Only those students who expressed a desire to have their prints taken were "printed." Faculty members who took part were Mr. Morey, Miss Messenger, Mr. White, and Mr. Cromer.

Typists who typed out information were Marjorie McEntire, Maxine Alden, Norma Stotts, Bonnie Johnson, Lena Bevins, Carol Burke, Jeanine Moffatt, Bonnie Scullen, Mary Beth Tanner, and Mary Lou Latty.

**Everyone Cooperated Well** "Students cooperation has been wonderful," said Eldon. "I believe this is the first time this has been done in PHS. We averaged about 1 minute and 10 seconds a person."

After all prints are taken, they will be forwarded to Washington, D. C., to be filed with the FBI's division of civilian indentificaton. Desk Sergeant Ralph Beard of the city police force gave instructions as to how the prints should be taken.

In 1946 dentist found a total of 1189 cavities in the teeth of PHS students. This year there were only 691 cavities found. Although there is quite an improvement it still could be better.

Miss Woods, school nurse, in a recent interview said, "We have had the dental clinic for the past 3 years. We do it only to let the students and their parents know what is wrong with their teeth. Then it is up to them to have the faults corrected.

"If everyone would visit his dentist at least twice a year, eat wholesome foods, and clean his teeth thoroughly two times each day, we would soon all have good teeth."

On many occasions Miss Messenger has had to use towels soaked in hot water — when a heating pad, hot water bottle, or an ice bag would have served the purpose much quicker, easier, and more efficiently. In the boys' dressing room, there isn't cot for a boy to lie on if he becomes suddenly ill.

Many schools with an enrollment no larger than PHS have such things. This school is indeed fortunate in having a clinic and a well-qualified school nurse, in addition to gym teachers who "know their stuff," but at times a need arises for such equipment as a STRETCHER, HEATING PADS, ICE BAGS and a COT for the boys' dressing room. And most certainly there is a need for RUBBER MATS in the shower rooms.




