"Wild Bill" Ames, who speaks in assembly Friday, Nov. 19, at 2 p.m., is a good example of "haphazard" success.

Beginning his career as an impersonator as a lark, Bill Ames

## Safety Is Theme Of State Officials Patrol Keeps Accident Reports

As a part of renewed efforts in the program to prevent traffic accidents, the Safety Department of the State Highway Commission has sent out 125,000 traffic accident report forms to sheriffs, chiefs of police and insurance companies in the state, Claud R. McCamment, State Safety engineer, announced today.

The Kansas State law requires drivers involved in any accident amounting to \$50 or more in property damage to both cars, personal injury or fatality, to make out an accident report and forward it within 24 hours to the state Safety department. Failure to reply may result in drivers license suspension or a fine.

"We are asking the cooperation of the driving public in this program," McCamment said. "We must have the necessary information on which to act, if we are to prevent a similar accident from happenings," he stated.

"No one likes to make out forms, but each report sent in to us may mean saving the life of the other

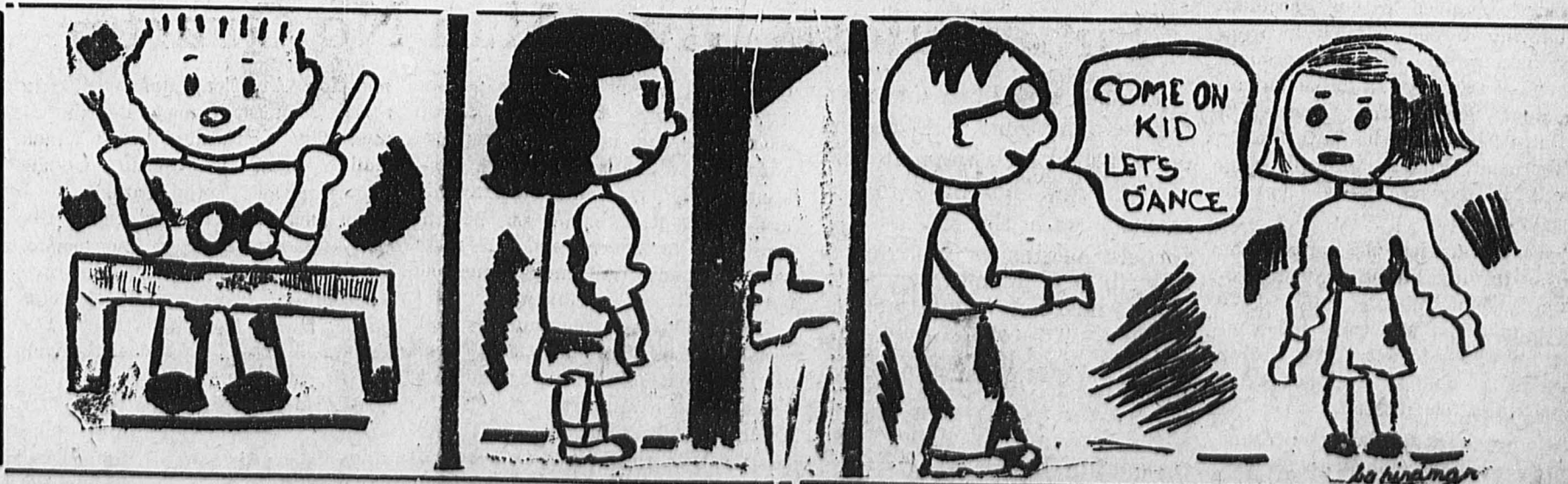

## 4-H Ranch Needs Funds

Fun and developing leadership in the oncoming generations are being combined on the new Rock Spring 4H Club Ranch a mile off U S Highway 77 near Junction City, Kans.

This 348 acre site was purchased in January, 1946 and in less than five months 4-H club members had raised the \$22,500 purchase price and paid off the mortgage.

Fund-raising activities of 4-H club have ranged from box socials and feed sack sales to livestock auctions and wheat festivals.

Outstanding gifts to the ranch include stable of Palomino riding horses from the Kansas Palomino

Breeder's Association, power lines and electrical equipment from the Kansas Power and Light Co. and farm machinery from International Harvester Company.

Although the land has been paid for; funds for buildings from which to carry on the complete development program is needed.

The campaign goal has been set at \$150,000 for this plan. Nothing is asked for maintenance. The camp will be supported by its own revenue and 4-H membership.

Recently E. A. Thomas, Editor of the Kansas High School Activities Journal, published The Board of Control's interpretation of the antifraternity rule in Kansas High Schools.

"A student who belongs to any organization composed of high school youngster not under the direct supervision of the faculty and whose membership rolls are not open to the entire student body, or anyone else who is concerned and interested, is a member of an illegal organization," explained Mr. Thomas in giving his general interpretation of the antifraternity ruling.

He went on to say that there have been attempts recently in some schools to organize such groups, but any high school permitting the existence of such illegal groups would immediately be placed in jeopardy of losing its membership in The Association.
