Basketball Terms Need Explanation

This is the first of a series of short articles telling basketball terminology with a few interpretations of the rules.

1. USES OF PROFANE LANGUAGE

Any boy using profane or obscene language while upon the playing floor may have a technical foul ruled against him and he may be ordered from the court if the official sees fit.

This is a technical foul and one for which a boy may be removed from the game. Only the captain may talk to officials, and he must talk in a respectful manner.

3. COACHES MANNERS

Coaches may not talk to officials in any tone except a respectful one and must not argue with the officials. They must not coach from the sidelines and should show good conduct and sportsmanship through the games.

4. ATTITUDE OF CROUD

If the attitude of the crowd is disrespectful, a technical foul may be called upon them. This means booing, attitude toward officials.
