With the United States and Russia at each others throats, the Chinese "Commies" fighting the Chinese Government, and the Palestine Jews at war with Palestine Arabs, the thinking people all over the world again are looking for some way to keep peace.

The one question that faces people today is how strong a world organization is needed to get this peace. Will it only have to be a confederation or will it have to be a federation?

Let's analyze each of these forms of government.

A confederation is a loose group of nations meeting together to discuss problems of mutual concern. It must be made clear, however, that the confederation can only recommend, it cannot make laws or make its decisions mandatory upon its members. The League of Nations and the United States are acid examples of the weakness of a confederation.

The second choice is a federation. Let's see why a federation is feasible. First of all, it can make and

enforce its laws and decisions. Secondly member nations will be represented in an entirely different method. The world legislature will be made up of two bodies. An upper house based upon equal representation from each nation and a lower house based upon three prime factors; population, literacy, and industrial potentialities.

The executive body will be made up of all members with, $\frac{3}{4}$ vote, being necessary to override any action by the legislative group. World courts will also be set up.

These three phases will complete a federation with power to control production of destructive weapons and external intercourse between nations.

The United States and Switzerland could be used as examples of working federations with the powers enumerated.

Clearly two paths lay before the people of the world today, continue under the resent system that has led us into war every 25 years. Or on the other hand take the path of world federation that provides strength to keep the peace.

The world seemed to be behind this organization, yet just three years later, here in 1948, plans are already being formulated to do away with this organization and establish a Federal World Government.

One of the main reasons given for this is the assertion that the United Nations has failed to solve present day problems. When people start talking about an organization, and how it has failed, this same organization is usually here to stay. The fact that some 50 odd nations have been brought together under the same roof, peacefully, is a sign of success by itself. When nations can air their opinions and differences by talking about them instead of going out and

shooting each other over some small dispute, this is a sure sign of success.

Difficulties in setting up a Federal World Government are overwhelming. The fact that nations do not have the same cultures, different governments, and do not understand another country's viewpoint, alone renders such a plan a failure and impossibility.

When people of America think of a Federal World Government, they think of the United States as being the head of such a plan, but would they? People are only seeing the finished product when they talk about a FWG. They have neglected to look at the work back of such an accomplishment. Advocates of a Federal World Government are asking that the working organization, the United Nations, which is a reality today, be thrown out and in its place put something that is only a vague dream.

City Wide Safety Program To Start Dec. 13

Safety Hazards Lurk; Be Alert

Stunned, hurt, and unbelieving, an individual wakes up, to what safety really is—in a hospital! Freedom from danger, exemption from injury, this is safety!

Everyday life is fraught with danger! Danger rides behind the wheel of every car and bicycle. Danger lurks in the dark corners of every hall, at the bottom of every stairway. Danger waits, ready to pounce on the hand that wanders too close to the workshop machinery.

Common sense warns that there are hazards everywhere, but too many people let their common sense drift and so wander into serious

accidents.

By being alert, one can be his own safety committee. Surprisingly, many accidents occur when drivers hit objects that are in plain view. Foolish? In one year alone, there were 2,980 motor car accidents by owners who killed themselves by hitting obstructions, in plain sight. Despite the ghastly warning of the previous year, 3,940 persons went out and got themselves killed in precisely the same way the very next year.

The problem is small—the consequences big. A careless moment may mean a human life!

Grade Schools Use Safety Patrols

"Approximately 200 grade school students will be serving on the safety patrols on the Pittsburg streets," stated Miss Blanch Smith, elementary school supervisor. "Boys and girls who take part in this organization will serve on the patrol on the most dangerous corners near the high schools."

The safety patrols are made up of boys and girls from the grade school, who have their parent's consent, and are usually from the sixth grade. Some, however, are going to be from the fifth grade in smaller schools.

"Pupils stand on the busy corners when students are leaving school to direct their crossing of streets. They will not be stationed there to direct automobile traffic, but will be there only to give signals to children waiting to cross the streets," Miss Smith said.

"On Dec. 18, a safety parade will be held here in Pittsburg. Representatives from all the grade schools, will march in the parade. Winners of the safety contest sponsored by the Pittsburg Safety Council will also march in the parade," Miss Smith concluded.

Free Show For Patrols

When the school bell rings now days and the warning school stop sign is put out, a guardian of the law stands behind it ready to protect Pittsburg school children.

John Pryor, safety patrolman for Pittsburg, is the watchful custodian of Pittsburg's children.

"The school patrols deserve the credit," he said, "I go from school to school supervising the work of these patrols and I have found them very capable, the girls as well as the boys."

Patrol Makes No Arrests

Since Patrol members cannot stop cars or make arrests, they wait for clear traffic before waving children across the street and rely on drivers to slow to a full stop at school signs.

"Cooperation by drivers and the setting of examples by adults will aid this safety program," Mr. Pryor continued.

Pryor recalls the long, hard fight to get an effective safety program for Pittsburg.

"Now that we have a safety program we will do every thing in our power to make it a success," he stated. Repainting of school stop signs and pedestrians zones are a part of this program.

Safety Program In Infancy.

Though still in its infancy the safety campaign in Pittsburg compares well with the safety program of cities that have had such programs in effect for years.

"Some common mistakes children make," according to Mr. Pryor "are failing to realize that they can be hit at any intersection regardless of whether it is considered a dangerous one or not. Riders of motor scooters should bear in mind," he said, "that they are classed as drivers and should observe the same rules for safe driving as motorists do."

Traffic Accidents Kill Many Children

Last year, in the United States, 2,400 children of school age were killed in traffic accidents. Out of this total, 24 were victims of Kansas highway accidents. In addition to the 24 who were killed, 366 school children were injured on Kansas highways.

School children are taught the rules of safety, but this does not relieve a driver of his responsibility, for most accidents to school children are the driver's fault.

Here are four outstanding rules for highway caution:

1. Consider every child on the street a human caution sign.
2. Drive with extra care whenever you see children or pass a school.
3. Keep clear of bicycles.
4. Watch out for youngsters on tricycles, roller skates, scooters, and those playing in or near the street.

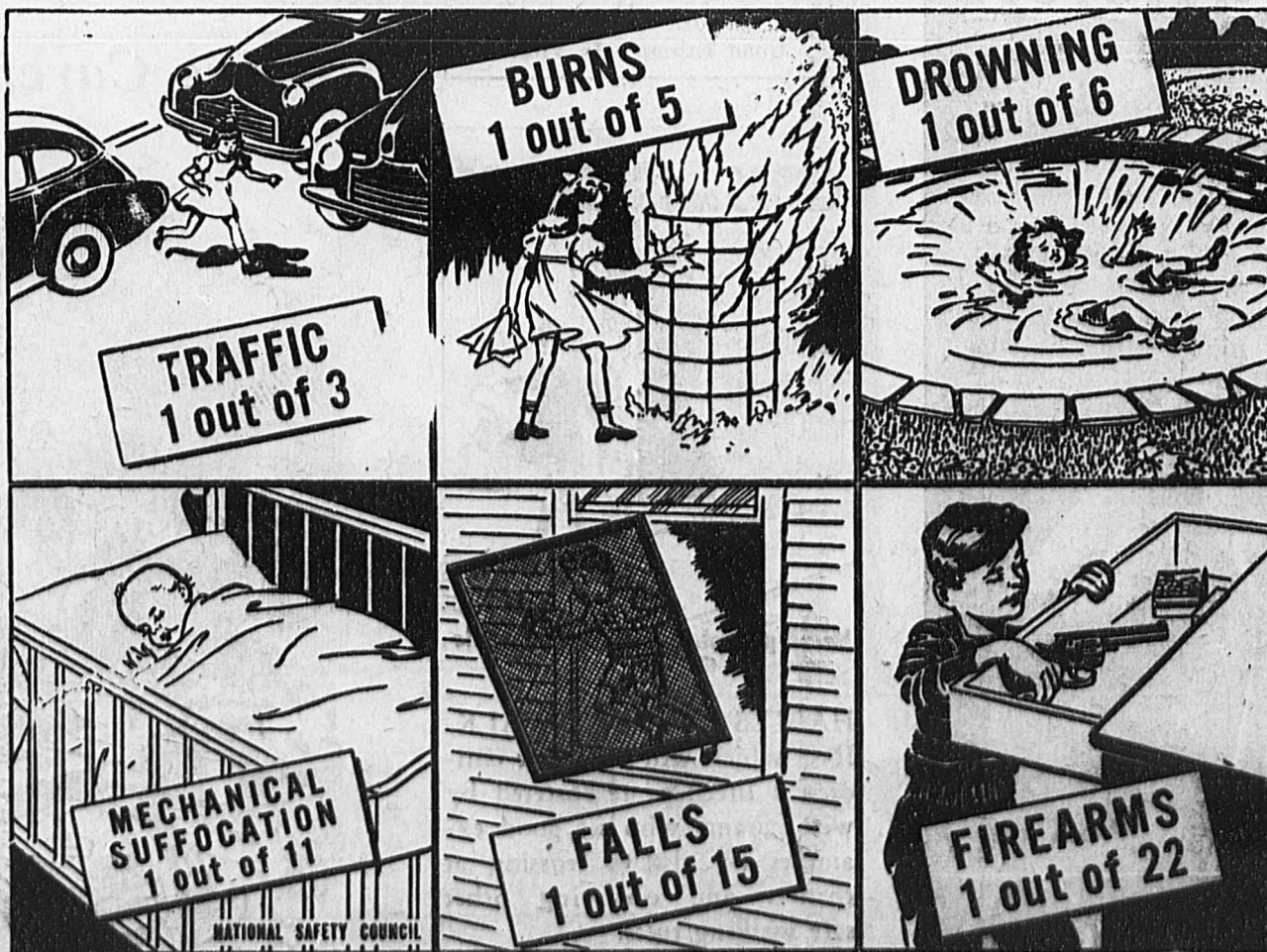
You Live

Radio, Parades, School Patrols To Promote, Pre Christmas Project

As part of its Pre-Christmas safety drive, the Pittsburg Safety Council aided by the Junior Safety Council will distribute safety bulletins downtown Dec. 18.

Jr. Safety Councils To Aid With Drive

When the Senior Safety Council conducts its annual pre-Christmas safety drive this year, it will be aided by the Junior Safety Council of Pittsburg.

Organized Oct. 13, members representing the three high schools are as follows: St. Mary's, Bob Kazmierski, John Deruy, and Walter Murphy; College Hi, John Macek, Dale Wisdom, and John Chatman; Senior Hi, Hugh Spencer, Don Menchetti, and Charles Peterman. Officers elected were John Deruy president, John Macek vice-president, and Walter Murphy secretary.

Holding their first meeting Nov. 24, each member reported on what had been done so far at his school.

This pre-Christmas drive which will run the week of Dec. 13-18 is the second one sponsored by the PSC and will be directed toward making residents of Pittsburg more aware of dangers on streets and highways during the holidays and will suggest their adoption of safer driving and walking habits throughout the year.

Safety talks will be made during the week by members of the Junior Safety Council to various civic and social groups here in town.

Pittsburg High Schools' speech department will take to the air during the week over KOAM and KSEK with a special 10 minute radio dramatization on safety.

School patrols under the direction of John Pryor will continue their work at school intersections and will participate in a uniformed safety parade Saturday at 1:30. Some 60 pupils will participate in the parade which will start at ninth and Broadway.

Council Promotes Safety Campaign

Pittsburg's Safety Council is a voluntary organization which was organized in July, 1947.

It will present a Pre-Christmas Safety Drive this year. Last year this Drive received national recognition from National Safety Council and American Automobile Association. That was because so many organizations participated in the Drive, such as the Booster and other high school papers, Boy Scouts, Junior Safety Council and many more.

The original call for the Pittsburg Safety Council was issued by the Mayor in June, 1947. The Mayor is General Chairman of the Council. The PSC operates through the Executive Board. A formal Constitution to perpetuate the organization was adopted by the Executive Board in September 1948. This Constitution is to be ratified by the council as a whole at the annual meeting in June 1949.

PSC promotes public safety either direct or through cooperating organizations, such as the American Legion, the School Patrols, the Junior Red Cross, and KSTC Safety Committees. For the term ending June 1949, it is expected that three safety drives will be organized.

The Pittsburg Safety Council's purpose is "To promote public safety; to recommend safety measures to governing groups; to cooperate with safety programs of other organizations; all within the city of Pittsburg."

Policeman To Treat Patrol To Show

Local Fox theaters will play host Saturday to some 200 children who have served on School Patrols this year.

Safety Patrolman Pryor suggested that a reward be given to children who had taken their turn on school patrols. Mr. Steele, manager of the local Fox theaters, supported the idea by inviting the group to attend a local theater.

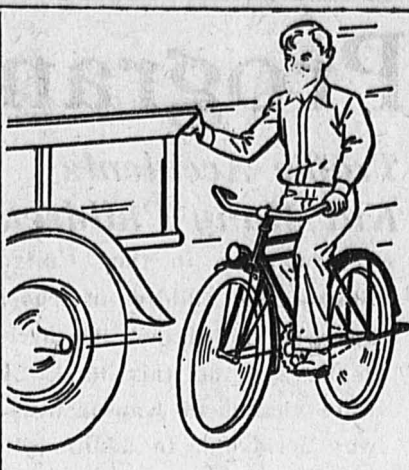

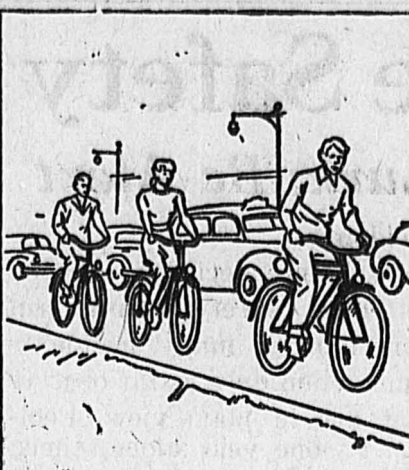
Bicycle Riders Learn Safety Rules



DO use arm signals to warn those behind that you intend to slow down, stop or turn. Bicyclists must follow rules of road just like motorists if 1947 bike death toll of 550 is to be cut.



DON'T hitch to moving vehicles of any kind. This is one of the most dangerous bike stunts, takes many lives and brings countless injuries. You are in danger from every direction.



DO ride single file on the extreme right side of the road. Riding abreast or weaving in and out of traffic slows vehicles, confuses motorists and boosts chance of accident.



DON'T carry passengers on the crossbar, handlebar or fender. Never break this rule, even for the best girl friend. Extras make bike hard to handle, is one of chief crack-up causes.



DO have a dependable headlight on front and clean reflector on rear for night riding. Risk goes up as sun goes down, so smart riders will have bike in garage by nightfall to be safe.

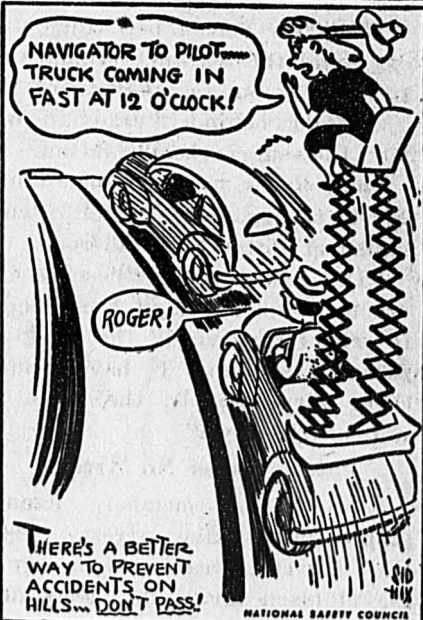

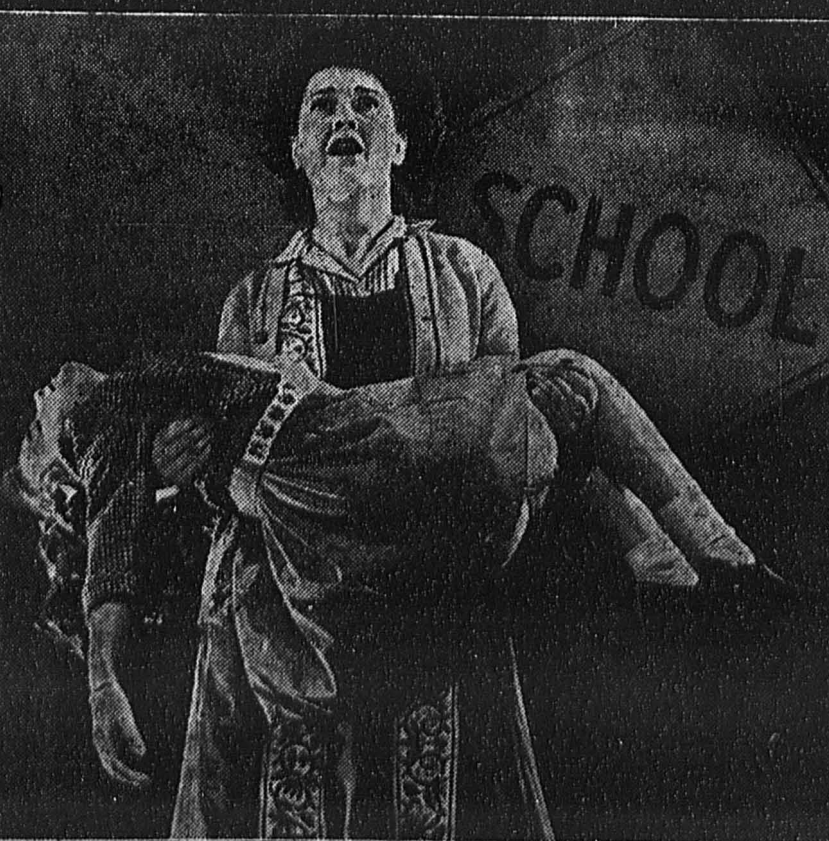

This scholarship program is sponsored by the Westinghouse Educational Foundation with the idea of promoting education and science.

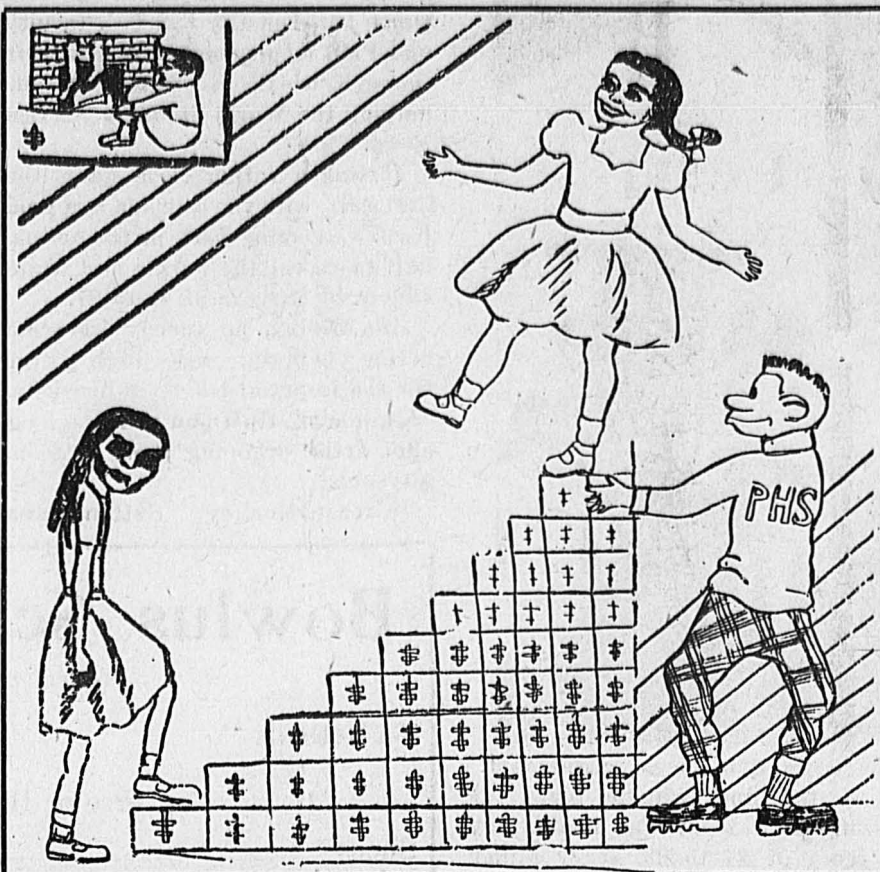

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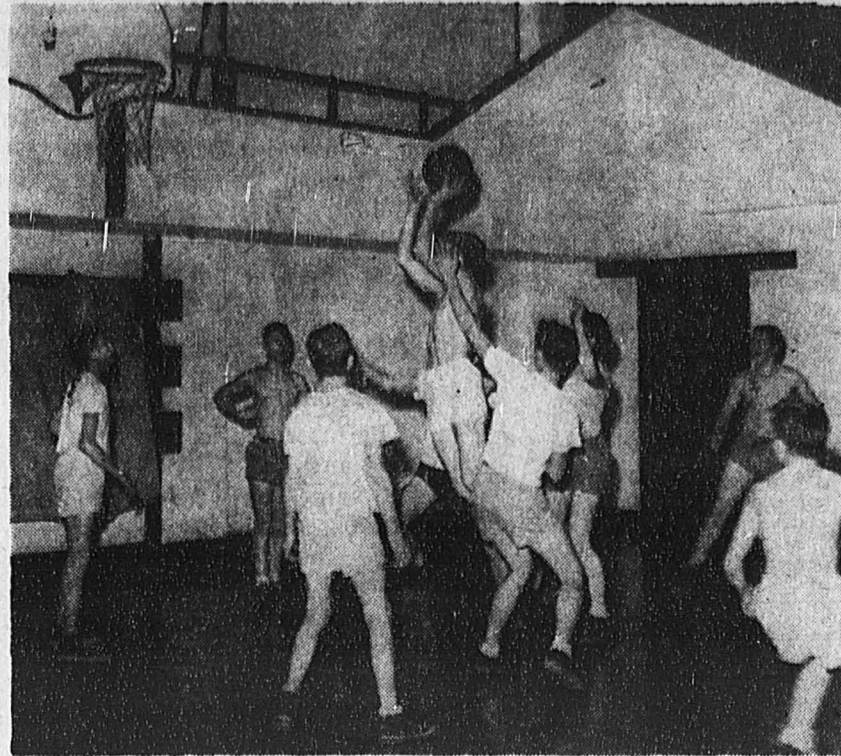
