TB Tests Show Few Positives

"I was quite pleased and delighted to see the small number of positive reactions to the tuberculin tests," Miss Margaret Woods, school nurse, stated.

Of 2350 tuberculin tests given in the Pittsburg schools with the exception of Horace Mann, only 39 positive reactions were recorded. Nine of these were from the 2nd students in Pittsburg High School who participated. Nine positive reactions were also recorded among the 225 students in Roosevelt Junior High.

Students from the Pittsburg schools who proved positive will be contacted by Mrs. Hyatt who will make appointments for x-rays to determine if the positive reaction is due to an active case of tuberculosis. This service is provided by the state and county tuberculosis association.

Students who wish to have x-rays in addition to the tuberculin test will be given the opportunity late this spring when the x-ray unit will be in the Pittsburg district.

Choose Play For Drama Festival

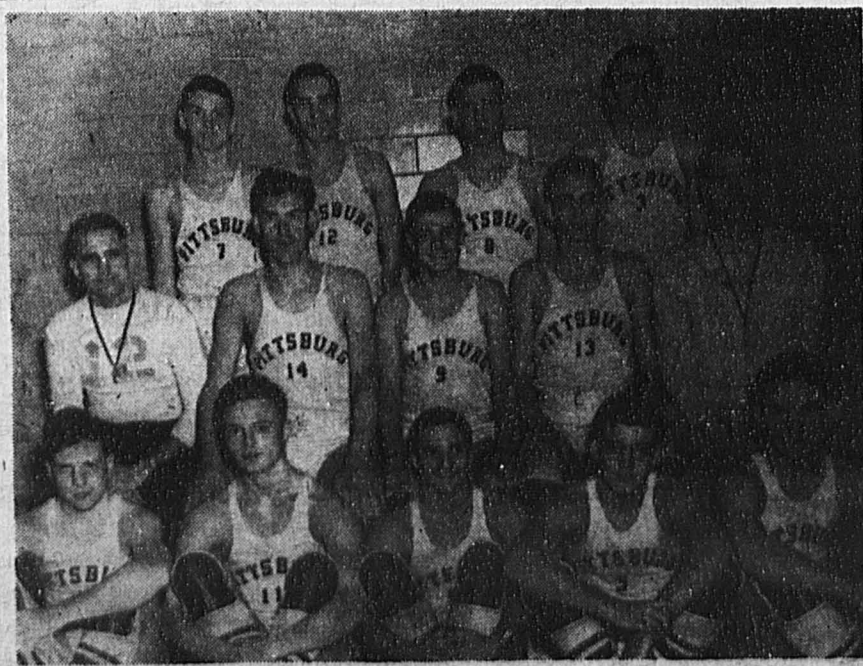
Saturday, March 25, PHS students will compete with those of other schools in a state high school speech and drama district elimination contest to be held at the Kansas State Teachers College. First division winners will go to the state finals at the University of Kansas sometime early in April.

Mr. Tewell has selected "The Man In The Bowler Hat" by A. A. Milne for the PHS entry in the one act play division. "This is an especially fine comedy which has placed high in contests all over the United States," said Mr. Tewell. Any student of PHS was eligible for tryouts whether or not he had taken speech or dramatics before. Two juniors and five seniors have been selected for parts in the play. They are: John, Phil Reid; Mary, Norma Simons; Hero, Clayton Walker; Heroine, Beth Phillips; Felion, James McDaniels; Bad Man, Ed Kelly; The Man in The Bowler Hat, Kaye Rickets.

This thirty minute play opens with a family scene and just as John's wife, Mary, remarks that nothing ever happens to them a pistol shot is heard, followed by sounds of distress. Things start happening fast and funny now; the hero enters followed by the heroine. Soon after their departure the Villian enters; and the hero is bound and gagged. A precious gem is stolen and placed in a hat box which is put in a checking locker. The ticket from this locker is placed in another locker and this procedure is repeated many times, making it necessary to open all lockers in rotation before the one containing the gem may be opened. The Man In The Bowler (Derby) Hat sitting on the stage watching the entire play is a mysterious character whose identity reveals the plot of the play. The comedy will be given for senior high students, before it is presented at the college festival.

Other fields of contests are: Extemporaneous Speaking on Civil Rights, Original Oration, Standard Oration, Humorous Declamation, Dramatic Declaration, Informative Speaking, Radio Announcing, and Poetry Reading. Mr. Tewell hopes to have representation in all divisions.

It is interesting to note that last year PHS students did exceptionally well at the festival, coming home with seven first ratings out of ten events. Clarence Dixon, graduate of last year, received three of these ratings, "We can do well this year if we work hard," stated Mr. Tewell.

Highschoolers from Lander, Wyoming, give that answer to the nation's teen-agers in a picture report titled "No Place for Dudes" in the February issue of LADIES' HOME JOURNAL.

From Lander, Wyoming, a town of 4000 near the center of the state, the high school group reports that their fun is rough and ready and clothes are made to match. For boys, low-slung Levis, colorful shirts, cowboy hats and boots are appropriate for the weekly square dances. Girls report their fashion trick is to give wide-brimmed hats of straw the "Wyoming Flare" by wetting the toppers and shaping the crowns and brims with rubber bands. They also visit the nearby Shoshone Reservation for fancy beaded and fringed moccasins, boots, jackets and bags. A male teen "with a fad on a girl" will stalk a deer in the mountains, then have gloves made for her from the deerhide.

Home parties are rare and the biggest party in recent memory took place after the football homecoming celebration when thirty fellows and girls gathered to peroxide their hair. Then some dyed streaks of bright green, the color, with vegetable tints. Reaction of the more conservative crowd: "Such is life on a totem pole".

In Lander, "where trails end and trails begin", fresh-air doings may include trail rides far into the mountains, midwinter swimming at steaming hot springs on the Indian reservation or rabbit hunting at night with a .22 and a spotlight. 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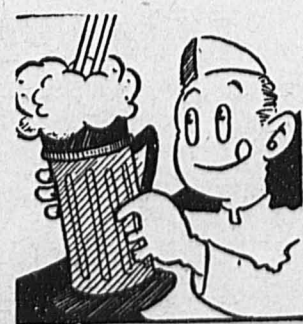
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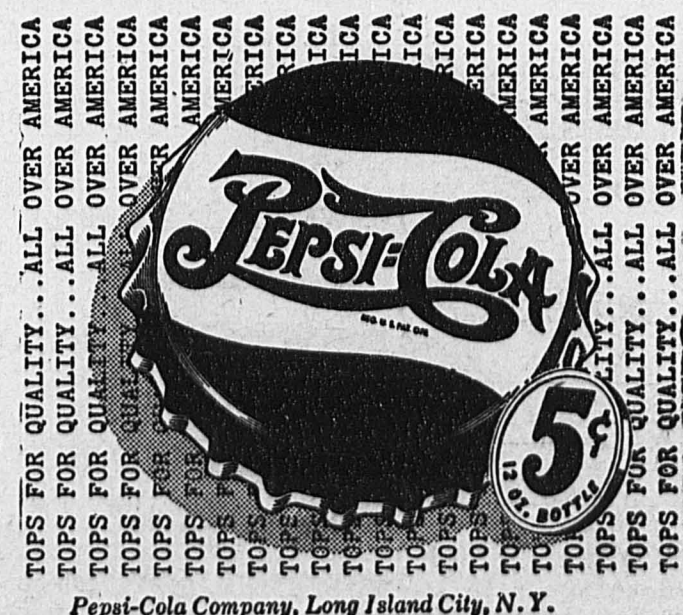
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Host To Regional Cage Tourney

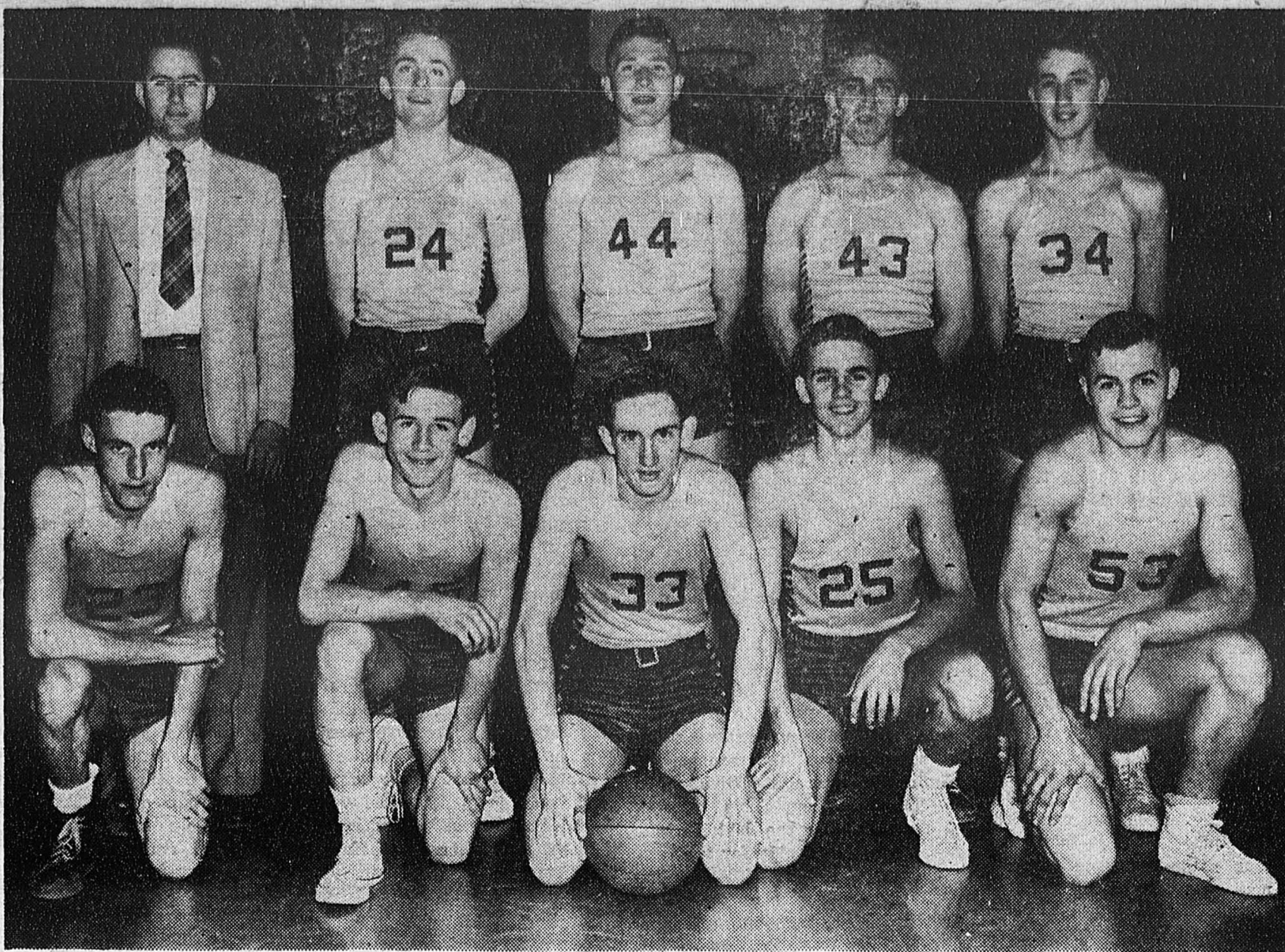
