# Schrag award presentation set

The annual Priscilla S. Schrag Memorial Music Award will be presented at 1:30 p.m. Thursday during a music department convocation in McCray Recital Hall, Pittsburg State University.

The award, which carries a stipend of \$100, is presented each year to an outstanding music student.

Dr. and Mrs. John White founded the award in memory of Mrs. Schrag, who died in 1985, in the hope that the living memorial would continue to spread her influence to future generations of young musicians. Mrs. Schrag was known as a strong supporter of involvement in the arts. Many of Mrs. Schrag's friends and colleagues have contributed to the fund which supports the award.

The award is always given on the final Thursday of the PSU fall semester, in order to coincide as closely as possible with Mrs. Schrag's birthday, which was Dec. 31.

In order to be eligible for the award, a student must reflect Mrs. Schrag's own dedication to excellence in scholarship and performance, as well as exhibit the strength of character which defines leadership.

The recipient will be chosen by Dr. Gene Vollen, chairman of the PSU music department. He will read a citation emphasizing those qualities which influenced his choice.

Mrs. Schrag was born in Patterson, N. J., where her parents, Walter and Ruth Schoeder, still reside. She received a bachelor of arts from Wilson College, Chambersburg, Pa., and a master of arts in theology from Columbia-Union Theological Seminary, New York City. She also received a master of arts in English from New York University and had completed her studies toward a doctor

English at Kansas State University.

An accredited medical records technician, Mrs. Schrag was director of medical records at Mt. Carmel Medical Center. She had been working toward a master of business administration.

She was a member of the First United Methodist Church, and was a member and editor of the newsletter for the Altrusa Club of Greater Pittsburg. She was also a member of Phi Beta Kappa honorary scholastic society.
