The Pittsburg Posaunen Ensemble

It is a virtual foregone conclusion that chamber music is one of the quickest, easiest, and best ways to develop ensemble concepts. Within the large ensembles the intimacy and function of every part is often difficult for young performers to hear and achieve. The P.P.E. strives to assist players to understand the roles of

each part and how different ways of scoring affect its sound and function.

In most ensembles an individual is assigned 1st, 2nd, 3rd or 4th part. In P.P.E. all the tenor trombonists rotate the books so that on any given concert all three tenor players may play 1st, 2nd and 3rd parts. In this way the members of the group experience the different problems associated with each part. All players benefit from experienceing problems of pitch and style that come about by the different demands placed on each player.

The result of this approach is a better and more unified understanding of the music because each trombonist is intimately aware of what the other members are

contributing to the ensemble.

The Pittsburg Posaunen Ensemble has performed at two Midwestern Trombone Workshops and this marks its second appearance at the K.M.E.A. Workshop.
