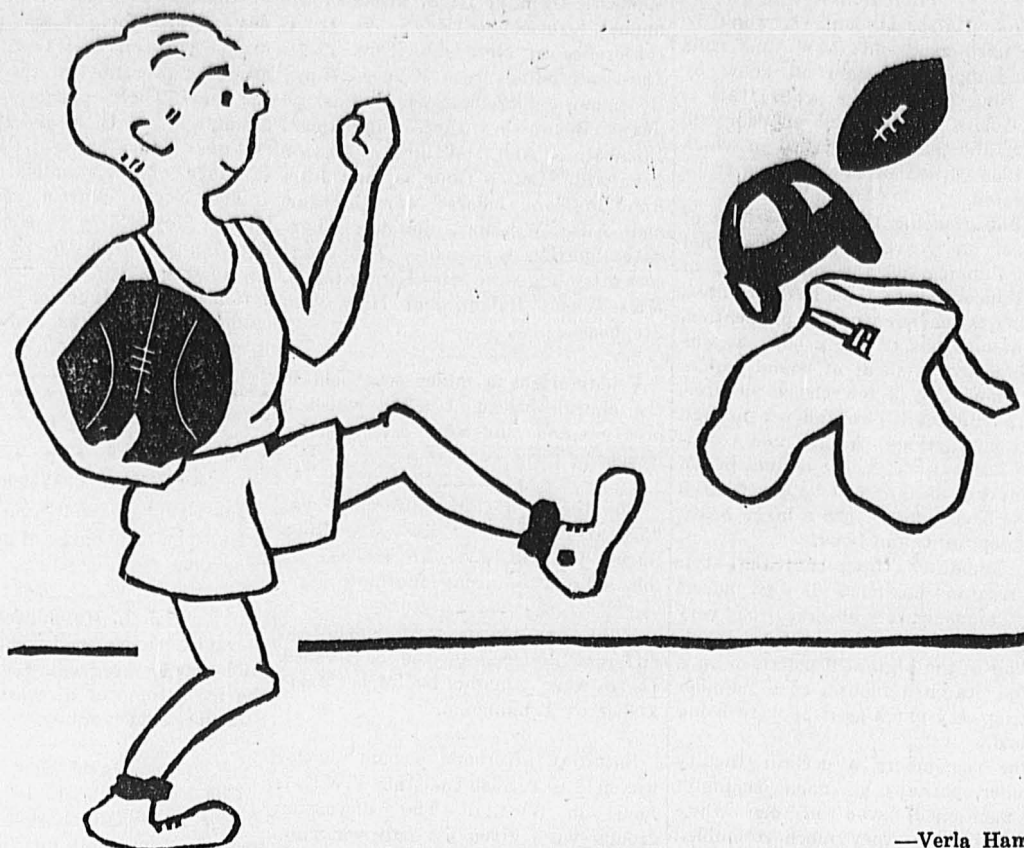

## Dragons Handed First Defeat of Season by Miami

Gudgenmen Lose to Powerful  
Wardog Team on Cold  
Turf

### Sleet Mars Game

Oklahoma Team Scores in First  
Period After Bad Kick  
From 7-yard Line

The Pittsburg high Dragon was handed its first defeat of the 1937 football season last Saturday afternoon on Brandenburg field, losing to the Miami Wardogs on a slushy, half-frozen turf, 0 to 6.

The Dragons decided to receive. With a cold icy wind in their faces the Purple put the ball in play on their own 16-yard line, after Fadler returned the kickoff from behind the goal up to this point.

Three plays at the line netted six yards. Fadler then kicked but the wind stopped it and it went out of bounds on the 21-yard line. The Miami team marched to the 7-yard line but the Pittsburg team took the ball on downs. Again Fadler booted out of bounds on the 21-yard line; but the Miami team came back with a 11-yard run to the Pitt ten. Then three plays took the ball up to the 2-yard line. On the fourth down Keithly plunged over for the only counter of the game.

The rest of the game was a battle of plunging backs and slippery runs in and around the midfield stripe with the Dragons fighting the cold and the mud but with no gain. Both teams were covered with cold icy mud.

The only Dragon threat came in the second quarter when from their own 23-yard line they advanced the ball down field 56 yards to the Miami 21-yard line just before the gun.
