerback Darryl Wren was selected in the third round of the 1991 NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills. This past spring, wide receiver Ronnie West was chosen by the Minnesota Vikings in the ninth round, while guard Kendall Gammon was chosen by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 11th round.

Wren, the 82nd pick overall, was chosen higher in the draft than any other player in PSU history, three selections higher than tackle Mike Potchad, who was a fourth-round choice (85th overall) by the Atlanta Falcons in 1971. Wren spent the 1991 season on the injured-reserve list for the Bills.

West, the winner of the 1991 Harlon Hill Award as the NCAA Division II Player of the Year, was primarily selected by the Vikings for his receiving and return ability, but was moved to running back during training camp this summer.

Gammon, a three-time All-MIAA selection, was chosen by the Steelers for his long-snapping ability on special teams and has also been getting work at the center position on offense.

Before Wren, the last Pitt State NFL draftee was end Alan Spencer, who was picked in the 12th round by the Vikings in 1973. Running back Albert Schmidt was selected in the 11th round by the Los Angeles Rams in 1972, following Potchad's selection in 1971.

The first Gorilla selected in the NFL Draft was tackle Len Mansfield, a seventh-round selection by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1958. He was followed in the same draft by teammate Ted Stahura, who was picked in the 30th round by the San Francisco 49ers as a future pick. Future picks were for players that had eligibility remaining, but whose class had graduated.

During the 1960's, the American Football League and the NFL were in a war to get the top players coming out of college, and each league had its own draft. Jerry Archer, a center on the 1961 championship team, was selected after his junior season by both the Detroit Lions (10th round of the NFL Draft) and the New York Titans (27th round of the AFL Draft) as a future pick by both squads.

Eldon Danenhauer, an offensive tackle for the Gorillas in the late 1950's, was not selected in the draft, but he is probably PSU's most successful pro player. Danenhauer played with the Denver Broncos from 1960-65, and earned All-AFL honors twice.

LeRoy Andrews, who played on PSU's earliest teams, was the first Gorilla to make the pros. He coached nine years in the NFL, leading the New York Giants to NFL runner-up finishes in 1929 and 1930 with a 26-5-1 mark during the span. Andrews also coached a team against the "Notre Dame All-Stars" led by Knute Rockne. It would be the last game Rockne would coach. Andrews posted a 54-32-6 overall record, coaching six teams, four as a player/coach.

John Levra, a linebacker for the Gorillas on the '61 championship team, never played pro football, but he is entering his 13th season as an assistant coach in the pros. Levra joined the staff of the Chicago Bears as defensive line coach in 1986, after working in the Canadian Football League in 1980, and under O.A. "Bum" Phillips in New Orleans from 1981-1985.

Others Gorillas who played pro football include: Ron Freeman, a linebacker for the Pittsburgh Maulers and Orlando Renegades of the United States Football League, Joe Murphy, who coached football and swimming at PSU from 1949 to 1976, played briefly for the St. Louis Gunners in 1934, and Bob Tarrant, a split end who played one season with the New York Giants in 1936. Many other Gorillas have earned free agent tryouts in the NFL, the most recent being running back Monte Weathers with Seattle in 1988-89.

A total of 31 former Pittsburg State University coaches and student-athletes have been enshrined in the Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame during the past four years.

The Hall of Fame was established in 1988, when a group of 15 charter members were inducted. This year, four new members will join the Hall of Fame as PSU's fifth class of inductees during Homecoming ceremonies on Oct. 10.

Of the five members inducted in 1991, three were former PSU football players — Kenneth Paxton Gire, John Peterson and Tom Miller.

Gire was selected by coaches Charley Morgan and Carnie Smith as captain of the school's 50th Anniversary football team in 1953. He was a three-time All-Conference selection at offensive center for the Gorillas.

John Peterson, who attended PSU from 1964-69, played defensive tackle and was PSU's only three-time All-American (1965-67), as well as a three-time All-Conference choice.

Tom Miller was a starting guard on Pittsburg State's 1957 NAIA National Championship Football Team. He earned second team All-American honors in 1957 and was a first-team All-Conference pick.

"Pittsburg State has a long history of a very strong intercollegiate athletic

program," said PSU President Donald W. Wilson. "We are proud of the accomplishments that these individuals have made to that strong tradition, and they will be honored from now on as members of our Hall of Fame."

A six-person selection committee composed of alumni and current athletic staff members evaluates the merits of the candidates who have been nominated for this distinction. The committee will select a new class each fall, with an induction ceremony scheduled as part of PSU's

Homecoming festivities.

The Hall of Fame is located in the south hallway on the first floor of the Weede P.E. Building. Photos of the inductees are displayed with a mural honoring PSU's 1957 and 1961 national championship football teams.

The Pittsburg State University football stadium and field, now known as Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium, was built in 1923 with volunteer labor and money donated by students, alumni, faculty and citizens of Pittsburg.

The facility was first named in honor of William Aaron Brandenburg, the first president of the University. In 1987, the University announced that the field would continue to bear the name of PSU's first president, but the stadium would now be called Carnie Smith Stadium in honor of the legendary PSU football coach who led the Gorillas to two NAIA national championships (1957 and 1961) and six conference titles during his tenure from 1949 to 1966.

During the past three years, Brandenburg Field/Carnie Smith Stadium has undergone over a million dollars worth of

renovations, making the stadium one of the finest small college athletic facilities in the nation.

The state-of-the-art August and Helen Rua Press Box was completed in time for the 1989 football season, and PSU hosted its first outdoor track meet on the new polyurethane Prentice Gudgen Track in the spring of 1989. Other parts of the major renovation project included the installation of an electronic message center and scoreboard, a new sound system, new lights, comfortable seating mounted in the bleachers, as well as a new bermuda grass playing surface.

Construction of the facility began with volunteer labor during the summer of 1923, after a successful fund drive raised the necessary \$100,000 to build the stadium. To ensure the stadium would be built in time for the 1924 season, PSU faculty members were required to contribute up to eight hours of labor per week.

On October 11, 1924, the first varsity football game was played between PSU (known as Kansas State Teachers College) and Baker University in front of approximately 4,000 fans. The Gorillas didn't disappoint the many people who worked so hard to build the new facility, earning a 6-0 victory over Baker.

The west stands of the stadium seat 3,600 spectators, and the east stands, added in 1940, seat an additional 2,000 people. The stadium is architecturally notable for the concrete relief over the front entrance, which was sculpted by PSU alumnus Waylande Gregory.

Strength and Conditioning Facility


Pittsburg State University's strength and conditioning program, under the direction of John Johnson, assists in keeping the Gorillas athletes in shape throughout the year.

Johnson designs not only exercise plans for the over 200 student-athletes, but also a dietary plan to follow during training for a complete fitness program, using the latest in research and technology.

Football student-athletes wrap up their conditioning program in the spring with the annual "Night of Champions"

lifting competition, which is open to the public.

The most visible part of the program is the PSU Fitness Center, located in the Garfield W. Weede Physical Education Building. The center features 3,700 square feet of work space, 10,000 lbs. of free-weight equipment, 16 single unit machine exercise stations, numerous free-weight exercise stations, and several Schwinn Airdyne Exercise Cycles. The Weede swimming pool is also used for conditioning as well as rehabilitation of injuries.



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

\$1600 Halftime Passing Contest

Contest Rules

- Three individuals will participate in the halftime passing contest at each PSU home game. Participants will be chosen by displaying an official PSU Football Game Program bearing a special mark on the inside back cover. The special mark and additional contest information will be announced over the public address system prior to halftime.
- In order to win cash prizes, participants must throw a pass and hit a target. The decision of the contest judges will be final.

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
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
