### Johnson Makes Extensive Plans For Music Pupils

This year the music department is planning several useful and enjoyable trips and concerts.

"In an effort to stimulate interest in the orchestra, we are combining the better string players of the junior high orchestra together with a few of our better brass players with the senior high orchestra," explained Mr. Johnson, music director.

#### Musicians Sacrifice

It is their intention to have about sixty players in this symphony orchestra. These musicians sacrifice a few of their evenings for practice. So far, there have been two rehearsals.

"We have in mind two trips for this group," Mr. Johnson announced. One will be an exchange program with Joplin high school. The second will be when the orchestra, along with the chorus, journey to Ft. Scott for an orchestra and chorus clinic.

"The chorus is one of the best balanced we've had for a number of years," stated Mr. Johnson with a pleased expression. "It's our intention to present an opera or operetta later. In the meantime we're getting ready to present a shorter program."

"The band has been invited to Ft. Scott, Nov. 11, for their Armistice Day Parade and to play at the football game in the afternoon. Several bands have been invited," continued Mr. Johnson.

Richard Edwards and Monroe Thomas are the color bearers who will be used in both parades and flag raising ceremonies. The color guards are John Ward and Walter Bates.

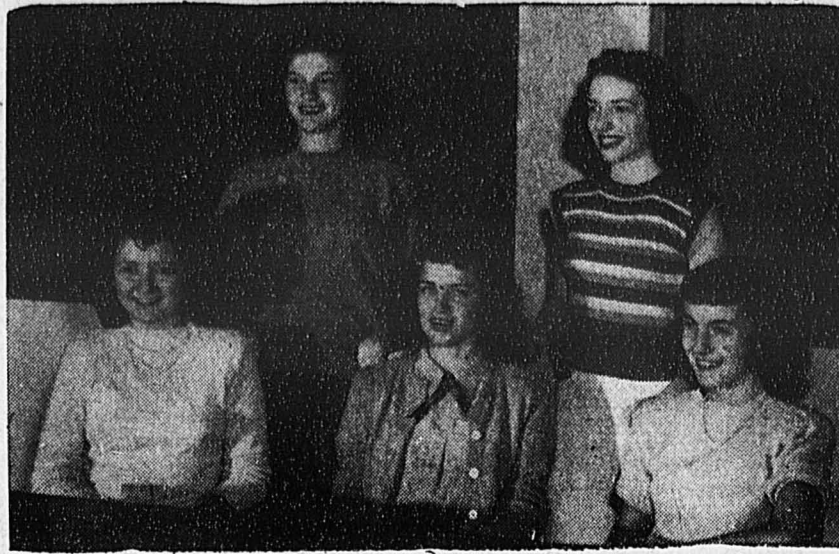
This summer, despite the shortage of lumber, Mr. Biddle, teacher of these classes, has been busy making equipment for the Board of education in the city schools. All but two weeks he spent making tables and easels and other equipment for grade schools and cabinets for some of the rooms in PHS.

"I am trying a new plan this year," remarked Mr. Biddle. "The boys will look over plans and make their decisions on what projects to make. Foremen are chosen to supervise the milling out of the parts of the project for their group."

This system aids in the explanation of the working of the machines, gives the student a chance to bring out his supervisory abilities, and gives him a chance to see how parts are made on an assembly line basis as in industry.

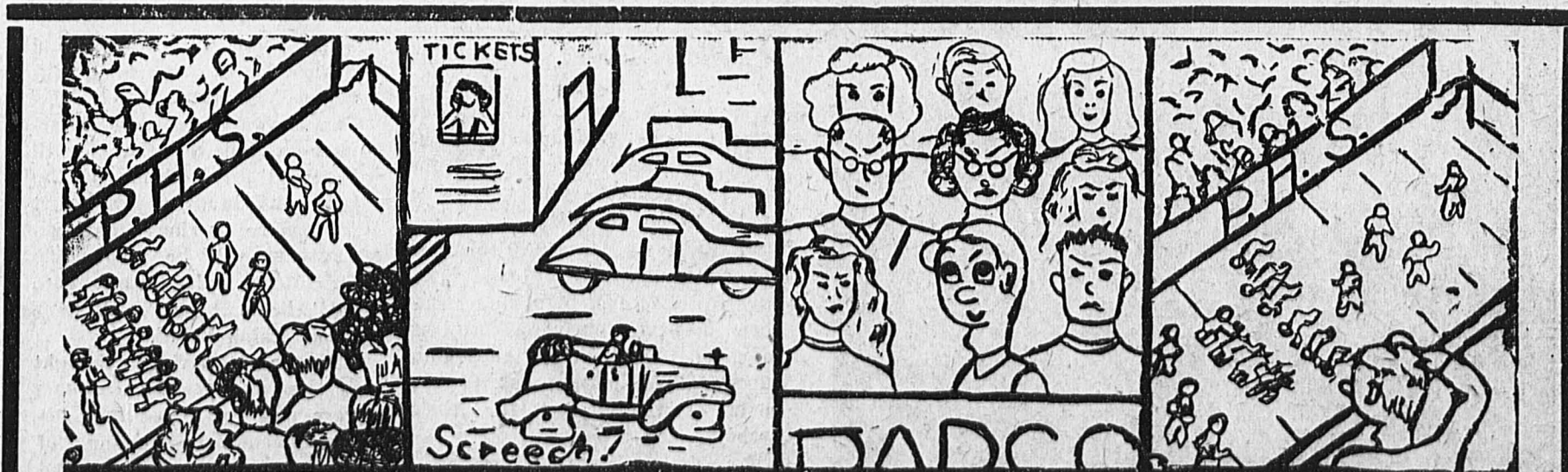
