PROGRAM NOTES

DECLARATION OVERTURE

Claude T. Smith's *Declaration Overture* is dedicated to the composer's wife, Maureen. The work was premiered by the North Central Bandmasters Honors Band at the 25th Anniversary Concert, November, 1975, in Chillicothe, Missouri. The overture is based on variations of the opening melody.

THREE JOURNEYS TO A HOLY MOUNTAIN

Alan Scott Hovhaness is an American composer of Armenian descent. His music is unlike any other composed in modern times and utilizes sonorities which most nearly approach the expressive content of Asiatic music. Many of his compositions have characteristics of tranquility and gentleness which contrasts with our contemporary age of dissonance. The first movement of *Three Journeys To A Holy Mountain* is in the spirit of Armenian religious music in three great melodic arcs, the last having the mood of a spiritual. The second movement is a long melodic line completed non-harmonically and unisonally over held drones in Oriental style. The third movement is in the form of a chorale and fugue; at the climax of the fugue, the chorale theme returns interspersed with many-voiced canon interludes.

HORN CONCERTO IN E-FLAT, K. 447

It was for Ignaz Leitgeb that Mozart wrote his four horn concerti. Leitgeb had been a horn player in the Archbishop's orchestra in Salzburg, and although he may have been a lazy and simple-minded fellow (Mozart delighted in playing practical jokes on him), he must have played his instrument well. The *Concerto No. 3*, presumed to have been written in 1783, stands out among the concerti because of its somewhat larger scope and its greater range of expression.

MARCH HONGROISE

The Marche Hongroise, or "Rakoczy March," the national air of Hungary, was first orchestrated by Berlioz in Vienna during his tour of 1845 and performed at a concert in Pesth, where it was received enthusiastically. In order to justify the interpolation of this march, he determined that the opening scene of his dramatic legend, "The Damnation of Faust," would take place on the plains of Hungary.

SERENADE FOR ALTO SAXOPHONE AND BAND

Regarding his Serenade, composer Frank Bencriscutto has said "I'm probably a prejudiced alto saxophonist, but I feel the alto saxophone is one of the most expressive of all instruments, possessing the greatest range of character potential. Serenade is written to take advantage of its technical grace and warm lyricism." The piece has two main themes: first a dance-like section using a long flowing theme, and then a serene ballad. The composition closes with the return of the first theme.
