Prizes Displayed Down Town

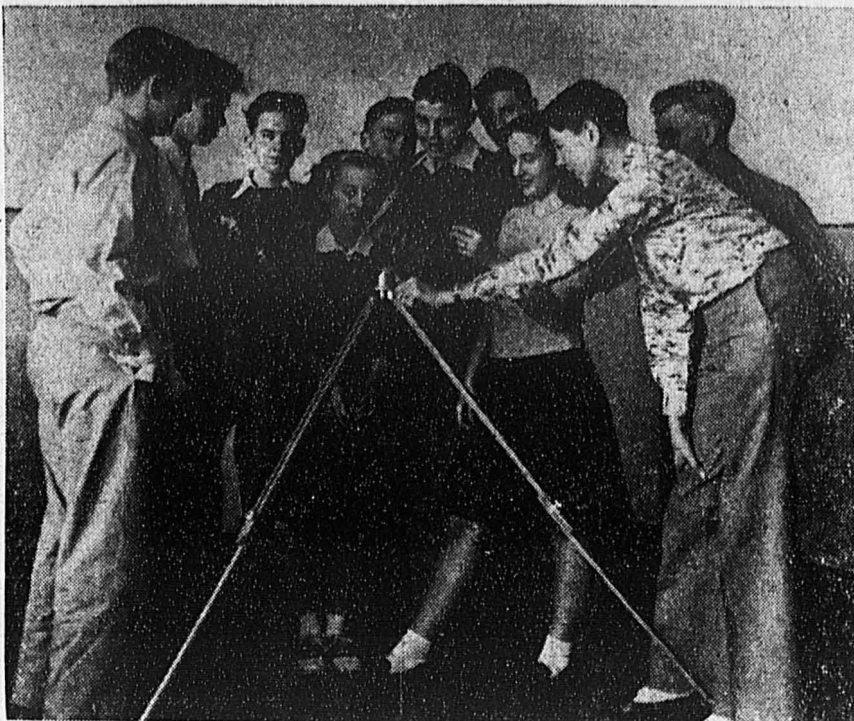
Due to the limited display space here in the school, a collection of dolls and prizes for the Lucky Yazzi Contest has been placed of Helen's shop downtown.

Stanford University Offers Scholarships To Worthy Pupils

PHS students may now take advantage of the Scholarships being offered by Stanford University if they enter the university as freshman, or as undergraduates with advanced standing, in September 1947.

Award actually made will depend upon the qualifications of the applicants. Consideration will be given to the school applicants previous record, promise of scholastic success, and financial need.

Scholarships are awarded for three quarters. Scholarship holders pay full tuition and other fees charged to regularly registered students, amounting to \$500 per year.

Scholarships offered are as follows: General Scholarships, open to men and women for study in any field; special scholarship, open to women whose major subject is Physical Education; there are a few additional scholarships, open to entering students, and a number of regional scholarships for students from certain localities.
