Prints will be taken in room No. 201, the conference room. Sgt. Beard of the local Police Department will be present to start the ball rolling. Portable printing equipment will be supplied by the Police Department.

"After a system has been set up the prints will be taken at a greater rate of speed and with more efficiency," concluded Eldon Harmon, student chairman.

"The junior high school will have their inspection on Feb. 12," continued Miss Woods. "Local dentists give their time to make this check."

This morning students were examined by Dr. A. L. Crowder and Dr. J. C. Kays, Dr. H. Marion Grandle and Dr. L. J. King did the "open wide, please," for the students in the afternoon.

"In the grade schools, we are having puppet shows stressing the importance of dental health. The shows are put on by the General Tooth Council in Chicago. These shows are planned to give the children educational dental instruction all the way through," smiled Miss Woods.

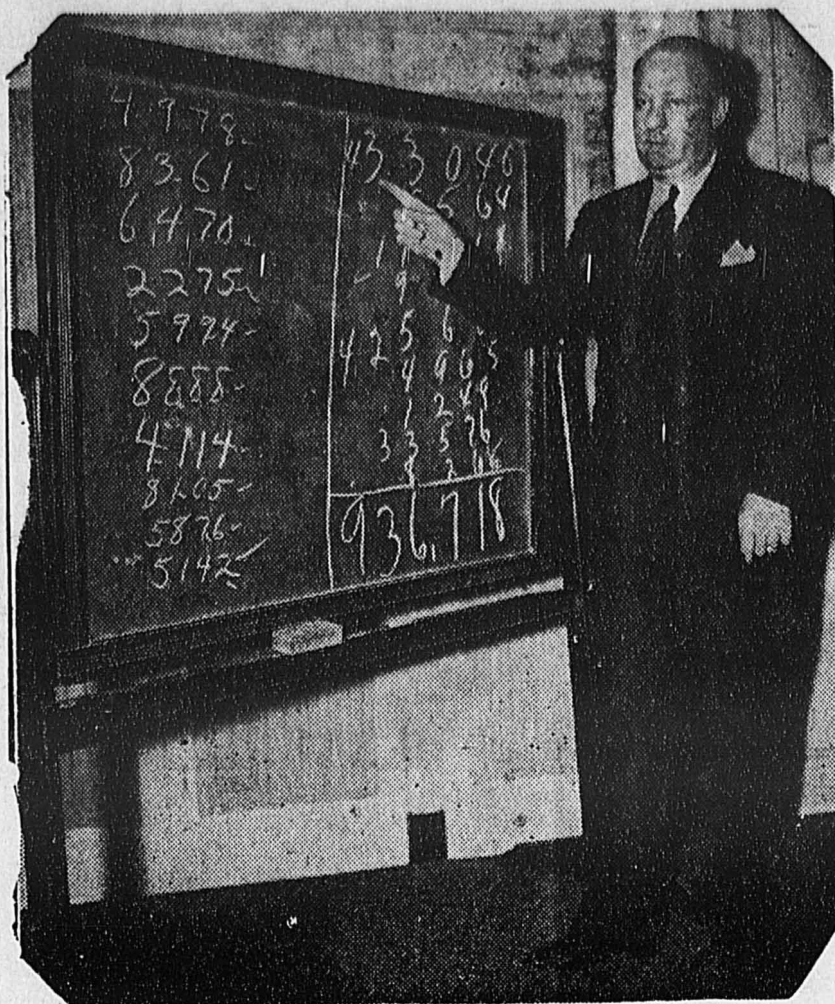
