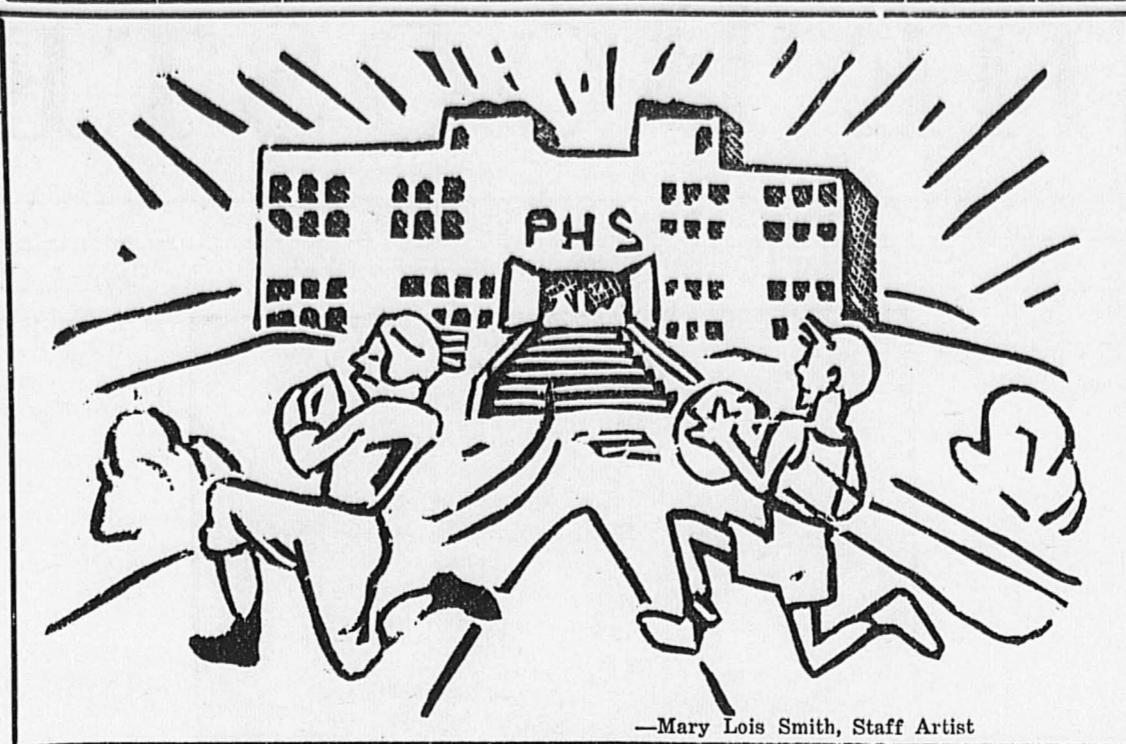

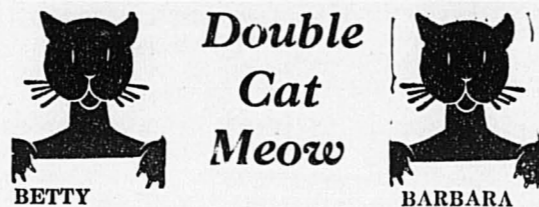

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Titans Swamp Dragons To Win Second Place

Cowan and Jack Robinson Score for Columbus; Lance Leads Pitt.

After 7 years of losing the Columbus Titans staged an upset on the Pittsburg Purple Dragons by defeating them 13-to-0 on the Columbus gridiron last Thanksgiving Day.

The Titans played a lusty game, chalking up over twice as many yards gained as by the Pittsburg eleven, most of which were on long runs around the ends. The Dragons put up a stiff battle during the entire game and once held for downs on their own 6 yard line.

Jay Cowan dominated the field for Columbus, smashing his way to frequent gains through the center of the Pittsburg line. He made one of the

Ray Lance tried to lead the Dragons on a touchdown jaunt in the third period and again in the fourth, but the Titans gave just so much and then started to buck the Pittsburg team ferociously. These were the only Dragon threats.

The "Coal Bucket" donated by the Lions Club of Pittsburg will repose in Columbus.

Big Bill Poland will probably be the choice for center with Lance and Wells, two steller guards, providing plenty of opposition for enemy forwards.

Jack Broadhurst and Pogson, or Peterson, will be the forwards. Last year Broadhurst made the second all SEK team and will be counted on for plenty of fast shifty floor play.

There is only one Non-league game scheduled for this season as the SEK is being played in a double round-robin in which all teams play all other teams two times. This kind of schedule will be more interesting for the spectators but more time to the players and will cause considerable more worry to the coaches.

This game is sponsored by the Hi-Y and Girl Reserves and is not a league game

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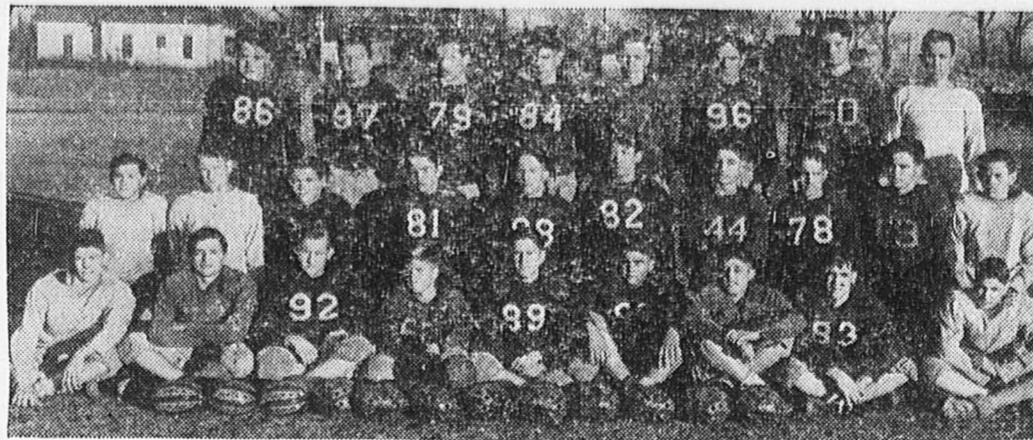
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Petunia Reserves Roll-up Impressive Record

The season was opened against Frontenac on Sept. 21 with a scoreless tie. The teams were evenly matched and the game was a see-saw, with one team gaining a few yards, of medical then the other.

Cherokee was the next opponent of the sophies, with the Petunias emerging the 19-7 victor. Touchdowns were scored by Seibert, Bush, and Wickware, for Pittsburg, with Seibert tossing to Neptune for the extra point. Purdum scored the lone Cherokee tally, with Madison taking a pass from Spigerelli for the ex-

tra point. Columbus was the victim of a 36-0 trouncing with Neptune and Bush scoring two touchdowns each and Wickware and Lemler one each.

Mulberry was the next prey for the Petunias. The opponents fell, 13-0 for the second shut-out of the season. The Arma reserves were no exception to the rule and finished on the small end of a 19-6 score, with Wickware, Bush, and Lemler scoring touchdowns.

Next came Ft. Scott, the fifth to fall at the hands of the rapidly improving

sophie squad. Zimmerman, Wickware, and Lemler scored in the 19-0 defeat. Columbus again was the underdog, this time 31-0, and Ft. Scott was the next to suffer defeat from the Petunias for the second time. The score was 20-6.

The last opponent of the Petunias was Parsons, who showed up better than any other against the strong sophomore squad. 24-13 was the final account, a margin of seven points, the smallest margin of victory for the entire season.

The team is made up entirely of

sophomores and freshmen and should furnish some good material for next year's Dragons. One player, Dale Bush, has already been drafted for a first berth with the Dragons.

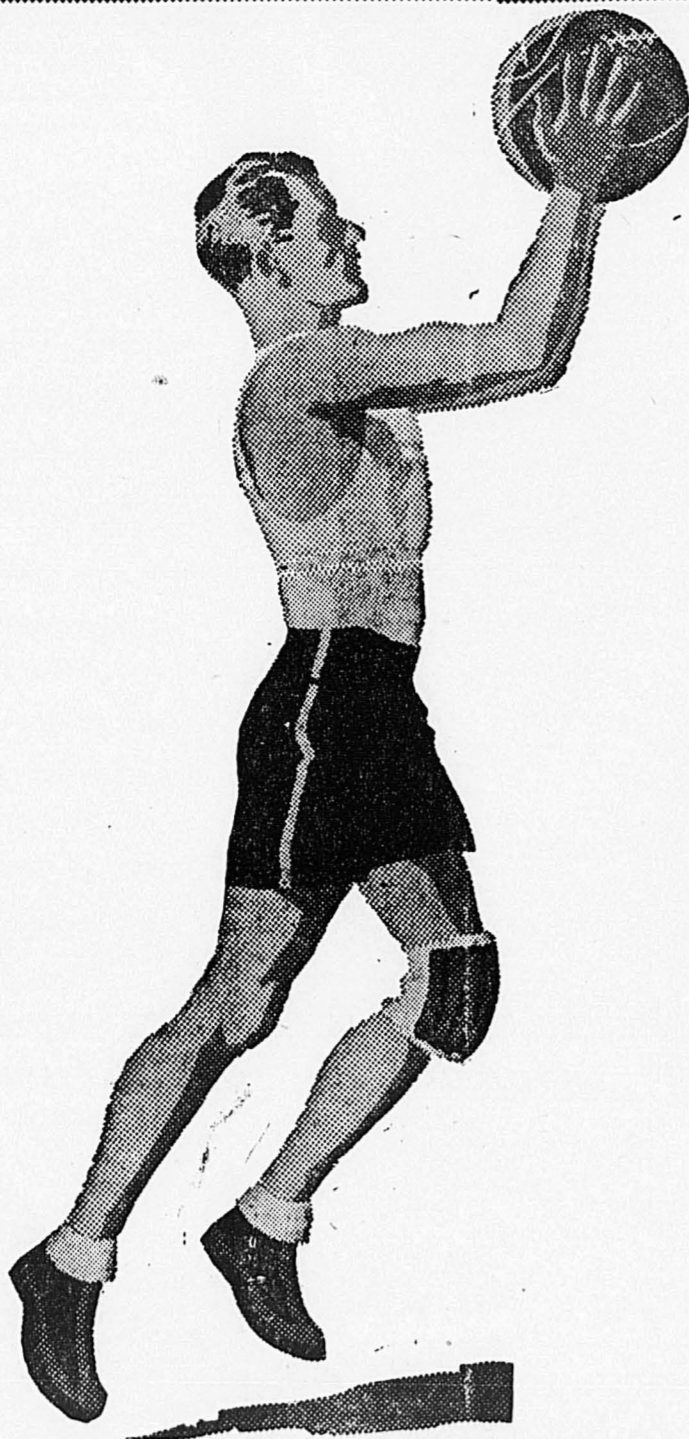
