(2) Each star of the flag should have one point reaching toward the top.

(3) The flags when displayed by an organization, will correspond with that displayed by a soldier's family, except that one star may be used with the number of members serving indicated by Arabic numerals, which will appear below the star.

Some cautions to be taken are— (1) The service flag will never be used as a covering for a statue, monument, or other articles.

(2) When displayed with the flag of the United States, the American must not be dipped, but the service flag may be dipped as a mark of honor.

(3) The service flag must be free and aloft. It will never touch anything beneath it, such as the floor, water or the windowsill. It must never be used as a drape, be drawn back or fastened.

The law permits and the regulations calls for a service lapel button or pin to be made having the same design and the same restrictions as to display as has the the service flag.

(2) Each star of the flag should have one point reaching toward the top.

(3) The flags when displayed by an organization, will correspond with that displayed by a soldier's family, except that one star may be used with the number of members serving indicated by Arabic numerals, which will appear below the star.

Some cautions to be taken are— (1) The service flag will never be used as a covering for a statue, monument, or other articles.

(2) When displayed with the flag of the United States, the American must not be dipped, but the service flag may be dipped—as a mark of honor.

(3) The service flag must be free and aloft. It will never touch anything beneath it, such as the floor, water or the windowsill. It must never be used as a drapey, be drawn back or fastened.

The law permits and the regulations calls for a service lapel button or pin to be made having the same design and the same restrictions as to display as has the the service flag.

Of War Announces Service Flag Display

official service flag display. There is also, an official code governing its display.

The authorized flag design of which was announced by Secretary of War Stimson, is identical with the design popularly used during the first World War—a white field with a red border, with blue and gold stars for the service men, living and dead. Flags now displayed, or offered for sale, bearing bars the letter "V" mottoes and patriotic slogans do not conform to the regulations.

One patriotic change has been made in the use of the two types of stars. When a blue star is changed to gold, the blue is retained and a slightly smaller gold star is placed over it, leaving a blue border around the gold. No silver stars are authorized.

A complete code on display of the flag has been set up. Some of the points are as follows:

(1) On a white rectangular field a blue star or stars within a red border. The size of the flag will be determined by the circumstances necessitating the display. When displayed with the American flag, both flags should be of the same size.

(2) Each star of the flag should have one point reaching toward the top.
