
One should strive to develope this quality.

"Everything looks about the same around PHS", he smiled, "except that most of the faces are new to me".



Lippitt Tells About Army Experiences

"Snafu" is the word PFC Newton Lippitt '46, gave for his job at the Independence Army Air Field. He works in the control tower, signaling planes and giving directions as to how they are to land, the weather conditions, and other information. Independence is a storage base for planes not in use.

PFC Lippitt entered the service March 11. He received his basic training at Sacc Field, San Antonio, Tex. From there he went to Scott Field, Ill., for radio training. 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
