Since its inception in 1978, it has performed throughout the midwest for a wide range of audiences including university and college students, guest recital appearances for the public and for various professional meetings. The Quintet also performs a program especially designed for young public school audiences. The members of the Quintet are all active as teacher-performers in the immediate area.

Steve Harry, Trumpet

Mr. Harry is currently Director of Instrumental Music and Music Theory at Fort Scott Community College. He holds a B.M.E. and a B.M. degree from Pittsburg State University, a M.M. degree from Wichita State University, and is pursuing Doctoral Studies at the University of Kansas. Mr. Harry has performed with the Wichita Symphony, Wichita Summer Theater Orchestra, Henry Mancini, Bob Hope, Wayne Newton, Ice Capades, and John Davidson. He has appeared as trumpet soloist with the Wichita State University and the Pittsburg State University Orchestras. Mr. Harry was also solo cornetist on European and South American Concert Tours. His teachers include Dr. Roger Stoner, David Hickman, Dr. Walt Myers and Richard G. Cook.

Marilynn Curran, Trumpet

Ms. Curran holds a B.M.E. degree from Pittsburg State University and is currently pursuing a M.M. degree at P.S.U. She has also studied trumpet at Wichita State University and the University of Kansas. Ms. Curran has performed with the International World Youth Orchestra, the Wichita Symphony, Holiday on Ice, Az-Is, Chase, and the Jack Henderson Orchestra. She has studied with David Hickman, Dr. Walt Myers, Robert Grocock, and Dr. Gary Corcoran. Ms. Curran is currently Supervisor and Director of Instrumental Music at USD # 447, Cherryvale, Kansas.

Wayne Harrell, Horn

Dr. Harrell presently is a member of the music faculty at Missouri Southern State College in Joplin. He performs as a soloist-clinician throughout the midwest. Dr. Harrell has performed as a member of the 62nd U.S. Army Band, the Arlington Chamber Orchestra, the Marlboro Festival Orchestra, the Wichita Symphony, the Springfield Symphony, the Joplin Community Orchestra and numerous chamber ensembles including the PSU Faculty Quintet, and the MSSC Faculty Trio. Dr. Harrell is a graduate of Wichita State University and the University of Northern Colorado.

Robert Kehle, Trombone

Mr. Kehle is currently Instructor of Lower Brass and Director of Jazz Studies at Pittsburg State University. He holds a B.M. and a B.A. from Washington State University, and a Master of Music on Trombone (with extensive work toward the Doctorate) from Indiana University. He has studied with Dr. S. Thomas Beversdorf (formerly of the Pittsburgh, PA, Symphony), Mr. Keith Brown (formerly of the Philadelphia and Metropolitan Opera Orchestras), Mr. M. Dee Stewart (formerly of the Philadelphia Orchestra), Mr. Edward Kleinhammer of the Chicago Symphony and Mr. Mike Olsavsky (formerly of the Spokane Symphony). Mr. Kehle has played with the Spokane Jazz Society, back-up for many touring artists, and has done recording work in the Indianapolis area. Besides his jazz and commercial experience, he has played trombone with the Spokane and Mid-Columbia Symphonies, the Indiana Brass Quintet, and is currently principal trombonist with the Springfield Symphony.

Richard Council, Tuba

Mr. Council attended Del Mar College of Corpus Christi, Texas, and holds a B.M. from Indiana University and a M.M. from the University of Tulsa. He taught public schools for three years in Virginia and Texas, as well as Low Brass Instructor at Shenandoah Conservatory. He was principal tubist with the San Antonio Symphony, Tulsa Philharmonic, and Corpus Christi Symphony. Mr. Council has studied Tuba with William Bell, William McKee and Emerson Harader. Currently he resides in Independence, Kansas.
