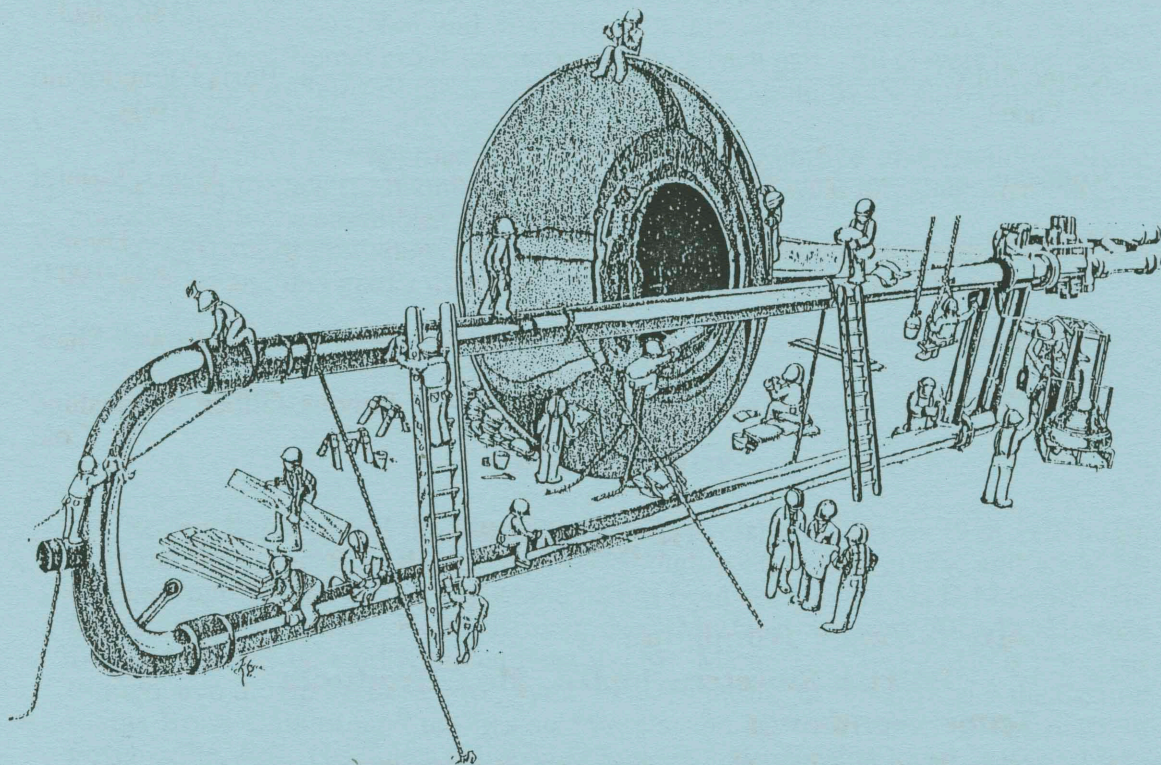

## **The Pittsburg Posaunen Ensemble**

It is a virtual foregone conclusion that chamber music is one of the quickest, easiest, and best ways to develop ensemble concepts. Within the large ensembles the intimacy and function of every part is often difficult for young performers to hear and achieve. The P.P.E. strives to assist players to understand the roles of each part and how different ways of scoring affect its sound and function.

In most ensembles an individual is assigned 1st, 2nd, 3rd or 4th part. In P.P.E. all the tenor trombonists rotate the books so that on any given concert all three tenor players may play 1st, 2nd and 3rd parts. In this way the members of the group experience the different problems associated with each part. All players benefit from experiencing problems of pitch and style that come about by the different demands placed on each player.

The result of this approach is a better and more unified understanding of the music because each trombonist is intimately aware of what the other members are contributing to the ensemble.

The Pittsburg Posaunen Ensemble has performed at two Midwestern Trombone Workshops and this marks its second appearance at the K.M.E.A. Workshop.

## **Robert Kehle**

Robert Kehle joined the Pittsburg State University faculty in 1978. He holds both the B.M. and B.A. degree from Washington State University, and an M.M. degree from Indiana University where he has been completing his D.M. work. He has studied with Mr. Keith Brown, Mr. M. Dee Stewart, Dr. S. Thomas Beversdorf, Mr. Edward Kleinhammer and Mr. Michael Olsavsky. He is principal trombone in the Springfield, Mo., Symphony Orchestra, trombonist with the Central Plains Brass Quintet, and teaches summers at the Music Festival of Arkansas in Fayetteville, Ark. His duties at Pittsburg State include teaching lower brass and jazz studies.

As a clinician and soloist, Mr. Kehle has given presentations at conferences throughout the midwest for varying groups of educators, students and professionals. He has soloed with bands, jazz groups and recently with the Springfield symphony Orchestra.
