Creator	The materials of the James Tate Collection were collected by Gene DeGruson, from the early 1960s to 1997, and Randy Roberts, from 1998 to the mid-2000s. Additional materials were donated by Charles Cagle.

Scope and Content James Tate was a Pulitzer Prize-winning poet, and an English and literature professor at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst. He was an alumnus of the Kansas State College of Pittsburg (now Pittsburg State University). Tate's poems were published in numerous books, magazines, pamphlets, and as broadsides during his career. Tate won several awards and honors, including the Pulitzer Prize (Poetry, 1992); the Yale Series of Younger Poets; the National Book Award for Poetry; and in 2004 was inducted into the American Academy of Arts and Letters. The contents of this collection consists of biographical and autobiographical material, correspondence, bibliographical information (compiled by Gene DeGruson), Tate's poetry, reviews, advertisements, publicity pieces, clippings, literary journals, recordings of interviews, and university catalogs.

Biographical Note James Tate was born on December 8, 1943 in Kansas City, Missouri. His father, Vincent Appleby, was a pilot during World War II and was killed in action shortly after Tate was born. After his mother remarried, he took the name of his step-father (Tate). James Tate attended high school at Shawnee Mission East High School, in Shawnee Mission, Kansas. In 1961 he was enrolled at the Kansas State College of Pittsburg (now Pittsburg State University) where he majored in geology for a few months, before switching his degree to English with a minor in philosophy. He graduated in 1965 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. He earned a Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of Iowa in 1967. After obtaining his master's degree Tate taught creative writing at the University of California, Berkley and Columbia University before settling at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst in 1971. In 1972, Tate married Liselott Jonsson, and the marriage ended in divorce in 1986.

Tate began writing poetry during his first semester at the Kansas State College of Pittsburg. In 1966, Tate won the Yale Series of Younger Poets for his first collection of poems, *The Lost Pilot*, a series of poems inspired by his father. His first volume of poetry, *Cages*, was published in 1966. Many considered Tate's style as being surreal, ironic, comic, lively, dream-like, bold, and adventurous. Tate won the Poetry Society of America's William Carlos Williams Award in 1991 for his *Selected Poems*, which also won the Pulitzer Prize for poetry in 1992. His collection of poetry, *Worshipful Company of Fletchers*, won the National Book award in 1994. He has also received the Wallace Stevens's award and fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation and the National Endowments for the Arts. Tate was married to the poet Dara Wier. He died on July 8, 2015 in his home in Amherst, Massachusetts.
