



1. USES OF PROFANE LAN-GUAGE

CIALS. This is a technical foul and one for which a boy may be removed from the game. Only the captain may talk to officials, and he must talk in a respectful manner.

4. ATTITUDE OF CROUD. If the attitude of the croud is disrespectiful, a technical foul may be called upon them. This means booing, attitude toward officals.
